The annual Tishomingo Christmas Parade is scheduled for December 6th at 5 o'clock. The theme of this year's parade is "A Christmas Fanciest".

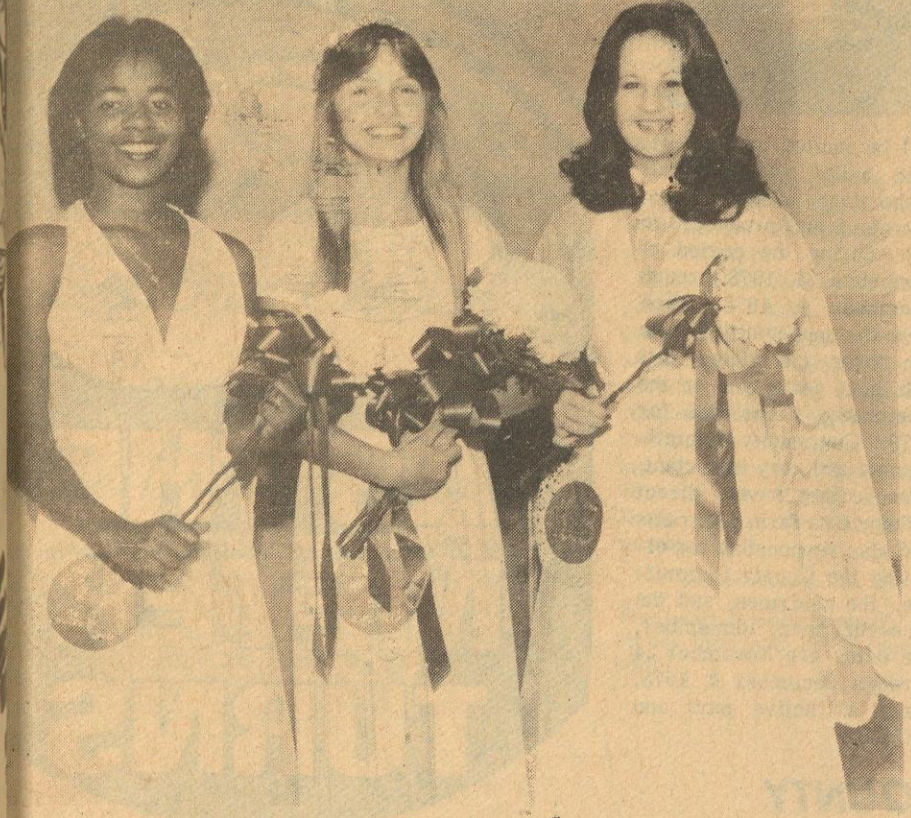

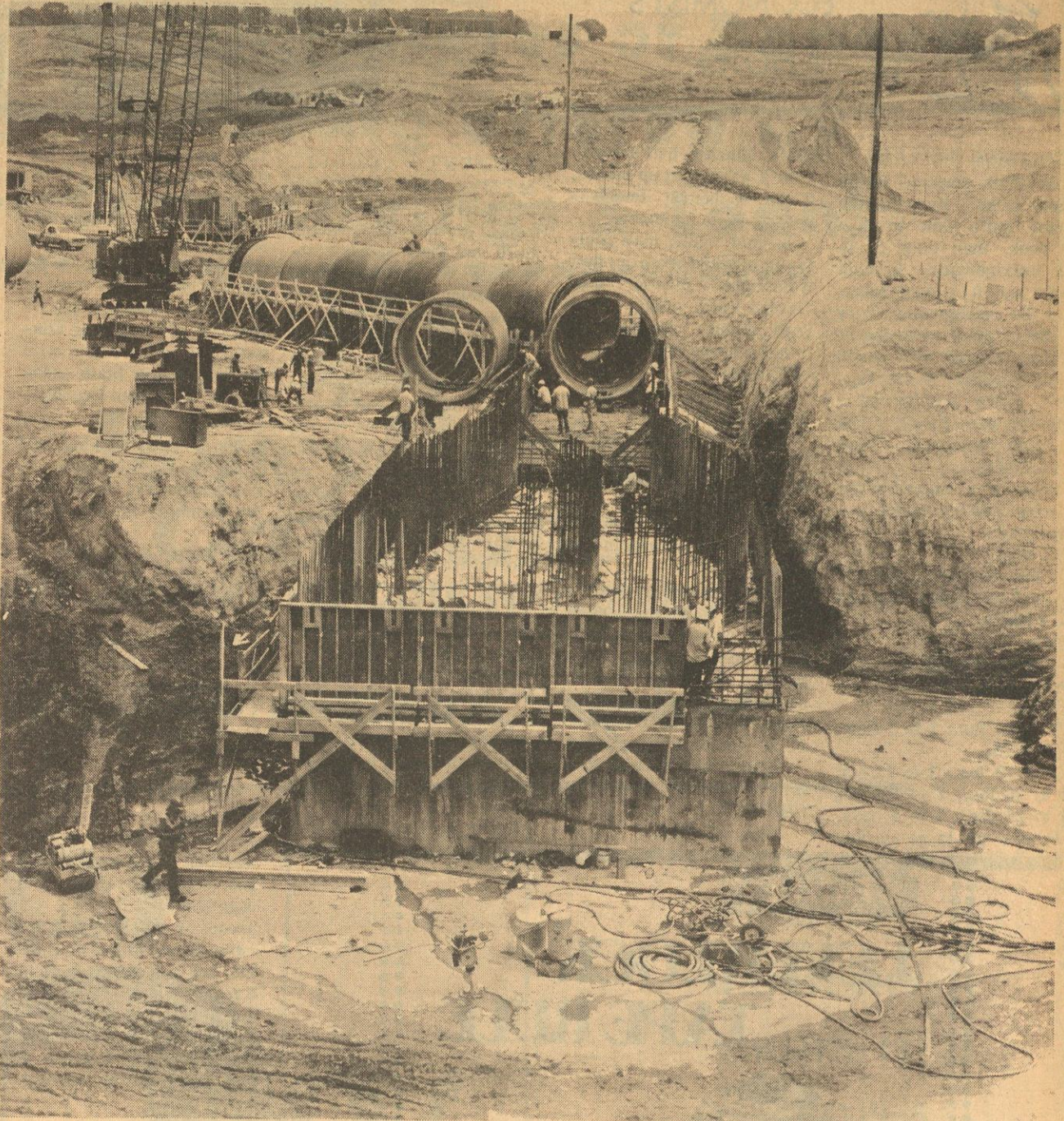

### Large Crowd Attends Open House At Yellow Creek Nuclear Plant Site

Sunday, Nov. 19, Thousands of Northeast Ms. and Northwest Alabama residents got their first official viewing of the construction site of the Tennessee Valley Authority's Yellow Creek Nuclear Plant, located on a 1,160 acre tract of land in Tishomingo County, approximately six air miles north of Iuka. Since construction began in February, they have moved, hauled away and rearranged 3.3 million cubic yards of material at the site. By the end of the project construction period another 6 million cubic yards will be moved.

In March's official groundbreaking, visitors saw small signs designating units and areas of the twin reactor plant. Sunday's crowd saw gaping holes and valleys dug deep inside the complex plant.

The dominant feature at this stage is cooling water pipes twelve-foot in diameter. These will run underneath the plant to two tall cooling calendars.

First impressions by Sunday sightseers included "I just had no idea it was going to be so much," one Iuka woman said. "I just can't imagine what they'll put in all this space."

It's not going to be just one building is it?"

The answer to the woman's question is, "No."

The two reactors at Yellow Creek will be the largest single units in the TVA system. Safety requirements and construction plans will require the use of 482,000 yards of concrete, 32,000 tons of steel, 6,200 valves and 2,300 miles of power and control cable to make them operational.

Red Hayes, a construction official at the site, said major progress had been made since last spring, due in part to excellent construction weather. As winter

sets in, Hayes said, some phases of work will slow down, but the work force will remain virtually the same.

The emphasis will be on different areas of work during the wet winter, Hayes said.

Construction plant, or non-permanent buildings, trailers, and facilities are nearing 50 percent of completion. Temporary engineering and administrative office trailers are now being used by project personnel until completion of a prefabricated administration office complex located near the powerhouse.

### Committee Organized To Promote Four-Laning Of Highway 72

Leaders of a new committee to push of the four laning of U.S. 72 from the Alabama stateline to the Tennessee line, hope to attract as many as 300 people from across the state to a kick-off meeting here Nov. 28.

The committee has adopted a theme "Four Lane 72 By '82."

Dr. Fayette Williams, who has been elected temporary chairman of the committee, said that political, civic, business and people from all walks of life are being invited to the public meeting.

Invitations have been sent to hundreds of people in chambers of commerce and business organizations along the 100 mile highway route.

THE DUTCH treat meeting will be held at the Holiday Inn at 7 p.m. Tuesday Nov. 28 in Corinth.

Dr. Williams said the meeting will include short presentations from TVA, the state park commission, the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway Authority, Miss-

issippi R & D Center, and the state highway department.

He said the meeting will center around the "economic impact of industrial development in the northern part of the state; the development of tourist attractions in North Mississippi; the trends of traffic in the area—past, present and future; and what the four-laning of Highway 72 will mean in all of these areas."

Right-of-way along the highway from Iuka to the Alabama line is already being bought by the Mississippi Highway Department. U.S. 72 is four-laned from Florence, Ala. to the Mississippi line.

Bobby Richardson, Northern District Highway Commissioner, who originally suggested the formation of the highway committee, because such an organization had been successful in getting U.S. 72 placed on the state corridor system for four-laning.

THE HIGHWAY commiss-

ion has suggested that federal financing might be available if the highway could tie the Yellow Creek Port area on the Tenn-Tom Waterway to the Mississippi River.

Next week's highway meeting will be a \$4.50 a person dutch dinner.

The meeting marks the first time that a group along the highway has been formed to push for the highway's four laning.

In 1972, the highway was left off the corridor program, and corridor funds are not authorized to be spent on the highways.

RICHARDSON TOLD a joint meeting of two civic clubs here three weeks ago that the creation of the committee would put some strength behind his request for federal assistance.

The commissioner has sought to get the highway added to the Appalachia Regional Commission (ARC) road system. A formal request has been made to Gov. Cliff Finch for the inclusion

of U.S. 72 on the ARC system.

The highway commission says there is no other highway that so completely meets the criteria of an ARC highway than U.S. 72.

NOTES

**THAWING POULTRY**  
To thaw poultry, follow safety rules. Keep poultry frozen until time to thaw or cook, then thaw it, in the refrigerator, in cold water or in a cool room.

In the refrigerator, thaw in the original wrapping or lightly covered with waxed paper if poultry in unwrapped. Place poultry on a tray for easy handling and to catch drippings. Thaw until pliable.

Here is a timetable for thawing poultry in the refrigerator:

**CHICKEN:**  
4 lbs. or over, 1 to 1 1/2 days; Less than 4 lbs., 12 to 16 hours.

**DUCK:**  
3 to 7 lbs., 1 to 1 1/2 days.

**GEES:**  
6 to 12 lbs., 1 to 2 days.

**TURKEYS:**  
4 to 12 lbs., 1 to 2 days; 12 to 20 lbs., 2 to 3 days; 20 to 24 lbs., 3 to 4 days.

Pieces of large turkey (Half, quarter, half breast), 1 to 2 days; Cut up pieces, 3 to 9 hours; Boneless roasts, 12 to 18 hours.

In cold water, thaw poultry in original wrapper or other watertight plastic bag. Change water often. Thaw until pliable. Approximate thawing times are:

**CHICKEN:**  
4 to 4 lbs., 1 to 2 hours.

**TURKEYS:**  
4 to 12 lbs., 4 to 6 hours; 12 to 20 lbs., 6 to 8 hours; 20 to 24 lbs., 8 to 12 hours.

You may partially thaw poultry in the refrigerator and complete thawing in cold water.

In a cool room, thaw poultry in a doublewall paper bag or wrapped in several thicknesses of paper. Place poultry on a tray for easy handling and to catch drippings. Thaw at 70 degrees F. or below until pliable. Approximate thawing time is:

**CHICKEN:**  
4 lbs., 12 hours.

After poultry is thawed,

**TURKEYS:**  
4 to 12 lbs., 12 to 15 hours; 12 to 24 lbs., 15 to 20 hours.

Thawing times will be shorter if giblets are not packed in the body cavity. If cut-up poultry pieces are separated by freezer paper, remove the outer wrapper, thaw partially in the refrigerator and then separate each piece for quicker thawing. Or, leave poultry pieces in watertight wrapper and thaw in cold water.

After poultry is thawed,

prepare for cooking the same way as chilled, unfrozen poultry. Cook poultry promptly after thawing.

**ASPARAGUS AND ENGLISH PEA CASSEROLE**  
1 Can English peas  
Margarine  
2 tsp. chopped pimento  
2 c. buttered bread crumbs  
1 can asparagus  
1 med. onion, chopped  
1 can cream of mushroom soup

Layer half the peas and asparagus in 1-quart casserole; dot with margarine. Add half the onion, pimento and soup in layers over vegetables. Toss 1 cup bread crumbs; toss with 2 tablespoons melted margarine and spread over soup. Repeat layers; cover with untoasted remaining bread crumbs. Bake at 375 degrees for 15 minutes or until soup bubbles through.

## ASCS Farm News

**ASCS ISSUES CERTIFICATION REPORT ON 1978 COTTON, FEED GRAIN, WHEAT ACREAGE:**

Farmers have "certified" to the federal government that they planted, set-aside or diverted for payment 152 million acres of cropland in 1978. Farmers were required to report these figures to county offices of the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service to be-

come eligible for federal price support programs for wheat, feed grains and upland cotton. According to Ray Fitzgerald, ASCS Administrator, the 152 million certified acres represent 73 percent of the 209 million acres enrolled during the March 1 - May 31 signup as normal crop acreage. During the signup, farmers who planted these crops were required to enroll in order to be eligible for program benefits. These farmers were not held to their intentions until they certified their acreages.

Department officials estimated that 1978 production from the certified normal crop acreage will make eligible for price support from the 1978 crop around 3 billion bushels of corn, 1.3 billion bushels of wheat and between 10 and 10.5 million bales of cotton. Fitzgerald also reported that participating farmers have certified 18.7 million acres (78 percent) of the 24 million acres designated during signup for set-aside, diversion, or haying and grazing. Set-aside acreage enrolled and later certified are: cotton 0.55 million (0.5 million - 91 percent); feed grains 12.1 million (8.4 million - 69 percent); wheat 11.4 million (9.8 million - 86 percent). Feed Grain acreage certified includes: Corn 3.3 million set-aside, 2.8 million diversion; sorghum 1.1 million set-aside, 0.4 million diversion; barley 0.6 million set-aside, 0.2 million diversion. Wheat certified acreage includes 8.4 million set-aside and 1.4 million haying and grazing. The cotton certification is all diverted acreage. Seventy percent (831,382) of the 1,186,143 farms enrolled during signup certified they will comply with program provisions.

**COMMITTEE ELECTION:**

You have the opportunity to vote for three candidates that will best serve you on the Community Committee for 1979. Community Committeemen are very important, because they have a direct influence on farm programs and also responsible for electing the County Committee, the chairmen, and the vice-chairmen. Remember, the dates are November 24 through December 4, 1978. Take an active part and VOTE.

## COUNTY AGENT'S NOTES

**PLAN NOW TO PLANT NEW FRUIT TREES THIS FALL AND WINTER:**

Buy healthy, stocky, vigorous trees. A weak, spindly, stunted tree is expensive regardless of price because it will grow slowly and will usually develop poorly.

Order trees early and specify a delivery date. Have the soil ready for planting the same day the trees arrive from the nursery. If this is not possible, heel in the bare-root trees. Break open the bundle of trees and distribute them evenly in a shallow trench. Fill the trench with soil to cover the roots. You can keep bare-root trees in this manner for a short time. Do not allow the roots to dry.

1. Dig hole large enough for natural spread of roots. Loosen soil in bottom of hole. Plant tree at same depth it grew before transplanting.

2. Keep tree roots moist while out of the ground.  
3. Stake to anchor tree.

Anchor tree with wires threaded through section of garden hose to prevent damaging bark.

4. Wrap trunk to lessen evaporation and protection from sun. Wrap lower one-half of trunk with burlap of tree wrap paper.

5. Prune one-third of the branches so roots will be able to feed remaining top. Cut branches next to stem or trunk; do not destroy natural form of tree.


6. Replace subsoil in hole with good top soil high in humus. Mulch newly plant-

ed tree.

7. Water often with soaking. Mound soil to water.

**PECANS:**  
Since insects and diseases organisms overwinter in leaves, limbs, and bark, collect the trash and burn to provide some control these pests.

**FIGS:**  
You should completely remove young fig trees with straw to reduce winter injury.

# Rabies Outbreak In Alabama

The following article appeared in a Birmingham newspaper and was brought to our office by a concerned animal owner. He felt that if rabies could spread from Georgia to Alabama it could surely come to Mississippi. With this in mind we urge all pet lovers to have their animals immunized.

"It's not only possible but probable" that the epidemic of rabies in wildlife will spread outside the nine southeastern Alabama counties now in its grip. This is the word from Alabama State Health Officer Ira Myers.

"There is no way to prevent rabies in wildlife, so where numbers of animals of a species having the disease are thick enough, it will spread," said Myers. "This is what happened when the large number of cases among raccoons in Georgia spilled over into Alabama."

Georgia has had 239 cases among animals confirmed this year, with 206 being raccoons. "The only reason rabies among raccoons didn't spill over into Alabama sooner," said Myers, "is because of the Chattahoochee River. Spread was slowed down by it."

On Nov. 10 an outbreak of rabies among raccoons in nine Alabama counties near the Georgia line prompted Myers to call on state, county and city officials for help.

He asked them to urge the public to get rabies shots for their pets.

"Rabies is passed on to man by pets if dogs and cats who have not had the shots are bitten by wild animals with the disease. The pets may bite their owners or the owners often handle pets with the disease while they have cuts on their hands through which germs can enter the body," said Myers.

Rabies among animals has been found in 18 counties in the state since last February, but those hardest hit are Houston, Barbour, Coffee, Covington, Crenshaw, Dale, Geneva, Henry and Pike.

"We have tested heads of 2,000 animals this year for rabies and have found 50 positive cases to date. Of the 50 positives, 30 were raccoons living in the nine southeast counties. Others were three skunks each in Limestone and Madison counties, a mink in Walker, a weasel in Marshall, a bat each in Jefferson, Etowah, Elmore and Mobile, a flying squirrel in Lee, three dogs in Houston and one in Covington, a cat in Houston and two in Coffee.

Having one's pets immunized must not only be done this year but in future years to save humans from an outbreak, said Myers.

Myers warned that hunters should be double sure that their dogs are immunized. "If a dog kills a coon, it's almost a sure thing that the coon is rabid because as a rule they can elude one dog. Any dog who is in the woods often should by all means have the rabies shot or he could bring the disease home to the owner's family."

- 8 ounces fine noodles, cooked as directed on package
- 1/2 cup Pepperidge Farm Stuffing Mix

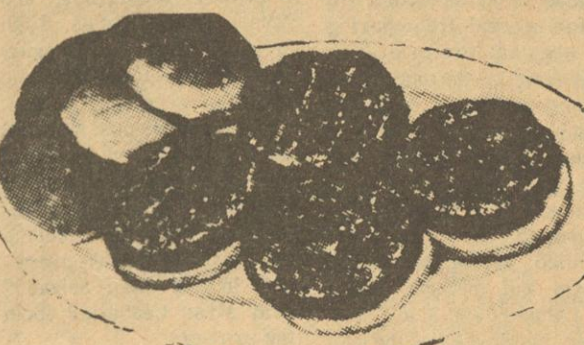

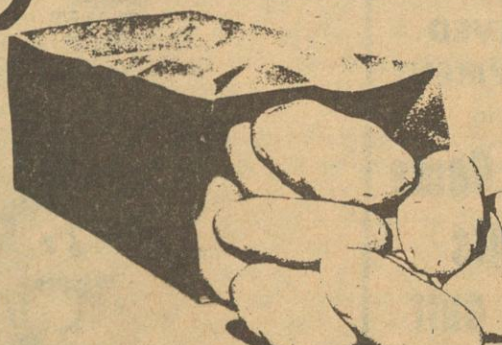
