An Open Letter To **Concerned Parents** And Youth

At the recent meeting called by TVA to explain their plans for a "Demonstration Village" near the Nuclear Plant site in Tishomingo County, great concern and frustration was expressed by practically every one of the 80 or more people present regarding the hiring practices being exercised by TVA in filling the hundreds of available jobs at the plant site, especially the "laborers" jobs. It is from these jobs that most, if not all, of the young people will be selected for the Apprenticeship Training Program. This program is designed to pay these young people to work with skilled craftsmen and attend classes after work so as to learn a trade or craft. This training program is highly desired and needed by many of our young people in this area.

After lengthy talks with TVA employment personnel concerning these laborers jobs and apprenticeship program, it appears that one group of people, our young males, or men, between the ages of 18 and 25 years old, are practically excluded from jobs by TVA's hiring guidelines and rules, especially those from within 50 miles of the plant site, which TVA refers to as the "commuting area" of employment.

This simply means that our young men who have graduated from high school, as well as future graduates, and who have taken further training in our trade schools, vocational schools and colleges and many who have already satisfactorily proven their qualifications by taking the General Aptitude Test requested by TVA, are to be denied the opportunity of a job or training program.

Instead, these jobs and the training program will be filled mostly by people from distant localities and who are less educated, less desirable and less qualified than are hundreds of our own young men. This in spite of the fact that TVA held public meetings here to request our support for the location and construction of the Nuclear Plant in this area, and in order to gain our support they assured us that local people would be considered first in filling the hundreds of jobs to be made available.

Apparently they have deliberately misled and deceived us through false promises, half truths and unnuendoes in hitting us in our softest spot, our youth. Now that we are aware of their actions and intentions, I feel that we must all unite in a common effort to see that they are held accountable. And only through a united effort involving all who have any interest in or obligations to our youth can we hope to accomplish our desire to see that our youth have an opportunity for training and jobs in their own community and state if they so desire.

My wife, Kathleen, and I were informed that many groups hold preference over our youth due to quotas or goals and preferences extended to almost every group except our local young men and all of these groups are represented or have representation while these young men have no one to support and encourage them in their efforts to achieve equal employment opportunity. We were told that preference is extended to veterans, minorities, people over 40 years of age, underprivileged,

females, and handicapped and former TVA employees. I have it on good authority that this Demonstration Village, including such fine facilities as swimming pools, beaches, playgrounds, boat docks and many other recreational facilities, which they propose to build on the lakes in one of the most desirable and beautiful locations in this area, is for the purpose of providing housing for primarily trainees for the apprenticeship program, most of whom will be from other areas of the country, such as Memphis, and who will be mostly uneducated and untrained young people from the minority groups. They are to be brought in here by the hundreds over a period of several years and an attempt will be made by TVA to educate them and train them, while paying them to work, in order to try to qualify them for the apprenticeship training program. All of this will be paid for from our tax money and from monies obtained by increases in our electrical rates.

I feel that our politicians from the local level to the Federal level, who represent the people in the area, should become involved and provide us with leadership and know-how if they are at all interested in our local youth. As our representatives in political affairs, this is an excellent opportunity for them to exhibit their appreciation and support for all of our youth, parents, friends and relatives in return for the support which they have solicited and enjoyed throughout the vears past.

I understand that TVA officials have met and discussed this situation with our Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors and with the Iuka Rotary Club. I am sure that the TVA personnel carefully avoided any direct discussion as to their hiring practices concerning the laborers jobs and the closely related Apprenticeship Training Program.

I strongly urge all who are interested in our local youth to contact your political representatives such as our legislators in Washington, as well as our highest state officials, and also local officials and ask for their full support, advice and assistance.

We discussed with TVA personnel the possibility of their calling another public meeting here to discuss the subject of their hiring practices openly, honestly and fully with the concerned people, but thus far they have exhibited little or no interest. Is this an illustration of how little interest they have in the local people and our desires and rights?

YCC Camp To Open Near Iuka

If you're between 15-18 years of age and still looking for summer work, the Youth Conservation Corps (YCC) may have a job for

A YCC camp, operated by TVA, will be open June 18-August 19 near J. P. Coleman State Park on Pickwick Lake. Thirty-two young people (16 girls and 16 boys) will be employed in the summer work-learn program, which combines conservation work on public lands with environmental education. YCC enrollees will receive a total salary of \$522 for the summer and will live in tents during the five-day, 40-hour work week and return home on weekends. All activities, including evening recreation, will be supervised by the camp's nine staff members.

YCC is a Federal youth employment program administered since 1970 through the U.S. Departments of the Interior and Agriculture. The Iuka YCC camp will be operated by the Tennessee Valley Authority in cooperation with the Department of the Interior.

"I quilted two quilts that first winter and I guess I've quilted from two to nine quilts near-: ly every year since then." "I wouldn't even start to count how many quilts Mama has made in all," remarked Zora Lee Nunley, of Muscle Shoals, one of Mrs. Hooper's ten children. "I have given quilts to all 23 of my grandchildren and all of my children, I've got three boys and I gave them all six quilts each when they got married." The quilts entered in the contest were judged on overall beauty and

attractiveness, design interpretation, color selection and combination, appropriateness of materials used, quilting technique and workmanship and originality of design and interpretation. Proud of her winning medal, Mrs. Hooper says, "I am going to have it made into a necklace." Asked if she plans to continue making quilts, Mrs. Hooper says, "I guess I will, I've made six since March 29th. I guess I average making a quilt a week." Mrs. Hooper does all the work on the quilts herself, and does not use a machine. "I'd rather make them by hand.

FREEZING FRUITS Homemakers need to follow the recommended

method for freezing fruits. Most fruits can be frozen satisfactorily, but the quality of the frozen product will vary with the kind of fruit, stage of maturity, and type of pack.

1. Select firm, evenly ripe fruit of the right variety for freezing. Freeze fruit that has a good flavor and color and is at peak ripeness for eating. Freezing won't improve quality of fruit. Immature fruit becomes pale and tasteless in the freezer; overripe fruit turns dark.

2. Most fruits are best when frozen soon after they are harvested. Peaches and pears may be held a short time to ripen.

3. Wash fruit in cold water before hulling or paring. Wash a small amount at one time to prevent bruising. Don't let fruit soak in water. Prepare as for serving. Use a stainless steel knife for paring or cutting. Work quickly. Slice fruit directly into the carton containing syrup or add sugar at once to the fruit.

4. Fruits packed with dry sugar or sugar syrupusually retain their color, flavor, and texture better than those packed without sugar. The amount of sugar or syrup used depends on sweetness desired. Juicy fruits will make their own symin when combined with dry sugar. A syrup may be preferable for less juicy fruits.

5. Some fruits darken during freezing unless treated to retard browning. Speed is important in preparing fruit for freezing. Ascorbic acid (vitamin C) is effective in preserving color and flavor of fruit and adds nutritive value. It also adds to the expense

line or powdered form of ascorbic acid is easier and better to use than tablets. Dissolve ascorbic acid in a little cold water and add to the fruit or syrup. Solutions should be made up as needed. If you use one of the ascorbic acid mixtures on the market, follow the manufacturer's directions.

Steaming a few minutes before packing is enough to control the darkening of some fruits, such as apples. You can use citric acid

or lemon juice on some fruits, but it is less effective than ascorbic acid and changes the flavor of the fruit.

6. Use a package that protects the quality of the fruit while in storage. Select the size container according to your planned use of the fruit. 7. Leave head space in

container as directed for each fruit. 8. Seal. Label with name

of fruit; date; purpose for which fruit is intended, such as pie, jam, or dessert; and amount of sugar used

9. Freeze at once. Place packages against freezing plates or coils. Leave space between packages so air can circulate freely.

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Place quartered chicken in a baking dish. Combine remaining ingredients in a saucepan; bring to boil. Pour sauce over chicken. Bake at 375 degrees for about 1 hour or until chicken is tender. Yield: 4 serv-

Cultivate Crops Early: Cotton and soybean producers who have crops coming to a stand should cultivate early for best crop yields. Early cultivation will aerate the soil, break crust, control weeds and encourage early growth.

Where cotton is large enough, use post-directed chemical sprays along with cultivation. The first culti-

vation should be deep enough to destroy grass and weeds but still leave the row in shape for effective application of post-emergence chemicals. You should use a rotary hoe to break crust and help get stands that

Broadleaf weeds take up space, use fertilizer and moisture, and are low quality grazing. Cattlemen cannot allow these pests to continue to increase in pastures. You should spray grass pastures with 2,4-D, dicamba or a combination of these materials. For cypressweed and horsenettle, a herbicide containing dicamba will be needed. Good coverage is important; use 10 to 20 gallons of spray mix per acre.

Control Garden Insects:

Don't let bugs harvest your garden crops. You should examine your garden each week to keep ahead of garden insect pests. If you find harmful insects, use an insecticide recommended for the kind of insects you have. When using insecticides, check labels and apply materials only to those vegetables crops listed.

Farmweek:

The June 19 feature segment of the "Farmweek" program will focus on the truck farming operation of Joyce Paulk of Tupelo. The 73-year-old gardener has a half acre plot in his back yard in the middle of Tupelo and grows everything from tomatoes to figs and grapes. Lee County Agent Charles Twitty will discuss Paulk's special farming operation.

The June 26 program will take you to the Mississippi Agricultural and Forestry Experiment Station at Pontotoc for a look at cattle implanting. Farmweek host Bruce Johnson will talk with Extension Area Livestock Specialist Joe Baker and Experiment Station Director Butch Withers about research being done on implanting day-old calves. The group will also discuss total cattle management and how implanting can help. Farmweek can be seen



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

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

Avon South, an official of the agency, said the information is needed to determine whether sufficient storage space is available for the 1978 harvest and also for the grain reserve program. Questionnaires requesting storage date have been mailed to all farm operators. "Most farmers have responded favorably to the request, and about 10 percent of them have answered the questions and returned the form," South said. ASCS loaned money to farmers to

construct more than half a billion bushels of storage capacity last year. However, there is limited knowledge of how much space existed before, or how much has been built on farms through private financing, he interested in knowing how many bins any individual farmer has; but we do need to know how many bushels can be stored on the farms,' South said. The data will be used strictly for the purpose for which it is intended, and any records identifying an individual farmer will be destroyed, the ASCS official said. A large 1978 crop could place consider-

able pressure on storage facilities, particularly in areas where tight storage conditions existed last fall. "With this information, we will attempt to find out where the handling and storage problems could show up during harvest." Commercial facilities are being surveyed by ASCS and the Economics, Statistics and Cooperatives Service.
