

TVA Stresses Public Safety At Yellow Creek Nuclear Power Plant Site

TVA's Public Safety Service, a service organization in the Division of Property and Services, is an installation located at all major dams, steam plants, and nuclear power plants. Composed of 23 persons presently, Public Safety is onsite at Yellow Creek 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. The day shift is the largest patrol unit, while

> The Public Safety ambulances function in coordion the project. "On each run that is made," Emerson noted, "a TVA nurse must be picked up." Most Public Safety officers are EMT (Emergency Medical Technician) trained, and Emerson's goal is to have each officer EMT trained. EMT training consists of 96

hours in 10 days. Lieutenant Bob Waddell from Counce, Tenn., is the firefighting specialist for the group and conducts a fire drill on the project every two weeks covering extinguishers, equipment, and unusual procedures. Each officer is required to attend one session per month. He also conducts and attends training sessions throughout the Valley.

Currently, Yellow Creek is the third nuclear power plant in the TVA system with its own public safety building and emergency equipment under one roof. Public Safety officers patrol the site constantly. The construction controlled area has been fenced to provide better control and security measures. A gatehouse will be established in the near future, and plant access will be available only by proper identification. Emerson added that he hopes to have a video camera system installed at strategic locations throughout the plant in the next few months. He noted that anyone having business would facilitate processing. Except for those authorized to enter the construction area, all visits must be approved by project man-

agement. Most Yellow Creek Public Safety officers have four or five years of previous public safety work, and all are deputized and bonded in Tishomingo County. According to Emerson, "About 98 percent of the officers hired in the last four or five years have been college graduates."

Any new officer has to qualify with his service revolver during the first 90 days; qualifying means making a 70-percent score on the firing range.

Emerson noted that when a public safety organization is begun at a new location, at least 5 or 6 people have to be brought in from other locations. Of the 20 officers here, 8 were hired here while the 12 others transferred from other areas. Of the 8 men hired here, 2 are from luka; 1 is from Corinth; 1 is from Tishomingo; 3 are from Alabama; and 1 is from Tennessee. The transfer breakdown includes 8 from Alabama, 3 from Mississippi, and 1 from Tennessee,

in sixteen weeks. Weight-Off-Wisely is a sixteen week program to help people lose weight through sensible eating, nutrition information, and exercising. Too many people are turning to fad diets, pills and gadgets in effort to lose weight. These often lead to poor nutrition, economic loss and bad health.

The first objective of Weight-Off-Wisely participants will be to obtain their desirable weight through dieting and exercising. They will learn the principles of good nutrition and will change eating habits. If participants will follow eating habits once desirable weight has been achieved, it

will be maintained. The weekly classes are pretty well divided between nutrition and personal improvement, with nutrition getting the emphasis. Each session will include a weighin, exercise, and a brief

FmHA Sets Interest Rate

The interest rate on rural housing loans made by the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) of the U.S. Department of Agriculture

Last year the agency made 1588 loans in Mississippi to families of moderate income, and 3032 loans to lowincome families. Moderateincome borrowers pay the full interest rate. Lowincome families may qualify for actual interest payments as low as 1 percent under "interest credit" provisions of the national housing

FmHA officials said the 1/4-point increase to 9 percent full rate is necessary to keep the interest rate to borrowers in line with the government's cost of money. The agency lends funds derived from sale of government securities to the pub-

FmHA Mississippi state director Mark Hazard said loan applications approved before the close of business at FmHA offices on Feb. 9 will receive the 8-3/4 percent interest rate remaining in effect until that time.

The rate change applies to FmHA Section 502 insured loans for single-family housing, Section 515 loans for rental housing -- including multi-family apartment projects -- and Section 524 loans for homesite development. "Interest credit" benefits may be applied to reduce actual payments for low-income single family housing, and for multifamily projects serving senior citizens and others of low income.

FmHA insured loans are made directly from the agency's county offices serving rural areas including communities of up to 20,000 population (10,000 in Standard Metropolitan Statistical Area counties). The agency also guarantees housing loans made by other lenders to families with above-moderate income. Interest rates on guaranteed loans are negotiated between borrower and lend-

The maximum income for a single individual is \$4,710. Maximum income levels for families is as follows: for two, \$6,210; for three, \$7,-700; for four, \$9,300; for five, \$10,830; for six, \$12,-360. Depending on the level of poverty, families with more than six members may add from \$1,075 to \$1,530 for each additional member.

Persons previously served by EEAP will not be eli gible. Payments for those qualifying for assistance will be for energy-related emergencies which occurred between Jan. 1, 1978, and May 1, 1978.

Newly appointed NMCAA Director Paul Walker Tomlinson pointed out that while the payments will reimburse utility payments from last year, the funds will actually help pay this winter's energy-related costs.

Fuel and utility bills which are eligible include operating cook stoves, lights, water, furnaces, space heaters, wood-burning heaters and refrigerators. The funds can also be used to cover such items as warm clothing, blankets and temporary space heaters. Telephone bills are not eligible for payment.

Community action officials stress that applicants must be able to prove they incurred an energy-related hardship in the period covered.

The Emergency Energy Assistance Program marks the first project undertaken in the local agency's housing and weatherization program. Weatherization programs for the poor have been a part of the national Community Action Agency services since 1974.

Driving **Fitness**

Are you fit to drive?

Before you automatically reply "Of course," take stock of your mental attitude and physical condition. You may be unsafe behind the wheel, both to yourself and to others on the

You may think you are in good health. You may have an excellent safety record. Yet, under certain circumstances, it can be dangerous for you to be in the driver's seat.

The American Medical Association reminds that the emotional stability of the driver is as important as any single factorin maintaining traffic satety. That's why you owe it to others and to yourself - not to drive when you have serious problems on your mind. If you're thinking about that argument you had before you left home or office; if you're in a depressed or angry "I don't care what happens' mood; if you're very worried about a personal problem, you're better off not

The sleepy driver causes



many accidents. In fact, sleepy driver is as much of a hazard as a drinking one. Dozing at the wheel can occur in broad daylight as well as at night. When making long trips, rest every two hours and drink coffee or cola to stay alert.

Many medicines, not just a few, can affect the way in which you handle the wheel. Certain commonly used drugs such as antihistamines, cold tablets and mild sedatives may dull your reflexes or impair your coordination. Stimulants can make you nervous. Tranquilizing drugs can cloud your judgment and interfere with driving skills. Consult your doctor about the side effects of any drugs you

Driving calls for clear, healthy eyesight, good side vision, judgment of distance and the ability to see well at night. Have your eyes tested regularly. If you have glasses for distance vision, don't forget to wear

If you have a nervous disorder or a heart condition, ask your doctor whether you are a safe driver. This also applies as you get older. Past 65, reflexes and coordination tend to be somewhat slower.

"We are very pleased at this time to offer outpatient, partial hospitalization, children's services, aftercare, consultation and education, and alcohol and drug services in all four counties," Hunninen said,

"We hope by September to have all ten planned comprehensive services fully operable. We will be adding inpatient services, screening services, and emergency services."

Timber Hills continues to operate a day training program for developmentally disabled adults in each of the four counties, funded in part by Title XX of the

State Department of Public the governing authority for Welfare.

Residential alcohol rehabilitation services are available to male residents of all four counties at the agency's Haven House in Corinth. Funding for this program is in part by Title XX, state alcohol tax money, and by a Mississippi Department of Mental Health

From a large gas producing area 200 miles off the Texas coast, a major offshore natural gas transmission system recently was completed to the Louisiana coast.




