Iuka **Unemployment Figures For** Woman Shot

A quarrel, which began on Friday, January 26, lead to the shooting of an luka resident, Minnie Ruth Mitcheli, on Sunday, January 28. According to the Tishomingo County Sheriff's De-

partment, Ms. Mitchell was shot twice by a .22 caliber pistol. She was shot once in the back and once in the shoulder by Lloyd Seay, also of Iuka. A Department spokesman

reported that on Friday a warrant was issued by Ms. Mitchell to have Mr. Seay removed from her home. He apparently returned on Sunday, shot Ms. Mitchell and fled in a 1971 Ford. The shooting took place in a public road just off

Eastport Street, after which Ms. Mitchell made her way to the home of Dorothy Mitchell where she phoned the authorities. Mr. Seay was picked up at

his home on Spring Street around 8:15 Sunday night, and was charged with attempted murder. He is being held in Tishomingo County Jail awaiting a preliminary hearing. The Tishomingo County

Hospital declined to make any comment on the victim's condition.

Mrs. Pruitt Heads Program

Tishomingo County's jobless rate rose 1.5 percent in December 1978, to reach 6.4 percent of the civilian labor force, or 490 individuals, according to Charles Smith, Corinth Area Manager of the Mississippi State Employment Service. This compares to 9.3 percent for the same period one year ago. Other estimates made by this agency reveal that 7,230 Tishomingo County residents were employed at the reporting period, approximately 30 less than the estimate in November and 200 below the estimate for the same period one year ago. The total civilian labor force for the county was estimated to be 7,730, only a minimal decrease from the November 1978 estimate but a substantial drop from

mate. Establishment based employment composed of manufacturing and nonmanufacturing employment, was estimated to be 4,850, a decline of approximately 50 from last month. This estimate includes all people working in Tishomingo County whether they reside there or in surrounding counties. Both manufacturing and nonmanufacturing

Tishomingo County Released industries experienced mi- last month and 280 from the nor changes. The yearly comparison also indicated a loss in establishment based employment where again in nonmanufacturing employment was offset by a loss in manufacturing.

Smith also stated that the current civilian labor force for the four-county area of Alcorn, Prentiss, Tippah, and Tishomingo stood at 40,-920, compared to 40,800 in November and 41,440 in December 1977. The estimated rate of unemployment, at 7.3 percent of the civilian labor force, was slightly more than the 6.6 percent of November but lower than the 8.6 percent of December one year ago. The number of employed persons, estimated to be 37 .-940, declined from 38,100 the December 1977 estiin November and rose from 37,890 in December one year ago. The major decrease from last month in employment was found in the Agri-

cultural group. Establishment based employment for the four-county area registered a net loss of 240 from last month but a gain of 200 from one year ago. A total of 15,150 workers were employed in manufacturing industries at mid-December, down by 220 from

nonmanufacturing industries, 14,690 were employed which represented a slight drop from the last estimate but a substantial rise of 490 was experienced from the estimate of one year ago.



Grapefruit sections or halves are always a welcome addition to the breakfast table. But for added meal-time enjoyment, why not make chilled grapefruit sections part of a fresh fruit platter or salad? Try sections combined with mandarin oranges or avocado.

When you buy grapefruit, you know it's ready to eat. State laws set the maturity level at which grapefruit can be picked and shipped out of state. Maturity, judged on the basis of juice, sugar and acid content, indicates the fruit is ready to eat.

skin can also be a sign of thick skin, pulpiness and lack of juice.

Grapefruit often has skin defects such as scales. scars, thorn scratches or discoloration, but these do not usually affect the eating quality of the fruit.

Avoid soft fruit or fruit with discolored areas on the peel at the stem end. Also avoid grapefruit with water soaked areas, loss of bright color and a soft peel that breaks easily with finger



You can prune broadleaf evergreens such as Burford's Holly, Photina, Viburnum, Ligustrum, Pittosporum, and Cleyera in late February. You should not prune broadleaf evergreens which offer early spring bloom, such as Azaleas, until after flowering in late spring.

Spring blooming shrubs which are now dormant and without leaves include Forsythia, Kerria, Weigela, and Spiraea, Since pruning at this time of year would prune off all the flowers on the stems, you should not prune these deciduous shrubs until after they flower. Prune ornamental shade

The focal point of the Franks family was always the warm, cozy kitchen where recipes were tested while homework was being done and family discussions took place. When cooking three meals a day for a family of ten (plus a few extras most of the time) much time was spent in the

kitchen. Mrs. Franks and herdaughters were always searching for a "better way" to do things. Simplicity, efficiency, economy, tastefulness and attractiveness in preparing meals with variety offered a continuing challenge. The daughters said "Many times our cupboards were practically bare but Mom would prepare fantastic meals with whatever she had on hand.

Our family discovered that ten members of this creativity can be expresssmall town South- ed in cooking as well as

other forms of art. We wanted to share what we'd learned with everybody else so we decided to write and publish "ECONOMY EAT-ING". We'd talked for 15 years about writing a cook-

book but always procrastinated. Then one day we just decided to get started. We call this our contribu-

much success already.

The most recent autograph party was held Thursday night at the luka Public Library and attended by many local people. Many of the Memphis bookstores have hosted tasting and autograph parties and many more have been booked for February, March and April.

Lee and Alta conducted a cooking demonstration at the John Simmons Shop in Memphis last Saturday.

The three sisters appeared on three television shows in Memphis: the "Good Morning From Memphis Show", the "Marg Thrasher Straight Talk Show", and The Peggy Rolfe's Noon Show". The Commercial Appeal and other newspap-

ers have featured articles on the book. It has really created a lot of interest and is a very timely topic.

The three women are marketing the book themselves. A number of publishers are interested in taking the book and adding color pictures and a color cover and increasing the price, but the authors say they'll probably keep printing and marketing the book themselves.

A national bookstore chain has taken the books to seven states already and plans are to go national with it.

The Franks sisters combine a variety of knowledge and work experience. Their background and careers cover a range of activities and experiences. They all are very civic and business minded individuals.

Ruth owns and operates her own printing business and has just recently become a publisher. She is the wife of Lee Roy Lovelace and has two teenaged daughters, Sherry and Lee Ann.

Alta has owned and operated two jewelry stores, was in the printing business for years and has managed numerous other businesses, and was a personnel consultant prior to publishing the book. Her sisters call

her "Colonel Parker" because she's the talker and promoter. She's married to Louis Zisk.

Lee, until recently, managed an exclusive dress shop in Memphis. She resigned to market the book. She is a former high school teacher and has owned and operated two nursery schools, a health spa, a modeling and self-improvement school, ran for county court, and was vice president of the Kirby Woods Mall Merchants Association in Memphis. She is married to Dr. Roy H. Williams and has two teenage daughters, Angela and Page.



Provisions of the corn and sorghum program include a 10 percent set-aside and a 10 percent diversion. The wheat and barley program contains a 20 percent set-aside requirement. South said farmers may sign up for voluntary diversion payments on corn and sorghum. However, no advance voluntary diversion payments will be made for 1979 crops.

"Program participants help increase farm prices and also help to prevent an excessive build-up of wheat and feed grain stocks," he stated.

ASCS will accept applications for the 1979 program until April 16.

PRODUCER SER-USE VICES, FARMERS AD-VISED:

To avoid unnecessary worry about the loss of 1979 farm program benefits, the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service

advises farmers to use premeasurement and other producer services.

"At the request of the producer, we will stake and measure acreages prior to crop planting time, Elmer A. South, Chairperson of the Tishomingo County ASC Committee, said. Producer services provided by the ASCS include measurement of set-aside land, field or subdivisions to be planted, total cropland, and land areas for other purposes. "Fees vary, based on the type of service rendered." The services are guaranteed for the program year in which they are taken.

According to South, producers who take advantage of premeasurement are guaranteed the acreage in the areas measured. "This is important in helping them to plan which fields to plant and which to set aside." The ASCS official encour-

ages farmers to use producer services to assure

that they are in compliance and eligible for full 1979 farm program benefits, and to eliminate costly destruction of crops. To request the service, call or visit the local ASCS Office at 205 Eastport Street, Iuka, Miss. Phone 423-5036.






