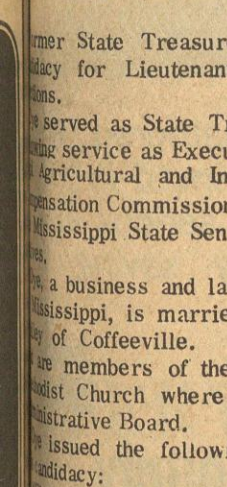

The Dyes have three sons who are members of the Galloway Memorial United Methodist Church where he serves on the Church's Administrative Board. Dye issued the following statement in announcing his candidacy:

"First, I would like to express my appreciation for the support and encouragement I have received from the people of Mississippi, recently and in the past. I had intended to announce my candidacy for Lieutenant Governor last month, but, like so many of you, my family and I on the Easter Weekend became victims of the worst flood in the Pearl River's history. TVA Delays Construction Of One Nuclear Reactor At Yellow Creek Plant

The Yellow Creek Facility, near Iuka, will be one of the three nuclear plants the Tennessee Valley Authority plans to slow construction work on, according to a spokesman.

The "adjustments in construction schedules" are aimed at "creating a better

fit" between generating capacity and power needs in the mid and late 1980's, said George Kimmons, manager of engineering and construction for TVA. He stated that delays would keep TVA from having to borrow millions of dollars needed to complete the plants on

their original schedule. He also said the areas served by the three plants do not need the amount of electricity that would have been generated if the four reactors had been built on schedule, beginning operations in the mid-1980's. Although TVA still plans to build two units at Yellow Creek, it will now build them one at a time, Kimmons said.

will stay in the Tishomingo County area longer than expected, causing more stable levels of employment and no "steep peaks" in the number of workers, he said.

The decision will hit the Hartsville, Tenn. plant the hardest where 3,500 workers are building the Plant B units that will be delayed, a spokesman said.

"It is at the B Plant in Hartsville where this thing will have the most effect because the work there is so far along. The effect at Phipps Bend and Yellow Creek is going to be less because the work there is just getting underway," the spokesman also said.

TVA does not know how many workers at the plants will be transferred or laid off, although a total of about 3,000 at the three plants will be affected by the decision, said John Schlatter, a TVA spokesman in Knoxville.

The Yellow Creek Plant is now 6.8 percent completed, but construction of the second unit has only recently begun. A spokesman said work on the second unit will be stopped at the next convenient point.

Kimmons said TVA has "no intent whatsoever of moving away from nuclear power." He said the decision "has nothing to do with Three Mile Island," referring to the March accident at a Pennsylvania nuclear plant.

Firm figures on the revised costs of the plants are not yet available, Kimmons said. Under the original schedule, Yellow Creek was expected to cost \$2.15 billion.

Work at Yellow Creek, where 2,000 persons are now employed, began in February, 1978, and was originally scheduled for completion in 1985.

In an effort to aid the handicapped children of our area, the Iuka Public Schools in cooperation with the State Department of Education and other public agencies who serve handicapped children, is extending efforts to identify, locate, and evaluate children under 21 years of age in need of special educational opportunities.

These agencies need this information to determine present and future program and placement needs, and for statistical reporting as the state moves toward the goal of providing educational opportunities to all handicapped children under 21 by 1980.

The handicapped children will include those who have one or a combination of the following disabilities: developmental delay, mental retardation, emotional handicaps, hearing impairments, language or speech impairments, physical handicaps, specific learning disabilities and visual impairments.

All information gathered will be confidential and will be maintained at a central location of the Iuka Public Schools. The information will assist officials in a student's personal, social, academic and vocational development.

Parents and guardians maintain the right to inspect all data collected and to appeal the accuracy of such information. The access of unauthorized persons to personally identifiable data without parental consent will be prohibited.

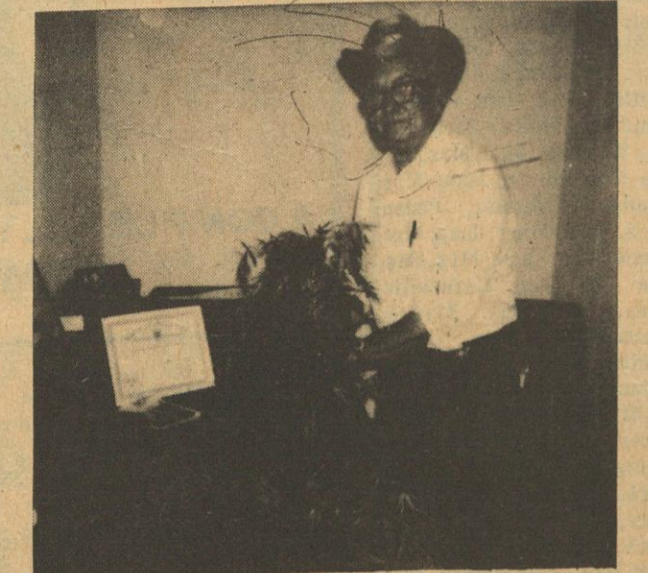

HOME ECONOMIST'S NOTES

WHO BUYS NEW PRODUCTS?

More than 6, 500 people were polled to determine which shoppers have the highest predisposition toward new products. Results show 18.7 percent bought something new on their most recent shopping trip. Half of these tried one new item; 3 percent purchased two or three.

Many factors influence shoppers' decisions to try new merchandise. For instance, those living in an area one year or less are three times as likely to buy a new item than neighborhood veterans of three to five years. Condominium and apartment dwellers are most apt to put something new in the market bag than

shoppers who live in houses. Similarly, renters are more prone to buy new items than are homeowners.

Divorced or separated individuals say they are most susceptible to new items than are singles, and both are more inclined to try a new product than are married couples.

Children have a positive effect on the purchase of new items. Parents with one or two kids are much more likely to try a breakfast cereal or chocolate bar. Childless shoppers are much less likely to experiment with something different.

The under-25 crowd is three times as inclined to try new items as the 25 to 34 group. Blacks also tend to buy more new products, as do those who attend col-

lege. Women who work part-time are more partial to new items than full-time working women.

HOW'S YOUR SHOPPING ETIQUETTE?
Check yourself. See how many of your answers are "yes".

- Be courteous to sales personnel and other customers.

- Wait your turn, and be sure your shopping is complete before entering a check-out lane.

- Report accidental breakage or damage to sales personnel.

- If you change your mind about an item, return it to its proper place.

- Avoid soiling, rumpling or stretching items when inspecting them and avoid unnecessarily handling of perishable foods.

- Always keep aisles and doorways clear.

- Learn when the store is least crowded. If possible, shop when stores are least crowded.

- Keep children under control.

1 1-lb. box frozen strawberries or 2 c. sweetened fresh strawberries

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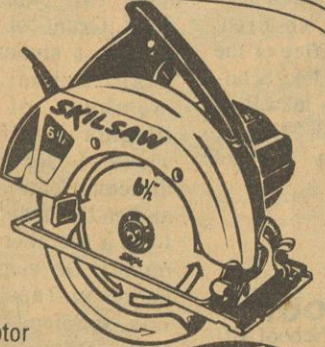

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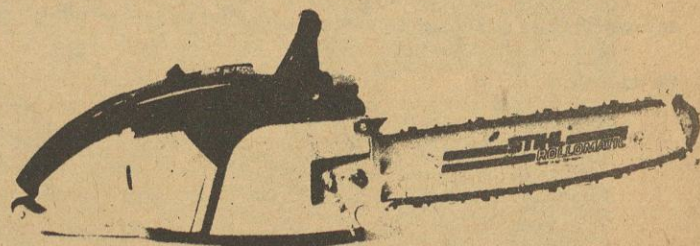

Seeing Double At Iuka Elementary School

Good things come in pairs, two peas in a pod, by two or another word these phrases is TWINS. The first set of twins that I remember hearing about are Jacob and Esau. If we were able to speak for a moment to the parents of these two, Isaac and Rebecca, we could probably get some helpful hints on raising twins. These boys, from what I can see, were not identical, but nevertheless were twins. The word twins is defined as being two separate but closely related similar things. There are identical twins (of the same sex and usually difficult to tell apart) and fraternal twins (may be one boy one girl, may be of the same sex but are easier to tell apart). Twins are two children, born to the same mother, at the same time - in other words, double dia-

pers, double bottles, double colic - but - double joy. The chance of having twins is said to be about 1 in 96 births and the tendency to have twins is believed to be hereditary.

It is believed that the heaviest living twins at birth, together weighed 27 3/4 lbs and the lightest surviving twins together weighed 2 lbs. and 3 ozs. It is also said that one mom gave birth to 16 sets of twins.

Twins are a familiar sight at the Iuka Elementary School. From an enrollment of about 620 students, sixteen of them make up eight sets of twins. The sixteen agree that there are advantages and disadvantages to being twins. The one advantage they all agreed on, every emphatically, was being able to play tricks on the teacher. Two such instances were

related by teachers about some of the twins. One mother gave one of her twins a dollar bill to share with his brother, and he tore the bill in half, giving one half to the brother and keeping one half. Another set of twins had a habit of switching papers. Two sets of the twins are first graders, four sets second graders, and one set of fourth graders and one set of 5th graders. The twins are usually separated in the classroom, so they do not become too dependent upon each other. Some of them are also very identical in looks. One teacher states she watches for a "small beauty mark" to identify the twins she teaches.

Some parts of the country have "Twin Clubs" where Moms and twins meet and enjoy exchanging ideas on caring for twins. None of these clubs are believed to exist in our area.

REGULATION GOVERNING MOBILE HOME PARKS
Section B. Permits 201.16 General Provisions

It shall be unlawful for any person to construct, maintain, or operate any mobile home park within the State of Mississippi unless he holds a valid permit issued annually by the health authority in the name of such person for the specific mobile home park. All applications for permits shall be made, prior to any construction of the park, to the Tishomingo County Health Department which shall approve the application when all requirements are met.

A mobile home park is defined as: "Any plot of ground upon which two or more mobile homes, occupied for dwelling or sleeping purposes, are located." Any person now operating a mobile home park without a permit, needs to contact the Tishomingo County Health Department at 423-6100. M-17-c.

Quality Management Plan. Response ranged from "full speed ahead" in Alcorn County to "let's keep status quo" in Tishomingo County, Norris said. Residents in Prentiss County again sought support for agriculture interests.

In a light turnout in Alcorn County, participants at the hearing voiced strong support for the plan and urged pushing ahead alleconomic programs. Emphasis in Alcorn County was on support for industrial development to utilize the Yellow Creek Inland Port facilities. Corinth Mayor John D. Mercier and Tennessee Valley Authority representative Sam Hixon reserved the right to comment on the plan until May 15 but both expressed qualified approval.

At Tishomingo County, a large crowd actively engaged in hot debate to maintain the tranquility of status quo. A majority of the participants feared any federal projects would result in more taxation. Norris pointed out several times that Public Law 92-500 and its amendments precludes taxation to build, operate and maintain wastewater treatment systems. "Before a system can be built, a user charge structure must be implemented making sure that only those who use the system will pay for its services," Norris stated, "In the past, most systems were operated by taxing the people."

Satisfied that the local 208 plan does not call for any action in Tishomingo County in the coming year, the Tishomingo County citizens said they would be glad for the cities to handle their own wastewater treatment needs if the rural parts of the county remain undeveloped.

One Tishomingo County official stated after the hearing that those in attendance do not indicate the feelings of all Tishomingo Countians.

There was no turnout in Prentiss County. At previous hearings, citizens and officials pushed for implementation of a Prentiss County Community Service District similar to the one in Alcorn County. The district will build, operate and maintain sewage treatment facilities in the areas of Prentiss County not under jurisdiction of any municipality. The district would operate in cooperation with city governments in Prentiss County.

Prentiss County officials have been particularly interested in supporting the farmers if dissatisfaction arises with the state 208 non-point source control program.

Sales Tax

A decrease in business activities in Tishomingo County was noted in March over February with the municipalities taking in a total of \$31,271.56 in March, down from the February sales tax collection of \$31,997.60. All towns except Belmont and Golden, showed a decrease, according to the data released in the monthly issues of Mississippi Municipalities

magazine.

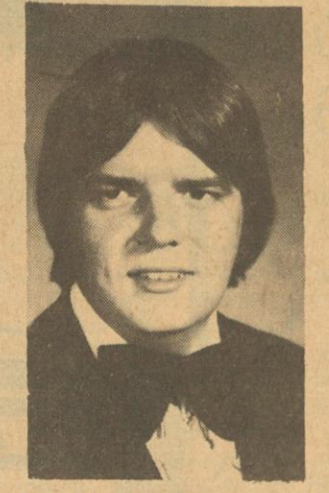

A First In West Tenn.

WEST TENNESSEE STOCK DOG TRIAL - The West Tennessee Stock Dog Trial Show will be May 19 and 20, beginning each day at 9 a.m. - rain or shine - at Wayne's Charolais Ranch, Hwy. 57, 6 miles west of Pickwick Dam, Tenn. Border Collie Dogs are usually used in these events. Many of these dogs are imported from the Highlands of Scotland. It is believed that the working collie was imported as early as 1800. This breed of dog has helped improve the conditions for sheep farming in the west. According to Robert Barlow, of Counce, Tenn., four of these dogs penned about 500 steers in one day on a huge Texas ranch. The completion of this job had previously taken thirteen men and several days of work. Owners and trainers of these dogs come from as far away as Ontario, Canada. Several dogs will compete in the show on May 19 and 20. A point of interest is the field trial. In the trial the Handler will stand in a circle with the sheep in a collapsible pen about 200 yards away. The dog stands with the Handler at the Handler's command the dog gathers the sheep herding them through three gates and the handler's circle twice in the process of herding them into a pen, which will probably be a stock trailer. The winning dog is determined by scores in six different areas: outrun, lift to, fetch, drive, penning and shedding. Each area carries points making a total of 55 points to be reached in twelve minutes. The judge for this contest will be Foy Evans, of Hiwassee, Ark. Mr. Evans has been raising these dogs for about 25 years and showing them for the past 10 years. He has shown dogs in six states, including the Bluegrass Trials in Lexington, Ky. He is on the Board of Directors for the American Sheep Dog Society. Foy Evans, Charles Race, Pottersville, Ark., and Arthur Allen, McClellanville, Ill., wrote the rules for catalog trials for the American Sheep Dog Society. Mr. Allen is also the author of the book "Border Collies in America."

This is a first in West Tennessee, a lot of fun for all, and a must for the cattleman. Entrants for this show are expected from 11 states and Canada. The Southside PTO, of Pickwick Dam, is sponsoring this show. The work in preparing for this event has also been shared by the Shiloh-Pickwick Lions Club. The admission is \$1.50 for adults and \$1.00 under 12. Refreshments will be served and all proceeds will go to the library fund for the Southside School. The Southside School was completely destroyed by fire on Christmas Eve, 1976. The new building is expected to be completed for the 1979-80 school session. The citizens and interested persons have a great desire to equip this new facility with a usable, well-stocked library and other needed educational materials. They feel that using proceeds from such things as the

COTTON WEED CONTROL: Cotton six inches tall or taller is large enough for use of "hotter" herbicide mixtures. MSMA plus dinoseb, Bladex or Karmex can be applied on cotton this size and will generally give better total weed control. Do not apply MSMA after cotton starts blooming.

This information was in the contents of the letter: "Your Commander - In - Chief Says: Dear Mr. Sibley: (Mr. Sibley, President, United Service Organizations) Not by machines alone will we win this war.

Unitedly, unstintingly, and

without interruption or delay, we have solemnly promised to give our men a mounting tide of guns, tanks, planes and ships.

We shall keep this promise, and one promise more - that we shall preserve for them, wherever they may be, and without regard to race, creed or color, the moral and spiritual values of the democratic ideals and freedoms for which they are now fighting.

Because the USO is unitedly dedicated to that high purpose and because that high purpose is a vital part of the job of winning this war, the USO should be supported by everybody - cheerfully, generously, and now - Signed: Very Sin-

cerely Yours, Franklin D. Roosevelt"

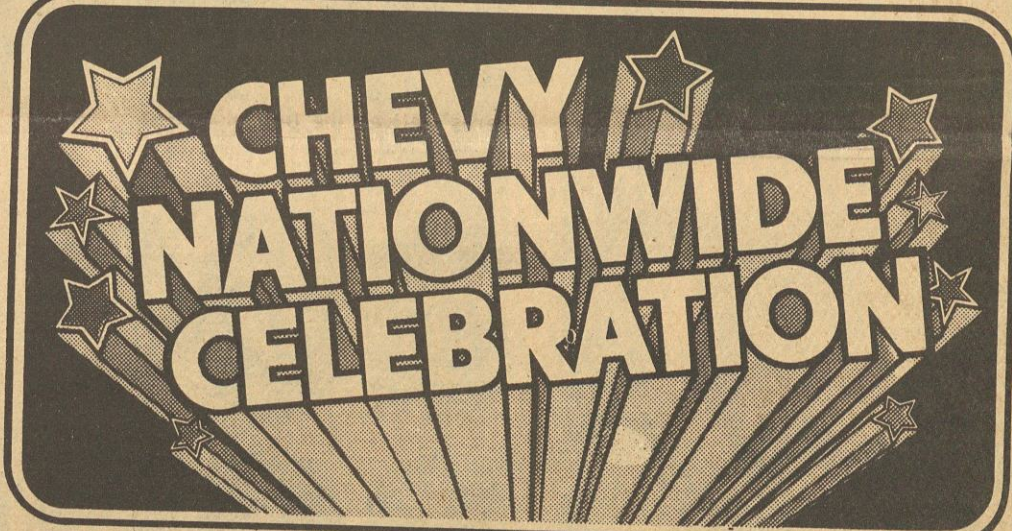

people have a right to expect their officials to use their offices for the good of all rather than for personal gain. Faith in public officials is essential to the continuation of our representative form of government. Education continues to be of primary concern to your government. I am deeply concerned about the quality of education we are providing our young people. As Lieutenant Governor, I will give first attention to the needs of our public schools, junior colleges, universities, and vocational and technical training programs.

There is a desperate need for the full implementation of the ongoing highway program. 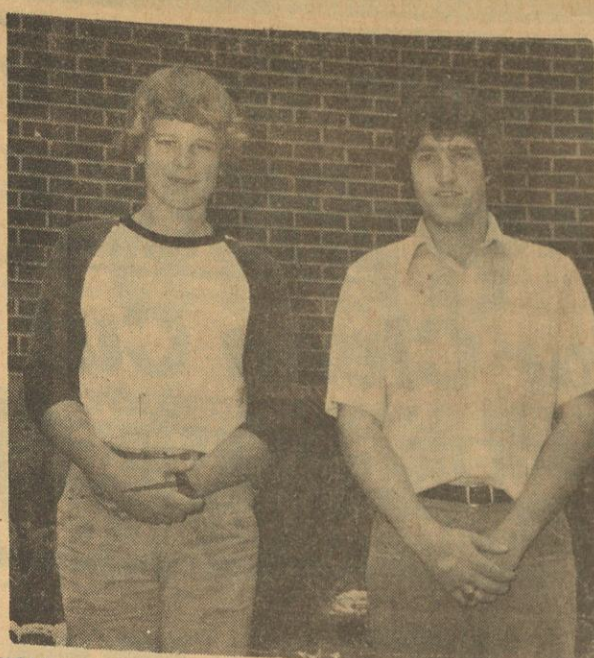

Local Youths Display Act Of Bravery

One of the greatest assets we as adults have is the youthfulness, bravery, determination and loyalty of our young adults. Some of our young adults in Iuka have recently proven these qualities in an act of bravery. Gus Sims and Paul Blackmon were the young men who pulled Mrs. Reeves Wagoner from the water near Eastport Beach in a boating accident that occurred Easter Sunday, April 15. Another young man, Buddy Bullard, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Bullard, and a friend saw the accident from the shore and rode their motorcycle to find help. Four other persons drowned as a result of the accident.

Paul and Gus told their story to The County News as we stood near the Iuka High School building where both are students. The concern and bravery came through the voices and was shown in the eyes of the young men as they related their experience. A warm, humid breeze gently rustled the leaves under a cloudy sky and students passed to and fro but one was unaware of any of his surroundings as our two young heroes relived the few mo-

ments of their deed.

Gus was visiting with Paul on that Sunday at the Eastport Marina (Paul's home and a business owned by his family) when Buddy Bullard and his friend approached on a motorcycle stating that an accident had occurred. Paul and Gus then hurriedly took a boat (a pontoon) belonging to Paul's father and went out to the site described by the two young people, where they found an overturned boat and some of the contents of the boat. Upon looking farther, they saw Mrs. Wagoner and pulled her into their boat. They turned her on her stomach where they were able to rid her body of some of the water she had swallowed. Then Paul and Gus wrapped their jackets around Mrs. Wagoner to provide warmth. Mrs. Wagoner told them that four other people were in the boat. Realizing that every moment counted, the young men looked a few minutes and asked passengers in a boat that had just arrived to continue their search and took Mrs. Wagoner to the Marina where she was taken from the boat to Tishomingo County Hospital by ambulance.

Paul and Gus stated that many things raced through their minds during the few moments. They said the experience had made them even more aware of practicing safety on the water. According to the young men, the water was very rough on that Sunday with white caps about 6 feet high.

We, at The County News, wish to thank these young men for this act of bravery and also to thank each young person in our community who has taken time for his busy life to help another.

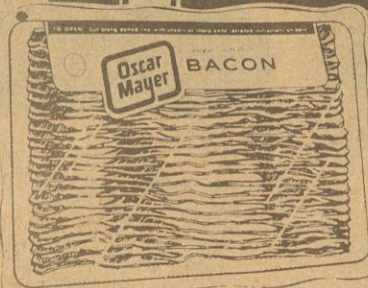

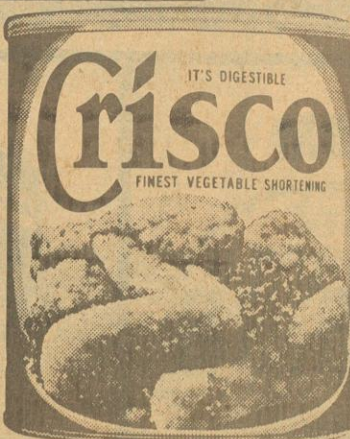

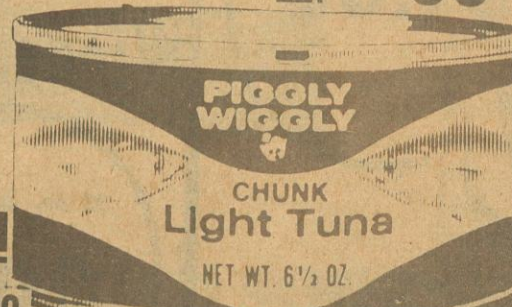
