Iuka Woman Shot

A quarrel, which began on Friday, January 26, led to the shooting of an Iuka resident, Minnie Ruth Mitchell, on Sunday, January 28.

According to the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department, Ms. Mitchell was shot twice by a .22 caliber pistol. She was shot once in the back and once in the shoulder by Lloyd Seay, also of Iuka.

A Department spokesman reported that on Friday a warrant was issued by Ms. Mitchell to have Mr. Seay removed from her home. He apparently returned on Sunday, shot Ms. Mitchell and fled in a 1971 Ford.

The shooting took place in a public road just off Eastport Street, after which Ms. Mitchell made her way to the home of Dorothy Mitchell where she phoned the authorities.

Mr. Seay was picked up at his home on Spring Street around 8:15 Sunday night, and was charged with attempted murder. He is being held in Tishomingo County Jail awaiting a preliminary hearing.

The Tishomingo County Hospital declined to make any comment on the victim's condition.

Unemployment Figures For Tishomingo County Released

Tishomingo County's jobless rate rose 1.5 percent in December 1978, to reach 6.4 percent of the civilian labor force, or 490 individuals, according to Charles Smith, Corinth Area Manager of the Mississippi State Employment Service. This compares to 9.3 percent for the same period one year ago. Other estimates made by this agency reveal that 7,230 Tishomingo County residents were employed at the reporting period, approximately 30 less than the estimate in November and 200 below the estimate for the same period one year ago. The total civilian labor force for the county was estimated to be 7,730, only a minimal decrease from the November 1978 estimate but a substantial drop from the December 1977 estimate.

Establishment based employment composed of manufacturing and non-manufacturing employment, was estimated to be 4,850, a decline of approximately 50 from last month. This estimate includes all people working in Tishomingo County whether they reside there or in surrounding counties. Both manufacturing and nonmanufacturing

industries experienced minor changes. The yearly comparison also indicated a loss in establishment based employment where again in nonmanufacturing employment was offset by a loss in manufacturing.

Smith also stated that the current civilian labor force for the four-county area of Alcorn, Prentiss, Tippah, and Tishomingo stood at 40,920, compared to 40,800 in November and 41,440 in December 1977. The estimated rate of unemployment, at 7.3 percent of the civilian labor force, was slightly more than the 6.6 percent of November but lower than the 8.6 percent of December one year ago. The number of employed persons, estimated to be 37,940, declined from 38,100 in November and rose from 37,890 in December one year ago. The major decrease from last month in employment was found in the Agricultural group.

Establishment based employment for the four-county area registered a net loss of 240 from last month but a gain of 200 from one year ago. A total of 15,150 workers were employed in manufacturing industries at mid-December, down by 220 from

last month and 280 from the nonmanufacturing industries, 14,690 were employed which represented a slight drop from the last estimate but a substantial rise of 490 was experienced from the estimate of one year ago.

Community Action Agency Finalizes Plans For Federal Recognition

Northeast Mississippi Community Action Agency is now finalizing plans for federal recognition.

The Northeast Mississippi Community Action Agency received interim funding on Nov. 1, 1978, for a four-month planning period. The umbrella-type organization was formed to operate social and economic programs to help eliminate poverty in this area.

Bishop pointed out, "We want to develop and support local programs which meet the critical service needs of the poor and provide permanent improvements in living conditions."

The agency will function to find and secure funds, personnel and other resources to support projects and solve immediate problems and to enlist the assistance of the private and voluntary sectors.


Input from the communities and the board of directors will determine what projects receive priority for funding.

Some of the programs which are being planned or considered by the new community action agency include Neighborhood Service Centers in each of the three

counties, a program for displaced homemakers, emergency housing for child abuse victims, senior opportunities services for persons 65 years of age or older, community food and nutrition services, health-related services, housing, summer youth recreation, crisis intervention and weatherization programs.

Bishop emphasized that representation of the poor is the most important objective of the community action agency and is an integral component of the agency's other major objectives.

"The ultimate objective of the agency," he said, "is to provide the poor with the key to self-sufficiency."

HOME ECONOMIST'S NOTES

ALL ABOUT GRAPEFRUIT

Grapefruit offers year-round eating enjoyment. But since it's in plentiful supply throughout January, now's a good time to give your family good time to give your family a taste treat.

Grapefruit sections or halves are always a welcome addition to the breakfast table. But for added meal-time enjoyment, why not make chilled grapefruit sections part of a fresh fruit platter or salad? Try sections combined with mandarin oranges or avocado.

When you buy grapefruit, you know it's ready to eat. State laws set the maturity level at which grapefruit can be picked and shipped out of state. Maturity, judged on the basis of juice, sugar and acid content, indicates the fruit is ready to eat.

Once picked, grapefruit will not ripen further, so

these laws are the consumer's assurance that all citrus in the market is ready to eat. Grapefruit is often "stored" on the tree after it matures. When this is done, the fruit becomes sweeter.

Firm, well-shaped fruit that is heavy for its size is usually the best for eating. Thin-skinned fruit usually has more juice than coarse-skinned grapefruit. Rough, ridged or wrinkled skin can also be a sign of thick skin, pulpiness and lack of juice.

Grapefruit often has skin defects such as scales, scars, thorn scratches or discoloration, but these do not usually affect the eating quality of the fruit.

Avoid soft fruit or fruit with discolored areas on the peel at the stem end. Also avoid grapefruit with water soaked areas, loss of bright color and a soft peel that breaks easily with finger

pressure. All are symptoms of decay and will probably affect flavor.

At the produce counter, you're the best judge of freshness and quality. Remember: Fresh fruit is perishable, so buy only what you need.

SWEET POTATO BREAD

Cream together:

2 1/2 c. sugar
1 cup soil

Add to mixture:

4 eggs (one at a time)

2 c. mashed sweet potatoes or 1 lb. can

3 1/2 c. all-purpose flour (Save 1/4 c. to coat nuts and dates)

2 t. baking soda

1 1/2 t. salt

1 t. nutmeg

1 t. cinnamon
1 t. allspice
1 t. vanilla

Mix:

1 cup chopped nuts)

1 cup chopped dates)

Coat these with 1/4 c. flour and fold into above mixture.

Fill four greased one pound coffee cans half full. Bake at 350 degrees F. for 1 hour. Grease cans with pan coating.

Pan Coating:

2 parts shortening -- 1 part flour (mix well and keep in refrigerator).

This bread is better if put in freezer couple of weeks.

COUNTY AGENT'S NOTES

FRUIT TREE DISEASE CONTROL:

If mature trees have not been treated with dormant oils to control scale insects, do so immediately. Application during the dormant period of a 3 percent lubricating oil emulsion or an emulsifiable oil at the strength recommended by the manufacturer will satisfactorily control scale insects.

PECANS:

Pecans are transplanted in the manner described for peaches. Again, do not add fertilizer at time of transplanting. You should prune the pecan transplant about one-third. This will give a more even distribution of the root/shoot ratio.

CARE OF YOUNG PECAN TREES:

Wrap trunks of newly transplanted trees with strips of burlap, heavy paper, or treated crepe paper to prevent sunscald and damage from wood boring insects. Wind the wrapping spirally from an inch above the ground to about 1 foot below the top after transplanted tree is cut back and tie with a cord. Keep the trunk wrapped for about two years, until top growth provides shade for the trunk.

FLOWERS PRUNING SHRUBS:

You can prune narrowleaf evergreens such as Pfitzer Juniper and Arborvitae in January and February. Narrowleaf evergreens prefer light shearing or tip pruning on a yearly basis to prevent the plants from getting out of bounds. Drastic and severe pruning on narrowleaf evergreens sometimes will yield disastrous results, since narrowleaf evergreens find it difficult to regain their former size.

You can prune broadleaf evergreens such as Burford's Holly, Photina, Viburnum, Ligustrum, Pittosporum, and Cleyera in late February. You should not prune broadleaf evergreens which offer early spring bloom, such as Azaleas, until after flowering in late spring.

Spring blooming shrubs which are now dormant and without leaves include Forsythia, Kerria, Weigela, and Spiraea. Since pruning at this time of year would prune off all the flowers on the stems, you should not prune these deciduous shrubs until after they flower.

Prune ornamental shade trees in late February. When removing a limb or

branch, be sure to make a clean, smooth cut. Cut as close to the trunk or branch as possible. This will assure proper healing of the wound.

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LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Editor:

I wonder if the economic impact on the farmer on our economy has, to a great extent, been overlooked or taken for granted.

We should all consider the number of jobs the American farmer generates. It will run well into the millions.

First, he generates jobs before he has planted the first seed. He must buy farm equipment and is responsible for the manufacture of farm machinery by such farm equipment companies as International Harvester, John Deere, J. E. Case, Ford Farm Equipment and others who employ many industrial workers both in management and in sales areas.

The farmer must buy fertilizer and soil building products, where producers employ another large group of workers. He must buy seed, creating another industry.

All these are multi-million dollar industries that would not be in business without him. Yet this is only the beginning.

Only four percent of our population is engaged in farming. This means, simply put, that four percent of us feed the other 96 percent.

Farming affects our financial community all the way from our local banks and Savings and Loan Associations to the Boards of Trade, Wall Street, and the Stock Market. It is involved in the shipping industry. And sales to other countries account for a large share of our balance of trade payments.

The farmer employs some help in his operation, but because he has to compete with industrial salaries, he does all the management and much of the manual labor himself.

In some instances he is put in competition with businesses he has indirectly helped to create.

In the actual growth of farm products, he takes a tremendous gamble. He must depend on relatively dry weather for cultivating and planting; and then on relatively wet weather for growth and production. Then again he needs dry weather to get his machinery into the fields for harvesting his crops.

After the harvest the number of beneficiaries is tremendous. Many multi-

million dollar industries come to mind.

The trucking industry is employed as he gets his grain to market.

The grain elevators, storage facilities, and related businesses exist solely for the handling of his grain.

The processors of wheat, soybean, cotton, cottonseed, rice, corn and other farm products do the initial processing, then channel these grains into other industries for further refining.

There are also the mills that refine grains into flour, meal, oil, cereals, and other products.

The canneries exist to process fruits and vegetables, and this industry is related to others, such as container products like Continental Can, glass manufacturers, the packaging industry with all its related paper and plastics suppliers.

The goods are handled all along the line until they come to the wholesale and retail grocers. Here again, we see many related employers. The wholesale grocery dealer must have trucks, salesmen, and clerical employees.

The retail grocer must buy equipment such as refrigerators, display cases, and all his store equipment, again from companies with high payrolls. He must employ personnel, pay for newspaper ads and other advertising. And the grocer has already contributed to the building industry when he built his outlet.

Finally, the farmer feeds us all so the rest can live and go about our jobs.

It could be that all of us who like to eat should lend him a helping hand.

This has barely touched the overall picture lightly. It would be most interesting to have actual figures from economists as to the number of jobs he generates and the number of people he sustains both here in America and abroad. But it does not take an economist to see that a very small segment of our society benefits more people than any other single group.

We should consider the farmer's situation and decide whether or not we are giving enough credit to these hard-working, tax-paying citizens who are contributing so much, and in return are receiving so little.

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
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
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Golden Wedding Anniversary

Educational Arm

FEED GRAIN PROGRAM SIGNUP NEARS: Starting Feb. 15, we will be accepting intentions to participate in the 1979 Feed Grain Program. Elmer A. South, Chairman of the Tishomingo ASC Committee, is available for information.

ers must file their intentions to participate during the sign-up period to be eligible for program benefits. "These benefits include price support loans on all eligible commodities produced, deficiency and disaster payments for barley, corn, sorghum, wheat or upland cotton on the participating farm." Farmers who participate are also eligible to use the grain reserve when it is open.

Provisions of the corn and sorghum program include a 10 percent set-aside and a 10 percent diversion. The wheat and barley program contains a 20 percent set-aside requirement. South said farmers may sign up for voluntary diversion payments on corn and sorghum. However, no advance voluntary diversion payments will be made for 1979 crops.

"Program participants help increase farm prices and also help to prevent an excessive build-up of wheat and feed grain stocks," he stated.

ASCS will accept applications for the 1979 program until April 16.

USE PRODUCER SERVICES, FARMERS ADVISED:

To avoid unnecessary worry about the loss of 1979 farm program benefits, the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service

advises farmers to use pre-measurement and other producer services.

"At the request of the producer, we will stake and measure acreages prior to crop planting time, Elmer A. South, Chairperson of the Tishomingo County ASC Committee, said. Producer services provided by the ASCS include measurement of set-aside land, field or subdivisions to be planted, total cropland, and land areas for other purposes.

"Fees vary, based on the type of service rendered." The services are guaranteed for the program year in which they are taken.

According to South, producers who take advantage of premeasurement are guaranteed the acreage in the areas measured. "This is important in helping them to plan which fields to plant and which to set aside."

The ASCS official encourages farmers to use producer services to assure

that they are in compliance and eligible for full 1979 farm program benefits, and to eliminate costly destruction of crops. To request the service, call or visit the local ASCS Office at 205 Eastport Street, Iuka, Miss. Phone 423-5036.
