### Citizens File Two Petitions

Two petitions were pre-  
sented to the Iuka Mayor  
and Board of Aldermen at  
the regular monthly meet-  
ing held Wednesday night,  
November 8, concerning the  
City Planning Committee  
and the Mobile Home Ordi-  
nance now in effect.

According to Richard  
Woodruff, instigator of the  
petitions, the basic goals of  
the two proposals is to do  
away with the City Plan-  
ning Committee and drop the  
regulations now controlling  
the placing of mobile homes  
and mobile home parks in  
the city. He said some 25  
concerned citizens suggest-  
ed the changes and helped  
formulate the petitions.

Approximately 556 citi-  
zens signed the mobile home  
appeal, which states that  
the ordinance, which was  
passed on September 23,  
1976, is detrimental  
(damaging) to the City of  
Iuka and has proved to be  
an unjust ordinance and al-  
lows too much discretion on  
the part of those who apply  
it.

The city lawmakers were  
also petitioned by 465 citi-  
zens to rescind the City  
Planning Committee that re-  
gulates the establishment of  
mobile home parks and en-  
forces the city ordinances  
regarding city zoning and  
mobile home parks. They  
feel that since the commis-  
sioners or directors of the  
City Planning Committee  
are appointed and not elect-  
ed by the voters of Iuka,  
they should not enforce or  
regulate these most impor-  
tant matters for the citi-  
zens. They also request-  
ed that the Mayor and Board  
of Aldermen assume the  
duties and powers of the  
City Planning Committee  
and rescind the committee  
and all of its activities.

Woodruff said that the only  
thing that transpired from  
his meeting and presenta-  
tion of the petitions to the  
board was that the city would  
consult their attorney. He  
said it could possibly be  
brought to a vote by the  
citizens of Iuka; however,  
Woodruff said Mayor Cut-  
shall stated that 50% of the  
people who signed the pe-  
tition did not know what they  
were signing.

### TVA To Hold Open House At Yellow Creek Nuclear Plant Site Sunday

The public is cordially  
invited to an open house at  
TVA's Yellow Creek Nu-  
clear Plant on Sunday, Nov.  
19, 1978. The site will be  
open from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m.  
for interested people to tour  
the project and see the pro-  
gress made to date.

The site is located ap-  
proximately nine miles  
north of Iuka on the Iuka-

Red Sulphur Springs Road  
near J. P. Coleman State  
Park. Signs mark the way  
to the project from Missis-  
sippi State Highway 25. On-  
site visitors will be direct-  
ed to a reception area where  
TVA personnel will be  
available to answer ques-  
tions. Literature on the  
project and a model of the  
plant will also be available

at this area. From this  
area the public may tour  
the site in their automo-  
biles. A map of the pro-  
ject showing the tour route  
and identifying points of in-  
terest will be handed out at  
the reception area. The  
route will also be marked.  
Work at the project began  
in February of this year  
under a Limited Work Au-  
thorization. The project is

currently approximately 4  
percent complete. When  
completed the project will  
consist of two Combustion  
Engineering pressurized  
water reactor units. Each  
unit will generate about  
1,400,000 kilowatts of elec-  
tric power. The project is  
scheduled to be completed  
in 1986. TVA is the archi-  
tect, engineer, and prime  
contractor for this project.

### \$1 Million Dollar Law Suit Filed In Tishomingo County Circuit Court

A Tishomingo County  
couple has filed suit in  
Tishomingo County Circuit  
Court charging a local con-  
struction company with

"negligence" and are ask-  
ing \$1 million in damages.  
Raymond and Jackie  
Casabella, parents of 19-  
year-old Sherri Lynn Casa-

bella, who died on July 17,  
1978, following an accident  
on J. P. Coleman State Park  
Road, have filed the suit  
against Bonds Construction

Company, claiming that the  
alleged negligence of the  
company, which was resur-  
facing the road at the time  
of the accident, caused the  
woman's death.

They claim the company  
placed "a slick or slippery  
substance," described as a  
mixture of oil and grease,  
on the road two miles ahead  
of the site where the com-  
pany employees were work-  
ing at the time of the ac-  
cident.

The lawsuit says the  
slick substance was placed  
on the westbound lane "to  
to and partly around" a  
blind curve 4.7 miles east  
of an intersection with Mis-  
sissippi 25, without placing  
any warning signs or sta-  
tioning a flagman at the  
curve.

It says Miss Casabella,  
driving a car that was in  
good condition and travel-  
ing in the proper lane and  
in a "legal" and "careful  
manner," came upon the  
substance without warning  
as she drove around the  
curve.

It said she immediately  
lost control of the car and  
collided with a tractor-  
trailer truck traveling on  
the other side of the road.  
Miss Casabella was in  
"excruciating pain" with in-  
juries to her legs, arms,  
chest and head as well as  
internal injuries, it said.  
She died 75 minutes later.

The lawsuit states the  
road is heavily traveled  
with traffic from nearby  
homes, minor construction  
sites and the construction  
of Yellow Creek Nuclear  
Power Plant.

It said the company  
should have foreseen the  
problem and placed a warn-  
ing sign or a flagman  
at the curve. The com-  
pany's "negligence and  
carelessness... were the  
sole cause" of Miss Casa-  
bella's death, it says.

### Decision Delayed On TVA Power Plant Village

TVA has adopted a wait-  
and-see attitude toward its  
proposal to construct a  
small village near Yellow  
Creek Nuclear Power Plant  
to house employees and to  
serve as a training center,  
the agency's Yellow Creek  
projects coordinator said.

Projects coordinator John  
Hendrix said TVA has plac-  
ed the proposal "on the back  
burner" while it waits to  
see if training and housing  
needs for nuclear plant con-  
struction employees will be  
met without the village.

The agency's proposal,  
called the Northeastern  
Mississippi Demonstration  
Project, would involve con-  
struction of a small village,  
accommodating 300 to 400  
individuals, at a site, com-  
monly called the Fingers  
area, 1.7 miles from the  
Tishomingo County Nuclear  
Plant.

Under the proposal, plant  
workers, especially those  
in minority groups, would  
live at the village, partici-  
pating in training pro-  
grams after work. Other  
TVA employees also would  
live in the village, which  
would have 100 mobile  
homes, 50 motel-type ro-  
oms and 25 cabins.

TVA also would use the  
240-acre Fingers village  
and a nearby 60-acre island  
to study integration of a  
variety of energy systems,  
including solar and wood-  
burning.

Many Tishomingo County  
residents have objected to  
the proposal, often saying  
the project would bring in  
non-county residents for  
training and jobs at the ex-  
pense of young county men.

Others thought the pro-  
posal would increase utility  
rates, injure a recreational  
wilderness and become a  
financial burden to the state.  
Hendrix said the agency  
will not continue with the  
proposal unless it finds a  
need for the Fingers village.

Job applications filed for  
the construction project  
currently indicate enough  
individuals living near the  
project would be available  
to fill unskilled, semi-  
skilled and trainee posi-  
tions, he said. In that case,  
TVA would not need a  
center to house its  
trainees, he said.

TVA does not know if  
enough trained area re-  
sidents are available to fill  
the skilled jobs, he said.  
If a number of skilled  
workers must move into  
the area, the agency may  
have trouble finding hous-  
ing for them.

Hendrix said TVA is  
monitoring the availability

of housing in the area  
around the plant.

If the area does not have  
a sufficient development in  
housing, the agency "may  
have to do something," he  
said, adding that the  
village might be a possible  
solution.

However, the village  
would be a "very expen-  
sive" solution, Hendrix  
said. Estimates indicate  
the construction would cost  
\$10 million. TVA might  
seek a "more economic"  
way to handle any housing  
or training facility needs,  
he said.

Currently 80 percent of  
the 1,700 employees work-  
ing on the construction  
commute to their jobs from

homes near the site, often  
using the site's mass trans-  
it system to reduce traffic  
problems.

Sixty percent live in  
Alcorn and Tishomingo  
counties in Mississippi,  
Colbert and Lauderdale  
counties in Alabama or  
McNairy and Hardin coun-  
ties in Tennessee.

Fifteen percent of the  
employees are members of  
minority groups.

Workers at the site are  
building support facilities,  
beginning pipe and iron  
work at the turbine  
building and finishing site  
preparation work in expec-  
tation of a full construction  
permit from the Nuclear  
Regulatory Commission.

### Adult Basic Education Courses At Iuka Schools

Adult Basic Education

courses for anyone above the  
age of 16 who does not have  
a high school diploma will  
begin on Thursday, Nov. 16,  
at Iuka High School and on  
Monday, Nov. 20, at Iuka  
Elementary School.

The classes are design-  
ed to prepare adults to take  
the GED test, which is ac-  
cepted as a high school di-  
ploma. Last year, approxi-  
mately 25 adults in the Iuka  
vicinity earned their high  
school diploma through this  
program.

Materials are furnished  
free of charge and there is

no registration fee.

The Tuesday and Thurs-  
day night classes will meet  
at the high school in Room  
5 from 6:00 to 9:00. Mr.  
David Bagley and Mrs.  
Becky Bowen will serve as  
instructors.

The Monday and Wednes-  
day night classes will meet  
in the Elementary School  
Library from 6:00 to 9:00.  
Mrs. Jeannine Stone and  
Miss Jean Akin will serve  
as instructors.

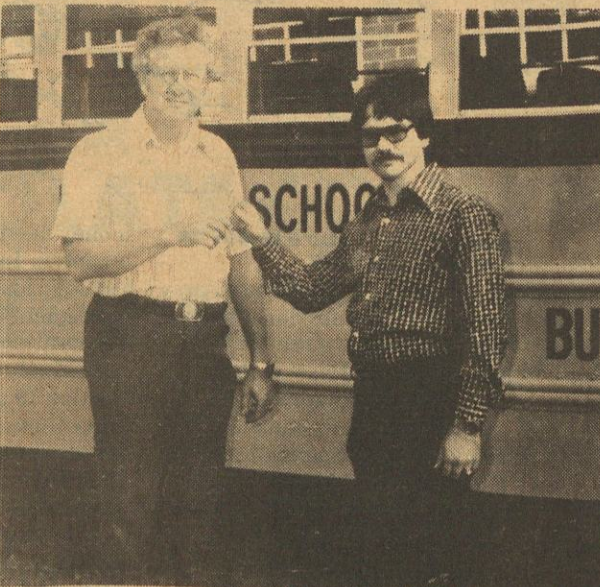
### County Basketball Season In Full Swing

#### TURKEYS

##### FOR HOLIDAY MEALS

Turkeys are good year-round but most people wait for the holiday season to buy and serve the all-American bird.

In their wild state, turkeys were an important year-round food source for the American Indian long before the Pilgrims found these shores. The turkeys that graced the first Thanksgiving board in 1621 were destined to elevate the bird as the great symbol of American gratitude for the blessings of a plentiful harvest. And so it remains today, over three and a half centuries later.

Today turkeys are available as fresh chilled, frozen and partially or fully prepared. The whole bird, in a variety of sizes, is still the most usual way to buy turkey, but boneless turkey rolls and turkey parts are increasing in popularity.

Very few markets handle

fresh turkeys, since freezing makes it possible to maintain quality over long periods of time. The freezing process has made turkeys a year-round meat in convenient forms.

Anytime you can use a large amount of turkey, your best buy is the large bird. For small families who can't use that much it's best to buy a smaller turkey or turkey parts.

Generally you can expect about two servings of three ounces of edible meat per pound of ready-to-cook turkey. Boneless turkey roasts or rolls will yield three or more servings per pound and have no bone loss, but the uncooked ones shrink in cooking. They are convenient to use, but usually are more expensive than whole turkeys. Some people feel that the presence of the bone during cooking of whole turkeys improves flavor.

There are two symbols on turkey labels that you should

look for. The circular-shaped USDA inspection label is your assurance of wholesomeness. It means the turkey was a healthy bird and that it was processed under sanitary conditions. The inspection label has nothing to do with quality.

Quality is shown by the shield-shaped grade label. Quality is judged in terms of tenderness, meatiness, flavor and freedom from defects. The top grade is USDA Grade A. Grade A turkeys have well developed, moderately broad breasts that are well fleshed throughout their length. Thighs and backs are well covered with flesh. Top quality turkeys have breasts, bodies, hips and pin bones well covered with fat -- except for fryers and young toms, which may have only a moderate amount of fat in these areas.

Grade B and Grade C turkeys are acceptable but Grade A is the best. Grade B and C is not usually shown on labels. Instead, these birds are sold as "USDA Inspected" turkeys with no grade label.

#### GARDENS

Major gardening activities for the year are over and harvests from the winter garden are small and limited in variety. November and December mark the shift from fresh garden vegetables to those canned and

frozen when the garden was really producing. Not only are they great tasting, but they conjure up memories of the fun and the hard work it took to grow them.

Check all stored vegetables such as acorn and butternut squash, sweet potatoes, and Irish potatoes. Remember squash and Irish potatoes require cool storage, but sweet potatoes won't take temperatures below 55 degrees.

Dig fall Irish potatoes before the soil gets extremely wet. A light frost will kill the vines but will not hurt the potatoes. Do not leave the potatoes in the ground after the tops have been killed.

Clean up garden tools, remove soil and rust, and protect with a light coat of oil. If you haven't stored the garden hose, wait for a sunny day and lay the hose out to warm so it is flexible. Drain it and roll it up. Change the oil in your garden tiller and drain or run the fuel out of the tank and carburetor.

Clean up the garden site. Place all dead plants in the compost pile or discard if infected with disease or infested with insects. Take down tomato stakes and bean poles. Store those sound enough for another year's use.

Where the garden soil

isn't likely to erode, plow or turn the soil to cover crop residues so they can deteriorate by spring.

Check all supplies of fertilizers and pesticides. Properly dispose of containers with missing labels. Check your County Extension Office if in doubt of what to do. Store all dusts and wettable powders in a cool, dry place. Reseal opened bags of fertilizer to prevent absorbing moisture and caking.

Get a soil test to determine fertilizer and lime needs for the garden. Put the lime down now so it will have a chance to act.

Prepare a few rows for that extra early planting in the new year.

Get a copy of the new seed catalog for fine reading and dreaming about the new garden you will plant. Some stores are putting up their new seed displays; check them to be sure of getting what you want.

Plant few strawberry patches by early November. Set the plants 1 foot apart on 3 to 3 1/2 foot beds. For North Mississippi, plant Sunrise, Cardinal, Comet, Dixieland, Pocahontas, and Blakemore varieties.

COMMENT PERIOD CHANGED FOR 1979 AGRICULTURAL CONSERVA-

### TION PROGRAM:

Proposed procedures and practices for the 1979 Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP) will be published in the Federal Register about November 14, after which the public will have 30 days in which to submit comments on the proposals, according to Ray Fitzgerald, Administrator of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

This is two weeks later than the earlier announced tentative date of November 1, for publishing the proposals in the Federal Register. Because of the later publishing date, the comment period is changed from 60 to 30 days in order for the new program to be ready for operation by January 1, Fitzgerald said.

The Agriculture, Rural Development, and Related Agencies Appropriations Act for fiscal year 1979 provides that ACP assistance will not be used for carrying out measures and practices that are primarily production oriented or that have little or no conservation or pollution abatement benefits.

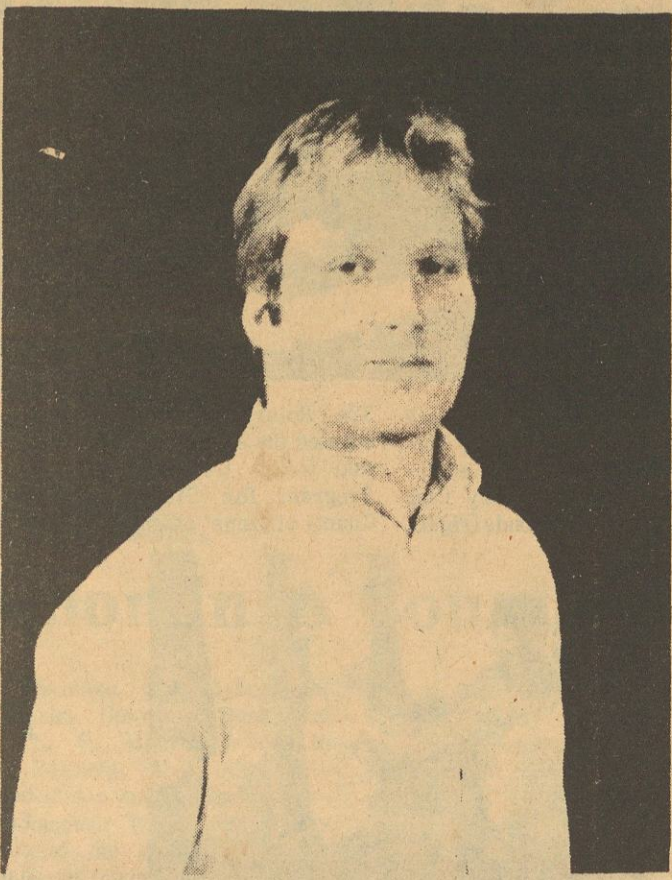

## A Announces Senior Citizen Program

Program of increased senior citizens was announced by TVA seven Valley state agencies.

agencies during the request of Chairman S. David to identify areas TVA could help fill which exist in state

and Federal programs for the elderly.

"TVA has many programs that provide direct or indirect assistance to the elderly, including our free home energy audit and no-interest loan insulation programs," Freeman said. "But the TVA Board feels that new initiatives are needed if we are to meet the growing needs of our

senior citizens, particularly in this time of rising energy costs."

Freeman said TVA would be assisting the state agencies in the areas of health care, employment and income opportunities, and energy conservation/education. He added that TVA was also considering the special needs of the elderly during its ongoing review of electric rate structures and delivery of electric service. Major elements of the TVA demonstration program announced by Freeman include:

Supplying each of the Valley states a van equipped to provide health checkups and health education information. "Taking preventive health care and basic health education opportunities to the elderly in isolated areas or areas where such services are not available is a 'gap' in present health care services," Freeman said. Staff on the vans would also assist the elderly in making arrangements for additional health care and would help make payment arrangements for Medicare, Medicaid, and health insurance to avoid

delays in needed services. TVA would fund its portion of the program for two or three years before turning financial responsibility over to the states and/or other possible funding sources.

Providing funds to upgrade the homes of selected elderly residents in key geographic areas so they can qualify as day-care or family-care homes. Such a program would provide employment opportunities for senior citizens and also improve the quality and availability of child care to working parents. TVA has identified areas with a critical need for child care facilities in the vicinity of the agency's Bellefonte (Alabama), Hartsville (Tennessee), and Yellow Creek (Mississippi) Nuclear Plants construction projects, and is presently investigating the need for more child care in Paducah, Ky.

Accelerating an existing program to train state aging personnel and senior citizen leaders to conduct residential energy management and conservation workshops. This program should reach thousands of

senior citizens with information and assistance on how to "winterize" and prepare for the heating season, Freeman said.

Building more than 30 warm room modules for senior citizens. This demonstration program will determine if low-income senior citizens will heat and live in only one room of a home during the winter months, thereby assuring the necessary heat and reducing electric bills.

Utilizing senior citizens in the joint TVA-power distributor program to provide free energy audits of the homes of Valley electric power users.

TVA would hire senior citizens to arrange schedules for audits, answer questions from the public, handle all clerical work, and perform other duties associated with the program. "This program would provide employment for some of our senior citizens and at the same time free TVA and distributor personnel to get out into the field and reduce the present backlog of requests for energy audits," Freeman said.

Consideration of the elderly in TVA's program of reviewing rate structures, delivery of electric service, and other aspects of the electric power program.

Substantially increasing an existing program to help low-income citizens, many of whom are also elderly, grow vegetable gardens to reduce grocery expenses, improve nutrition, and in many instances produce a cash crop. TVA's Division of Agricultural Development provides participants technical advice, seed, fertilizer, and other help in growing their produce.

Initiating a small-scale, one-year demonstration program designed to show how elderly citizens who own large, older homes could supplement their incomes by converting unused space into rental apartments. Under this proposal, 10 homes would be selected for renovation with TVA assuming responsibility for 3/4 of the cost. If the demonstration proved successful, TVA would encourage the state aging offices to seek out financial institutions and other sources of funding to establish a low- or no-interest loan program so that this activity could be expanded throughout the region.

Freeman said that work on those elements of the program not already underway would begin this fiscal year, and estimated that the first year cost of the program to TVA would be about \$1 million. He said that TVA would finance those elements of the program which are directly related to power activities from power revenues, and the remainder of funds would come from congressional appropriations.

Several of these initiatives have been developed so that the participating states, through other funding sources, will assume financial responsibility for the programs after a one- or two-year demonstration, allowing TVA to move on to other demonstration efforts.

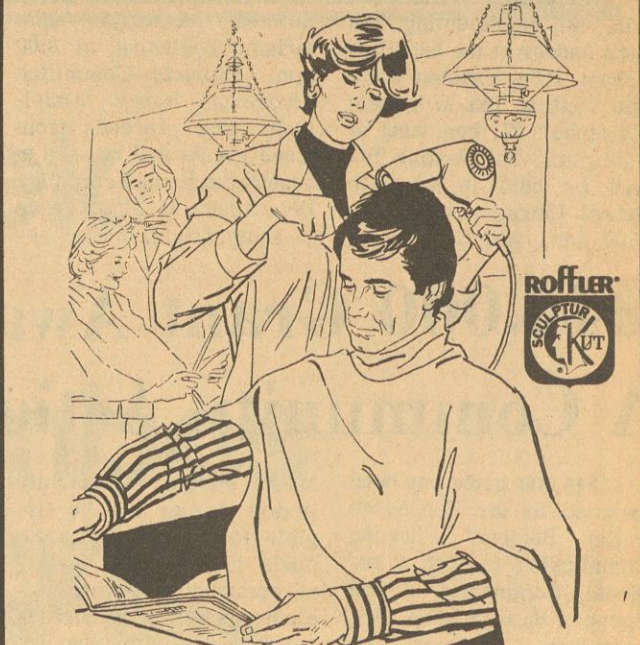

## \$44,000 Grant Awarded For A Community Action Agency

A \$44,000 grant has been awarded to the Tennessee Valley Regional Planning Commission to fund a regional Community Action Agency, E. S. Bishop, Sr., executive director of TVRPC, announced.

The planning "seed" money for the Northeast Mississippi Community Action Agency was made available through the regional Community Services Administration office in Atlanta through the Mississippi Governor's Office of Human Resources. The local agency will serve the three-county area of Tishomingo, Prentiss and Alcorn.

"This will be an umbrella agency to provide numerous community services and will fill needs which are not currently addressed by existing operating agencies," Bishop stated.

Bishop also announced that Allan Myers, a professional planner, has been employed and is already initiating several program proposals. The Northeast

Mississippi Community Action Agency will be eligible for federal and state funds to operate a variety of community services including housing and land development, health care, nutrition, emergency housing for child abuse victims, counseling and juvenile delinquents, weatherization, recreation and a wide scope of programs to aid both young and old members of the community.

The local agency will operate under the direction of an advisory board which will be composed of representatives from the public, private and poor sectors of the community. Representatives of the poor sector will be elected. The poor and public sectors will in turn appoint members from the private sector.

An essential objective of the CAA is extensive and intensive participation by the poor residents of the community. Input from the private sector in general is also urged. Community

action programs are based on the belief that poor people possess talents and resources essential to reducing the problems of poverty. Insight and participation from the poor sector are necessary for a successful program designed to lessen the impact of poverty, officials said.

Bishop, who will serve as interim director of the agency, stated that Ms. Myers has an impressive record and will provide aggressive leadership in organizing the agency and setting priorities and goals for the community.

Ms. Myers comes to Corinth from Greenwood where she was planning director for the Rising Sun Community Development Association Inc. She received her master's degree in urban and regional planning at Texas Southern University of Texas and a double bachelor of arts degree in communications and political science at Stanford University in Stanford, Ca. She completed additional studies at Harvard and Stanford in Tours, France.

The new planning director will be speaking at civic and public meetings to explain what the agency can do for the community and what the area residents can do to aid in the success of these programs.

Other personnel will be employed after the advisory board is formed and programs become operational.

## AA Area Assembly

Early in 1945, Alcoholics  
Anonymous came to Missis-  
sippi when three members  
who had found sobriety in  
the fellowship in Washing-  
ton, D. C. moved to Jackson

and started a group there.  
A few months later, a few  
members from around the  
Delta formed a group in  
Greenwood. Today, the  
state has approximately 100  
groups located in almost  
every county, and an alco-  
holic seeking help with his  
or her drinking problem may  
find it not far away.

Anonymity is the very  
foundation of this loosely-  
knit organization and is res-  
ponsible for much of its  
growth. No member ever  
reveals the name of another  
to anyone outside of A.A.  
Many movements were  
started to try to help the  
alcoholic long before the

beginning of A.A., but none  
of them ever showed better  
than a 2% recovery among  
victims of this widely pre-  
valent illness. Yet from its  
inception, Alcoholics An-  
onymous reported that ap-  
proximately half of its mem-  
bers never drank again, and  
another 25% eventually at-  
tained and maintained sob-  
riety.

There are no dues for  
A.A. membership. The only  
requirement for member-  
ship is a desire to stay  
sober. Through the fellow-  
ship's twelve steps of a  
suggested program of re-  
covery, more than a million  
men and women have found

the way to a sane and use-  
ful way of life, after being  
considered helpless and  
hopeless. The writer of  
this article, an alcoholic  
and a former newspaper  
man, came to A.A. in 1945,  
and has never had another  
drink.

The more than a million  
sober members give ample  
proof that A.A. will work,  
if an alcoholic wants to stay  
sober.

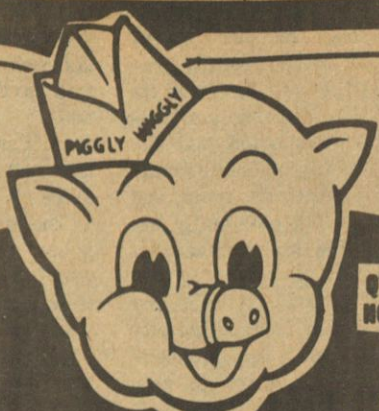
