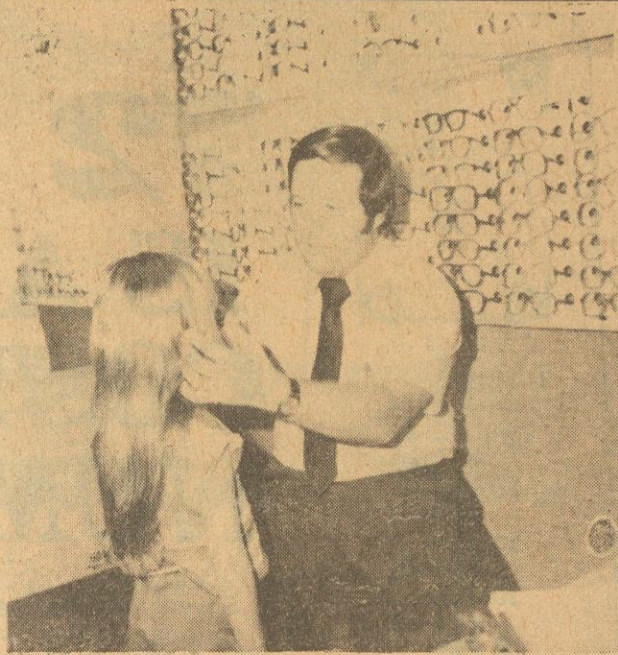

City Students To Be Transported

The following residential areas and bus routes to serve them are as follows: (1) Highway 72 East, Old Jones Drive - Route #8, Mr. Medley; (2) Martha Lane and Confederate Cemetery area - Route #3, Mr. Rast; (3) Battleground vicinity - Route #11, Mr. Yoe; (4) Eastport - Snowdown intersection, North Pride Street - Route #6, Mr. Mann; (5) Oak Road, Crest Road, Pine Lane - Route #4, Mr. Patrick; (6) Westwood Circle, West Ash Street vicinity - Route #1, Rev. Samples; (7) Don Crest

apartments and Chicken Road - Route #7, Mr. Vandiver; (8) New city route - will begin at the high school, proceed on to Indian Creek Road; on to Johnson Road; return by Spring Street and Pike Street; cross Main through Pickwick Circle to Ash Street; down Mill Street to Wilmuth Street, Oak Grove and vicinity - Route #12, Coach Bolen.

Dr. Stone stated that the city route was based upon a survey that was conducted during the summer and that the city route is tentative. Parents are urged to contact the school and to have their children at a location easily accessible by a school bus.

The school system wants to provide transportation to every Iuka city resident and with mutual cooperation with will be accomplished after the first few days of school. Attention Soybean Farmers

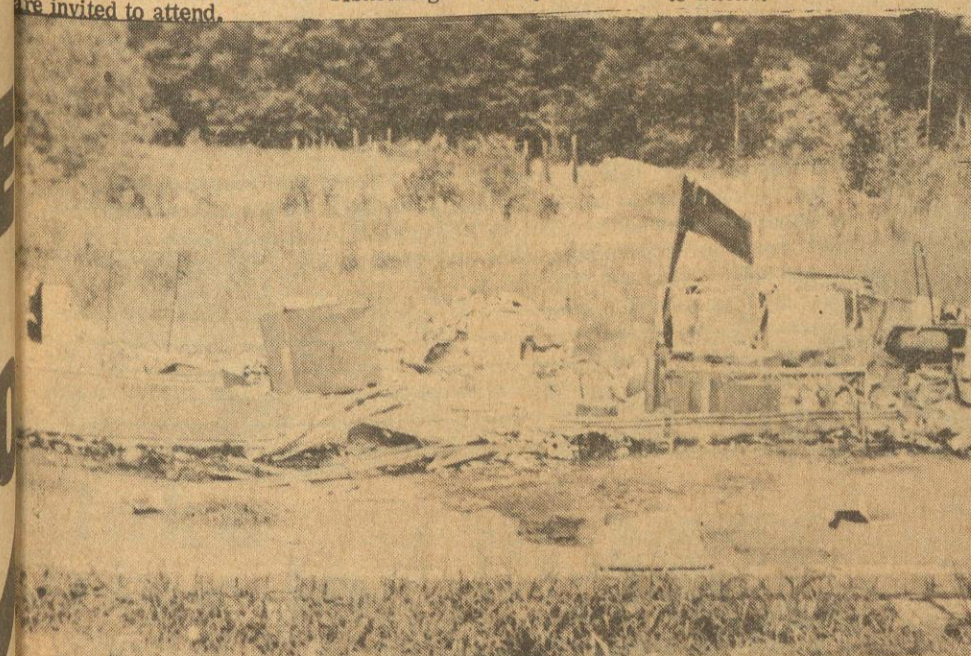
Area Soybean farmers can get a personal look at soybean research being conducted at the Mississippi Agricultural and Forestry Experiment Station (MAFES) Northeast Mississippi Branch in Verona on Thursday, August 24, according to Percie B. Stricklen, County Agent in Tishomingo County.

The Northeast Mississippi Branch program is one of six to be held this summer to give Mississippi's soybean farmers a chance to learn about soybean research in Mississippi. Sponsors of the soybean field days are: MAFES, the Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service; the Mississippi Soybean Promotion Board; and the Mississippi Soybean Association.

The Northeast Mississippi Branch program will begin at 1 p.m. and conclude at 4 p.m. Topics will include: "Soybean Varieties and Rotation for Cyst Nematode Control"; "Soybean Dates of Planting, Varieties and Row Width"; "Wheat - Soybean, Double Cropping Systems"; "Soybean Planting Methods Following Winter Grazing"; "Soybean Herbicide Application and Incorporation Methods in Wheat Straw"; "Soybean Weed Control"; and "Double Cropping Sunflowers".

Experiment Station and Cooperative Extension Service personnel will be on hand to talk with individual soybean farmers. Dr. R.C. Albritton, station superintendent, will coordinate soybean field day activities.

Cars will leave the County Agents Office in Iuka at 11:30 a.m. and travel down Hwy. 25. All persons interested in soybean production are encouraged to attend.

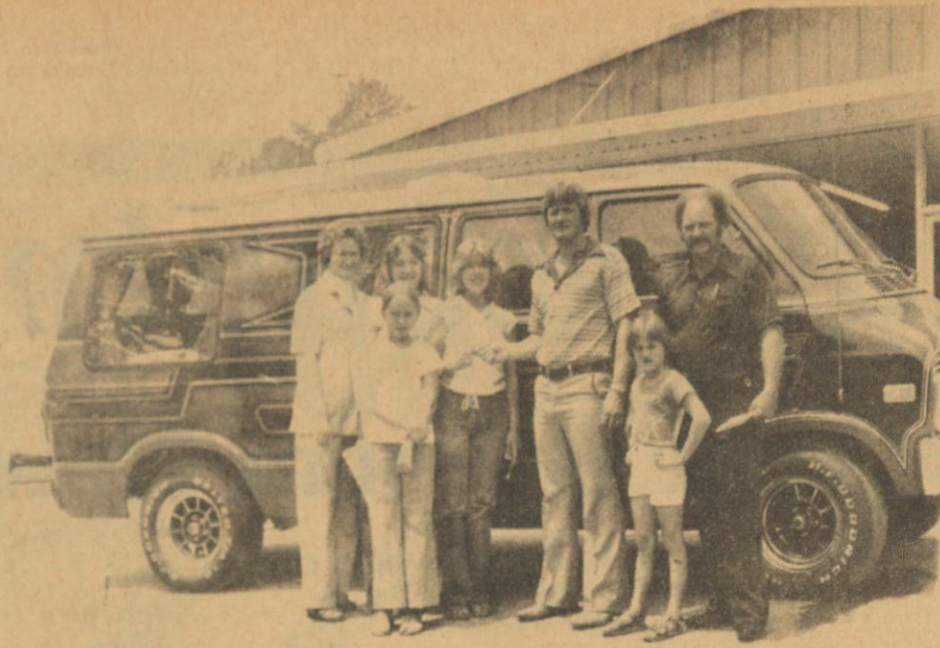

1978 Referendum on Advertising and Sales Promotion of Lamb and Wool: The U. S. Department of Agriculture and the American Sheep Producers Council have announced a proposal that would allow USDA to withhold funds from payments made under the incentive program to producers. The deduction, which would be used to help finance the council's advertising, promotion and producer information activities, would amount to 2 1/2 cents per pound of shore wool and 12 1/2 cents per hundredweight of unshorn lambs. Before the proposed agreement can go into effect, it must be approved by sheep producers voting in a referendum to be held Aug. 21, through Sept. 1, 1978. Any individual, corporation, partnership or legal entity which had an interest as owner or partial owner in one or more sheep 6 months old or older for at least 30 days during 1977 is an eligible voter. Voting may be in person or by mail. Any eligible producer that does not receive a ballot by Aug. 21, 1978, should contact the ASCS Office.

tions Now Being Taken: The Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP) sign-up is currently underway. The period of sign-up is Aug. 14 through Aug. 18, 1978. Listed below are the practices that have been approved by the Tishomingo County Development Group: SL-1, Permanent Vegetative Cover; SL-2, Improvement of an Established Cover; SL-4, Terrace Systems; SL-5, Diversions; SL-8, Cropland Protective Cover; SL-11, Permanent Vegetative Cover on Critical Areas; WC-1, Livestock Ponds; WP-3, Sod Waterway; WP-4, Animal Waste Control Systems (Lagoons); FR-1, Planting Trees; FR-2, Improving a Stand of Forest Trees; and SP-6, Permanent Open Drainage Systems (V-Ditches).

The funds are limited, therefore, select the practice needed most on your farm to solve the conservation needs. Remember, the sign-up period is Aug. 14 through Aug. 18, 1978. The place to sign-up is at the ASCS Office. Requests will be taken after Aug. 18, if funds are available to the County Committee. Contact the county office for details or call 423-5036.

ROTISSERIE COOKING

Cooking outdoors on a rotisserie can be one of summer's treats. Consider a large, compact roast if you want to get good results on the rotisserie. Beef rolled rib, rolled rump and sirloin tip roasts are excellent selections.

Here are additional pointers: Be sure to mount the roast properly for good balance. This will permit the meat to rotate evenly on the spit.

Place a drip pan under the roast. If you are cooking over coals, arrange pan so drippings do not fall on coals and smoke. For example, if the rotisserie turns so the meat surface rotates upward at the front, the drip pan should be under the front edge of the meat. See where droplets fall and place the pan to catch them.

Insert a meat thermometer at an angle or through end of roast so the tip is in the center of roast, but not in fat or touching the spit. Check to see that thermometer clears rotisserie equipment and the drip pan as the spit turns.

Follow the directions that come with your rotisserie equipment concerning operation of the spit and regulation of temperature.

Low to moderate temperatures give best results.

Roast until meat reaches desired doneness. Cooking time depends on size and shape of roast, cooking temperature and degree of doneness you prefer.

Because cooking time varies with intensity of heat produced, a roast cooked on an outdoor rotisserie may require longer to cook on a breezy day than on a calm one.

To maintain even heat when cooking over charcoal, space coals about an inch apart. Add new charcoal around edges and wait until charcoal glows, then push coals toward center.

GRAPE JELLY WITH GELATIN

- 2 tablespoons unflavored gelatin
- 2 tablespoons unsweetened lemon juice
- 1 bottle (1 pint 8 oz.) unsweetened grape juice
- 2 tablespoons lique sweetener

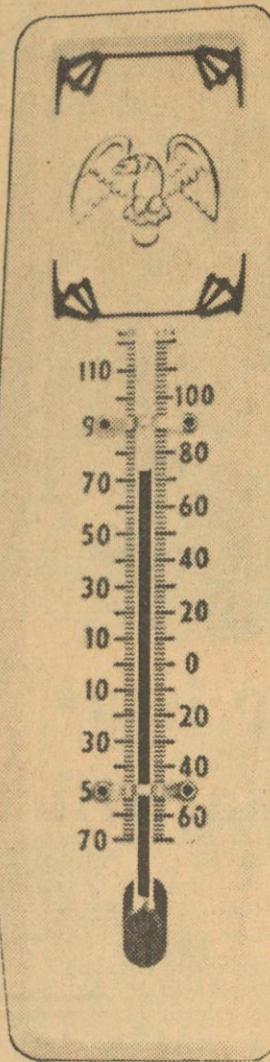
In a saucepan, soften gelatin in grape juice and lemon juice. Bring to a rolling boil, dissolving gelatin; boil 1 minute. Remove from heat. Stir in liquid sweetener. Pour into hot sterilized jars. Adjust lids. Store in refrigerator. 1 tablespoon equals 11 calories. Yield: 1 1/2 pints.

72 IS A COSTLY NUMBER

Seventy-two degrees is what some people consider a "nice" air conditioned temperature. Apparently they don't realize 72 degrees is costing them 42 percent more than the recommended temperature.

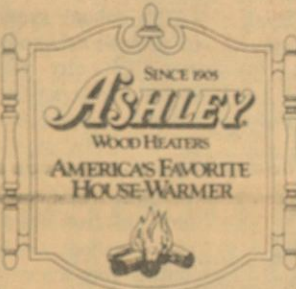

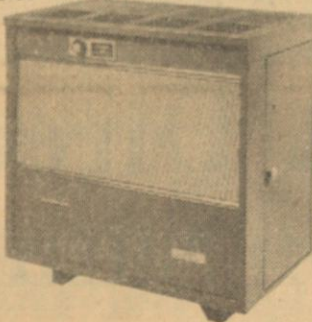

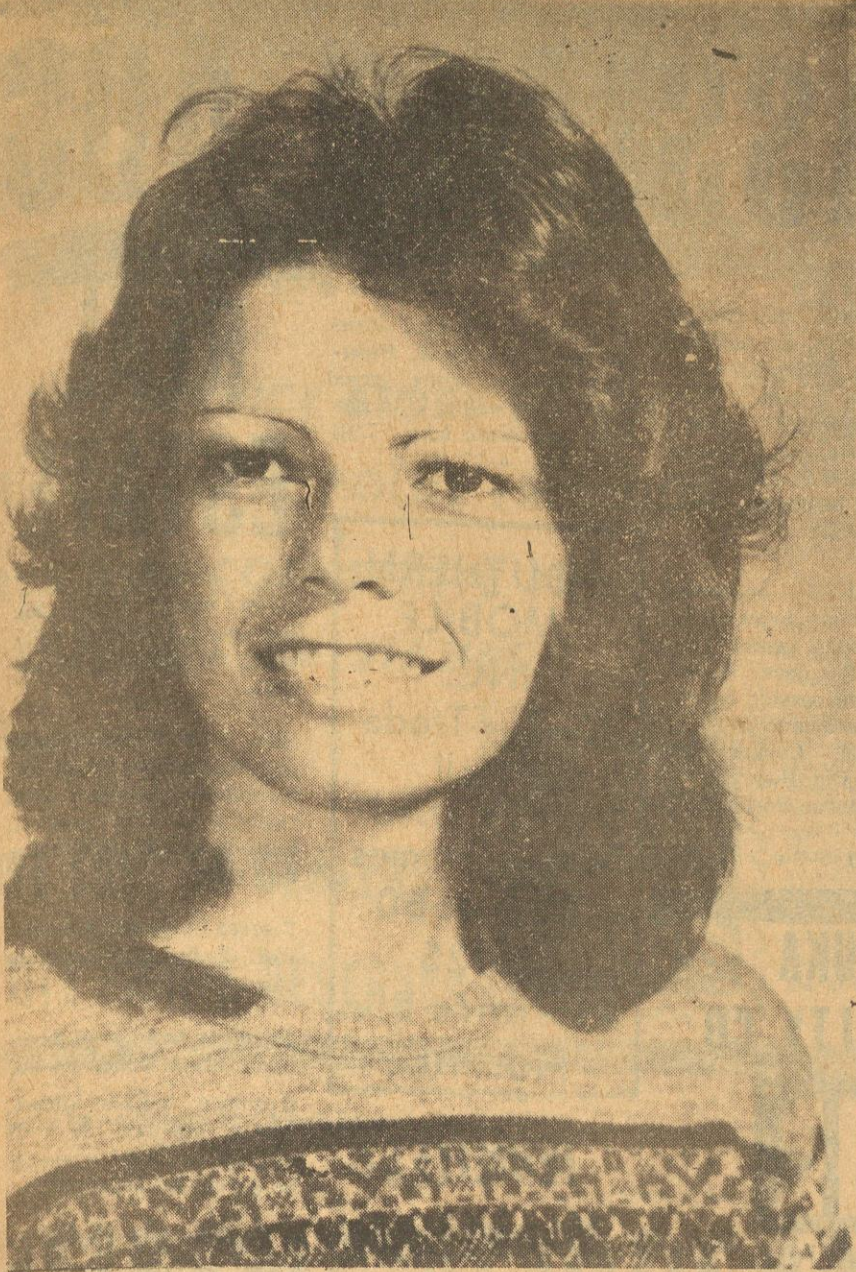

Locating Dove Areas

Dove shooters looking for a good place to go hunting may have an easier time this year as a result of a new service offered by the Mississippi Game and Fish Commission's central office in Jackson.

The Commission is asking farmers and landowners who will have fields prepared and available for public hunting, either on a free or paid basis, to call the agency's public relations office in Jackson so they can help get the word to inquiring sportsmen.

"Every year people call our office about this time and ask where some good places to go dove hunting," spokesman David Watts said.

"Of course we tell them about our wildlife areas located all across the state, but sometime these are farther than the hunter wants to drive. In the past we have had no way of knowing what private landowners are putting on public dove shoots where the public could hunt.

"So this year we are asking landowners to call and give us their name, address, telephone number, and the size and location of their field, and we will in turn relay this to whoever calls our office," Watts said.

According to Watts, the Game and Fish Commission will keep a list of areas by county available to the public on a free or paid basis. Anyone calling in can find which spots are near his home.

The Jackson office of the Game and Fish Commission is located in the Robert E. Lee office building at 239 North Lamar Street in Jackson. To call and report areas available to the public for dove hunting, or to find out where to go, call the Commission at 354-

7333, between the hours of 8:00 and 5:00, Monday through Friday.

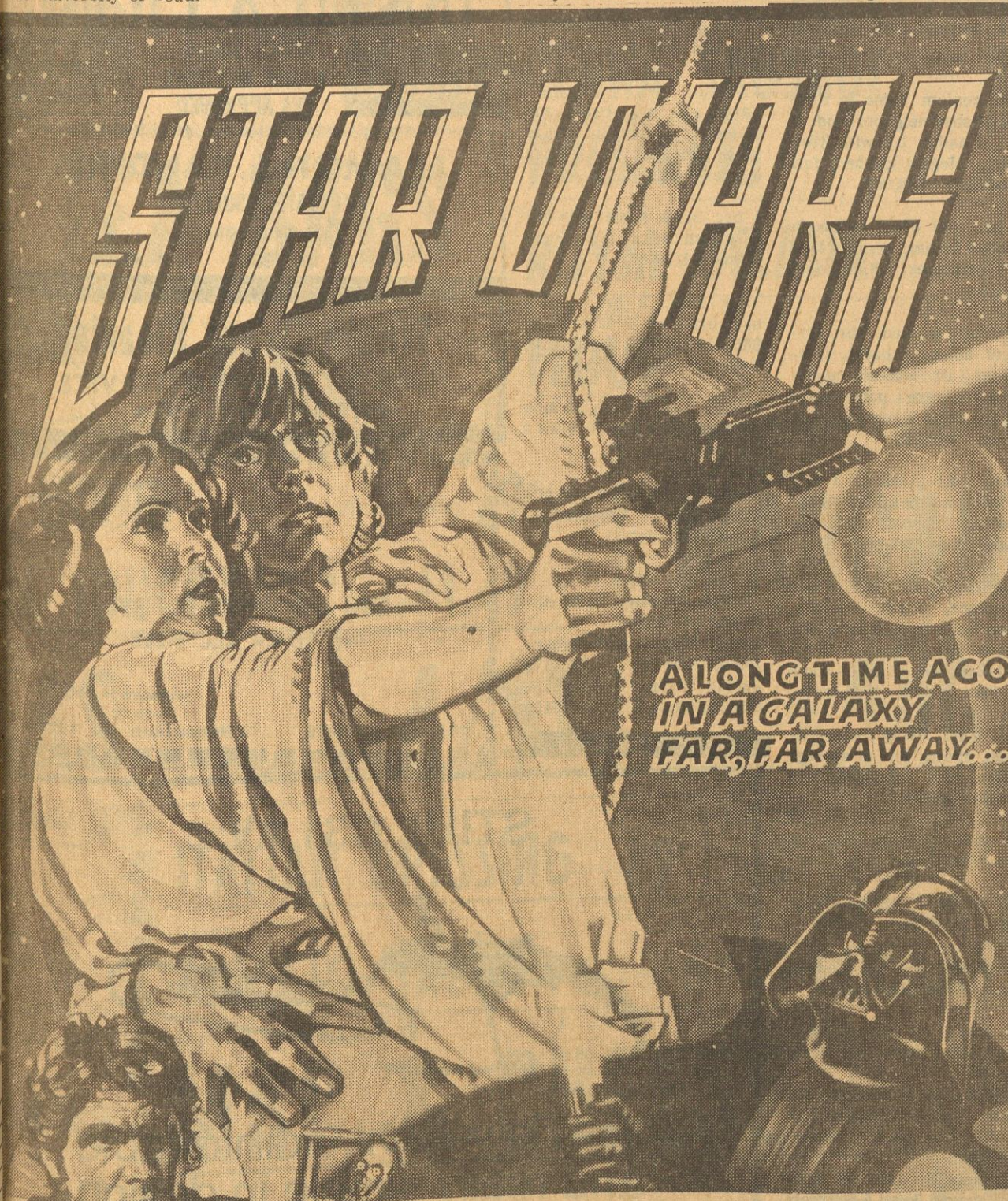

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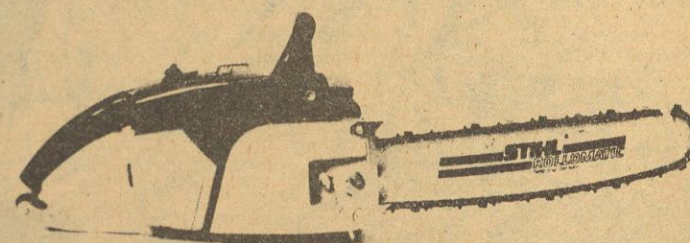

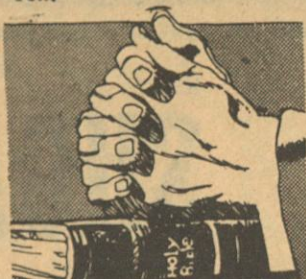
Lois Lomax

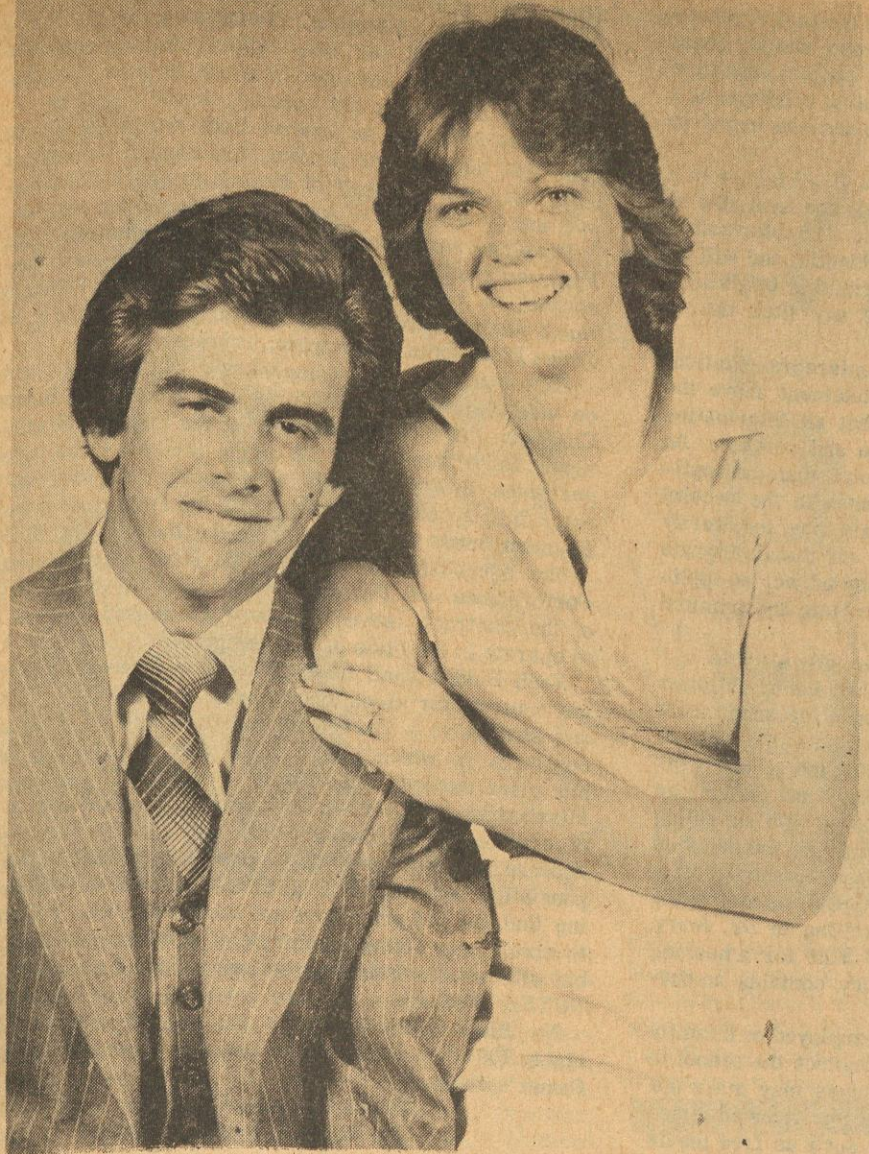

meeting these criteria but with other unusual expenses due to unusually high medical expenses, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, and disaster or casualty losses are urged to apply.

Application forms are being sent to all homes in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

To discourage the possibility of misrepresentation, the application forms contain a statement above the space for a signature certifying that all information furnished in the application is true and correct. An additional statement is added to warn that the application is being made in connection with the receipt of Federal funds, that school officials may, for, verify the information in the application, and that deliberate misrepresentation of information may subject the applicant to prosecution under applicable State and criminal statutes.

In certain cases, foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a family has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for such meals and milk for them, it should contact the school.

Under the provisions of the policy the school principals will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official, he may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis.

If he wishes to make a formal appeal, he may make a request either orally or in writing to Dr. Jerry Stone, 507 West Quitman St., 423-3206 for a hearing to appeal the decision. The policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure.

If a family member becomes unemployed or if family size changes, the family should contact the school to file a new application. Such changes may make the children of the family eligible for reduced price meals, or for additional benefits such as free meals and milk if the family income falls at or below the levels shown above.

In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, color, or national origin.

Each school and the office of the Superintendent has a copy of the complete policy which may be reviewed by any interested party.

**AVOID ILLEGAL RESIDUES**

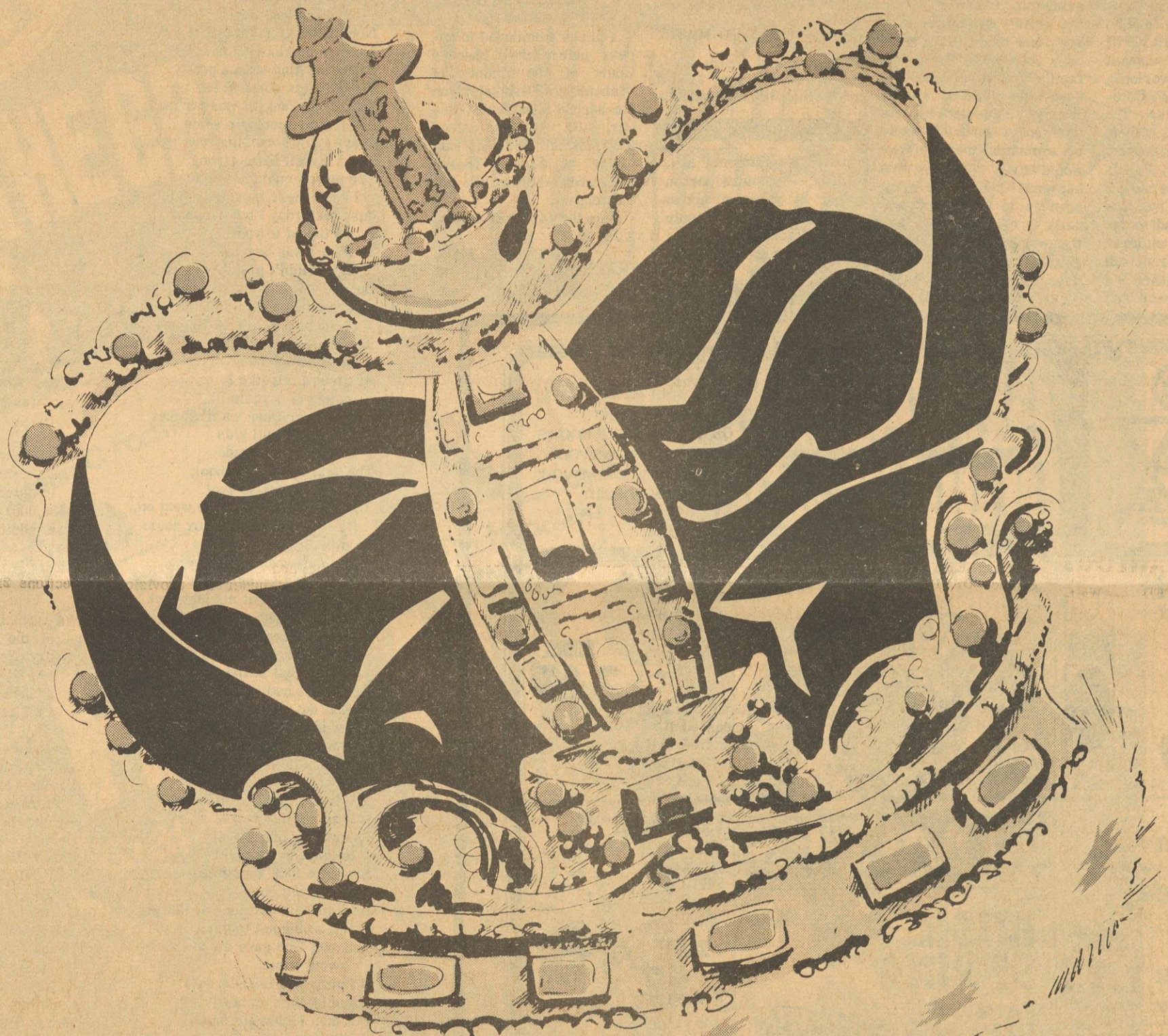
It is extremely important that livestock and poultry producers follow all withdrawal periods listed on labels of drugs, insecticides, or wormers that they may use in their production program. Following these prescribed withdrawal times will prevent illegal residues from showing up in meat or animal products such as milk or eggs.

When calculating withdrawal time, keep in mind that each withdrawal day is 24 hours starting with the hour in which the material was last administered to the animal. For example, if a material with a five-day pre-slaughter withdrawal time is used at 9:00 a.m. on Friday using the 24 hour formula, the animal will complete its first withdrawal day at 9:00 a.m. Saturday. Using this procedure, the fifth and final withdrawal

day will occur at 9:00 a.m. on Wednesday.

The following are a few examples of some products and their withdrawal times. There are many materials that can be used in hog, poultry, or cattle production, so check individual labels for proper withdrawal times and be safe; avoid illegal residues.

Thibenzole's withdrawal time is 3 days (72 hours) before slaughter and 4 days (96 hours) before milk can be used for food; Tramisol (bolus, drench, pellet), 2 days (48 hours) before slaughter; Tramisol (injectable), 7 days (168 hours) before slaughter; Tiguvon 3% pour-on, 35 days before slaughter; Warbex, 35 days before slaughter; toxaphene, 28 days before slaughter; and Tetracycline (poultry and hogs), 4 days (96 hours) before slaughter.

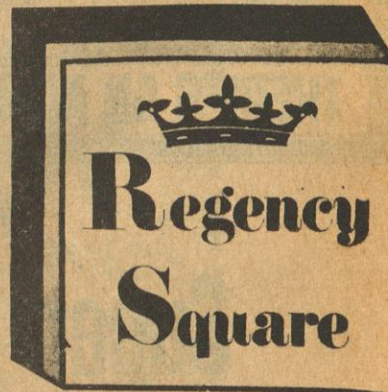

possess, keep or harbor any dog within the corporate limits of said Town unless such dog has been so inoculated against rabies.

SECTION 3. It shall be unlawful for any person who owns or has in his or her possession or under his or her control or who keeps or harbors any such dog within the corporate limits of the Town of Tishomingo, Mississippi, to cause or permit any such dog to be at large within said Town unless the dog bears a suitable metal tag approved by the State Board of Health which may be braded to the collar or harness of such dog, which said tag shall have stamped thereon the serial number of vaccination and the year in which said dog was inoculated (vaccinated). The fact that any such dog fails at any time to bear such tag shall be prima facie evidence that the owner of such dog has failed to have such dog inoculated (vaccinated) against rabies as provided by law and as herein provided.

SECTION 4. No dog of dangerous, vicious, fierce or mischievous propensities or tendencies may be at large at any time within the corporate limits of said Town and it shall be unlawful for the owner or other person having any such dog in his or her possession or under his or her control, or in any manner keeping or harboring any such dog within the corporate limits of said Town to cause or permit any such dog to be at large in said Town. If any dog bites or attempts to bite any person while such dog is at large, then such dog shall be conclusively presumed to be a dangerous dog and a dog of dangerous propensities and tendencies. If any dog attacks or attempts to attack any other dog or other animal while such dog is at large, then such dog shall be conclusively presumed to be a large, then such dog shall be conclusively presumed to be a vicious dog and a dog having vicious propensities and tendencies. If any dog at large chases or otherwise attempts to catch a person, then such dog shall be conclusively presumed to be a fierce dog and to have fierce propensities and tendencies. If any dog at large scatters garbage, or trespasses upon the premises of any person other than the owner thereof, the such dog shall be conclusively presumed to be a mischievous dog and a dog of mischievous propensities and tendencies.

SECTION 5. If any dog is caused or permitted or is found to be at large within the corporate limits of said Town in violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance, then such dog may be caught and impounded by any of the police officers of said Town or by a person designated by the policeman on duty, and may be held and disposed of as herein provided. If any such dog is so impounded, the same shall be released to the owner thereof only in the event of the payment within three (3) days to the policeman on duty of the Town of Tishomingo, Mississippi for the use and benefit of said Town, the sum of Two Dollars (\$2.00) as a fee for catching or otherwise apprehending such dog, and the additional sum of Two Dollars (\$2.00) per day or portion thereof that such dog may be so impounded. If the owner of any such dog fails or refuses to so pay such fees within three (3) days from the time such dog is initially caught and impounded, then such dog may be destroyed. The payment of the fees herein provided, and the payment of any such fees shall not relieve any person from the penalties, herein prescribed for any violations of this ordinance. Before any impounded dog is so destroyed, the person charged with the primary duty of enforcing this ordinance, or the policeman on duty of said Town, shall give three (3) days' notice of the fact that said dog has been so impounded by posting a notice in three (3) public places in said Town.

SECTION 6. No female dog in heat shall be permitted to be at large at any time and it shall be unlawful for the owner of any female dog in heat to cause or permit such dog to be at large at any time within the corporate limits of the said Town.

SECTION 7. If any dog suffering with rabies or reasonably suspected of suffering with rabies is caused or permitted to be at large within the corporate limits of said Town, such dog may be killed by any police officer of said Town, without such officer having to catch or impound such dog.

SECTION 8. If any dangerous dog or dog having dangerous propensities and tendencies as herein defined is found at large as herein defined, the such dog may be killed by any police officer having to catch or impound such dog.

SECTION 9. If any dog within said Town shall at any time have rabies, or shall be suspected by the County Health Officer or his representatives of having rabies, or shall have been exposed to rabies, such dog shall be safely confined and in all respects dealt with in accordance with the directions of the County Health Officer.

SECTION 10. The policeman on duty of said Town shall designate one of the police officers of said Town, or other suitable person who is charged with the primary duty and responsibility of enforcing the provisions of this ordinance, but any and all police officers of said Town are fully authorized and empowered to enforce any and all the provisions hereof.

SECTION 11. The failure or refusal of any person to comply with any of the provisions of this ordinance, and the violation of any provision or ordinance by any person shall constitute a misdemeanor; and any person guilty of any violation of any provision of this ordinance shall, on conviction thereof, be fined for the first offense in a sum not to exceed Five Dollars (\$5.00); and for the second offense in a sum not to exceed Twenty-Five Dollars (\$25.00); and for the third offense a sum not to exceed Fifty Dollars (\$50.00); and for any subsequent offense a sum not to exceed One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00).

SECTION 12. This ordinance has been considered section by section, provision by provision, and as a whole, and if any section or provision hereof shall be held unconstitutional or invalid for any reason, the remaining sections and provisions hereof shall be valid, it being hereby declared that all constitutional and valid provisions hereof would have been enacted after the exclusion of any section or provision which might be found to be unconstitutional or invalid.

SECTION 13. Any and all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith or any part hereof are hereby expressly repealed.

SECTION 14. The City Clerk shall cause this ordinance to be published as soon as possible after the passage hereof. The Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the said Town find and adjudge that numerous dogs are at large in the Town of Tishomingo, Mississippi in violation of the laws of the State of Mississippi, and particularly in violation of Chapter 1, Title 25, Volume 5, Mississippi Code of 1942, as well as in violation of substantially all of the provisions of this ordinance. The Mayor and Board of Aldermen of said Town further find and adjudge that the public safety and health of the inhabitants of said Town require that this ordinance become effective immediately upon its adoption, and for such reasons, this ordinance shall become and be effective immediately upon its adoption and approval.

The foregoing ordinance having been reduced to writing and read and considered section by section, provision by provision and as a whole, the same was fully introduced and a motion made for the adoption thereof, and a vote taken thereon with the following result:

An Ordinance

There came on to be considered by the Board of Mayor and Aldermen of the Town of Tishomingo, Mississippi, the following ordinance, to-wit:

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE VACCINATION AGAINST RABIES OF ALL DOGS WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE TOWN OF TISHOMINGO, MISSISSIPPI; PROHIBITING DOGS FROM RUNNING AT LARGE WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE TOWN OF TISHOMINGO, MISSISSIPPI, DURING CERTAIN PERIODS AND UNDER CERTAIN CONDITIONS; AND AUTHORIZING THE IMPOUNDING AND DESTRUCTION OF DOGS UNDER CERTAIN CONDITIONS; AND PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION HEREOF, ALL AS PARTICULARLY HEREINAFTER SET FORTH.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Tishomingo, Mississippi:

SECTION 1. That for the purpose of this ordinance, the following definitions shall apply when used herein.

(a) The word "dog" shall include both the male and female sex of the canine species.

(b) The word "owner" shall include any person, firm or corporation owning, possessing, harboring or keeping a dog.

(c) The words "at large" shall mean off the enclosed premises of the owner and not under the control of the owner or other persons by leash, cord, chain or other physical means of restraint sufficient in strength to control such dog.

(d) The word "Town" shall mean the Town of Tishomingo, Mississippi, and any and every place within the corporate limits of the Town of Tishomingo, Mississippi.

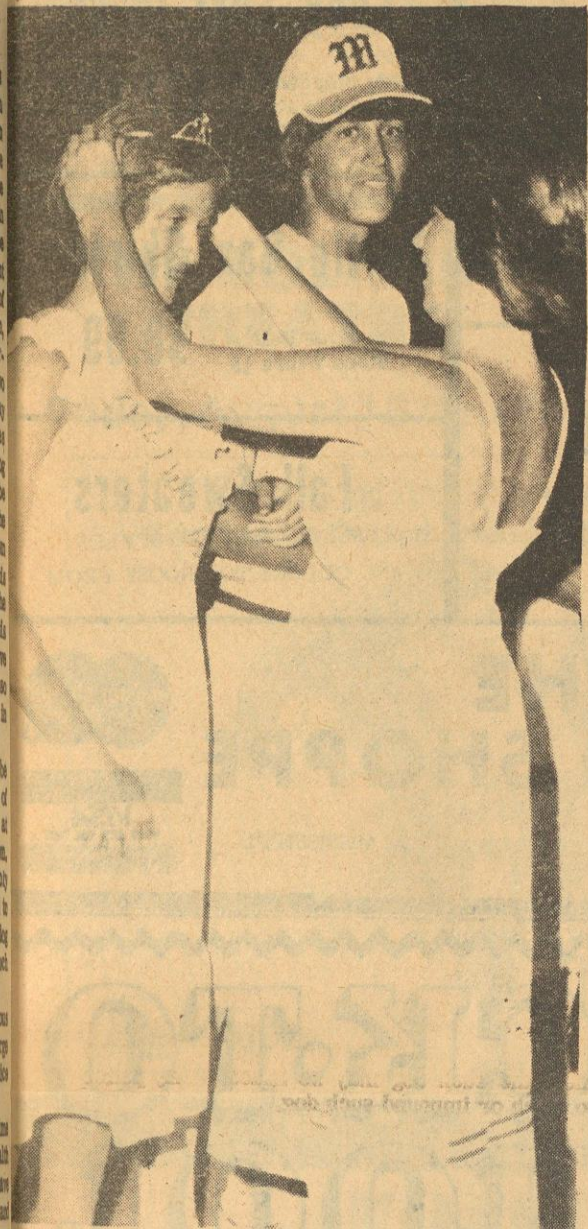
SECTION 2. Every person in the Town of Tishomingo, Mississippi, who owns or has in his or her possession or who keeps or harbors any dog within the corporate limits of said Town, shall have and keep such dog inoculated (vaccinated) against rabies, as provided by the laws of the State of Mississippi, and as provided by the rules and regulations prescribed and promulgated by the Mississippi State Board of Health, and it shall be unlawful for any person to own,

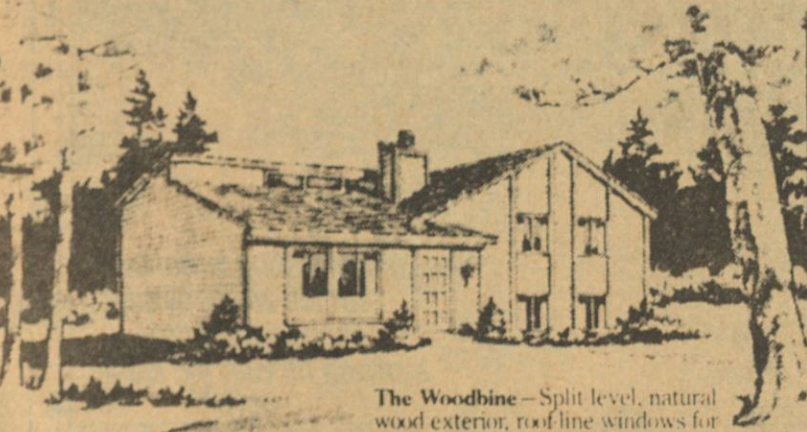

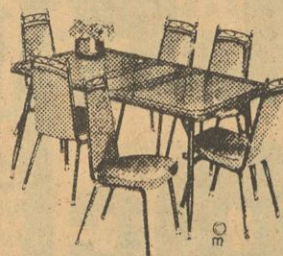

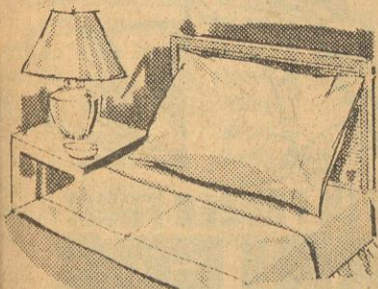
