## Year-End Report On Tenn-Tom Construction

The new decade dawns, and the long-awaited Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway nears the end-point of construction. Over 100 miles of the 232-mile water course opened to trained navigation from Memphis to Demopolis, Ala. to Mobile, Midway through the Exciting Eighties, the entire waterway is completed, affording millions of dollars in annual savings to shippers and opening an entirely new frontier to foreign trade.

While talked about for nearly two centuries, actual construction of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers did not begin until 1972. Work is now progressing at a rapid rate in every segment of this major transportation artery which parallels the borders of Alabama, Mississippi and Tennessee. When completed, the "Tenn-Tom" (as it is called) will link the Gulf of Mexico with the inland waterways, opening the distance from America to foreign ports through the Port of Mobile as much as 800 miles.

The waterway will join the Tennessee River near Pickwick Dam and Yellow Creek with the Black Warrior River at Demopolis, Ala. The waterway includes four locks, a 100-foot high lift lock at Bay Mills, and an excavated canal involving removal of 150,000 cubic yards of earth, through the ridge separating the Tombigbee and Tennessee basins.

Early \$1 billion of the estimated \$1.67 billion total cost of the entire project is now under contract. Of the only two remaining major structures to be placed under contract will be the remaining contract scheduled for 1981. Construction is progressing at a rate of about 10 percent each month.

With over 5000 workers employed on Tenn-Tom construction and related work, the employment rate along the waterway route has dropped well below the national average, according to Glover, Administrator of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway Development Authority.

Efforts have been successful in maximizing employment and increasing business opportunities for local residents, including minorities. As a result, over 25 percent of the workforce from the local area and 25 percent are minorities.

Over \$15 million of money has gone to minority contractors and businesses. The waterway has drawn attention of the White House as a result of the successful efforts of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway Development Authority.

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already proving to be of great value as models in other projects affecting the environment, according to Gerald McLindon, Dean of the School of Environmental Design, Louisiana State University. McLindon chairs the board which includes a consulting hydrologist, geologist and zoologist. Since 1971, this prestigious environmental board has monitored all facets of waterway construction, making recommendations for needed changes in design and construction methods and supervising execution of those modifications.

As Wilkins points out, enhancement of the environment takes on new meaning and purpose when you put human beings into it as this project has.

While the history of efforts to construct this project goes back a mere couple of hundred years, the use of the river as a hub of life goes back thousands of years. Proof of its early use, almost to the dawn of mankind, is being unearthed daily by teams of archeologists from nearly every major university in the country.

As a result, the entire Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway has been surveyed by professionals in the field of cultural resources preservation with over 700 historic and prehistoric sites identified. The knowledge gained about these early inhabitants of the Tombigbee River Valley is immeasurable. It is the single most intensive cultural resources investigation presently on-going in the United States. These important discoveries would not have been made and would not have been documented were it not for the Tennessee-Tombigbee construction project, according to officials.

Actual construction of recreation facilities on the waterway has begun with work on recreation areas on both the Gainesville and Aliceville Lakes. The total 49 recreation areas are being constructed by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers on 13,000 acres at a cost of approximately \$33 million. It will create about 42,000 water-surface acres extending from Demopolis, Ala. to near Pickwick Lake at Iuka, Miss.

While the past year has been "smooth sailing" for construction, the waters have been a little more turbulent for the Tenn-Tom in the courts. "The friends of the Tennessee-Tombigbee won another skirmish in the lower courts and are confidently awaiting word on the final action of the New Orleans Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals," according to Wilkins. "We are even more confident that we will finally win the environmental extremists and the railroads over to our side and join forces to give people of our region all the tools they need to insure a secure economic future," Wilkins said.

On November 30, 1976 the L & N Railroad and the Environmental Defense Fund brought suit to halt construction of the waterway charging it was not properly authorized by Congress and that it discriminates against alternate modes of transportation, primarily railroads. However, no other railroad has joined L & N in their action. Two years later, the Northern District Court of Mississippi heard three of the 15 counts, after setting aside the remaining points for a later hearing. After an eight day trial and presentation of hundreds of documents by the plaintiffs, Judge William C. Keady ruled in favor of the waterway.

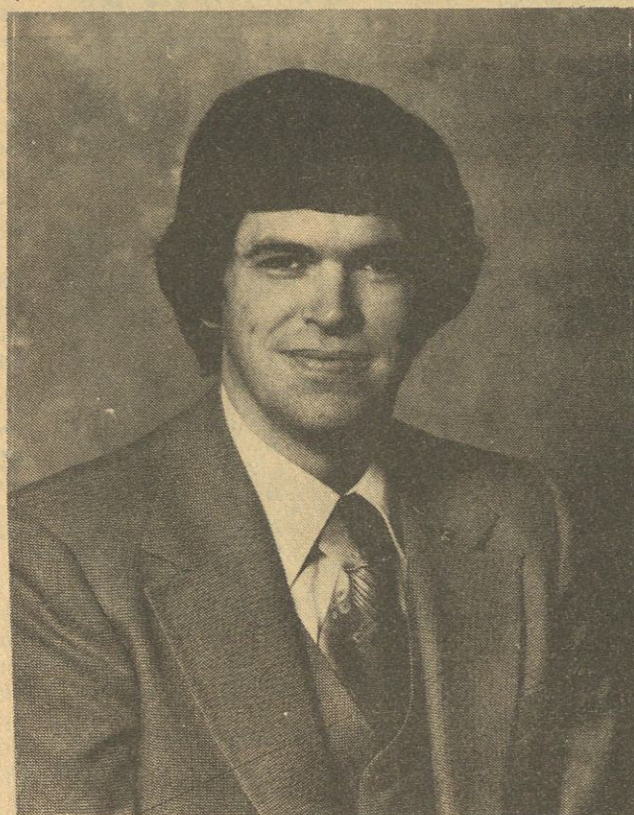
In his ruling, the Judge said the plaintiffs had a stale claim, based on the doctrine of laches. The case was appealed to the Fifth Circuit Court, where oral arguments were heard in December. A ruling is expected soon.

Relocation of bridges, roads and utilities, which are the responsibility of the states of Alabama and Mississippi, are progressing as scheduled. To date, eight of the 10 bridges in Mississippi and three bridges in Alabama are under construction or completed.

According to Wilkins, the waterway is expected to annually generate more than \$105 million savings in transportation costs.

In this era of acute awareness of the need to balance national energy supplies against a growing trade deficit, the transportation savings afforded by the shorter Tenn-Tom route will make a difference, Wilkins said. Coal, a principal commodity to move on the waterway, will be shipped at a savings of \$2.57 per ton, or about \$42 million in savings the first year. A study shows that the Tenn-Tom will be one of the busiest in the nation with tonnage equivalent to that now moving on the Tennessee River.

A number of grain elevators and terminals are being established along the waterway. The Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway, Wilkins said, is serving as an impressive "drawing card" for industrial growth because of the inherent need for water transportation. A result will be the formation of a strong base for the region's economy and a dramatic rise in the per capita income.

## BODY FOUND IN INDIAN CREEK

The tightly-clad body of a man was found in the shallow waters of Indian Creek, just east of Campground Church, early Saturday morning, January 5, by two deer hunters, according to the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department.

Officials responded to the call shortly after 7:30 a.m. and found the body wearing only light clothing with no coat or hat, partially covered with water. The man, later identified as James C. Butler, from Huntington, Tenn., was believed to have been in the water only a few hours in the cold temperatures of Friday night and early Saturday morning. Butler is believed to have been in his 50's and no marks to indicate physical abuse were found on the body, according to authorities. Butler was seen alive at about 8:00 p.m. on Friday evening, and at that time was believed to have

been inebriated. Sources told The Tishomingo County News that the car, a 1971 Oldsmobile station wagon, belonging to the deceased man, was involved in a hit and run accident in Wintergarden, Fla. on Saturday evening, several hours after the body had been found. Two white male subjects, from Tishomingo County, were believed to be driving the car. The two suspects were seen with Butler on Friday evening, January 4.

Authorities reported a Coroner's Inquest was held at the scene, where the Coroner pronounced Butler dead. No ruling on the cause of death has been given, although officials reported that death from drowning had been ruled out, and the case is still being investigated.

The Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department, State Investigator and County

Coroner were among authorities responding to the call.

According to Mr. Howie, Walker is in custody at Tishomingo County Jail after turning himself in to authorities. Allred and White are believed to be at large in Florida.

### Trends In Men's Wear

The trend in men's wear is neat and clean with designs that mix and match, blend and meld. Sportswear is casual, marked by separates in shirts, vests, sweaters, jackets and pants.

Emphasis is on the shoulders. Narrow pants present a V-shaped silhouette. Straight legs and loosely constructed tops offer a boxy, Fifties look. Detailing lends western appeal.

Synthetic or natural fabrics often team up on blends including tri-blends, such as polyester/cotton/wool. Surface interest in both tops and bottoms is accomplished with tweeds, donegals, herringbones, tick weaves, nubs and slubs, brushing and fleecing. Quilted touches highlight shoulders. Back yokes, button belt loops and arrowhead pockets tell it.

Shirt collars are smaller. Cotton, polyester, wool and blends are favorites. The fabrics are textured, patterns scaled down. Ties are narrow in subtle colors or in novelty sport versions. Casual shirts boast plackets, yokes, embroidery, cinched waists and a range of collars.

Sweaters and vests with V-necks, shawls, convertibles and army collars accommodate shirt/tie/sweater or vest coordination. Blends of wool/acrylic; wool/nylon AND ACRYLIC ARE POPULAR. Tweeds and speckled yarns, bright jacquards, com-

plicated intarsias (both sides of a patterned fabric are alike), chenilles and rib knits are featured. Cotton or cotton/polyester velour cagidans round out the picture.

Sport jackets and blazers are softly constructed with shoulder padding, narrow lapels and shawl collars. Following squared-off shoulder lines of the Fifties, some jackets feature back vents, drawstrings of cinched waists.

Jeans in denim, corduroy, chino and canvas are popular. Casual slacks lean toward wool and wool-blend flannels in tweeds and donegals. Narrow waistbands with side tabs; tapered or straight legs, some cuffed; numerous pockets; and pleats make pants a focal part of the wardrobe for the fashionable male.

### One-Dish Chicken Dinner

- 1 quart thin sliced pared potatoes
- 2 cups cubed, cooked chicken
- 1 (10 oz.) package frozen green peas
- 1 (10 1/2 oz.) can cream of chicken soup
- 1/2 cup can milk
- 2 tablespoons instant minced onion
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
- 1/2 teaspoon dried marjoram
- 1/4 teaspoon dried mustard
- 1/8 teaspoon pepper
- Dash Tabasco Sauce\*
- Paprika

Layer half the potatoes in the bottom of 11 1/2 x 7 1/2 x 1 1/2 inch baking dish. Sprinkle with salt. Top with chicken. Let peas stand at room temperature a few minutes. Squeeze package to break up block - scatter peas over chicken. Top with remaining potatoes. Again, sprinkle with salt. Combine soup, milk, onion, 2 teaspoons salt, Worcestershire, marjoram, mustard, pepper, and Tabasco sauce. Heat, stirring occasionally until smooth. Pour evenly over potatoes. Sprinkle top with paprika. Cover and bake at 375° F. for one hour or until potatoes are done.

## County Agent's Notes

### Start Pigs Off Right

To help pigs reach market weight faster, start them early on a high energy creep ration. When a sow's milk starts tapering off, it pays to have

her pigs already eating dry feed. Not only does the extra energy help pigs grow, but medication in high quality starter feed will protect them from disease. Minerals in the feed will also help pigs develop strong bones.

### Crop Rotation

As you plan your 1980 crop production program, you may want to consider crop rotation. Rotating crops with other crops such as legumes will interrupt disease cycles and reduce insect and weed problems. Despite these benefits, crop rotation has been eliminated from many Mississippi farms because of the availability of nitrogen fertilizer and conversion to a single crop system. However, with low levels of organic matter in many fields, herbicide buildup and other management problems, producers need to evaluate the advantage of crop rotation.

### Farmweek

A discussion of changes in the income tax law will highlight the January 14 edition of Farmweek on Mississippi Educational Television. Farmweek Reporter John Winkfeld will interview Extension Economist, Dr. Johnnie Sartor about the changes, which will be effective for this year's tax return. ### 1980 Beef Referendum

Beef and dairy producers in Tishomingo County are reminded of the upcoming beef referendum. The registration period will be held January 28 through February 6, 1980. Producers will vote by mail February 19 through February 22, 1980. Contact the county office at 423-5036, if you have questions concerning this referendum.

### 1980 Cotton Production

A preliminary 1980 crop upland cotton national program acreage of 11,602,285 acres has been announced by the Secretary of Agriculture, according to Elmer (Booster) South, Chairperson of the Tishomingo County ASCS Office. In order for cotton producers to be assured of target price protection on their entire planted acreage, they must also reduce their acreage in

1980 by 10 percent from their 1979 plantings. No acreage set-aside will be required for 1980. South went on to explain that producers who reduce their 1980 upland cotton acreage from that planted and considered planted in 1979 by at least 10 percent will be assured of deficiency payments on their total planted acreage if the market price falls below the target price.

The target price provides income protection to cotton farmers, South said. If the national average price received by farmers for upland cotton during calendar year 1980 falls below the target price, cotton producers will receive a deficiency payment at a rate equal to the difference between the higher of either the average market price or the loan price of 48 cents per pound for 1980.

Complete details of the 1980 Cotton Program will be available at the Tishomingo County ASCS Office, South said.

## Cooperative Extension Service

Mississippi should experience below normal temperatures in January, according to the National Weather Service Outlook distributed by the Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service.

The outlook also predicts drier than usual conditions for north Mississippi while wet weather is expected to prevail in the south, say agrometeorologists at the Environmental Studies Service Center in Stoneville who prepare the report.

Winter calving begins in many areas of Mississippi in January. Cattlemen should pay special attention to heavy springer and newborn calves to minimize losses. This is

especially true for heifers with first calves.

Pastures will grow slowly in the cold period, but good hay supplies are adequate. Extension specialists recommend the use of high energy feed for cattle. Cattlemen the feed intake with salt. However, salt toxicity may develop unless cattle have access to water. Extra effort must be made to keep ponds and tanks free of ice.

Poultry producers will pay higher heating bills for broiler houses. Producers will need to keep close watch on weather conditions and make curtain and heating adjustments to lessen chill stress on flocks and to save fuel. Cold snaps may be frequent, and afternoon highs normally range from near 50 degrees in the north to upper 50s in the south. Morning temperatures

are normally around in the north and upper in the south.

Little field work done since good dry will be scarce. About ches of precipitation fall in January.
