MISS ANGELA PAULETTE SOUTH, Miss Hospitality for 1978, will travel to Biloxi next week representing Tishomingo County in the Miss Hospitality Pageant. Bell Asks To Reduce Rates; Change Way We Pay For Assistance

South Central Bell Tuesday filed a proposal with the Mississippi Public Service Commission (PSC) that would reduce monthly telephone bills by changing the way telephone customers pay for Directory Assistance.

If the proposal is accepted by the PSC, basic monthly telephone rates would drop 50 cents per line, and more of the cost of providing Directory Assistance service would be paid by the people who use it the most.

Today, the cost of providing the service is shared equally by all Mississippi telephone users, whether or not they ever call Directory Assistance.

"Some think of it as a free service. But this so-called 'free' service costs Mississippi telephone users almost a million dollars a month -- and the cost is going up," said W. G. Hardin, local South Central Bell manager.

"The number of calls to Directory Assistance is increasing at almost twice the rate of growth of the number of telephones served. Our operators are answering more than 300,000 Directory Assistance calls every weekday. Almost 9 out of 10 of those calls are for numbers that are already listed in the telephone directory. 'And,' he said, 'just one-third of our customers make 90 percent of the calls.'

"What it boils down to is this: We have a lot of equipment, a lot of people, and a lot of money tied up in providing a service that some people use a great deal more than others do. But, right now, all customers share the cost, regardless of usage.

"Under our proposal those who use Directory Assistance the most would pay a greater share of the cost."

"To my way of thinking, the new plan would be more fair," Hardin said.

Here is how Bell's plan would work, as outlined by Hardin.

-- The basic rate for a home or business telephone line would drop by 50 cents a month.

-- Included in the lower basic rate would be a monthly allowance of three Directory Assistance calls.

-- If you exceed your three-call allowance, a 20-cent charge would be applied for each additional Directory Assistance call made during the monthly billing period.

-- For each in-state long distance call completed from and charged to your telephone during a billing month, you could make one in-state long distance Directory Assistance call (obtained by dialing 1-555-1212) without charge and without having it apply to your three-call allowance.

-- People who have physical handicaps that prevent them from using a directory would be exempt from any Directory Assistance charges; so would hospital patients, hotel and motel guests, coin telephone customers, and people calling Directory Assistance for numbers outside Mississippi.

Hardin pointed out that experience in other Bell System locations where similar plans have been in use for some time indicates that about nine out of ten Mississippi customers would not exceed the three-call allowance.

"That means nine out of ten of our customers would have lower monthly telephone bills," he said. "Obviously, the vast majority of consumers would benefit from this plan, which will provide a much fairer way for our customers to pay for Directory Assistance," Hardin said. "Those who use it less would pay less for their telephone service.

Hardin pointed out that although the new plan is expected to result in a substantial decrease in the number of calls to Directory Assistance, projections based on past employee turnover rates indicate the company will be able to place at least 90 percent of any affected Directory Assistance operators in other jobs at their present locations.

"However, if the plan is approved we should have to add fewer operators in the future due to the anticipated drop in Directory Assistance calls," Hardin said. "This would keep the cost of telephone service in the future lower than it otherwise would be."

Garbage Pick-up

All residents of Iuka are reminded that garbage cans must be placed by the street or they will not be picked up. This will eliminate the costly and time consuming backing in driveways. This will not apply to elderly or handicapped residents.

Your cooperation is requested to properly place garbage in proper cans, plastic bags or small cardboard boxes. Loose garbage will not be picked up.

Annual Meeting

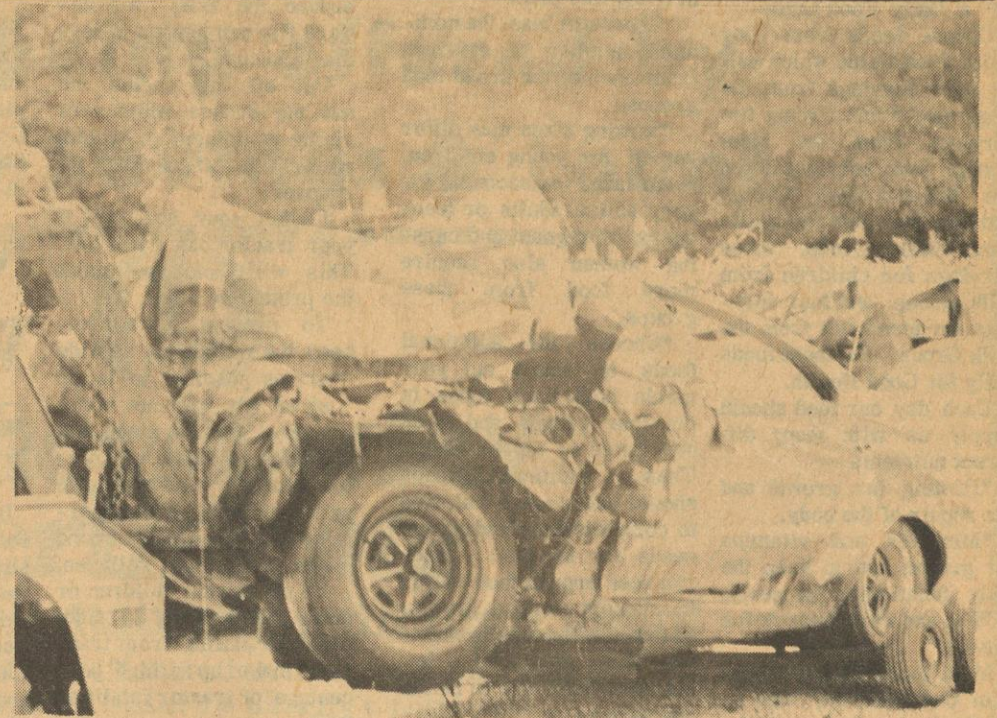
The Tishomingo County Electric Power Association Annual Meeting will be held on August 12, 1978, at the Tishomingo County Courthouse at 10:00 a.m.

Horse Show

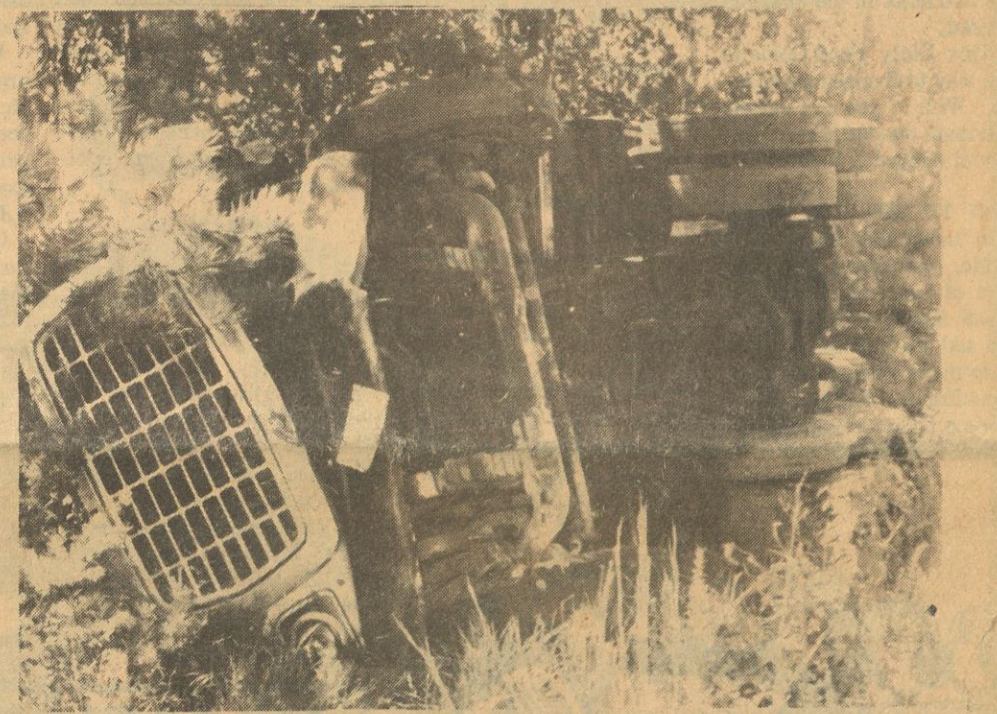

Monday Morning Accident Claims Life Of Iuka Teenager

A two-vehicle accident was fatal to a young Iuka girl early Monday morning, July 17.

Miss Sherry Lee Casabella, 19, was dead on arrival at Tishomingo County Hospital following the 8:30 crash on Coleman Park Road, just 1 1/2 miles from her home.

According to Tishomingo County Deputy Sheriff, Douglas Mullins, Miss Casabella was traveling south on Coleman Park Road when she apparently hit a slick spot on the road and lost control of her 1972 Oldsmobile 442. He said that the vehicle left the right

side of the road, came back onto the pavement and hit head-on with a north-bound tractor-trailer rig on the north-bound shoulder of the road.

The 1972 truck, loaded with slag, was driven by William Cantrell, of Greenwood, Miss. Mr. Cantrell and his young son, who was a passenger, escaped with no injuries from the overturned vehicle.

Emergency Medical Technicians (EMT), from Tishomingo County Hospital worked some 45 minutes freeing Miss Casabella from her automobile. She died enroute to the hospital.

Funeral services for Miss Casabella were held at 4 p.m. Tuesday at Cutshall Funeral Home Chapel with Rev. Stanley Magill officiating. Burial was in Hubbard Salem Cemetery.

Survivors include her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Casabella, of Iuka; four brothers, Leonard, James, Scotty and Larry Casabella, all of the home; one

sister, Mrs. Terry Lynn Whitehurst, of Athens, Tn.; and her grandfather, James J. Casabella, of Sheppardville, Ky.

TCDF To Accept Old Court House In Iuka

In order to obtain Federal funds, the Courthouse property must be leased to a county-wide, non-profit corporation for 99 years. The Tishomingo County Development Foundation (TCDF), founded in 1972 and chartered in February, 1975, is a county-wide, non-profit group whose officers and directors are: Neil Davis, chairman; Pat Allen, vice-chairman; W. S. Brown, Jr., secretary/treasurer; Luther Roy Adams, Herman Ann, L. R. Harris, Earl Lindsey, B. L. Mercer, John Moore, Kelly Segars, Jimmy Timmes, Gary L. Taylor, and Paul Whitlock.

At a meeting of the officers and directors of the TCDF held at the Tishomingo County Vo-Tech Center on Monday, July 17th, it was moved, seconded, and unanimously accepted to accept the renovated Court House structure.

A work crew is now cleaning the various rooms and attempting to clear out the papers, pigeons and droppings. Following this activity, specific plans will be outlined by Mr. Hunley's organization for replacing broken windows, replacing both front and back

doors, installing new gutters and downspouts, repairing roof overhang and make the building pigeon proof, repairing and painting interior walls, ceilings and trim, removing the 1934 addition and reconstructing the wall, and removing the exterior paint where necessary, repairing mortar joints and repainting. (Complete removal of paint and exterior renovation to bare brick as originally built will be deferred until the most effective procedure is determined.) The following additional improvements must be done before the building is open to the public: sand and refinish floors, convert mechanical room, rewire electrical circuits, install heating (and possibly cooling) unit, install two restrooms, and install fire escape.

The TCDF will utilize the renovated Court House for developing museum exhibits depicting the principle historical eras of the county (Chickasaw Inhabitation, Civil War Period, Mineral Springs Resort Period, Modern Period, Future); collecting, storing, and displaying other artifacts of historical and cultural interest; developing and operating a recreation and tourism information center; developing and operating an office of economic and industrial promotion; offering for sale publications, souvenirs, gifts, antiques and other appropriate merchandise; offering meeting space to community organizations for various functions; providing facilities for other programming such as performances and exhibitions.

by area artists, craftsmen and others who can contribute to the education and cultural enrichment of the community, and landscaping the site to present an attractive setting, provide for proper circulation and offer adequate parking facilities.

The accomplishment of this goal is made possible by the coordinated efforts of The Tishomingo County Court House Museum Committee, the Yellow Creek Watershed Authority, musical and theatrical persons, persons interested in the Arts and Museums, and the Tishomingo County Development Foundation (TCDF).

FOOD FOR FITNESS
A Daily Food Guide
Choose foods from Your Daily Food Guide which will be four servings from the Vegetable-Fruit Group; two servings from the Meat Group; four servings from the Bread-Cereal Group; and two servings for adults from Milk Group, three servings for children from Milk Group, and four servings for teenagers from the Milk Group. Eat these foods daily for Good Health.
Each day our food should supply us with many different nutrients --
*Protein for growth and for repair of the body.
*Minerals and vitamins for growth and to keep the body functioning properly.
*Fat and carbohydrate for energy.
Most foods contain more than one nutrient. But no single food contains all the nutrients in the amounts we need. Therefore, choosing foods wisely means selecting kinds that together supply nutrients in the amounts needed.
This Daily Food Guide is one way to choose food wisely. With it, you can get the nutrients needed from a variety of everyday foods.
HOW TO USE THIS GUIDE
In using this Daily Food Guide, you select the main part of your diet from four broad food groups. To this you add other foods as needed to make your meals more appealing and satisfying.
Some pointers to guide you in using this plan:
*Choose at least the minimum number of servings from each of the broad food groups.
*Serving sizes may differ -small for young children, extra large (or seconds) for very active adults or teenagers. Pregnant and nursing women also require more food from these groups.
*Choose the additional foods to round out your meals both from foods in the four groups and foods not listed in these groups. These additional foods should add enough calories to complete your food energy needs for the day. Children need enough food energy to support normal growth; adults need enough to maintain body weight at a level most favorable to health and well-being.
*Try to have some meat, poultry, fish, eggs, or milk at each meal.
CORN FRITTERS
1 1/2 cups sifted flour
1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
1 egg, beaten
1 can (12 or 16 oz.) whole kernel corn or 2 cups fresh cooked corn
1/2 cup milk
1 tablespoon melted butter
Sift dry ingredients together. Combine egg, drained corn, milk and butter. Add to dry ingredients; mix lightly. Drop by spoonfuls into deep hot fat (360 degrees) and cook until brown. (These fritters may be fried in shallow fat.) 8 servings (2 fritters each).

COUNTY AGENT'S NOTES

TRACTOR SAFETY
Mississippi farm tractor accidents killed 12 in 1977. Manage to prevent serious accidents on your farm by using safe tractor operation practices.
Prevent tractor rear-up or flip by hitching loads low or at recommended points on the drawbar. Do not hitch high or wrap chains around the axle; a backward flip can happen in less than a second.
Cut off the engine and set the brakes while servicing equipment to avoid a power-take-off accident or runaway.
Fasten your seat belt if your tractor has a roll bar. This will hold you inside the protective area.
To prevent a rollover, keep the wheels set as wide apart as possible to do the desired job. Do not operate on a slope so steep that you must hold onto the tractor with one hand and drive with the other. Avoid operating near drop-offs or pond banks that might collapse.
Do not permit children or other passengers to ride. Children falling from tractors make up a high percentage of tractor fatalities each year.
Train your tractor operators in safety, and check tractor operator manuals for information.
These safe practices will help avoid a tractor accident on your farm. Remember July 25 - 31, 1978 is National Farm Safety Week. This year's theme is "Manage to Prevent Farm Accidents".


NEMJC Student Wins 1st In U.S. Skilled Olympics
David Young, machine shop student at the Northeast Mississippi Junior College, won first place in the Machine Shop Competition at Vocational and Industrial Clubs of America (V.I.C.A.) and the United States Skill Olympics held in Birmingham, Ala. from June 26-30, 1978. The Tishomingo County youth competed with junior college and high school students from 47 states and territorial associations.
V.I.C.A. is the national organization for trade, technical, industrial, and health occupations. About 250,000 students from the various associations belong to V.I.C.A.
Competition was held earlier this year to determine the first, second, and third place winners in each state or territory. David was eligible to participate in the national competition since he had won first place in the state competition held earlier.
David was chosen as one of the three from machine shop to be eligible to participate in February, 1979 at Cincinnati, Ohio where one student will be selected to participate in the International Skill Olympics in Cork, Ireland in September, 1979.
David has attended the Northeast Mississippi Junior College in the machine shop program for the past two years. His instructors are Mr. J. T. 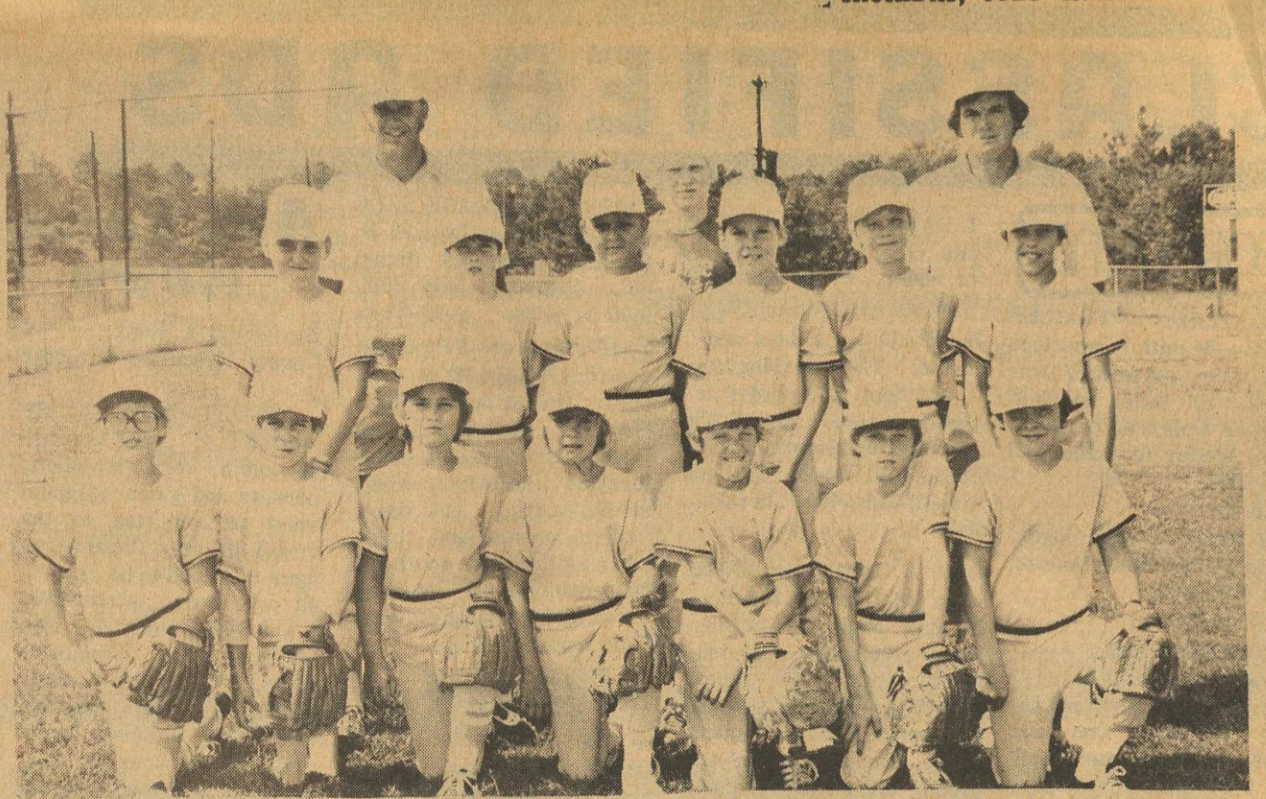

REPORT ACREAGE BY AUGUST 1: Your acreage of cotton, corn, soybeans, peanuts and grain sorghum must be reported to the county office. These acreages will need to be reported accurately as possible. It's a requirement for eligibility for commodity loans, target price protection and disaster program assistance. However, farmers wishing accurate measurements, may request measurement service - at cost - from the local county office. The acreage of set-aside and diverted acreage will need to be reported by August 1. Remember! The set-aside land must have a cover other than weeds or bushes. The cover may be volunteer stands. Farmers with upland cotton acreage must report the planted acreage or that no acreage is planted by August 1, 1978, in order to protect the cotton yield for the farm. Farmers who do not report will receive zero (0) yield for 1978. For all other crops, the acreage will be zero (0) if no acreage report is filed. Your failure to report may have an adverse effect on program participation in future years. August 1 is the final date to report and this date will not be extended. So, report now before the deadline of August 1.

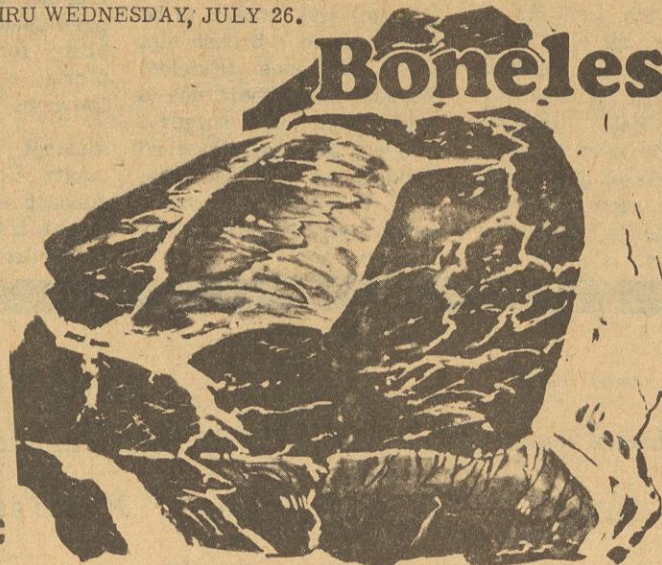

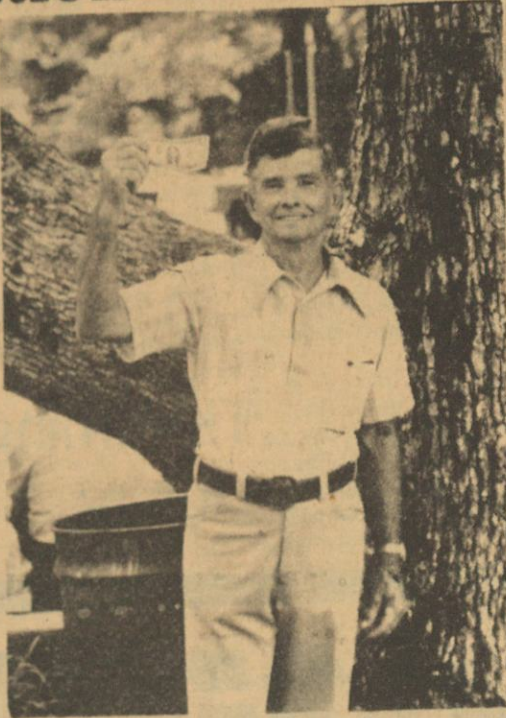

Charles Smith, Manager of the Corinth Area of the Mississippi State Employment Service stated today that Institutional Training is a program funded in classroom size to provide vocational training for those in need, in order to make them eligible for the world of work, and for those who need financial assistance in the way of allowances and training costs in order to participate. The responsibility for selection, referral, and payment of allowances lies with the Mississippi Employment Security Commission. Those individuals who are desirous of making application for such training, especially veterans who receive priority, should contact their nearest Mississippi State Employment Service Office.

TVA Will Raise Fuel Rates In August

TVA fuel adjustment charges for August will jump \$2.17 per 1,000 kilowatt-hours, the sharpest increase since electric power charges were tied to fuel costs, the agency said Monday. The boost means that the average homeowner in the TVA service area will pay more than \$30 per 1,000 kilowatt-hours for the first time in history. The increase comes on the heels of a \$2.35 increase per 1,000 kilowatt-hours in basic power rates which went into effect in July, an increase aimed at raising \$60 million additional revenue by Sept. 30. The fuel adjustment charges do not apply to the first 500 kilowatt-hours. TVA said fuel-related costs showed a sharp increase due to heavy power loads to meet air conditioning demands and rising costs for coal burned in power generation. Lee Sheppard of the TVA information office said the average price of coal has increased \$5 per ton during the past year. TVA calculated that the recent United Mine Workers settlement resulted in an average increase of \$1.50 a ton in the cost of coal under existing contracts. Sheppard said the UMW settlement will boost fuel costs to the TVA system by \$57 million the first year. The August fuel adjustment charges were calculated on the cost of fuels and purchased power for the month of June. In addition to higher coal costs, TVA has been forced to make heavy use of expensive oil-fired peaking turbines. Electricity from peaking turbines costs three to four times as much as generation from other TVA power plants. TVA said the average cost of coal burned in TVA power plants in June was more than \$27 a ton compared to about \$22 a ton for coal burned a year ago. The increase means that a typical local rate for August for 1,000 kilowatt-hours will be \$30.29 compared to \$29.21 in July and \$26.28 in August of last year. This will be the first time TVA power charges will top \$30. The national average for electric power is \$44 per 1,000 kilowatt-hours. TVA Chairman David Freeman has warned repeatedly that power consumers should cut back on power use as much as possible during the summer, raising their air conditioning thermostats three degrees, not only to save the agency operating costs but also to hold down home electric bills. And the agency has worked out an agreement with the Department of Energy to reduce power demand by 1 million kilowatts to two gaseous diffusion plants during the summer as a means of cutting back on power demands. The sharp increase in charges for August followed a period of about six months where there was little change in the fuel adjustment charges with declines and increases almost balancing out during the period.
