Area Residents Discuss Proposed Village With TVA

Approximately 80 residents from the Northeast Mississippi area discussed TVA's proposal for the construction of a village near Pickwick Lake with agency representatives last Thursday night, June 1, at the Tishomingo County Courthouse.

TVA is conducting a feasibility study covering the proposal, which is called the Northeastern Mississippi Demonstration Project, which could possible solve housing and training problems for some workers on TVA's proposed Yellow Creek Nuclear Power Plant.

Representatives explained the proposal would involve construction of a small village accommodating 300 to 400 individuals, at a 240-acre site 12 miles north of Iuka and 1.7 miles from the nuclear plant.

Plant workers, especially those in minority groups, would live at the village, participating in job skills

and personal training programs after work. Other TVA employees also would live in the village, which would have 100 mobile homes, 50 motel-type rooms and 25 cabins.

Some individuals who opposed the demonstration project told TVA officials they feared the training and housing program would reduce the number of area residents TVA would hire for the nuclear plant construction.

TVA Yellow Creek projects coordinator John Hendrix said the demonstration project would be "a supplement to and not in lieu of" TVA Programs to promote local hiring.

During the eight years of plant construction, TVA also would use the village and its adjacent 60-acre island to study integration of a variety of energy systems, including solar and wood-burning, TVA officials said.

After the nuclear plant is in operation, the site would be returned to Mississippi government for use as a recreational area in the J.P. Coleman State Park.

Some individuals at the meeting opposed the demonstration project, expressing concern about the financial burden the state would assume to maintain the site after TVA has returned it to Mississippi.

Some Tishomingo County residents who use the proposed site for recreation also objected to its conversion from a natural area to a developed recreational site.

Hendrix said TVA will consider all comments and ideas presented at the public meeting as it decides if it will adopt the proposal.

Union Agreement Reached

Don Cowell, Plant Manager of Consolidated Aluminum Corporation's Iuka Plant, and Jimmy M. "Troy" South, President of Aluminum Workers International Union Local No. 206, announced that, after several days of negotiating, the Company and the Union reached agreement May 27, 1978, on the terms of a new 3-year Labor Agreement, which became effective June 1, 1978.

Approximately 44 Production and maintenance employees of the Iuka Plant are covered by the new agreement.

TRACTOR-AUTO ACCIDENT CLAIMS LIFE OF COUNTY FARMER

One of Tishomingo County's most outstanding farmers was killed Wednesday,

May 31, in a tractor-auto accident, just three miles from his home in the Holts

Spur Community.

Elbert Ray Davis, 47, was dead on arrival at Tishomingo County Hospital after the tractor he was riding was hit from behind by a 1974 Plymouth, driven by Luther Pruitt, of Burnsville. According to Curtis Butler, Mississippi Highway Patrolman, the crash occurred around 9:00 Wednesday evening when the auto driven by Pruitt, traveling south of Burnsville on Highway 365, ran into the rear of the Davis tractor, also headed south. The heavy equipment overturned on impact, throwing the driver under the plows. According to Mrs. Davis, her husband had been plowing ground to plant soybeans on Wednesday and was returning home when the accident occurred.

Luther Pruitt, driver of the car, was treated in the Tishomingo County Hospital emergency room for

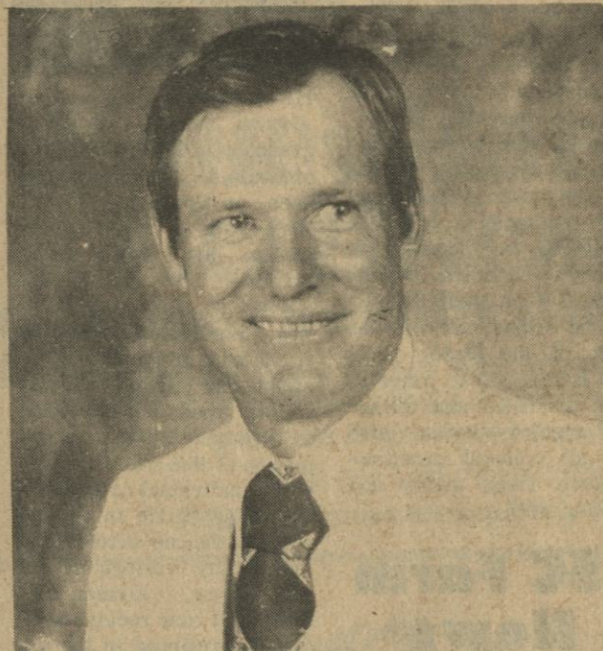
lacerations, contusions, and a possible fracture and was later transferred to the Coffee Memorial Hospital in Florence. According to a family spokesman, he is reported as improving, but still remains in serious condition.

Funeral services for Ray Davis were held at 2 p.m. Friday at the Berea Church of Christ with Marvin Rainey officiating. Burial was in Berea Cemetery with Cutshall Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

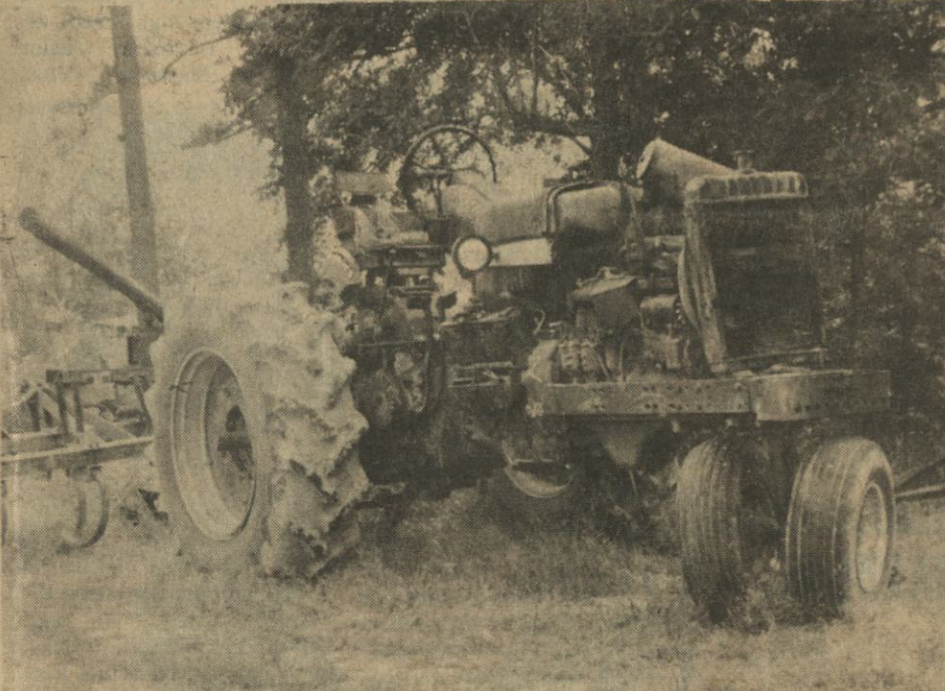
Mr. Davis was an active participant in both church and community affairs. He served as part-time Church of Christ minister and part-time Farmer's Aid with the Extension Service. As a leading farmer in Tishomingo County, he served as chairman of the ASCS County Committee; Director of the Holcut-Cairo Water Assn.; President of the Tishomingo County Pork Producers; and member of the Soil and Water Conservation Board. He also held membership in the Yellow Creek Watershed Authority; the Agriculture and Forestry Committee; the Cattlemen's Association; the 208 Water Control; the Test Demonstration Farmers; and the Appalachian Regional Commission. Mr. Davis was also a former employee of Conalco in Iuka.

A resident of the Holts Spur Community since 1949, Elbert Ray Davis was the son of Mrs. Fannie Davis and the late Elton L. Davis, of Burnsville. He married the former Gloria Briley, of the Leedy Community, and had one child, Anna Lea, 10 years old.

Other survivors include five brothers, Luther Davis, of Tupelo; Garvin E. Davis, of Booneville; Ruben C., Roy Dewayne and Elton Junior Davis, all of Burnsville.

DANTIN, FINCH IN RUNOFF; COCHRAN, WHITTEN, SENTER WIN

Most Mississippi political observers were shocked early Tuesday night, as partial election returns from throughout the state indicated Columbia Attorney Maurice Dantin would lead the ticket in the Democratic Primary for U.S. Senator. Sharing the runoff, which will be held June 27, will be Mississippi Governor Cliff Finch, who came

in second during Tuesday's balloting.

In the Republican Primary for U.S. Senator, Congressman Thad Cochran, of Jackson, rolled to an easy win over his opponent, Charles Pickering, of Laurel.

North Mississippi Democratic Congressional incumbent, Jamie E. Whitten, rolled over primary opposition to win renomination for his party's slot on the November General Election ballot. Whitten had an early lead over Hernando District Attorney Gerald Chatham.

MONEY MANAGEMENT DETERMINES LIFE STYLE

Inflation and the energy crunch have created basic changes in life-styles of Mississippians. There are basic changes in the way money is spent.

As a matter of necessity, people are becoming more selective. According to the U. S. Department of Commerce, the average American family spent 5.6 percent more of its total income on health care in 1976 than it did in 1950, 3.9 percent more on housing and 1.6 percent more on utilities. In the same 26 year period, we spent 7.7 percent less of our total family income on food and drink, 4.3 percent less on clothing and 2.3 percent less on household needs other than utilities.

A family in Mississippi may change its life-style by developing money management practices. If you need help in money management, contact your local Extension home economist for money management publications.

SMALL APPLIANCES CAN SAVE ENERGY

Because small cooking appliances have enclosed heating elements, they often require less energy than an oven or surface unit of a range. Substitute small appliances for a range for some cooking. An electric frypan is energy-efficient and can be used for frying, baking, stewing and broiling. For example, less energy is required to cook hamburgers on an electric frypan than on a surface unit of an electric range. Coffee makers and egg cookers are similarly efficient. Toasters, toaster ovens and

small broilers use less energy than an oven, primarily because they are small and there is less metal to heat.

Another versatile and energy-efficient kitchen utensil is the pressure cooker. Because cooking under pressure is done at higher temperatures, foods cook in one-third the time of conventional cooking methods.

RICE-APPLE CRISP

2 cups cooked rice
1 can (20 oz.) pre-sliced apples
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1 cup brown sugar
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
1/4 teaspoon salt
3/4 cup flour
6 tablespoons butter or margarine
1/2 cup chopped nut meats

Combine rice, apples, lemon juice, 1/2 cup sugar, cinnamon, and salt in buttered shallow baking dish. Mix flour and remaining sugar. Cut in butter until mixture is crumbly. Stir in nut meats. Sprinkle over rice-apple mixture. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes. Serve warm topped with whipped cream. Makes 6 servings.

PEACH TREE BORER CONTROL
Peach tree borer control is a preventive program. To be effective, it must be on schedule. The adult peach tree borer

er moths start emerging in late May and continue at intervals until frost. They lay their eggs on the lower trunks of peaches and plums soon after emerging. After hatching, the young larvae bore through the outer bark into the cambium layer. If the insecticide is present, this larvae will be killed. To be effective and to prevent your having to spray so often, these insecticides must have a long residual action. The recommended materials - chlorpyrifos (Lorsban 4E) and endosulfan (thiodan) - both give residual action of 30 or more days. Chlorpyrifos (Lorsban 4E) is not sold in lots under one gallon. Endosulfan (thiodan) is sold in small containers.

The waiting period for chlorpyrifos (Lorsban 4E) is (Thiodan), 30 days. Consequently, the early ripening varieties cannot be sprayed until after harvest. The late ripening varieties may be sprayed in South Mississippi from May 1 to May 15. In North Mississippi, spray late varieties from May 15 to June 1. Following these first applications, spray every 30 days thereafter through October 1.

The single fall treatment with ethylene dichloride has been cancelled because of the absence of this material from the market.

Peach tree borers attack the tree trunk near or below the ground. Their damage results in a jelly-like substance and frass where they have tunneled into the trunk. When there is jelly on the limbs, this is the work of the lesser peach tree borer, spray limbs as well as fruit and foliage with regular sprays. Also use all cultural practices to keep trees thrifty and growing well.

REPORTING 1977 & 1978 ACP PRACTICES: Many Tishomingo County farmers have ACP practices that expired June 1, 1978. If you have a practice that you have not reported, then you need to report immediately.

DISASTER CROPS:

If a program crop fails you have 15 days from the date of failure to file application for disaster at the county office. Remember! disaster applications must be filed and crop checked by a representative of the county office before crop is destroyed. Any time you have a disaster that affects your crop, please inform the county office before you destroy the crop.

TARGET PRICE RAISED: On May 15, 1978, President Carter signed into law the Emergency Agricultural Act of 1978. Farmers participating in the 1978 wheat set-aside program will be eligible for program benefits based on a target price of \$3.40 instead of \$3.00 per bushel. The minimum loan rate for the 1978 through 1981 crop of upland cotton is increased from .44 cents per pound to .48 cents per pound. Target prices represent a floor price that eligible farmers may receive nationally for their crops planted within the national program acre-

age. If the national acreage market price of a particular crop falls below the target price, a deficiency payment is made equal to the difference between the target price and the larger of the national loan rate or the market price.

BEEKEEPER PROGRAM:

The Beekeeper Indemnity Payment Program in Tishomingo County is administered by this office. In order for you to be eligible for a payment in the event you suffer a pesticide loss, there are certain program requirements you must comply with. Please contact the ASCS Office for further details about this program.

Richard Clark Speaks At Midway RCDC Club

The Midway Rural Development Club met at the Community Center on May 24, at 7 p.m. for the regular meeting.

President, Mr. Edward Wynn, called the meeting to order. Mr. B. L. Mercer gave a very inspiring devotional on "Love", taken from Cor. 1:13.

Guest speaker for the evening was Representative Richard O. Clark. Mr. Clark made an interesting and informative report on the 1978 legislative session. He said that there were 1,500 bills introduced in the House of Representatives, 496 were passed, 1,100 bills were introduced in the Senate with 408 passing.

Mr. Clark said that out of the 863 million dollars of revenue received, 64% was spent on education.

Some of the bills that passed were as follows: Education - \$500,000 teacher pay increase with \$225,00 added for experienced teachers; 5 day minimum sick leave with pay; not more than 24 pupils for each teacher; the state will provide special education teachers for handicapped pupils. Reapportionment Bill - Representatives will be redistricted. 16 Section

Land Use Change - The land will be put up for bid and leased for fair market value. State employees received an increase in salary. 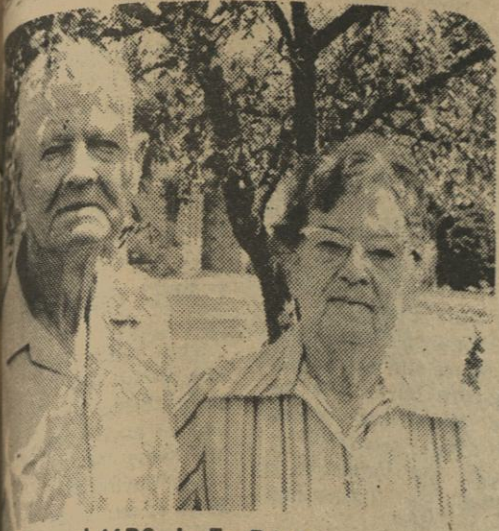

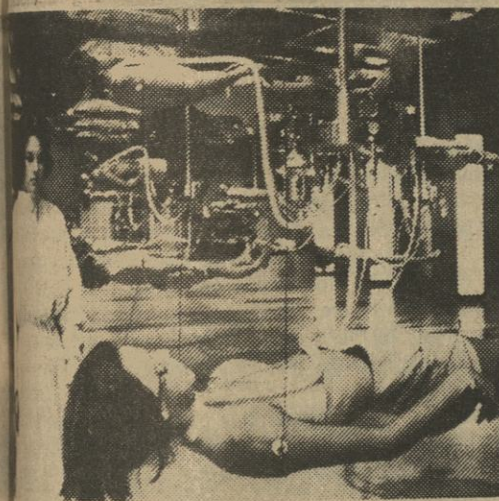
Their roses are exquisite, and the many other well-groomed plants in the yard indicate that there is a housefull of love nearby.

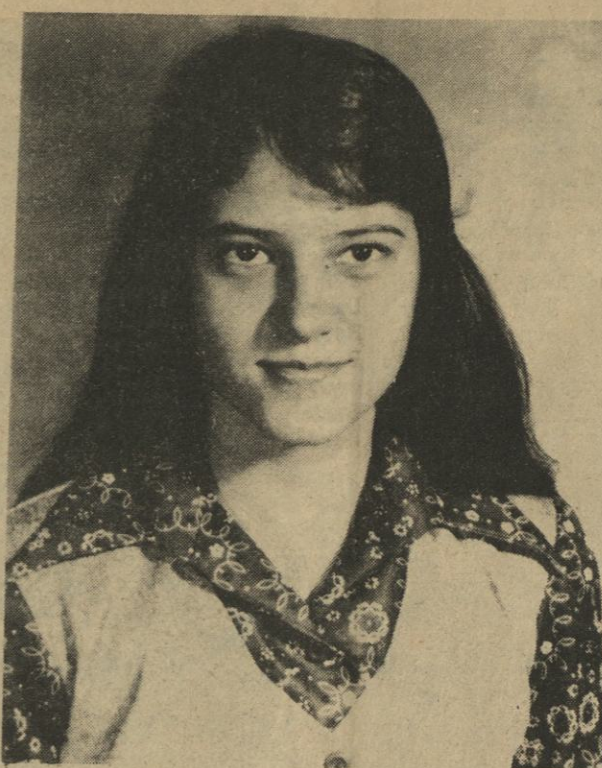

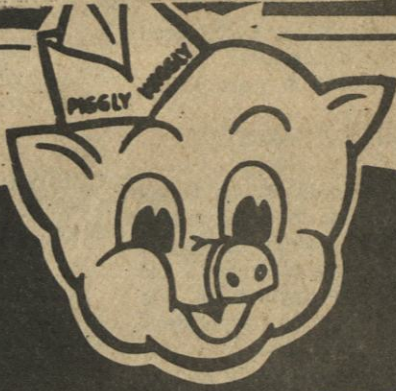
