W. S. Brown Named To TTWBAC

C. B. (Buddie) Newman, Speaker of the House of Representatives, has appointed W. S. Brown, Jr., of Iuka, to fill the vacancy on the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway Bridge Advisory Committee caused by the resignation of George McLean, Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of the Northeast Mississippi Journal in Tupelo.

In appointing Brown, Speaker Newman stated, "As a citizen of Northeast Mississippi, knowledgeable of the economic benefits that will accrue to the State of Mississippi as a result of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway project, I am confident Mr. Brown will be effective in performing the duties as prescribed in Section 21 of House Bill 1475."

Members of this committee serve without compensation.

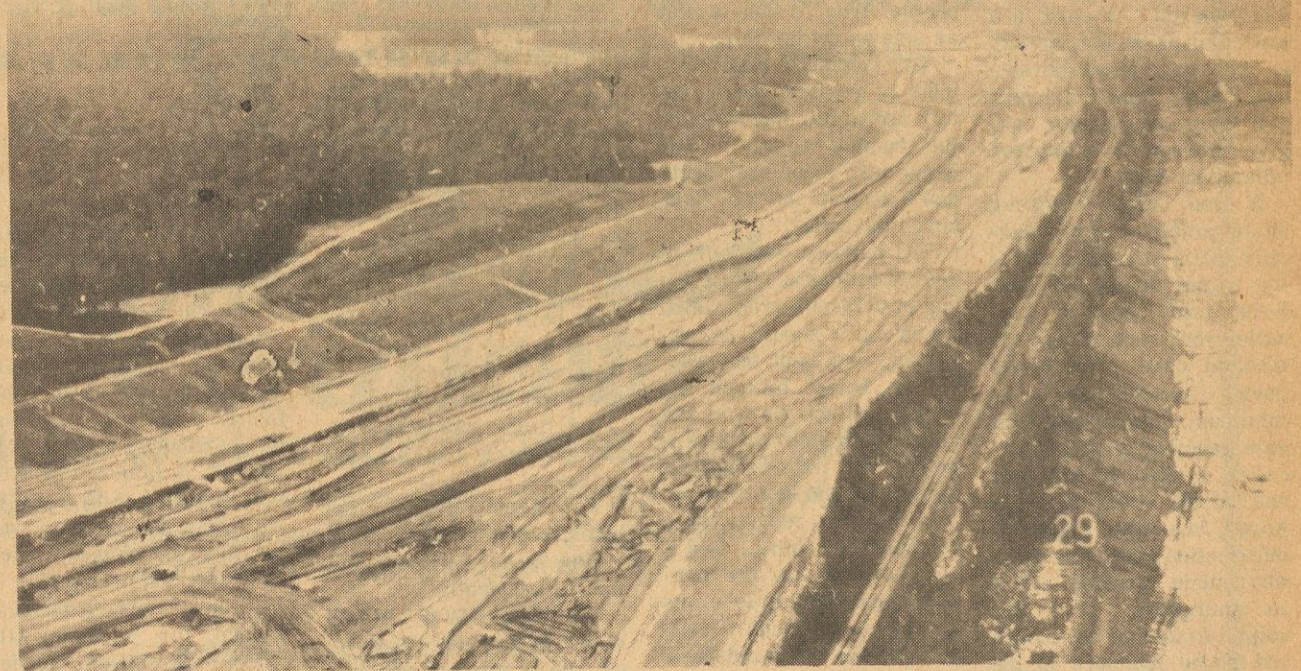
Members of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway Bridge Advisory Committee are Senators William G. Burgin, Dan Moore and Cecil Sumners, Representatives Bruce Williamson, Frank Lynn, and Jerry Wilburn. In addition to the legislative members, two private citizens are appointed: Mayor John Mercier (appointed by Lt. Governor Evelyn Gandey) and W. S. Brown, Jr., (appointed by Speaker C.B. (Buddie) Newman).

Inflation costs were the primary reason for the increased estimate.

CORPS TO AWARD 2 MAJOR CONTRACTS

The U. S. Army Corps of Engineers plans to award two major construction contracts early in 1979, in the Divide Section of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway, according to Col. Robert K. Tener, Nashville District engineer.

The contracts will be for major works located in

Tishomingo County, Miss. - one for excavation of approximately 11 miles of waterway channel between

Burnsville and Paden, Ms.; and the other for construction of the Bay Springs Lock and Dam complex.

The channel work, designated Divide Cut Sections 4 and 2A, will be for the balance of the waterway channel through the topographic divide separating the Tennessee and Tombigbee River basins. It will include about 93 million cubic yards of common excavation; 887,000 cubic yards

of stone slope protection; two major reinforced concrete drainage structures and numerous minor drainage structures. The excavated material will be disposed in pre-selected areas along the channel designed to minimize impacts on the environment. The work will include landscaping to harmonize the disposal areas with the surrounding area. Four other channel excavation contracts in the Divide are currently underway.

The Bay Springs contract will include construction of a navigation lock with an 84-foot lift and a lock chamber measuring 110 feet x 600 feet. It also includes a rockfill dam 120 feet in height. Construction of the

lock will involve approximately 1,500,000 cubic yards of rock excavation; 420,000 cubic yards of mass concrete; 3,000 tons of reinforcing steel; numerous rock bolts and prestressed anchors; lock miter gates and operating machinery.

Col. Tener estimates that the bidding documents for these two projects will be available in January 1979.

All of the Nashville District work on the waterway is on the northern-most segment, known as the Divide Section. Two other portions of the waterway, the Canal Section and the River Section are being constructed by the Mobile District.

Completion of the waterway is scheduled for 1986.

New Cost Estimates For Waterway

The Corps of Engineers has released new cost estimates for the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway based on 1978 price levels and other factors including design changes and modifications to some contracts.

The current estimated costs for completion of the waterway is \$1.67 billion, an increase of \$114 million over the 1977 estimate. These figures included \$1.54 billion in Federal funds and \$137 million in non-Federal funding needed to complete the project by 1986.

Inflation costs were the primary reason for the in-

creased estimate.

The estimates show the increase in Federal funding required as \$121 million but this was partially offset by a decrease in non-Federal funding of \$7 million.

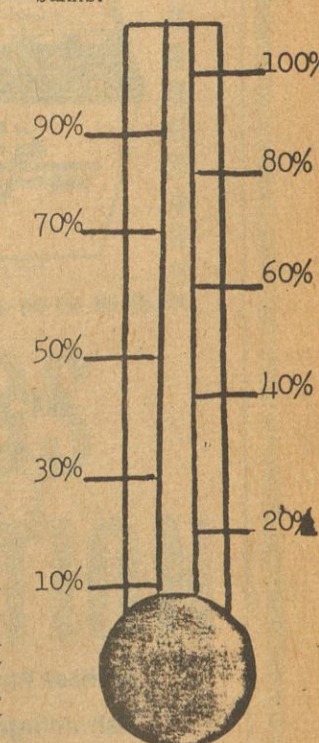

EMERGENCY MEDICAL ID

Who should carry emergency medical identification? Everyone, say medical experts! A card in a wallet or purse can identify an ill or injured person; help locate family, friends, and personal doctor; and give information to improve emergency care.

If you have a special health problem, wear a durable metal or plastic alerting signal device on your wrist, ankle, or neck, indicating your special need for medical care. The signal device should carry, as minimum information, the emergency medical identification symbol on one side and on the other, in a few words, the most important information needed by those who might provide aid in an emergency. It is also helpful to include the names and phone numbers of the nearest of kin, another relative or close friend or your personal doctor.

KEEP GUNS UNLOADED
AT HOME
Is it dangerous to have

guns in the home? The answer, obviously, depends on the people in the house. Guns aren't dangerous, but people are. A gun is just as safe as the handler.

The accident rate with guns is greatest during the fall and winter months during hunting season. But many of these accidents don't happen in the field, but in the house.

The number one point to reduce accidents is that any gun in the home be unloaded. Every gun should be unloaded, and kept that way, before being brought indoors. Keep the gun and ammunition stored separately, with the ammunition under lock and key.

Leave gun repairs to a competent gunsmith. And if you keep a gun for personal protection, it deserves special care. Such a weapon should be accessible only to the person expected to use it in an emergency. This person should have adequate training in gun handling and marksmanship. Everyone who handles guns should be taught the safe way to handle, care

for and store guns. Developing a healthy respect for guns will go a long way in developing safe habits.

MINUTE CANDIED
SWEET POTATOES
4 medium sweet potatoes,
cooked, canned or leftover
2 tablespoons melted butter
or margarine and a dash
of cinnamon
1/4 cup brown sugar, firmly
packed

Cut in half. Blend butter,
sugar and cinnamon. Spread
over potatoes. Bake in 350
degree oven until hot, or
broil 5 minutes. Serves
4-6.



Can you remember any
old-fashioned remedies?

When I was growing up,
homes or a household was a
miniature hospital. Mother
was a combination of doctor,
nurse, surgeon, anesthetist,
diagnostician and mid-wife.
First-aid was always a kiss
on the bruised part to make
the pain go away. Some of
the old-fashioned remedies
were born of experience and
were passed on from one
generation to another. Here
are a few I remember:

To break measles out:
Use hot tea - usually sas-
safras.

For hives: To break out
hives, use catnip tea.

For warts: Rub on Cas-
tor Oil frequently.

For Rheumatism: Wear a
string tied around the ankle,
or rub a mixture of coal-
oil, turpentine, and cam-
phor on the joints.

To whiten the teeth: Ea,
radishes.

To purify blood: Take
molasses and sulphur.

For the seven year itch:
Grease all over with sul-
phur and grease or hoglard.

For toothaches: Brown
baking soda, baked or dar-
kened in the oven and packed
around the tooth.

For boils: Draw to a
head by spreading on paste
made of soap and sugar.

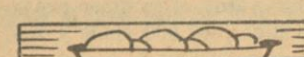
For insect stings and bites:
Apply tobacco juice to a
sting, even wet snuff was

For eye irritation: Apply
one drop of Castor Oil.

For corns: Rub on Cas-
tor Oil.

and apply a catnip poultice.

MANAGEMENT OF NEWLY PURCHASED FEEDER PIGS

All shipped feeder pigs
are subject to the stresses
of fatigue, hunger, thirst,
temperature changes, ration
changes, different sur-
roundings and social prob-
lems. Almost every group
has a shipping fever reac-
tion. Care of newly arrived
pigs must be directed to
relieving the stresses and
treating the shipping fever
correctly and promptly.

To give yourself the best
chance for success with
newly purchased feeder
pigs, put your emphasis on
these points:

1. A dry, draft-free,
well-bedded facility.
2. A specially formulat-
ed starter ration.
3. Adequate intake of
medicated water the first
week.
4. Prompt and correct
treatment of sick pigs.

ARRIVAL ON FARM:

Check the pigs carefully
on arrival at your farm, and
reject those which do not
appear as described by the
seller. In most instances,
suppliers provide no war-
ranty, expressed or implied,
for performance or health of
the pigs after they have been
accepted by the producer.

Facilities and equipment
to receive the pigs should be
prepared well in advance.
Feed should be mixed and
medication should be ready
for the water. Provide new-
ly purchased pigs with a
clean, dry, disinfected en-
vironment. Disinfectants
quickly neutralize when ap-
plied to dirty or manure-
covered floors. Apply cres-
cyllic acid, iodine or phenol-
derivative disinfectant to all

FLOOR SPACE:

Upon arrival, provide at
least 4 sq. ft. for 30-50
lb. pigs and 5 sq. ft. for
50-80 lb. pigs. Providing
additional space is benefi-
cial for heavier or stress-
ed animals.

WATER MEDICATION:

Water medication is a
must. It is often desirable
that newly purchased feeder
pigs have access to clean,
unmedicated water for 12-
24 hours after arrival; and
then begin medicating. Al-
low one waterer for each 25
pigs. A palatable product
containing the products of a
sulfa group and electrolytes,
or water-soluble antibiotics
and electrolytes, should be
supplied in a tank or by any
other means in which actual
water consumption can be
measured. A pig will nor-
mally consume approxi-
mately 2 times as much
water as feed. This is ap-
proximately 1/2 gallon per
day for a 40-lb. pig, de-
pending on weather condi-
tions. If the medicated wa-
ter consumption is below
this amount, the pigs are not
receiving the required med-
ication, and you should con-
sider changing to a more
palatable product, or add-
ing a flavor enhancer (Jello)
to make the medication
more palatable. This treat-

ment should be continued for
about 1 week. If mechani-
cal waterers such as nipple
waterers are used, be sure
the pigs know how to oper-
ate them.

FEEDER SPACE:

Provide at least 1 un-
covered feeder space for
each 4 pigs. Where there
are lids on feeders, the lids
should be tied open for the
first several days or until
such time as the pigs are
conditioned to raising the
lids.

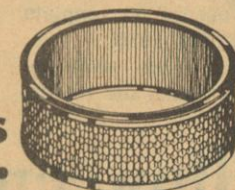

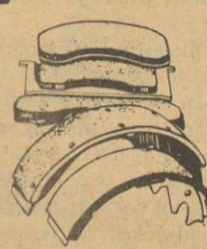

CCC INTEREST RATE LOWERED ON UPLAND COTTON LOANS;

Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland announced on October 3, a lower interest rate for all 1978 crop Upland Cotton Commodity Cre-

dit Corporation (CCC) loans from 7-3/4 to 7 percent to make the rate consistent with interest charged for other commodities. The 7-3/4 percent rate for Upland Cotton had been in effect since July 26.

The Action was taken following the signing by President Carter of the Amendment to Section 103 (F) (1) of the Agricultural Act of 1949 deleting the provision that the interest rate on cotton loans be established quarterly by CCC on the basis of the lowest current interest rate on ordinary obligations of the United States. The Amend-

ment permits CCC to charge the same interest rate on all commodity loans.

The CCC loan interest rate for all 1978 crop commodities other than Upland Cotton was increased from 6 to 7 percent on June 13.

The changes, which Benson calls "Energy Saving Homes" are meant to hold down the monthly cash outlay of a homeowner for utilities and help in the national effort to conserve natural resources.

sumers who heat their homes with electricity or are converting to electric heat are eligible for interest-free loans for storm windows, floor insulation, weatherstripping, caulking, and insulated doors, as well as the previously offered attic insulation. Homes having electric air-conditioning but not electric heat qualify for the same items, with the exception of storm windows and floor insulation. Consumers who have already received no-interest

loans for attic insulation are also eligible for other items in this program. Manager of Power Nat Hughes said typical annual savings on electric bills from all these weatherizing measures are estimated to be about \$265 for electrically heated and cooled homes. (This amount would vary, depending on the size of home and amount of electricity used.) This would also mean an annual reduction of about 8,900 kilowatt-hours in home energy used. If a certified heat

pump is installed, typical additional savings of 4,270 kilowatt-hours -- amounting to \$125 each year would be realized. TVA's cost for the program will be offset by the resulting savings in generating capacity needed to meet future peak power demands. For each electrically heated home fully weatherized under the program, the TVA power system will benefit by a reduction of 3.5 kilowatts in its peak load requirements. For each 1,000 homes taking advantage of this program, the annual energy savings will be equal to about 4,000 tons of coal, and the savings in power plant investment will be at least a million dollars.

The present home insulation makes available free home energy surveys to all consumers, to find out opportunities each home offers to cut energy waste. Over 66,000 surveys have been made since the program began last August. These surveys would continue to be available upon request to the local electric system.

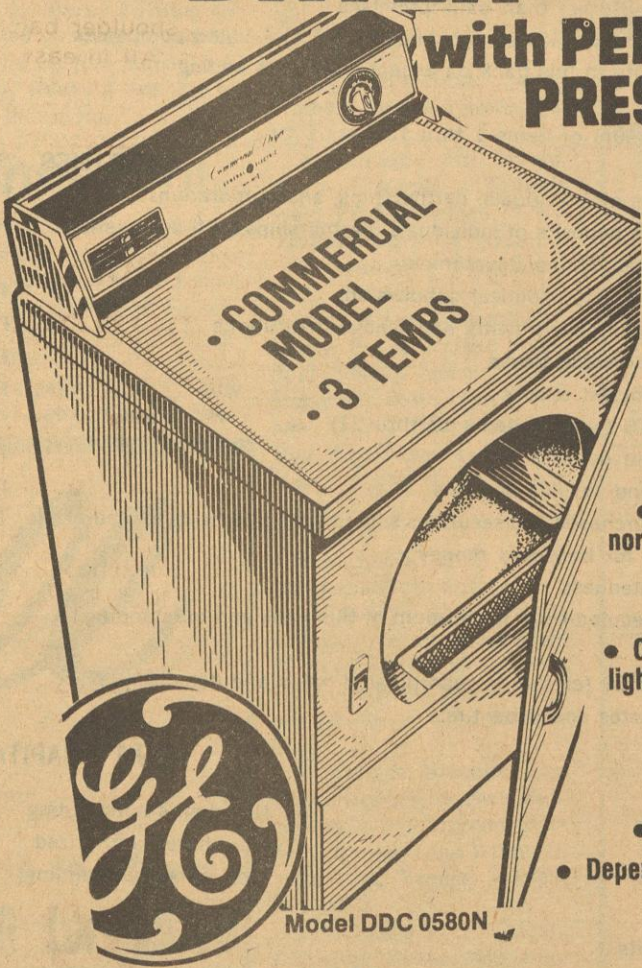

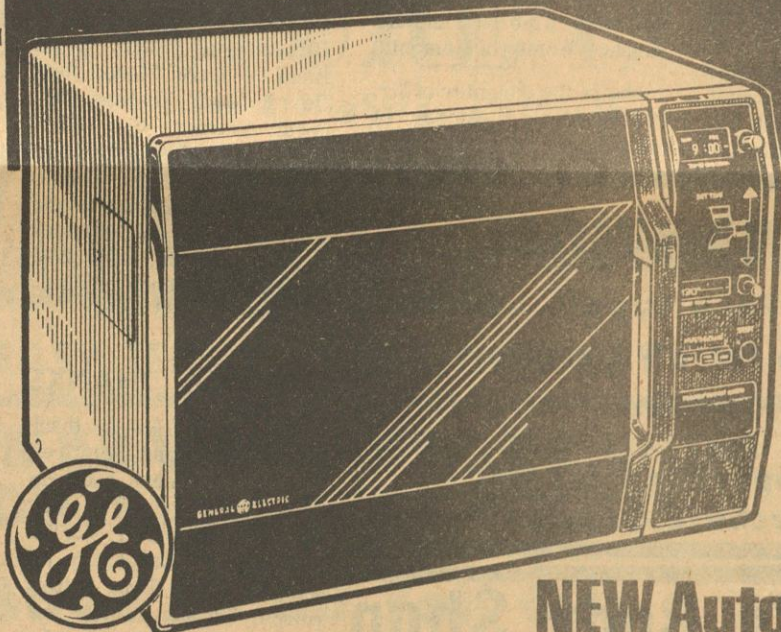

Freeman Approves Expansion Of Energy Conservation Programs

Expansion of two TVA home energy conservation programs was approved Friday by Chairman David Freeman. For the past year, interest-free TVA loans for home attic insulation have been available through local power distributors. Over 20,000 Tennessee Valley homes have been insulated using these loans. In the expanded program, interest-free financing up to \$2,000 will be available for other energy-conserving measures. In addition, homeowners can receive low-interest loans for installa-

tion of energy-conserving heat pumps, provided the home is completely weatherized.

"If consumers take full advantage of this expanded program, it's the equivalent of building a 1,000-megawatt power plant within the next eight years," Chairman Freeman said. "Energy conservation is the cheapest way we have to hold down electric rates and reduce the need for more generating capacity."

Specific arrangements will vary according to the heating/cooling requirements of the home. Con-

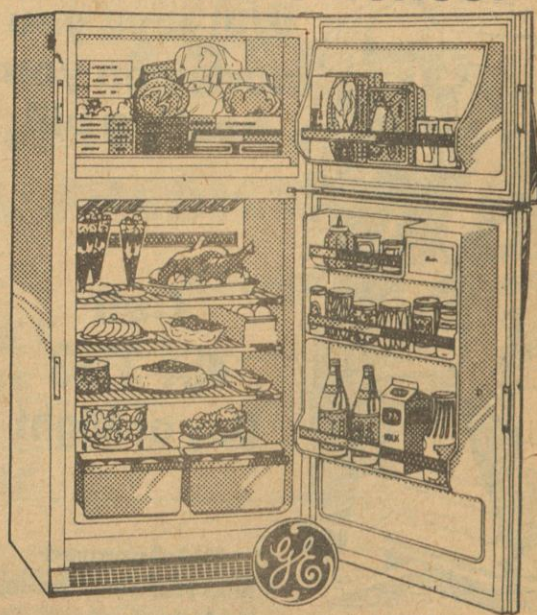

Youth Training Program

Iuka Municipal Separate Schools is participating in the Youth Employment Training Program again this year. The YETP is designed to provide jobs and career opportunities to youths who are drop-outs and are unemployed or underemployed, or youths in school that are economically disadvantaged. The Iuka School System is participating in this program because it feels that there are many drop-outs and youths in this county that we can help. Dr. Jerry C. Stone, Superintendent of Iuka Schools, is the director of the program. The YETP is designed to provide youths with skills that are needed in each student's career area and to provide occupational information and career exploration activities. Governor Cliff Finch of the State of Mississippi, and his staff headed by Dr. Jamie Howell have been working with the Iuka Schools because Gov.

Finch feels that employment of youths is a high priority in Northeast Mississippi, and that educational opportunities will aid in determining the fate of these young people.

Every individual participating in the program must meet the following criteria at the time of application and enrollment: (1) be unemployed or underemployed, or in school, (2) 16 through 21 years of age, and (3) a member of a family with a total family income at or below 85% of the lower living standard.

Also working with Stone in the Program are L. Jay McKinney as the assistant director, Mrs. Jill Jourdan as the career counselor, Lennie Bevin as career aide, and Mrs. Regina Bonds as secretary.

There have been many improvements made at our school this summer. One of the major improvements has been to Howard Auditorium. Central heat and air conditioning has been installed, walls repaired and painted, curtains for the windows, carpeting down the aisles, stage floor refinished and flood lights installed, and seats repaired, as well as could be done so. While this work was going on this summer, Dr. Stone found the Grand piano that once used to add so much to that stage, back in a corner amid a lot of junk and other debris. He got it out and cleaned it off and now it is once again on stage in Howard Auditorium. But it will take \$1200 to have the piano repaired and refinished so it can be used again. Dr. Stone says if the piano is repaired he will see there is a case made for it and it will be locked when not in use. We need this piano so very much and the school does not have the money to have this work done. I believe there are enough of us who want to continue to see our school improved, and I believe we will give the money to have this piano put back in first class conditions.

Some of you remember how fortunate the school was in having a Grand piano. Some very dedicated teachers, pupils and friends raised the money for it. Mrs. Darrell (Payne) Jourdan, who taught school at Iuka 25 years, was the one who worked so hard to raise the money for the piano. I talked with Mrs. Jourdan last week, and she still loves Iuka School so much and all of her former students are

still dear to her. Hanging in Howard Auditorium is a glass enclosed case with all the names of the students who served in the Armed Services during World War II listed. Some of the names have a star by them - these are the ones that did not come home. This was another project of Mrs. Jourdan's.

I also talked with Mrs. Cecelia Fulkerson about the piano. She began giving piano lessons at Iuka School in 1932. She had 45 students. Today, at 92 years of age, Mrs. Fulkerson is still giving piano lessons

and has 13 students. She was the first one to play the Grand piano at commencement exercises. For a number of years she used Howard Auditorium for her student recitals. This could be done again if the piano is repaired.

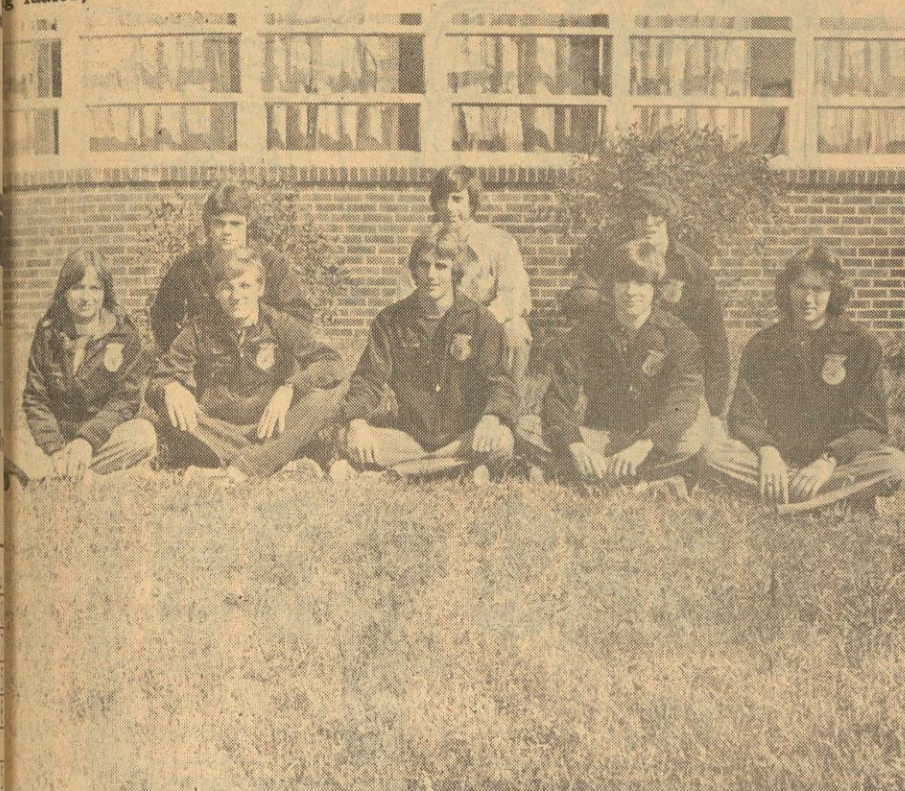

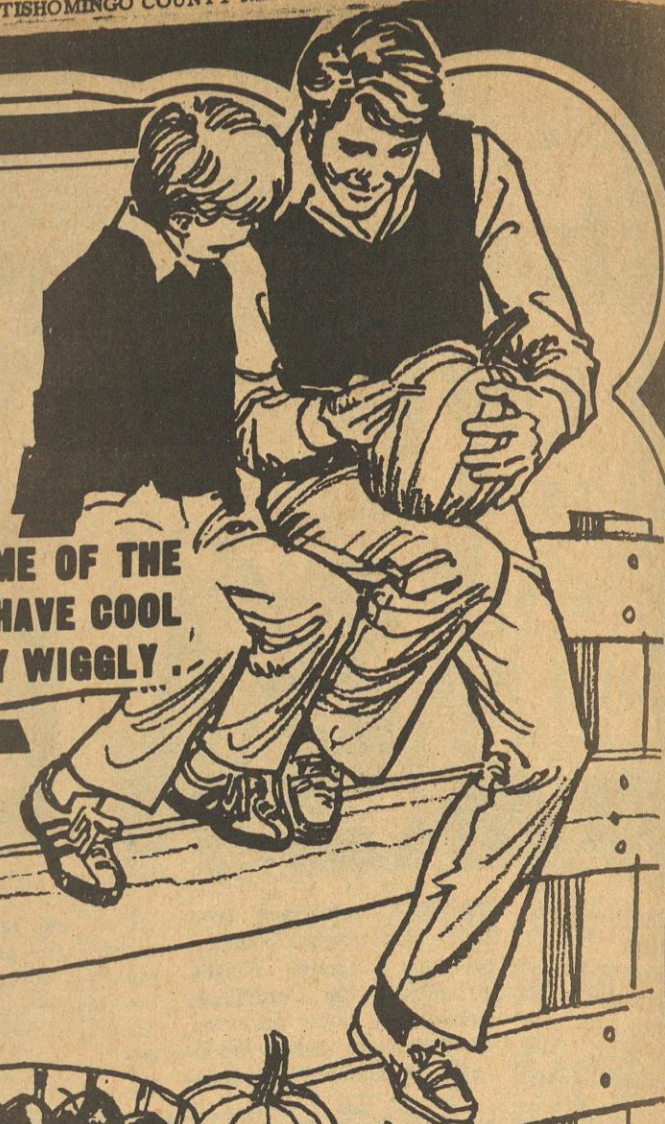

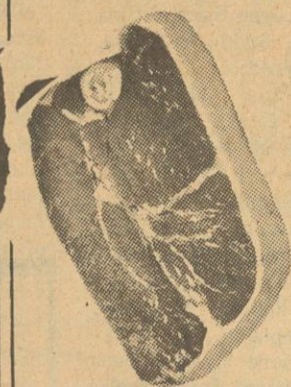
