# TRACTOR-AUTO ACCIDENT CLAIMS

One of Tishomingo County's most outstanding farmers was killed Wednesday,

accident, just three miles from his home in the Holts

Elbert Ray Davis, 47, was dead on arrival at Tishomingo County Hospital after the tractor he was riding was hit from behind by a 1974 Plymouth, driven by Luther Pruitt, of Burnsville. According to Curtis Butler, Mississippi Highway Patrolman, the crash occured around 9:00 Wednesday evening when the auto driven by Pruitt, traveling south of Burnsville on Highway 365, ran into the rear of the Davis tractor, also headed south. The heavy equipment overturned on impact, throwing the driver under the plows. According to Mrs. Davis, her husband had been plowing ground to plant soybeans on Wednesday and was returning home when the accident occured.

Luther Pruitt, driver of the car, was treated in the Tishomingo County Hospital emergency room for

lacerations, contusions, and a possible fracture and was later transferred to the Coffee Memorial Hospital in Florence. According to a family spokesman, he is reported as improving, but still remains in serious condition.

Funeral services for Ray Davis were held at 2 p.m. Friday at the Berea Church of Christ with Marvin Rainey officiating. Burial was in Berea Cemetery with Cutshall Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Mr. Davis was an active participant in both church and community affairs. He served as part-time Church of Christ minister and parttime Farmer's Aid with the Extension Service. As a leading farmer in Tishomingo County, he served as chairman of the ASCS County Committee; Director of the Holcut-Cairo Water Assn.; President of the Tishomingo County Pork Producers; and member of the Soil and Water Conservation Board. He also held membership in the Yellow Creek Watershed Authority; the Agriculture and Forestry Committee; the Cattlemen's Association; the 208 Water Control; the Test Demonstration Farmers; and the Appalachian Regional Commission. Mr. Davis was also a former employee of Conalco in Iuka.

A resident of the Holts Spur Community since 1949, Elbert Ray Davis was the son of Mrs. Fannie Davis and the late Elton L. Davis, of Burnsville. He married the former Gloria Briley, of the Leedy Community, and had one child, Anna Lea, 10 years old.

Other survivors include five brothers, Luther Davis, of Tupelo; Garvin E. Davis. of Booneville; Ruben C., Roy Dewayne and Elton Junior Davis, all of Burnsville.

TVA is conducting a feasibility study covering the proposal, which is called the Northeastern Mississippi Demonstration Project, which could possible solve housing and training problems for some workers on TVA's proposed Yellow Creek Nuclear Power Plant.

Representatives explained the proposal would involve construction of a small village accommodating 300 to 400 individuals, at a 240-acre site 12 miles north of luka and 1.7 miles from the nuclear plant.

Plant workers, especially those in minority groups, would live at the village, participating in job skills

and personal training programs after work. Other TVA employees also would live in the village, which would have 100 mobile homes, 50 motel-type rooms and 25 cabins.

Some individuals who opposed the demonstration project told TVA officials feared the training and housing program would reduce the number of area residents TVA would hire for the nuclear plant con-

TVA Yellow Creek projects coordinator John Hendrix said the demonstration project would be "a supplement to and not in lieu of" TVA Programs to promote local hiring.

During the eight years of plant construction, TVA also would use the village and its adjacent 60-acre island to study integration of a variety of energy systems, including solar and woodburning, TVA officials said.

After the nuclear plant is in operation, the site would be returned to Mississippi government for use as a recreational area in the J.P. Coleman State Park. Some individuals at the

meeting opposed the demonstration project, expressing concern about the financial burden the state would assume to maintain the site after TVA has returned it to Mississippi.

Some Tishomingo County residents who use the proposed site for recreation also objected to its conversion from a natural area to a developed recreational

Hendrix said TVA will consider all comments and ideas presented at the public meeting as it decides if it will adopt the proposal.

MONEY MANAGEMENT DETERMINES LIFE STYLE

Inflation and the energy crunch have created basic changes in life-styles of Mississippians. There are basic changes in the way money is spent.

As a matter of necessity, people are becoming more selective. According to the U. S. Department of Commerce, the average American family spent 5.6 percent more of its total income on health care in 1976 than it did in 1950, 3.9 percent more on housing and 1.6 percent more on utilities. In the same 26 year period, we spent 7.7 percent less of our total family income on food and drink, 4.3 percent less on clothing and 2.3 percent less on household needs other than utilities.

TARGET PRICE RAISED: On May 15, 1978, President Carter signed into law the Emergency Agricultural Act of 1978. Farmers participating in the 1978 wheat set-aside program will be eligible for program benefits based on a target price of \$3,40 instead of \$3.00 per bushel. The minimum loan rate for the 1978 through 1981 crop of upland cotton is increased from .44 cents per pound to .48 cents per pound. Target prices represent a floor price that eligible farmers may receive nationally for their crops planted within the national program acre-

er moths start emerging in age. If the national acrelate May and continue at intervals until frost. They lay their eggs on the lower trunks of peaches and plums soon after emerging. After hatching, the young larvae bore through the outer bark into the cambium layer. If the market price. the insecticide is present,

this larvae will be killed. To be effective and to prevent your having to spray so often, these insecticides must have a long residual action. The recommended materials - chlorpyrifos (Lorsban 4E) and endosulfan (thiodan) - both give residual action of 30 or more days. Chlorpyrifos (Lorsban 4E) is not sold in lots under one gallon. Endosulfan (thiodan) is sold in small containers.

The wating period for chlorpyrifos (Lorsban 4E) is (Thiodan), 30 days. Consequently, the early ripening varieties cannot be sprayed until after harvest. The late ripening varieties may be sprayed in South Mississippi from May 1 to May 15. In North Mississippi, spray late varieties from May 15 to June 1. Following these first applications, spray every 30 days thereafter through October 1.

The single fall treatment with ethylene dichloride has been cancelled because of the absence of this material from the market.

Peach tree borers attack the tree trunk near or below the ground. Theirdamage results in a jelly-like substance and frass where they have tunneled into the trunk. When there is jelly on the limbs, this is the work of the lesser peach tree borer, spray limbs as well as fruit and foliage with regular sprays. Also use all cultural practices to keep trees thrifty and growing well.
