FmHA Makes Emergency Loans Available To Farmers

Bob Bergland has given to make emergency loans to Farmers Home Administration state directors authority to make emergency loans to farmers as soon as loss from natural disaster is confirmed.

The secretary abolished a time-consuming system in effect for several years that required county governments and state governors to request disaster loan service, then for the Secretary to designate counties where FMHA emergency loans could be made. This course was followed when damage assessment reports indicated the need for 25 or more farm emergency loans in a county.

Under the new, less timeconsuming procedure, State Director Mark Hazard will authorize the Agency's

Secretary of Agriculture county offices in Mississippi any number of farmers showing a need for emergency credit to offset substantial loss caused by storm, flood, drought or other natural disaster. The state director will act on the basis of available information and damage reports received from FmHA county offices. Designations of eligibility by the Secretary of Agriculture will no

> longer be required. FmHA emergence services also are automatically available where a major disaster or emergency has been declared by the President.

> Hazard said Bergland's action to cut red tapc from emergency loan procedure was taken under a provision of the Agricultural

Credit Act of 1978, signed by President Carter August

FmHA emergency loans are made to farmers lacking other sources of credit for recovery from natural disaster. Beginning Oct. 1, 1978, amounts offsetting actual loss associated with production will be made at an interest rate of 5 percent, and additional amounts Girl Scouts, Red Cross, at higher rates. Low-rate loans also are made to restore farm dwellings and ousehold effects lost or damaged due to natural disaster. Loans are made through FmHA county offices. 

Miss Nellie Horton's HOME **ECONOMIST'S** NOTES

CHOOSING INTERFACING in choosing an interfacing. The two most important factors w consider are the weight of the outer fabric and the effect the pattern designer has created.

Keep in mind the purposes of the interfacing: to give body and support, to tonhole locations, to prevent ties and weights. They are reinforce such areas as butimprints of seams from showing through the right side, to keep the fabric from stretching and to emphasize areas like cuffs and pocket flaps.

Interfacings should be suitable in weight for the fabrics on which they are used. As a general rule, they should be no heavier or stiffer than the fabric. Where practical, self-fabric in wash materials insures color and shrinkage identical with that in the fabric.

When shopping for an interfacing, place a piece of your fabric over the different interfacings and feel the two layers together. Then select one that follows suggestions of your pattern. Also check to see that your interfacing does not show through the fabric, especially when fabric is white or pastel.

Learn the names of current interfacings on the market. Study new ones to see which best suits your use. Suggested pre-shrunk interfacings for cotton fabrics are lawn batiste and

Permanent-finish organ-When sewing, be selective dy may be used in broadcloth and other lightweight

cottons. It requires no shrinking. For lightweight fabrics, use underlining fabrics for interfacing. When using wool in tai-


loring a suit or coat, use an interfacing of hair can-Hair canvases are vas. available in different qualimade strong and resilient by blending goat hair into the fabric. Other fibers in hair canvas may be wool, cotton, rayon or polyester, depending on the weight and purpose. Before buying hair can-

vas, crush it in your hand and see how well it springs back. The better quality hair canvas is resilient and does not wrinkle easily.

MEAT LOAF (225 calories per serving) 1 1/2 lb. ground lean beef 3/4 c. fine bread crumbs 1/4 c. chopped green pepper 1/4 c. water 2 eggs, slightly beaten

1/2 c. nonfat dry milk powder 1/4 c. chopped onion Seasonings to taste

Combine all ingredients; mix lightly. Pour mixture into lightly greased flint skillet. Bake in 350-degree oven for 1 hour. Yield: 6 servings.




Can It Still Do The Job?

LAND FORMING: Land forming is a key factor in improving farming efficiency. Land forming aids water intake, prevents excessive erosion and permits precise irrigation, cultivation and chemical appli-

Areas to be land formed this fall should be harvested early. When land forming, do not make deep cuts which expose unproductive soils. After land forming is completed, take soil samples to determine fertilizer requirements.

STOP SWINE DISEASES:

You can prevent most diseases in your swine operation by good management and sanitation. A good health program prevents diseases instead of treating them after they occur.

To keep pigs healthy, avoid housing them in damp buildings. If you use an unheated building to house pigs, use three to four inches of wood shavings or similar materials for bedding. Also, use adequate insulation to keep buildings at a more constant tempera-

SEED SUPPLIES FOR FALL PLANTING: You need to make ar-



rangements to secure your fall seed supplies if you haven't already done so. Small grain and ryegrass seed appear to be in adequate supply for fall planting. 


