U.S. 72 Four Lane Passes Committee

Senator Cecil Sumners
stated Tuesday, January 23,
that the Senate Highways and
Transportation Committee
has approved and passed to
the Senate Bill #2704, author-
izing the State Highway
Committee to build an
additional two-lane highway

along U.S. Highway 72, which
in effect would four-lane
Highway 72 from the Ala-
bama line to the Mississippi
River.

Illegal Possession Leads To Arrest

A 20-year-old Tisho-
mingo County man was taken
into custody Monday follow-
ing his apprehension on
charges of possession of
illegal substances.

According to the Sheriff's
Office, county officials re-
ceived a tip which lead to
the arrest. Two highway
patrol units and a state in-
vestigator stopped the man's
vehicle near Midway and
recovered one pound of

marijuana, bagged for sale,
various controlled drugs,
and possible PCP (angel
dust) being transported th-
rough the county.

The young man, who re-
mains unidentified by re-
quest of the Sheriff's Office,
was arrested and is awaiting
action by the Grand Jury.
Substances taken during the
bust have been sent to the
state crime lab for evalua-
tion.

Assurance Of \$60,000 Grant For Mineral Springs Park

Now that you have been
assured of our grant for
Mineral Springs Park, I am
sure you read the announce-
ment by your Congressman
Jamie Whitten in last week's
issue of your paper.

I want to thank each and
every one of you who have
contributed to this very
worthy cause. It has al-
ways been said that Mineral
Springs Park has always
been the greatest asset Iuka
has or ever will have. It
serves all the people and
especially the youth in so
many ways.

Since so many people have
asked and seem confused as
to what we hope to do I am
going to explain to the best
of my knowledge. We hope
to install playground equip-
ment, installed by manufac-
turer at a cost of \$15,100.,
log cabin to be used as con-
cession stand, \$12,000.;
water fountain, \$7,857.; dou-
ble shuffleboard court,
\$1100.; band stand, \$7,200.;
tennis courts consisting of
paving, chain link fence and
underground wiring, also
nets, coating and posts,
\$15,944.; one concrete walk
that will circle by the foun-
tain and cabin and back to
the original walk, \$500.

If you will add the above
figures, I believe you will
come up with a total of
\$59,701.00. Looks as if we
have enough money, but
there are always hidden
costs. We will need at least
\$3,000 to stock the conces-
sion stand in order that we
can continue to make money
for the upkeep of this equip-
ment and add more. At
least two completely dead
trees will have to be cut for
safety, benches and tables

repaired. So many of you
have held your donations
back, because you were in
doubt about this project go-
ing through.

Now that we are assured
of the project and construc-
tion will start as soon as
weather permits, I beg of
you in my most humble way
to please make your dona-
tions as soon as possible,
as this is the only way
possible to get matching
funds. I hear that 1400
towns have applied for this
money and it cannot last
long.

Man Charged With Insurance Fraud

A Columbia, Tennessee
man was charged with In-
surance Fraud by the Tisho-
mingo County Sheriff's of-
fice, after allegedly mis-
representing himself to an
Iuka woman.

According to a sheriff's
office spokesman, an Iuka
woman swore out a warrant
for Clay Gladden, 36, of
Columbia, representative of
the Associate Doctor's In-
surance Company, after she
paid him \$268.69 on Sept.
30, 1978, and received no
policy by January 10, al-
though the check she wrote
him had been cashed.

Gladden was jailed in
Tishomingo County on Jan.

15, and appeared before
Justice Court Judge, Jim
Kirk, on January 18. Ac-
cording to Kirk, Gladden
was released after paying
approximately \$400 in fines
and returning \$268. to Mrs.
Marion Robinson and \$52.00
to Mrs. Billie Lambert.

The case has been turned
over to the State Insurance
Commissioner for further
investigation.

HOME ECONOMIST'S NOTES

REMOVING STAINS FROM WASHABLE FABRICS:

Laundering removes many stains on fabrics, but sets others. Treat stains before you launder the article.

Removing stains can be easy or hard. Your success will depend, in part, upon: the stain itself, the fabric, the age of the stain and the products and methods you use.

All stains cannot be removed by home methods. You may need to take some articles to a drycleaner or commercial laundry. Fresh stains are easier to remove. Some stains are set by laundering; always pretreat. Know your fabric: Is it washable? Color-fast? Test an inconspicuous part if you are not sure. Can chlorine bleach be used on the fabric? The tag will tell you. (If you saved it, that is?)

If a garment is not washable, take it to a dry cleaner. Identify the stain. Home treatment might set the stain and make the job im-

possible for a professional. Follow the best methods. If two or three methods are given, try the simplest one first.

A. Turn the fabric upside down on paper towels or tissues.

B. Treat stain from back side of fabric. Change towels or tissues often.

C. Work lightly -- don't RUB! Sponge rather than rub.

TO CLEAN GRAYED CLOTHES:

Clothes will turn gray from an accumulation of soil -- including dyes and soap curd. They may be yellowed from a build-up of oil. You can restore moderately grimy clothes to whiteness with the following method:

* Keep the size of each load small enough so articles agitate vigorously.

* Use the hottest water available.

* Add one to two cups of a nonprecipitating water softener, such as Calgon, to the wash water. The amount

depends on the hardness of the water.

* Next, add the amount of required detergent. You may notice more suds than usual, even with a lod-sudsing detergent.

* After several minutes of washing, add bleach. Chlorine bleach is most effective, but it will weaken fabrics containing silk, wool or spandex, and it can remove some fabric finishes and colors. Oxygen bleach is safe for all washable fabrics.

If your clothes are still gray or yellowed, repeat the treatment. Fresh water, detergent and water softener will remove more soil than extended washing in dirty water.

LIME-COTTAGE CHEESE SALAD

(40 calories per serving)
2 envelopes diet lime gelatin
2 c. hot water
2 tsp. vinegar
1/8 tsp. salt
1/2 c. cottage cheese
2 tsp. pimento
1 tsp. grated onion

Dissolve gelatin in hot water; stir in vinegar and salt. Pour 1 cup into 3 cup mold; chill till almost firm. Chill remaining gelatin mixture until slightly thickened. Fold in cheese, pimento and onion. Pour over firm layer in mold; chill until firm. Unmold on lettuce. Yield: 4 servings.

Irish potatoes when weather permits.

FRUITS AND NUTS:

If you are going to plant fruit or nut trees later this winter or early spring, you should take a soil sample and have it analyzed for pH and fertilizer requirements. Most fruit and nut trees grow best in a pH range of 5.8 to 6.5.

You can plant peaches any time in the dormant season, which is usually November through February in Mississippi. Planting early in the dormant season is often desirable, to allow the soil to settle and the roots to become established and begin developing before top growth begins in the spring.

PLANT PROPERLY:

Dig a hole large enough and deep enough to permit seeding the plant without bending, breaking, or crowding the roots. Prune roots of the new plants only when it is necessary to remove damaged or dead roots or roots that are exceptionally long and out of proportion with other roots.

Place loose topsoil in the bottom of the hole. Set the plant in the hole upright at the depth that it was growing in the nursery. Fill the hole about two-thirds full with pulverized topsoil so that it will settle around the roots. Fill the hole with water to aid in packing the soil. After the water has

COUNTY AGENT'S NOTES

GARDENS:

It's a new garden year and it's time to start working your 1979 vegetable garden.

1. Review the results of your 1978 garden. Do not replant varieties that didn't produce last year. Do not discard anything that failed because you didn't water or control insects.

2. Draw a garden plan showing rows and what is planted in them. The plan should show replant vegetables as some rows will produce three or four different vegetables in a season.

3. Check seed supply left from last year. If properly stored, 1978 seed should still germinate in 1979.

4. Select recommended varieties for planting plus a few new varieties for trial. This year why not try Sugar Snap, a new type of English pea, Grand Duke Kohlrabi, Dusky eggplant, Traveler 76 tomato, or Green Duke broccoli. Check Extension Publication 1091, Vegetable Gardening for a list of recommended varieties. A copy is available at your County Extension Office.

5. Place catalog seed orders early in the month.

6. When weather permits,

clean up the cold frame or build one. Use Extension Plan Nos. 5941 and 6080-A; available at your Extension Office.

7. Take a soil sample. Liming and fertilizing according to test results pay dividends, while liming and fertilizing by chance cost you dollars.

8. Broccoli and cabbage transplants require about 8 weeks to grow in a cold frame, so plant the seed in January.

9. Row up part of the garden for early peas and

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soaked in, finish filling the hole with topsoil, leaving a slight depression around the base of plant to hold water during rain and irrigations. Do not apply fertilizer at this time.

ASC Farm News

WHEAT, FEED GRAIN PROGRAM SIGNUP BEGINS FEB. 15 - Farmers can sign up for the 1979 wheat and feed grain program beginning February 15, according to Elmer A. South, Chairperson of the Tishomingo County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee. Provisions of the corn and sorghum set-aside program include a 10 percent set-aside and a 10 percent diversion. The wheat and barley program contains a 20 percent set-aside requirement. "Participation in the program is voluntary," South said. However, producers must file their intentions to participate during the signup period to be eligible for program benefits. All farmers planting feed grain and/or wheat for harvest in 1979 are eligible to participate. Program participants will be eligible for price support loans, deficiency and disaster payments for barley, corn, sorghum or wheat on the participating farm, and on other normal crop acreage grown on the farm. They will also be eligible to use the grain reserve. South said farmers may also sign up for voluntary diversion payments on corn and sorghum. "However, there will be no advance voluntary diversion payment for 1979 crops." Producers who sign up agree to take out of production one acre for every ten planted in 1979 to corn and sorghum; two acres for every ten planted to wheat and barley for grain; and reduce the acreage of NCA crops by this set-aside amount. "By participating in the set-aside program, farmers help to prevent an excessive build-up of wheat and feed grain stocks which cause low farm prices," South said. More program details may be obtained from the local ASCS. The sign-up period will be conducted until April 16.

COTTON PROGRAM CONTAINS NO SET-ASIDE REQUIREMENT - "Upland cotton growers will not have to set aside or divert acreages to be eligible for target prices or deficiency payment on their 1979 crop," Elmer A. South, Chairperson of the Tishomingo County ASC Committee, said. The 1979 program decision was based on smaller cotton stocks, strong export demand and improved mill use. A set-aside or diversion program, coupled with another bad weather year, could cause very tight supplies and a further reduction in cotton stocks next year, the ASCS official said. Other upland cotton provisions include a seed cotton loan program and a 10,634,181-acre national program acreage. He said the target price for the 1979 upland cotton crop will be announced when final yield and cost estimates are available. Based on the Dec. 1 yield estimates and

preliminary production costs, the target price would be 57.7 cents a pound, up from 52 cents for the 1978 crop. "The target price provides income protection to cotton farmers, and serves as a base to determine disaster payments." If the national average market price for upland cotton in 1979 falls below the target price, cotton growers will receive deficiency payments. Growers who voluntarily reduce their 1979 cotton acreage from that planted in 1978 by at least 15 percent will receive deficiency payments on their total planted acreage. Producers who do not reduce acreage will receive deficiency payments subject to location factor, time planted acreage, time who are prevented from other nonconserving yields because of a disaster on one-third of the price. Further details of the 1979 upland cotton program may be obtained from the local ASCS Office.

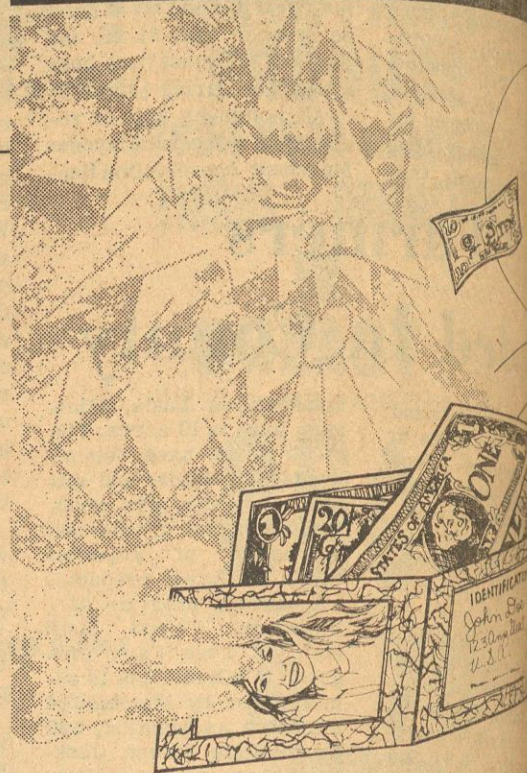

than seven (7) days prior to such date and also said
resolution shall be published by posting a copy there-
of for at least twenty-one (21) days preceding the date
herein fixed at three (3) public places in said Muni-
cipality.

REPORT TO MISSISSIPPIANS

Inflation will once again be the major problem of the 96th Congress. It is apparent that unless inflation is controlled, our very lifestyle will be threatened.

When President Carter took office two years ago, I invited me along with other Congressional leaders to the White House for a general discussion on national issues. I asked the question of each of us, "What do you see as the major problem facing the United States?" My answer was "Inflation -- the high cost of living is our greatest problem." In the past two years inflation has become so severe that it is a widespread agreement that something must be done. Inflation is now uppermost in the minds of our citizens as the greatest challenge facing government officials every level.

At the opening of the 96th Congress last September, I introduced a resolution that would bring about a federal budget in a gradual manner by calling for a "you-go" constitutional amendment. This amendment requires that if at the end of the year a deficit exists, an additional tax would be automatically imposed to pay it. The budget would be balanced every year, unless a national emergency existed, such as war or depression.

This amendment would place the burden of keeping the budget in balance squarely on the shoulders of Congress. It makes it clear that any member of Congress who votes appropriations that result in a deficit is automatically simultaneously voting for a tax increase. Under this plan one follows the other as night follows day, and the taxpayer who would bear the burden of any tax increase would be the one who imposed it on them.

I believe this amendment is an idea whose time has come. Recent elections have reflected strong public support for such a concept, and at least 22 state legislatures have called for a constitutional amendment with the same purpose.

Until this amendment, or one similar to it, is passed, we must work for reduced deficits. Congress has made a start. We have established a special budget committee to impose a ceiling on ourselves for the last three years, reducing the deficit from \$66 billion to \$50 billion to \$40 billion. The President has helped in this.

However, too much fat remains in the budget. We are all paying dearly for those huge budget deficits. President has pledged to hold the deficit to \$30 billion fiscal 1980 which begins October 1. That figure is only one-half of the 1976 deficit.

Much of the debate in Congress this year will be a question of how much budget cuts can be made without starting a recession in business at the same time. Our hope is we can reduce federal spending while avoiding a recession, but we will have to proceed carefully and not take extreme and drastic steps which could have deleterious effects and greatly upset our already troubled economy.

Let me emphasize that cutting federal spending to balance the budget is not the sole solution to our problem. There is no single cause and no single solution. Reduced spending is a step in the right direction, but we are committed to doing all I can to help restore stability to our economy.
