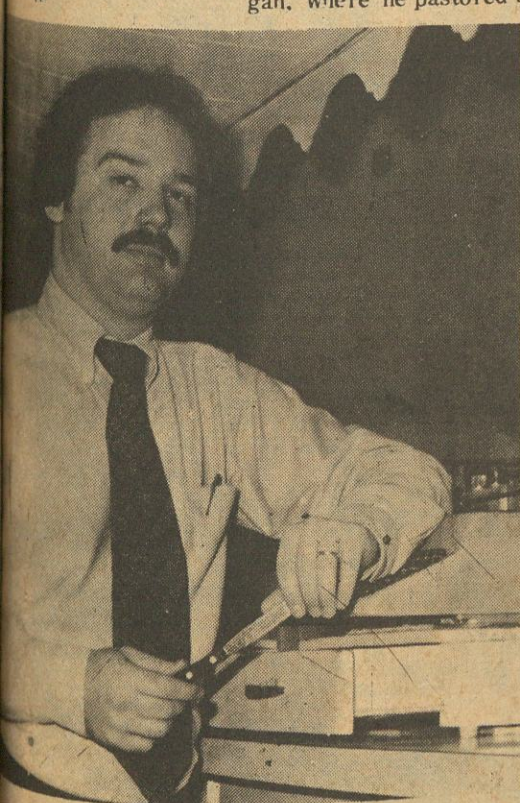

Jim Herring Announces Candidacy For Governor



Today I announce my can-
didacy for the Democratic

HOME ECONOMIST'S NOTES

BUYING LINENS

With the present emphasis on individuality and coordinated interiors, the most private rooms in the house -- the bedrooms and baths -- get special consideration. The right linens for these rooms can contribute to the total decorating plan.

Choice is sometimes difficult because of the variety of fibers, sizes, qualities, colors, decorative features and styles available. Important factors to consider are the use, beauty, quality, cost and the care required. Learn to read labels for such information as:

- * Size
- * Fiber content
- * Construction - the length, width & thread count
- * Special finishes
- * Expected service -- the amount of shrinkage to expect and the strength of the yarns
- * Care required
- * Name of the manufacturer

THREE AREAS OF COLOR

The walls, floors and ceilings of a room are the background for your furnishings. You will find the results more pleasing if you

keep these background colors soft and soothing. Since they represent a major investment, plan them carefully. Your window treatment also becomes an important part of your background.

Your chairs and sofa represent the second largest area of color in the room. Use brighter, stronger, deeper colors here. A good rule of thumb is to use not more than three colors, no matter how many pieces of furniture you have. The smaller the piece the brighter the tone can be.

Accents and accessories are the bright sparks. They include lamp bases, ash trays, pictures, other decorative accessories and pillows. You can let yourself go here with sharper, vivid colors. But be sure these accents relate to the colors of background and upholstery.

Don't forget the wood tones. The color of the tables and other wood pieces is also an important part of your color plan. Select the finish of each individual piece to blend with the scheme. Don't try to match every piece.

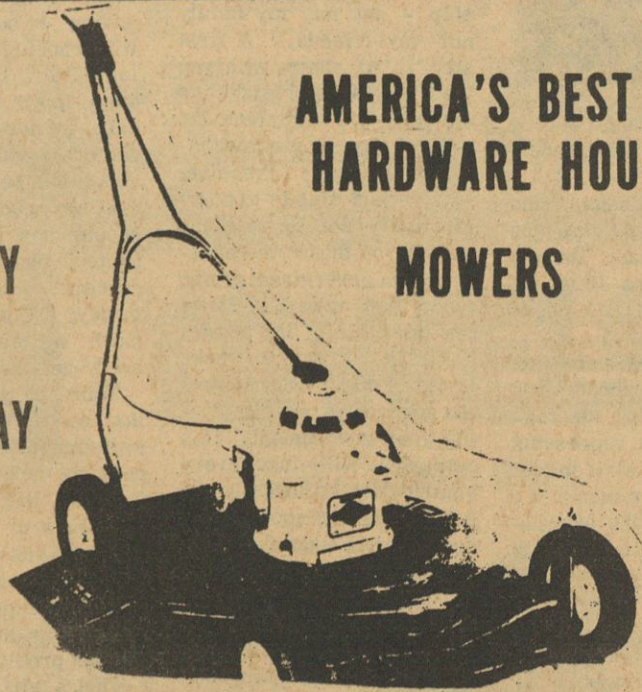

QUICK ORANGE MUFFINS

2 cups flour
1 tsp. baking powder
1/2 cup sugar
3/4 teaspoon salt
5 tsp. shortening
2 tsp. grated orange rind
1 egg, well beaten
1/2 cup orange juice

Sift dry ingredients, cut in shortening. Add orange rind. Combine beaten egg and orange juice and add to first mixture, stirring only until flour is moist. Fill greased muffin tins 2/3 full. Bake 15 to 20 minutes at 425 degrees. Yield 12 muffins.

COUNTY AGENT'S NOTES

QUAIL FEED:

Landowners should carefully clip pastures and weedy areas to avoid destroying quail or turkey nests. Honeysuckle or blackberry patches next to field borders are especially good nesting areas.

Disking in early spring at a depth of four to six inches next to suitable cover can produce quail feed in some areas. To determine if you can provide quail feed by disking, check a nearby area that has been plowed and left unplanted. If there are sufficient quantities of quail feed, disking is the method to use. If you were not able to plant bicolor seedlings, you might try planting the seeds from April 1 to May 15. Bicolor plots should be one-eighth to one-fourth acre in size.

Cowpeas which furnish food for quail in late summer and early fall should be planted May 1 to June 1. Browntop millet can also

be planted for quail feed.

BIRDS MAY DAMAGE PINES:

Blackbirds and starlings may severely damage or kill pine stands.

Researchers in Georgia measured damage to a loblolly pine stand about 10 acres in size where blackbirds and starlings roosted. The trees were 14 years old. Over a four-year period, one million roosting birds killed 9 percent of the pines in about a five-acre area, resulting in a loss of \$128 per acre.

About 2.5 acres of the roost site were treated with a surfactant solution at the rate of 6.6 gallons per acre to control the birds. There was no adverse effect on roost vegetation from the treatment.

Set-aside cover must be approved, South says. Farmers who sign up for the feed grain and wheat program agree to set-aside one acre for every ten planted in 1979 to corn and sorghum and two acres for every ten planted to wheat and barley, Elmer A. South, Chairperson of the ASC Committee, said. The acreage designated as set-aside must be devoted to an approved conservation practice that will protect the land from weeds and wind and water erosion. "This protection must be established on the set-aside land

as soon as practical after the beginning of the normal period for planting spring crops." South said that approved set-aside cover excludes a number of crops such as corn, cotton, grain sorghum and soybeans. "Some producers initially planted these crops in 1978, not planning to comply with the program, and then designated the acreage as set-aside after experiencing a disaster. Farmers will be considered out of compliance in such cases, and crops planted in the spring or summer that are not approved will not be authorized for set-aside or voluntary diversion." Set-aside acres must be crop-

that the set-aside and voluntary diversion will be adequately protected.

Cost-share funds suspended on some herbicides - Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland recently announced that effective March 1, 1979, the cost-share funds and technical assistance would be dropped for agricultural conservation practices requiring herbicides 2,4,5-T and 2,4,5-TP. The herbicides are used to control brush and weeds on forest, pasture, range and rights of way. "Secretary Bergland does not want to take even a remote chance that any of our programs will result in a health hazard to the American people," Elmer A. South, Chairperson of the Tishomingo County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committee, said. "We will review cost-share agreements with farmers and ranchers to insure that modifications are made to comply with the suspension order." He noted that there is an exception. The U. S. Department of Agriculture would continue to provide financial and technical assistance to farmers or ranchers using 2,4,5-T on range land and in rice fields. In its emergency suspension order, the Environmental Protection Agency did not restrict these practices. South urged that all persons with questions about compliance procedures contact the Tishomingo County ASCS Office.

Value Of Co. Farm Production

The value of farm production in Tishomingo County was up about \$850,000 in 1978 to a value of almost \$8 1/2 million. This is in line with the statewide increase, where the value of production reached \$2,495 billion -- a record value for the second year in a row.

Several factors contributed to the increase, the two most important being higher yields and better prices. In early spring, the cattle cycle turned around and cattlemen finally started making a profit. Livestock producers had lost money for several years because of low cattle prices. Beef cattle is still the 4th leading income producer in the country with a 1978 value of \$1 1/3 million. Soybeans are first with a value of almost \$1 4/5 million. Forest products is 2nd with a value of \$1 3/4 million. Income from swine is 3rd, valued at \$1 1/2 million.

Both cotton and soybean yields increased over 1977 and prices received for both commodities were as good or better than the year before. The county's 15,500-acre soybean crop was valued at \$1,857,600. Cotton averaged 400 pounds of lint per acre on 415 acres for a value of almost \$135,000. Corn, hogs, hay, horticulture and other miscellaneous crops amounted to an additional \$2 1/2 million. While most farmers in the county made some money

last year, they certainly did not recover from the past two or three lean years. Inflation hit the farmers especially hard. They must buy their machinery, fertilizers, pesticides, and other crop and livestock inputs at retail, and sell their products at wholesale. And

they have no control over either. While many of us may complain about slightly higher food prices, I think we will all agree that higher prices are better than the alternative -- a food shortage. Like the rest of us, farmers must make a profit to stay in business.

The agricultural program in Tishomingo County is aimed at helping farmers use their resources in the most profitable manner. The Tishomingo County Extension Service is a full partner in the statewide agricultural development program called III by '83. Sponsored by the Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service, III by '83 has a goal of increasing the value of production in the state to \$3 billion annually by 1983.

The projected agricultural income in Tishomingo County for 1983 is about \$13 million. This goal can be reached and even surpassed if farmers in most commodity areas will use the total package of recommendations from Extension and follow good management practices.

The outlook for agriculture is good this year. Very little cotton will be planted in Tishomingo County this year. The soybean outlook is fair, with acreage expected to remain about the same. Beef prices are expected to remain strong because of the reduction in cattle numbers. The outlook for forestry is good. Increasing productivity of private timberlands under ideal conditions would raise the economic output. Other crops are expected to remain about the same in acreage but should have an increased value.

Burnsville Library News

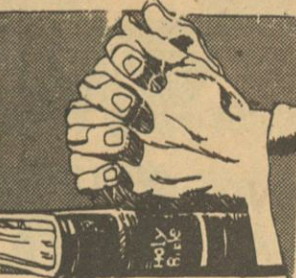

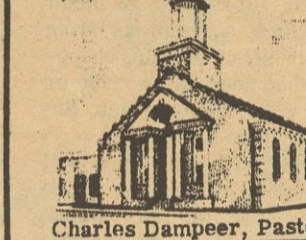

REPORT TO MISSISSIPPIANS



The Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway has been analyzed over and over again from every angle. It has met every challenge -- in the Congress, by the administration and through the courts. However, the greatest test of this project will come after it is completed and the economic benefits are measured. I expect the Tennessee-Tombigbee to pass the test with flying colors, with benefits greater than any of the current estimates.

The initial annual benefits from the Tennessee-Tombigbee are estimated at \$107 million, progressing to \$143 million. Those are impressive figures which reflect the soundness of our investment in this project which will be a link between the Tennessee, Ohio and Upper Mississippi Rivers on the north, and the Port of Mobile and Gulf Intracoastal Waterway on the south.

However, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers has historically been conservative in estimating future benefits of navigation projects, so the benefits could very well add up to much more than we can imagine now.

The Tennessee River navigation project carries more than 10 times the annual tonnage estimated for its justification at the time of construction. The Upper Mississippi River navigation project exceeded projections seven times over within 10 years of completion, and the Ohio River navigation project carries 10 times the traffic originally projected. The Gulf Intracoastal Waterway between New Orleans and Mobile exceeded projections eight times over in the first eight years of operation.

The most recently completed major navigation project is the Arkansas River project, from the Mississippi River to Tulsa, Oklahoma. The projected traffic estimate when the project was built was that it would reach 13.2 million tons in 1984. At the present rate of growth the traffic will be 19 million tons by that date.

The Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway is already exceeding predictions of the economic growth its construction would stimulate. Prior to construction of the project, economists predicted that \$2.6 billion in new industry would come to the area by the year 2000 as a result of the Waterway. That figure has almost been reached in 1979, as \$2.4 billion in new industry has been announced in Mississippi and Alabama Counties near the Waterway since 1972.

In 1972 it was predicted that 28,000 new jobs would be created. It is now projected that 135,000 new jobs will result by the year 2000.

Although some limited navigation benefits will be realized as the project proceeds, it is essentially a through waterway -- the real benefits can not begin to be realized until the project is completed. Therefore the cost of delaying the Tennessee-Tombigbee for any reason would be tremendous. There are no valid, new and compelling reasons to propose the delay of this project, or its termination.

The newest challenge to the Tennessee-Tombigbee is in the form of a bill filed by a Senator from Wisconsin calling for deauthorization of the project. I will fight this bill with the proven facts in favor of the project. I believe the Tennessee-Tombigbee will withstand this test as it has all others.

I will continue to strongly urge the continuation of construction of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway at the maximum efficient speed, so as to complete this new link in our inland water transportation system and to realize the very large annual regional and national benefits. This project will pay for itself in benefits. Its construction is an investment in the future, and will bring economic benefits for generations to come.

It has deserved the support it has received from Congress and from three administrations, and I believe that strong support will continue.

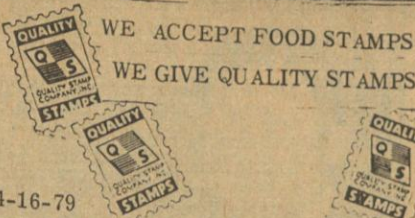

All 1942 cars were classed as new and selling them subjected the owner to the same penalty as that meted out to a dealer. Exception -- Owners who are called to the Armed Services. Other folk could sell only to government approved purchasers.

Good-Bye Trouser Cuffs: Men's clothing stores began that week to snip the part of new trousers that was left to make cuffs. The wool was reclaimed and used again (recycling is not a new thing).
