Citizens **File Two** Petitions

Two petitions were presented to the luka Mayor and Board of Aldermen at the regular monthly meeting held Wednesday night, November 8, concerning the City Planning Committee and the Mobile Home Ordinance now in effect.

According to Richard Woodruff, instigator of the petitions, the basic goals of the two proposals is to do away with the City Planning Committee and drop the regulations now controlling the placing of mobile homes and mobile home parks in the city. He said some 25 concerned citizens suggested the changes and helped formulate the petitions.

Approximately 556 citizens signed the mobile home appeal, which states that the ordinance, which was passed on September 23, 1976, is detrimental (damaging) to the City of Iuka and has proved to be an unjust ordinance and al-

The city lawmakers were also petitioned by 465 citizens to rescind the City Planning Committee that regulates the establishment of mobile home parks and enforces the city ordinances regarding city zoning and mobile home parks. They feel that since the commissioners or directors of the City Planning Committee are appointed and not elected by the voters of Iuka, they should not enforce or regulate these most important matters for the citizens. They also requested that the Mayor and Board of Aldermen assume the duties and powers of the

Each unit will generate about 1,400,000 kilowatts of electric power. The project is scheduled to be completed in 1986. TVA is the architect, engineer, and prime contractor for this project.

Others thought the proposal would increase utility rates, injure a recreational wilderness and become a financial burden to the state. Hendrix said the agency will not continue with the proposal unless it finds a need for the Fingers village. Job applications filed for the construction project currently indicate enough individuals living near the project would be available to fill unskilled, semiskilled and trainee positions, he said. FOR HOLIDAY MEALS Turkeys are good yearround but most people wait for the holiday season to buy and serve the all-American bird.

In their wild state, turkeys were an important year-round food source for the American Indian long before the Pilgrims found these shores. The turkeys that graced the first Thanksgiving board in 1621 were distined to elevate the bird as the great symbol of American gratitude for the blessings of a plentiful harvest. And so it remains today, over three and a half centuries later.

Today turkeys are available as fresh chilled, frozen and partially or fully prepared. The whole bird, in a variety of sizes, is still the most usual way to buy turkey, but boneless turkey rolls and turkey parts are increasing in popularity.



DO SOMETHING about the isn't likely to erode, plow or turn the soil to cover crop residues so they can deteriorate by spring.

Check all supplies of fertilizers and pesticides. Properly dispose of containers with missing labels. Check your County Extension Office if in doubt of what to do. Store all dusts and wettable powders in a cool, dry place. Reseal opened bags of fertilizer to prevent absorbing moisture and caking.

Get a soil test to determine fertilizer and lime needs for the garden. Put the lime down now so it will have a chance to act. Prepare a few rows for that extra early planting in

the new year. Get a copy of the new seed catalog for fine reading and dreaming about the new garden you will plant. Some stores are putting up their new seed displays; check them to be sure of getting what you want.

Plant New strawberry patches by early November. Set the plants 1 foot apart on 3 to 3 1/2 foot beds. For North Mississippi, plant Sunrise, Cardinal, Comet, Dixieland, Pocahontas, and Blakemore varieties.



TION PROGRAM:

Proposed procedures and practices for the 1979 Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP) will be published in the Federal Register about November 14, after which the public will have

30 days in which to submit comments on the proposals, according to Ray Fitzgerald, Administrator of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

This is two weeks later than the earlier announced tentative date of November 1, for publishing the proposals in the Federal Register. Because of the later publishing date, the comment period is changed from 60 to 30 days in order for the new program to be ready for operation by January 1, Fitzgerald said. The Agriculture, Rural Development, and Related

Agencies Appropriations Act for fiscal year 1979 provides that ACP assistance will not be used for carrying out measures and practices that are primarily production oriented or that have little or no conservation or pollution abatement

benefits. Fitzgerald said implementation of these pro-

visions of the act will be achieved through the establishment of: criteria for determining the practices eligible for ACP assistance: guidelines for directing assistance toward situations in which practices can be expected to yield significant public soil or water conservation, or pollution abatement benefits; and, procedures to facilitate approval of solutions to local soil conservation, water conservation, or pollution abatement problems not addressed by practices thought to meet the national criteria.

Written comments may be delivered by mail or in person to Alan Durick, Acting Director, Conservation and Environmental Protection Division, Room 3096, South Building, ASCS-USDA, Washington, D.C. 20013.

Fitzgerald said final details on the 1979 ACP will be announced about Dec. 26, and these guidelines, procedures and practices will become effective January 1.





Grants Farmers Home Administration in Mississippi hit an all-time high this last fiscal year in loan making and grants, according to Mark Hazard, State Director. Over \$564 million in loans and grants - benefitting Mississippians in all 82 counrace cars, and helping in ties - were approved. Hazard, appointed as State Di-He plans to attend Northrector by President Carter, said he was especially proud

ment during his first year with the organization. This record year compares to over \$300 million lastfiscal year.

Farmers all over the state whose crops suffered from adverse weather conditions were assisted with disaster loans, and other financial assistance was given farmers for real estate and production loans. Over \$376 million went into the farm economy of the state and a total of 10,666 loans were made to farmers.

More than \$113 million went into building badly needed houses for middle and low income families. As a result of this program, many families are now living in decent, comfortable houses instead of the inademinte shelter they were occupying.

Community services loans and grants amounted to over \$35 million. More Mississippi communities

now have water and waste disposal systems. Many of these rural communities were having to cope with inadequate water and waste facilities, but are now enjoying the luxury of good, fresh water and good waste disposal systems.

Business and industry loans made this fiscal year far exceeded other years, putting \$37 million into our economy. As a result, approximately 2700 jobs were saved and 1600 new, additional jobs were created. 1979 is expected to be even better than this.

Hazard stated that all this had been accomplished without detriment to the servicing program. He praised the FmHA county personnel for their excellent job of carrying out balanced loan making and loan servicing programs.

Hazard further stated that Hazard further stated that President Carter's Agricul-tural Credit Act of 1978 would enable FmHA to as-sist more Mississippians. This new law contains im-provements in the farm, community, and businessindustrial credit programs available through this agency. Implementation of this law should result in increased use of private resources to meet the credit requirements of farming and rural development, and a more effective concentration of direct federal assistance upon areas of need that can be served in no other way.

Major elements of the TVA demonstration program announced by Freeman include:

Supplying each of the Valley states a van equipped to provide health checkups and health education information. "Taking preventative health care and basic health education opportuni-

. Utilizing senior citizens in the joint TVA-power distributor program to provide free energy audits of the homes of Valley electric power users.

TVA would hire senior citizons to arrange schedules for audits, answer questions from the public, handle all clerical work, and perform other duties associated with the pro-"This program gram. would provide employment for some o "our senior citizens and at the same time free TVA and distributor personnel to get out into the field and reduce the present backlog of requests for energy audits," Freeman said.

. Consideration of the elderly in TVA's program of reviewing rate structures, delivery of electric service, and other aspects of the electric power program.

. Substantially increasing an existing program to help low-income citizens, many of whom are also elderly, grow vegetable gardens to reduce grocery expenses, improve nutrition, and in many instances produce a cash crop. TVA's Division of Agricultural Development provides participants technical advice, seed, fertilizer, and other help in growing their produce.

. Initiating a small-scale, one - year demonstration program designed to show how elderly citizens who own large, older homes could supplement their incomes by converting unused space into rental apartments. Under this proposal, 10 homes would be selected for renovation with TVA assuming responsibility for 3/4 of the cost. If the demonstration proved successful, TVA would encourage the state aging offices to seek out financial institutions and other sources of funding to establish a low - or nointerest loan program so that this activity could be expanded throughout the region.





AA Area Assembly

Early in 1945, Alcoholics Anonymous came to Mississippi when three members who had found sobriety in the fellowship in Washington, D. C. moved to Jackson

and started a group there. A few months later, a few members from around the Delta formed a group in

Greenwood. Today, the state has approximately 100 groups located in almost every county, and an alcoholic seeking help with his or herdrinking problem may find it not far away.

Anonymity is the very foundation of this looselyknit organization and is responsible for much of its growth. No member ever reveals the name of another to anyone outside of A.A. Many movements were

started to try to help the alcoholic long before the

beginning of A.A., but none of them ever showed better than a 2% recovery among victims of this widely prevalent illness. Yet from its inception, Alcoholics Anonymous reported that approximately half of its members never drank again, and another 25% eventually attained and maintained sob-

riety. There are no dues for A.A. membership. The only requirement for membership is a desire to stay sober. Through the fellowship's twelve steps of a suggested program of recovery, more than a million
