COUNTY BRIDGE CLOSED TO TRAFFIC Supervisor Seeks Outside Funds To Maintain

A small rural road in Tishomingo County was the scene of a massive road block early Monday morning, September 18, in an attempt to crack down on overloaded vehicles traveling on the deteriorating farm to market route.

The stretch of black top, which connects Midway to the Alabama State Line, was closed to traffic weighing over 10 tons at 6:00 a.m. Monday, thus haulting the passage of loaded slag trucks from the Mississippi Stone Company, which is located in the Providence Community. Approximately 50,000 to 80,000 tons of rock are carried daily over the road to various counties

throughout Mississippi, the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway Project, and TVA's Yellow Creek Nuclear Project. This small stateaid road was neither built nor maintained to accomodate the heavy loads of traffic from the quarry, which has included 200 tractor-trailer trucks per

collapsing. Cracks were found in the concrete supports and 10 x 14 beams used as reinforcements were also found broken. The bridge, located on the county road off Hwy. 25, has been condemned to all traffic, including not only 18 wheelers, but also school buses and local traffic. "I'm responsible for this bridge if someone should get killed," Ryan said. He believes anyone who crosses the bridge is risking his life.

> He has arranged detours for bus routes and has asked other traffic to remain away from the bridge. The bridge, which is "wider than it is long," is part of the road which leads to Mississippi Stone Co., Inc., said Steve Howley, project engineer for the company's largest buyer,

Granite Construction Co., of Aberdeen. The decision to conderma the bridge virtually stops the quarry's operation, because trucks loaded with stone cannot get to the highway, he said. Since only a small amount of rock is stored away from the quarry, time is a factor in the problem,

Howley said. If the quarry is not able to use the road. Granite Construction and other buyers will purchase from an Alabama company, moving "\$3 million in revenue" across the border and cost-

ing 50 stone company work-

ers their jobs, Howley said.

Mr. Ryan states that he has "full sympathy" for the truck drivers, who are only trying to make a living. He feels it is time for both state and federal funds to be issued for the upkeep of the road, which is so vital to Mississippi's only hard rock quarry. Ryan said he spent \$50,000 on the road last year and it is now crumbling with pot-holes, some 6 to 12 inches deep. He stresses that to preserve this one road, he would have to spend all the funds alloted to him by the county for the upkeep of the 157 miles of road in his district. Estimates indicate the county needs between \$800,000 to \$1,000,000 to repair the bridge and road.

Both Howley and Ryan said the bridge and the road badly need financial help from the state government. Ryan said several attempts to reach Gov. Cliff Finch by telephone Monday were unsuccessful.

Ryan and Howley hope to get promises from state officials as soon as possible. Howley hoped the written assurance of coming aid would convince Ryan to replace the struts and to reopen the bridge. He indicated the company might seek an injunction to force Ryan to take this action.

Ryan said he might take some temporary measures to reopen the road, but he emphasized that replacing the struts would not be safe. Although this has caused inconveniences and may cause a great business loss to the quarry, Ryan said he thinks reopening the bridge

could cause a death. "We need some help bad,"



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


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A Tribute To Jack Timbes

Later in winter, it will help to have a good dog to find squirrels feeding on the across the state each year. ground.

Shooting hours on squirrels are one-half hour before sunrise until sunset. The daily bag limit is eight and possession limit is 16,

with no possession limit allowed on opening day.

State conservation officials stress that hunters must have shotguns plugged and incapable of holding more than three shells. Hunters must also have on their person while hunting a valid state hunting license.

October Power Lower

TVA's monthly fuel charge will go down in October by 94 cents per thousand kilowatthours, reflecting a dip in fuel and purchased power costs in last month's operations. The fuel charge applies to all electricity except the first 500 kilowatthours of monthly home use.

As an example of the trend in charges, the October bill under the most typical local rate will be \$29.81, down from \$30.28 this month. Actual bills depend on the amount of electricity used,

and on local rate schedules. "While the fuel charge usually shows a downward trend in the fall, the cost of electricity is still up considerably from a year ago," A. O. Daniels, Director of Power Utilization, said today. "The average cost of coal burned in TVA

power plants in August was \$27.41 a ton, a 28 percent increase over the cost a year earlier. And base rates for TVA power were increased 8 1/2 percent in July to cover continuing increases in other kinds of power supply costs."

Consumers with electric heat can take advantage of this fall months to prepare for the much higher electricity use and bills of winter, he said. "Under the new expansion of TVA's home conservation program, interest-free loans are now available through local power systems for such measures as storm windows

and weatherstripping, along with improving insulation in existing electrically heated

homes." All consumers can contact the local electric system to receive a free home survey of energy conservation opportunities under this program, he said.
