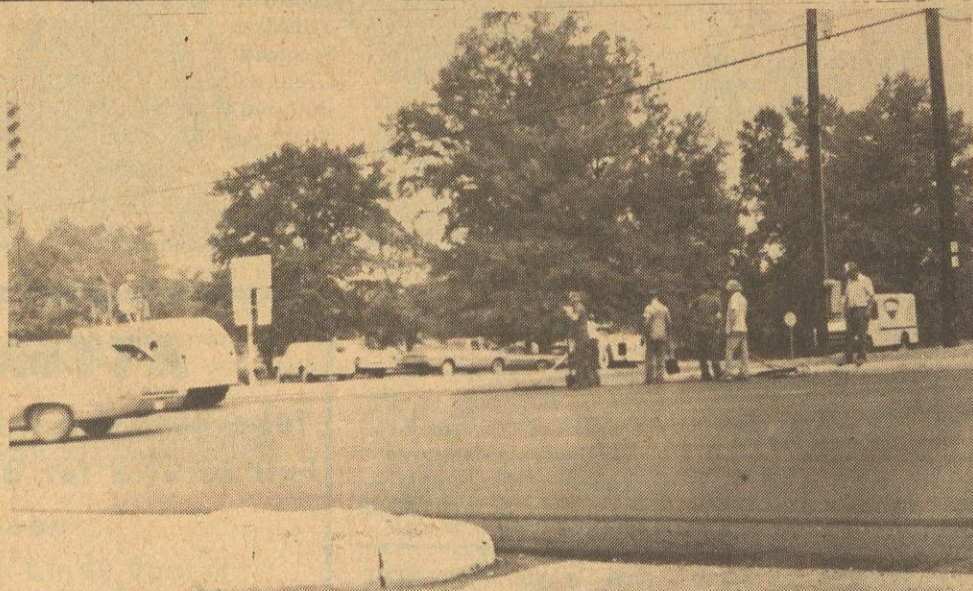

ANOTHER FACE-LIFT FOR IUKA — In order to take care of the heavy traffic at the intersection of Highways 25 and 72 in Iuka, the State Highway Department is completely reconstructing the intersection. All four lanes have been widened and leveled and at the present time are being resurfaced with 1 1/2 inches of hot mix. According to Mr. H. L. Denton, Maintenance Superintendent, a new traffic light will be installed and will include turning signals. Mr. Neal Peach, Assistant Maintenance Engineer, reports that approximately \$70,000.00 is being spent at the site with Bonds Construction Co. handling the contract. Mr. Roscoe Dick, Maintenance Supervisor, told The News that the traffic at the intersection was unbelievable and that the improvements were necessary to handle the hundreds of vehicles which pass this way daily. Upon completion the improvements at the intersection will be a real asset to the City of Iuka and will be an attractive site to all passers by.

FmHA Makes Emergency Loans Available To Farmers

Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland has given Farmers Home Administration state directors authority to make emergency loans to farmers as soon as loss from natural disaster is confirmed.

The secretary abolished a time-consuming system in effect for several years that required county governments and state governors to request disaster loan service, then for the Secretary to designate counties where FmHA emergency loans could be made. This course was followed when damage assessment reports indicated the need for 25 or more farm emergency loans in a county.

Under the new, less time-consuming procedure, State Director Mark Hazard will authorize the Agency's

county offices in Mississippi to make emergency loans to any number of farmers showing a need for emergency credit to offset substantial loss caused by storm, flood, drought or other natural disaster. The state director will act on the basis of available information and damage reports received from FmHA county offices. Designations of eligibility by the Secretary of Agriculture will no longer be required.

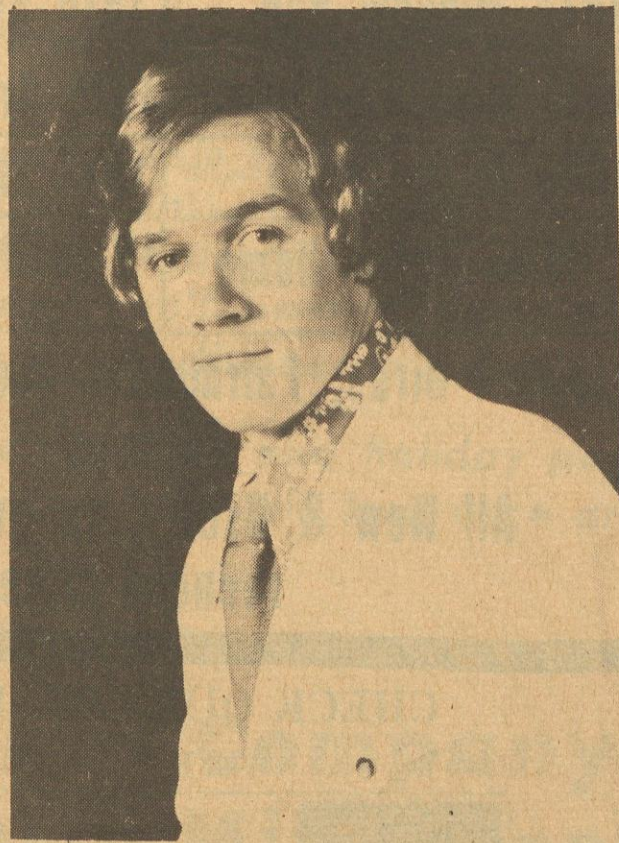
FmHA emergency loan services also are automatically available where a major disaster or emergency has been declared by the President.

Hazard said Bergland's action to cut red tape from emergency loan procedure was taken under a provision of the Agricultural

Credit Act of 1978, signed by President Carter August 4.

FmHA emergency loans are made to farmers lacking other sources of credit for recovery from natural disaster. Beginning Oct. 1, 1978, amounts offsetting actual loss associated with production will be made at an interest rate of 5 percent, and additional amounts at higher rates. Low-rate loans also are made to restore farm dwellings and household effects lost or damaged due to natural disaster. Loans are made through FmHA county offices. Phillips Winner Of 1st Prize In Copyright Competition



Nicholas B. Phillips, of Iuka, has won the \$250 first prize in the 1978 Nathan Burkan Memorial Competition at the University of Mississippi School of Law, President Stanley Adams of the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers announced. The competition at the University of Mississippi was under the supervision of Dean Parham Williams, and the title of the winning essay

was "Abie's Progeny: Towards Defining 'Expression'".

Before his law school studies, Mr. Phillips received the following degrees: A.A. in Mathematics, Northeast Mississippi Junior College (1971); and B.A. and M.A. in English, University of Mississippi (1973 and 1977, respectively).

While studying law at the University of Mississippi School of Law, Mr. Phillips

was engaged as a teaching assistant in a Legal Writing program during the Spring of 1978, and, at the same time, was working towards an M.A. degree in English. He held membership in Phi Alpha Delta. The son of Mr. and Mrs. N. L. Phillips, also of Iuka, Mr. Phillips has assumed the position of Instructor of Paralegal Technology at the Northeast Mississippi Junior College in Booneville.

The Nathan Burkan Memorial Competition is sponsored annually by ASCAP, America's most prestigious performing rights licensing organization, in memory of ASCAP's first General Counselor who died in 1936. It is designed to stimulate interest in the field of copyright law. First and second prizes of \$250 and \$100 are offered in each of the leading law schools throughout the nation. A panel of distinguished judges then considers all the prize-winning papers which are received from participating law schools, and selects the outstanding essays for National Awards of \$1500, \$1000, \$750, \$500 and \$250.

Tishomingo Methodist "Friends Festival"

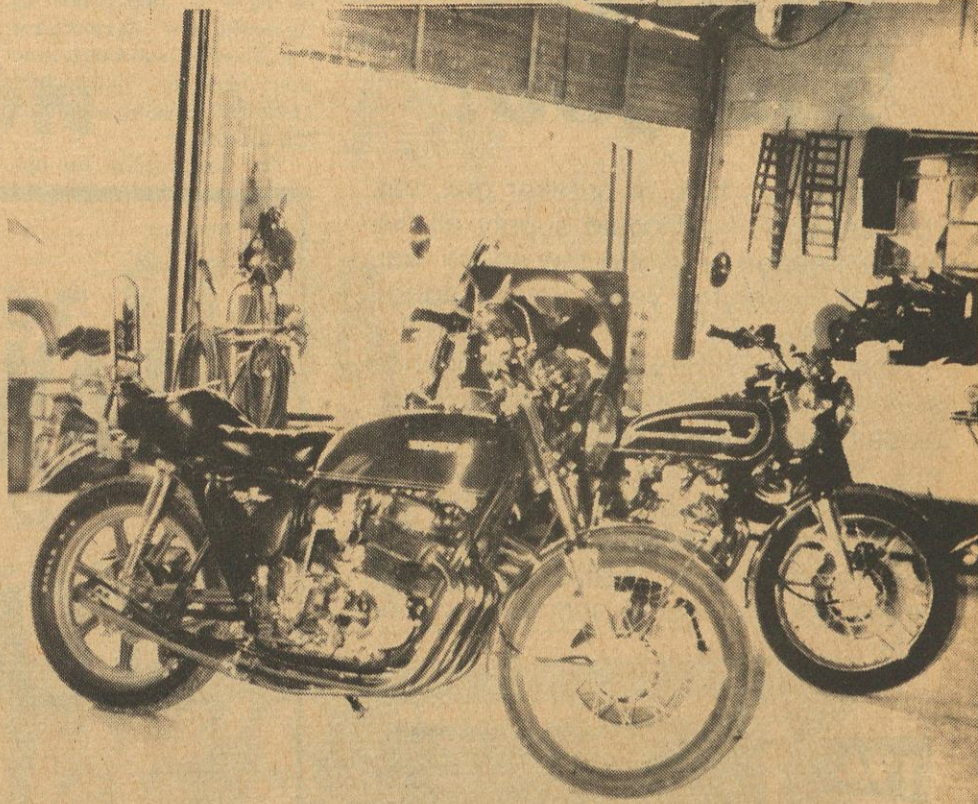

HOME ECONOMIST'S NOTES

CHOOSING INTERFACING

When sewing, be selective in choosing an interfacing. The two most important factors to consider are the weight of the outer fabric and the effect the pattern designer has created.

Keep in mind the purposes of the interfacing: to give body and support, to reinforce such areas as buttonhole locations, to prevent imprints of seams from showing through the right side, to keep the fabric from stretching and to emphasize areas like cuffs and pocket flaps.

Interfacings should be suitable in weight for the fabrics on which they are used. As a general rule, they should be no heavier or stiffer than the fabric. Where practical, self-fabric in wash materials insures color and shrinkage identical with that in the fabric.

When shopping for an interfacing, place a piece of your fabric over the different interfacings and feel the two layers together. Then select one that follows suggestions of your pattern. Also check to see that your interfacing does not show through the fabric, especially when fabric is white or pastel.

Learn the names of current interfacings on the market. Study new ones to see which best suits your use. Suggested pre-shrunk interfacings for cotton fabrics are lawn, batiste and muslin.

Permanent-finish organ-dy may be used in broadcloth and other lightweight cottons. It requires no shrinking. For lightweight fabrics, use underlining fabrics for interfacing.

When using wool in tailoring a suit or coat, use an interfacing of hair canvas. Hair canvases are available in different qualities and weights. They are made strong and resilient by blending goat hair into the fabric. Other fibers in hair canvas may be wool, cotton, rayon or polyester, depending on the weight and purpose.

Before buying hair canvas, crush it in your hand and see how well it springs back. The better quality hair canvas is resilient and does not wrinkle easily.

MEAT LOAF

(225 calories per serving)
1 1/2 lb. ground lean beef
3/4 c. fine bread crumbs
1/4 c. chopped green pepper
1/4 c. water
2 eggs, slightly beaten
1/2 c. nonfat dry milk powder
1/4 c. chopped onion
Seasonings to taste

Combine all ingredients; mix lightly. Pour mixture into lightly greased flint skillet. Bake in 350-degree oven for 1 hour. Yield: 6 servings.

LAND FORMING:

Land forming is a key factor in improving farming efficiency. Land forming aids water intake, prevents excessive erosion and permits precise irrigation, cultivation and chemical application.

Areas to be land formed this fall should be harvested early. When land forming, do not make deep cuts which expose unproductive soils. After land forming is completed, take soil samples to determine fertilizer requirements.

STOP SWINE DISEASES:

You can prevent most diseases in your swine operation by good management and sanitation. A good health program prevents diseases instead of treating them after they occur.

To keep pigs healthy, avoid housing them in damp buildings. If you use an unheated building to house pigs, use three to four inches of wood shavings or similar materials for bedding. Also, use adequate insulation to keep buildings at a more constant temperature.

SEED SUPPLIES FOR FALL PLANTING:
You need to make ar-

rangements to secure your fall seed supplies if you haven't already done so. Small grain and ryegrass seed appear to be in adequate supply for fall planting. Prices are expected to be slightly higher than last year's. Supplies of clover seed also will meet the demand for planting this fall.

FARMWEEK:

The September 18 edition of the "Farmweek" program will feature an in-depth look at corn production in Mississippi. Farmweek reporter Tyson Gair will discuss with producers, researchers and Extension personnel the crop's potential of becoming a major row crop in the state. Extension Agronomist Dr. Charles Baskin will talk about the history of corn production in Mississippi. Dr. Frank Davis and Dr. Gene Scott, both U. S. Department of Agriculture researchers at Mississippi State University, will discuss research with corn varieties.

Farmweek is shown each Monday evening at 7:30 and the following Tuesday morning at 7:30 on the Mississippi Educational Television Network.

USDA SEEKS COMMENTS ON PROPOSAL FOR 1979 UPLAND COTTON PROGRAM: The public has until October 20, 1978, to submit recommendations concerning provisions of the 1979 Upland Cotton Program. The Upland Cotton Loan level must be announced by November 1, 1978, and the Upland Cotton National Program acreage by December 15, 1978. Ray Fitzgerald, Administrator of the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, said public comment is being sought on the following:

The target price for up-

land cotton; The National Program Acreage and Program Allocation Factor for Upland Cotton. (The NAP is the number of harvest acres projected as needed to meet domestic and export requirements during the 1979-80 marketing year which begins August 1, 1979. The minimum NPA required by law is 10 million acres. The allocation factor is determined by dividing the NPA for the 1979 crop by the estimated harvest acreage for the crop); The voluntary reduction from 1978 upland cotton acreage in order to guarantee target price protection on total 1979 planted acreage; whether there should be a set-aside requirement for upland cotton and, if so, the extent of such a requirement; if a set-aside is in effect, whether there should be a limitation on upland cotton planted acreage and, if so, the extent of such limitation; whether there should be a provision for additional diversion of upland cotton and, if so, the extent of such diversions and payment therefore (if land diversion payments are made, producers will be required to devote to approved conservations used an acreage of cropland equal to the amount of such land diversion); the loan level for upland lint cotton (min-

imum required by law is 48 cents per pound; whether a seed cotton loan program should be offered and, if so, what the loan level should be; and the specifications for bale packaging materials.

Prior to making these determinations, the secretary will consider any written recommendations received by the Acting Director, Production Adjustment Division, USDA-ASCS, P. O. Box 2415, Washington, D. C. 20013. Comments will be available for public inspection during normal business hours in room 3630 of USDA's South Building.

The public has until Oct. 10, to submit ideas and comments on the 1979 feed grain and soybean programs.

Interested persons should comment on such items as whether barley and oats should be included in the feed grain program; whether there should be a set-aside requirement and a land diversion program, and if so, the extent of such provisions. "Comments may also concern the amount of the national program acreage, the reduction required, if any, from previous year's harvested acreage to guarantee target price protection on total planted acreage, loan and purchase levels for the 1979 crops of corn, sorghum, barley, oats, and rye, including commodity eligibility, storage requirements, premiums and discounts."

For soybeans, comments should include the loan and purchase levels for the 1979 crop, including commodity eligibility, storage requirements, premiums and discounts. Mail comments to the acting director, Production Adjustment Division, ASCS, USDA, Room 3630, P. O. Box 2415, Washington, D. C. 20013.

I'm a lover of books, as most of the people I know, also know. Some old books are not worth anything and some are very valuable. Maybe not in dollars and cents, but in the history of a community, town or county. A friend of mine who was searching records to fine genealogy of her family found a copy of the land-deed of my great grandmother, Ann Janetta Barrett's dated and signed the 17th day of May A.D. 1887. Books of such records are valuable for many things. People are searching for records of all kinds. They are traveling the country over, searching for such records, which are supposed to be found where they were recorded in county court-houses. In another record book found in the courthouse in Corinth "The Marriages of Old Tishomingo County" (Alcorn, Prentiss & Tishomingo) 1861-65, I found the record of my grandmother's brother's marriage license dated 1861. The county clerk's name and also the names of the bondsmen who came with him to buy the license. Those names included my grandfather, which proved the name I had been told, James Leander Polk Timbess - it was signed - J.L.P. Timbess. This even proved the spelling of the name. This record book is over 100 years old. In another old record not so old but of great impor-

tance is a county cemetery record. Most counties have one. Tishomingo County does not, as yet but I'm sure there's one in the making. From one of Tippah County I found very valuable burial records of one of my friend's grandmother and other relatives. This friend lives in Asheville, N.C. but as a child had lived in Ripley, Miss.

If someone hadn't been a lover of old books, we would not know the history of the educational advantages I had in the late 1800's.

Have you gone to the Luka Library to see the Luka Normal Institute catalog of 1893 - 1894? On page 39 you find the history of the Normal.

Organized 1882-83 - 34 boarders; 1883-84, 54 boarders; 1884-85, 61

boarders; 1885-86, 111 boarders; 1886-87, 132 boarders; 1887-88, 143 boarders; 1888-89, 155 boarders; 1889-90, 211 boarders; 1891-92, 249 boarders; 1892-93, 176 boarders.

Have you searched the alumni list? You just might find your kin among the alumni or in the enrollment of 1892-93.

Our country has many valuable records, built into books that are being safeguarded for the coming generations. Are we taking care of our records?
