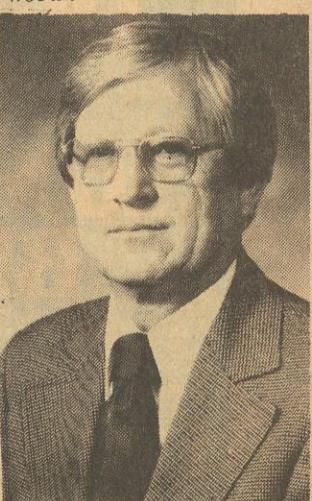

COUNTY BRIDGE CLOSED TO TRAFFIC

Supervisor Seeks Outside Funds To Maintain

Vital Industrial & Rural Road

A small rural road in Tishomingo County was the scene of a massive road block early Monday morning, September 18, in an attempt to crack down on overloaded vehicles traveling on the deteriorating farm to market route.

The stretch of black top, which connects Midway to

the Alabama State Line, was closed to traffic weighing over 10 tons at 6:00 a.m. Monday, thus halting the passage of loaded slag trucks from the Mississippi Stone Company, which is located in the Providence Community. Approximately 50,000 to 80,000 tons of rock are carried daily over the road to various counties

throughout Mississippi, the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway Project, and TVA's Yellow Creek Nuclear Project. This small state-aid road was neither built nor maintained to accommodate the heavy loads of traffic from the quarry, which has included 200 tractor-trailer trucks per day.

According to A. C. Ryan, Third District Supervisor, he felt it was necessary to enforce a 10 ton limit and 45 MPH speed limit this week after discovering a bridge on the verge of collapsing. Cracks were found in the concrete supports and 10 x 14 beams used as reinforcements were also found broken. The bridge, located on the county road off Hwy. 25, has been condemned to all traffic, including not only 18 wheelers, but also school buses and local traffic.

"I'm responsible for this bridge if someone should get killed," Ryan said. He believes anyone who crosses the bridge is risking his life. He has arranged detours for bus routes and has asked other traffic to remain away from the bridge.

The bridge, which is "wider than it is long," is part of the road which leads to Mississippi Stone Co., Inc., said Steve Howley, project engineer for the company's largest buyer, Granite Construction Co., of Aberdeen.

The decision to condemn the bridge virtually stops the quarry's operation, because trucks loaded with stone cannot get to the highway, he said. Since only a small amount of rock is stored away from the quarry, time is a factor in the problem, Howley said.

If the quarry is not able to use the road, Granite Construction and other buyers will purchase from an Alabama company, moving "\$3 million in revenue" across the border and costing 50 stone company workers their jobs, Howley said.

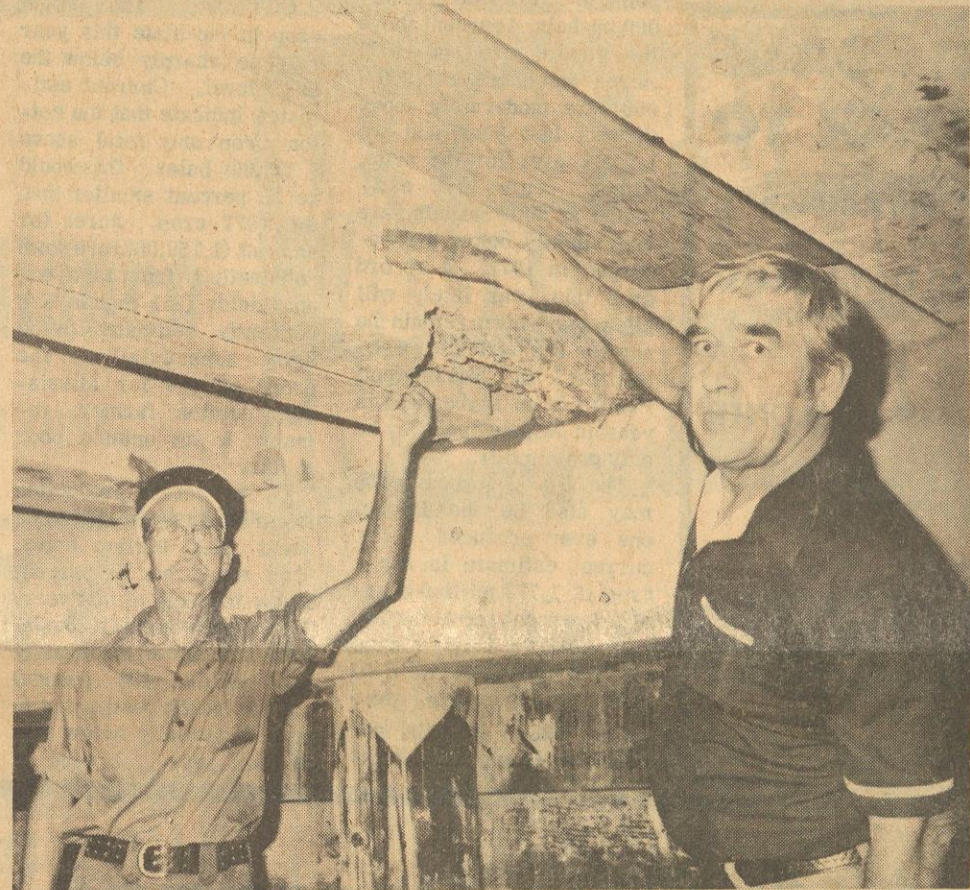
Mr. Ryan states that he has "full sympathy" for the truck drivers, who are only trying to make a living. He feels it is time for both state and federal funds to be issued for the upkeep of the road, which is so vital to Mississippi's only hard rock quarry. Ryan said he spent \$50,000 on the road last year and it is now crumbling with pot-holes, some 6 to 12 inches deep. He stresses that to preserve this one road, he would have to spend all the funds allotted to him by the county for the upkeep of the 157 miles of road in his district. Estimates indicate the county needs between \$800,000 to \$1,000,000 to repair the bridge and road.

Both Howley and Ryan said the bridge and the road badly need financial help from the state government. Ryan said several attempts to reach Gov. Cliff Finch by telephone Monday were unsuccessful.

Ryan and Howley hope to get promises from state officials as soon as possible. Howley hoped the written assurance of coming aid would convince Ryan to replace the struts and to reopen the bridge. He indicated the company might seek an injunction to force Ryan to take this action.

Ryan said he might take some temporary measures to reopen the road, but he emphasized that replacing the struts would not be safe. Although this has caused inconveniences and may cause a great business loss to the quarry, Ryan said he thinks reopening the bridge could cause a death.

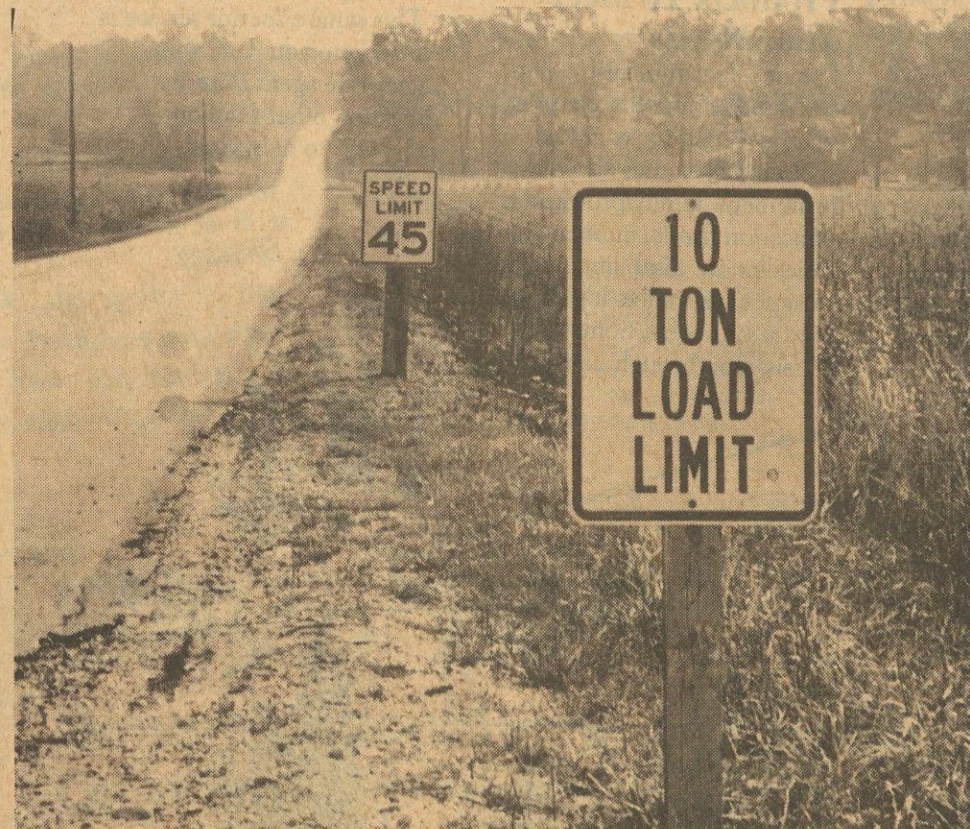
"We need some help bad," he said.

bridge is located between Hwy. 25 at Midway and the Alabama line on a small rural road. The collapse of the bridge was apparently caused by extremely heavy vehicles traveling on its surface. According to Ryan, some 80,000 tons of rock are moved daily over the

road from the Mississippi Stone Company, which is not practical for a road built for "farm to market" traffic only. A 10 ton load limit and a 45 MPH speed limit has been placed on the road and is being strictly enforced until repairs to both the road and bridge can be made.

that an ordinance was passed by the board last year limiting weight on county roads to 10 tons when necessity was undeniable. Signs have been posted all along the small rural road and the

laws have been strictly enforced by local officials after the discovery of severed beams in a bridge located on the stretch this week.

SHOWER CURTAINS
Ready-made shower curtains can be surprisingly expensive, and making your own is unexpectedly easy. With a plastic liner or old shower curtain beneath, nearly any fabric can be used. A standard shower curtain is usually 6 x 6 feet, so two lengths of 36 inch fabric will work. Wider lengths can be seamed and trimmed to 6 feet or left wider for more fullness. If you like the look of a floor-length curtain, measure and cut accordingly. A center seam is acceptable, although many people prefer to use a full width center panel with narrower side panels. Using the liner as a pattern and making the finished curtain one inch larger all around is a simple way to be sure everything will fit.

1. Cut fabric into 81-inch lengths (unless you are making a floor-length or ceiling-to-floor curtain, then figure accordingly). Seam the fabric panels together as needed for finished width of about 75-76 inches.

2. Turn down the top edge in a double one-inch hem. Stitch or fuse. (Fusing adds more body, which is often desirable.) Turn a double three-inch hem at the bottom edge. Stitch or fuse. Repeat at side edges with a double half-inch hem.

3. Apply grommet or large eyelets to make 5/16-inch medium buttonholes along the top hem edge.

Use the liner as a guide for spacing, or space 12 holes evenly along the top of the curtain, starting in about 1 1/2 inches from the side edge and 1/2 inch down from the top. Lay the curtain and the liner together. Put shower curtain hooks through both. Hang on shower rod.

COMBATING RUST STAINS
Rust stains on carpeting caused by metal casters or chair legs are problems to remove because only acids will tackle the marks. Before trying any solution, test it on a hidden area to see if it affects the carpet dye. Hydrofluoric acid, available in the cleaning products section of some grocery and department stores, produces excellent results on rust stains. If it doesn't change the color of a test area, put a couple of drops of the acid on a tissue wrapped around an ice cream bar stick and rub the stain.

Oxalic acid also works on rust, and because it is less caustic, many people prefer it. It is available at drug stores in a one percent solution and can be applied in the same way as hydrofluoric acid. It will take several minutes before the acid begins to work.

BOILED DEVILED HAMBURGERS
(226 calories per serving)
1 lb. lean ground beef
1 1/2 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
1 1/2 tsp. prepared mustard
Dash of pepper
4 tbsp. catsup
2 tsp. horseradish
2 tsp. minced onion
1 tsp. salt

Combine all ingredients; blend well. Place under broiler, about 3 inches from flame, for about 3 minutes on each side. Yield: 4 servings.

CROP OUTLOOK
SOYBEANS: Soybean production in Mississippi this year may be at a record level. Current estimates point to a crop of 78,000,000 bushels, 4 percent above the record crop of 1977. Acres for harvest (3,900,000) are moderately above that of last year and the largest ever for the state. Yields, currently estimated at 20.0 bushels, are just slightly below that recorded in 1977. A record crop this year likely will allow soybeans to remain the number one agricultural enterprise in Mississippi. Profits from soybeans this year in Mississippi may be only poor to fair.

The U. S. soybean crop may also be the largest one ever produced. The current estimate is for a crop of 1,772 million bushels, 3 percent above the record crop of 1977. Acres for harvest (63.3 million) are up moderately while yields (28.0 bushels per acre) are expected to be down moderately. A crop this large may put some downward pressure on soybean prices as we move through the harvest season.

COTTON: The cotton crop in the state this year may be sharply below the 1977 level. Current estimates indicate that the cotton crop may total about 725,000 bales. This would be 26 percent smaller than the 1977 crop. Acres for harvest (1,150,000) are down substantially from last year and yields (511 pounds) are currently estimated to be down substantially. The profit picture for Mississippi cotton farmers remains, in my opinion, poor to fair.

U. S. cotton production is currently estimated to be about 11.2 million bales. This would be 22 percent below the crop of last year. Acres for harvest (12.3 million) are down moderately and yields (436 pounds) are currently estimated to be substantially below that of last year. A crop of

only 11.2 million bales this year may allow prices to hold fairly steady or possibly improve.

CORN: Mississippi's corn crop is currently estimated to be about 5,805,000 bushels, 1 percent above that of last year. Acres for harvest, at 135,000 are down 16 percent from last year while yields may be substantially above those of last year. The current estimate is for a yield per acre of 43 bushels. Using only average yields and current prices, profits from this enterprise appear to be poor.

Nationally, the corn crop likely will be a record one. The current estimate is for a crop of 6,798 million bushels, 7 percent above the 1977 crop. Acres for harvest (67,794,000) are down slightly while yields are expected to be substantially above those of last year. The current estimate is for a yield per acre of 100.3 bushels, the highest U. S. corn yield ever recorded. The large corn crop this year likely will continue to put downward pressure on prices.

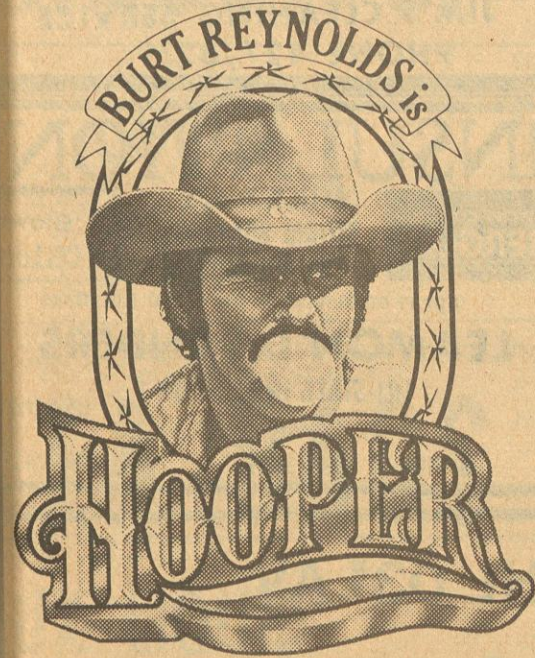
Mrs. Pearl Blunt came from Tishomingo Hospital last Tuesday. She seems to be doing better after surgery. She had a long stay in the

Squirrel Hunting Begins

Squirrel hunting, Mississippi's most popular gunning sport, opens Saturday, Sept. 30, in the delta and many northern counties. Prospects are bright and hunters should be out in numbers for the season that

extends through Dec. 24.

Some 50,000 shooters should be in the woods opening morning for the state's number one hunting sport which gets underway in Zone 1 counties north of and including Warren, north of Interstate-20, Yazoo, Madison, Attala, Montgomery, Grenada, Calhoun, Pontotoc, Union, Prentiss and Tishomingo.

According to a recent survey by biologists, some 170,000 state hunters take over 3.3 million squirrels across the state each year. Hunters average spending nine days afield and taking home over 2 squirrels each day they hunt, Wildlife Coordinator Edsel Chiburn said.

"The state has three basic types of squirrels: the delta fox squirrel, hill fox squirrel and the gray squirrel. People will be out hunting them on all our wildlife areas in Zone 1 on opening day, and of course other wildlife areas will be busy when squirrel hunting season opens in their areas. We're expecting a real good hunt this year," Chiburn said.

Biologists advise looking for the reddish-yellow delta fox squirrel mainly in hardwood bottom areas in the delta and along adjacent bluff areas. Early in the season squirrel cuttings under food trees should indicate good hunting spots. Hill fox squirrels are common along ridges and in mainly pine woodlands.

"The gray squirrel, or 'cat squirrel,' is the more widely hunted animal," Chiburn said. "Hunters can look for them in moist stream and branch bottom lands and along sloughs supporting large stands of oak, hickory, and other seed and nutbearing hardwoods. They shouldn't neglect hill sections where mixed hardwoods and pines grow."

Veteran hunters say that hickory nuts are a top squirrel food item. They are cut in early fall while the nuts are green and stored for winter food. Acorns and magnolia seeds are also squirrel favorites, especially in south Mississippi where there are few hickories. Other favored foods include ash, cypress, beech,

blackgum, ironwood, dogwood, elm, hackberry, walnut and mulberry.

Hunters prefer a variety of gun and shell combinations for squirrel hunting. In early fall some like the sport of hunting with a .22 rifle. Although 20 and 16-gauge shotguns, and even .410's can all take squirrels, many prefer the security of a 12-gauge with No. 6 or 7 1/2 shot in big timber. Later in winter, it will help to have a good dog to find squirrels feeding on the ground.

Shooting hours on squirrels are one-half hour before sunrise until sunset. The daily bag limit is eight and possession limit is 16,

with no possession limit allowed on opening day.

State conservation officials stress that hunters must have shotguns plugged and incapable of holding more than three shells. Hunters must also have on their person while hunting a valid state hunting license.

October Power Lower

TVA's monthly fuel charge will go down in October by 94 cents per thousand kilowatt-hours, reflecting a dip in fuel and purchased power costs in last month's operations. The fuel charge applies to all electricity except the first 500 kilowatt-hours of monthly home use.

As an example of the trend in charges, the October bill for a home using 1,000 kilowatt-hours of electricity under the most typical local rate will be \$29.81, down from \$30.28 this month. Actual bills depend on the amount of electricity used, and on local rate schedules.

"While the fuel charge usually shows a downward trend in the fall, the cost of electricity is still up considerably from a year ago," A. O. Daniels, Director of Power Utilization, said today. "The average cost of coal burned in TVA

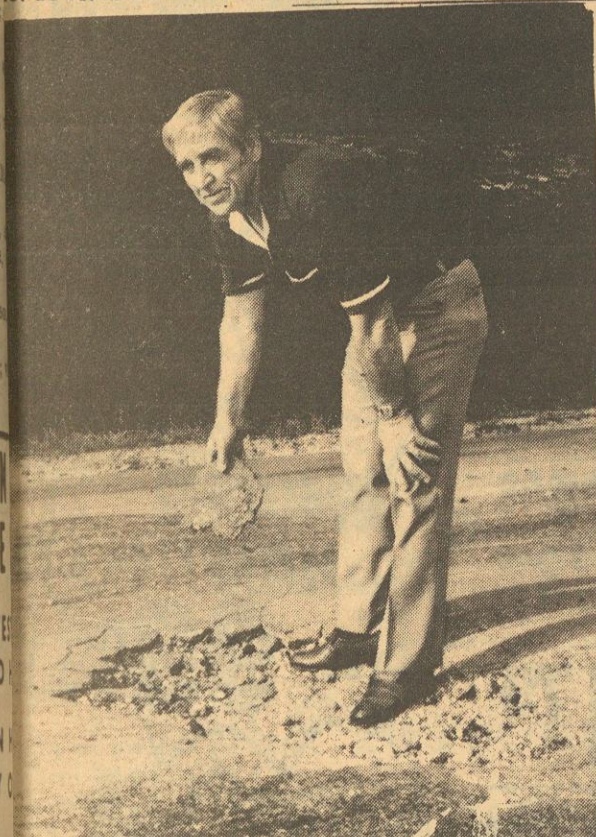

line. The Dolphins won the game 7-6.

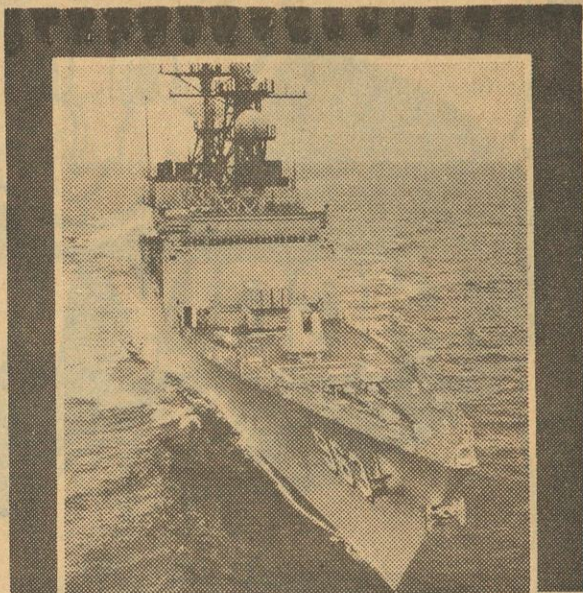
The Rams scored in the first quarter with Chuck Holley sweeping right end. The extra point came up short.

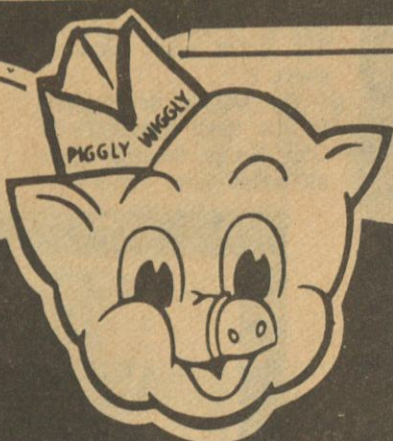

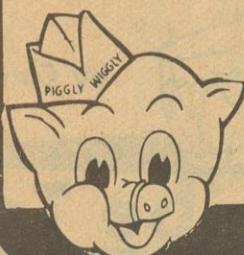
