

WINTER GRAZING MANAGEMENT

With the late stands of winter grazing this fall, it is especially important that you fertilize these crops adequately. Nitrogen is the "grass growing element" and also determines the

protein content of forage. The higher the forage nitrogen content, the higher the crude protein value of the forage.

Ryegrass and small grains can use up to one pound of nitrogen per acre for each day's grazing. This means that the grazing can use about 30 pounds of nitrogen or 100 pounds of ammonium nitrate each month, Crops fertilized every two months will need about 200 pounds of ammonium nitrate or 150 pounds of urea. The last application should be applied in March.

You should not use urea on winter grazing crops on newly limed soils that have not received a good rain or when soil temperatures are less than 40 degrees.

WINTER SEED CONTROL Bermudagrass is becoming a particular problem in Mississippi cotton fields. The pest can be controlled, but it will take several

Where erosion is not a problem, chisel infested areas lightly two or three times this winter to drag the bermudagrass stolons to the top of the ground. It is best to do the cultivation after a hard freeze. Exposure to temperatures below 25 degrees for several hours will also kill nutsedge tubers and johnsongrass rhizomes.

BUY RICE SEED NOW Now is a good time for you rice producers to make decisions on your rice seed needs for the 1979 planting season. Contacting seed suppliers now will help assure you of getting good quality seed. Seed bought at the last minute may contain red rice or other weed seed. Be sure to check the seed bag to make sure these future pests are not present.

producers will be en. couraged to remove from production an acreage equal to 20 percent of the acres that they plant for harvest in 1979, a percentage identical to the 1978 program, according to Elmer A. South, Chairperson of the Tishomingo County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee. Basically the same as in 1978, the 1979 program offers corn and sorghum producers a 10 percent setaside and a 10 percent diversion program. There is a 20 percent set-aside and a 10 percent diversion program. There is a 20 percent set-aside program for barley, instead of a combination set-aside diversion program. According to South, the acreage a producer participating in the diversion program can plant to a feed grain in 1979

is not restricted to the prior year's acreage, as was the case in 1978. Under the previous program, the diversion payment was related to the acreage a producer planted for harvest. In 1979, the diversion payment will be related to the acreage a producer diverts from production which must equal 10 percent of the acreage planted to the crop for harvest. "Feed grain producers will again be eligible for target price payments on their entire planted acreage by restricting plantings from 1978 by 10 percent for corn and grain sorghum and 30 percent for barley," South said. The incentive to participate in the 1979 feed grain program totals \$2.30 a bushel for corn and \$2,40 a bushel for sorghum and barley. The corn target price will be \$2.20, instead
