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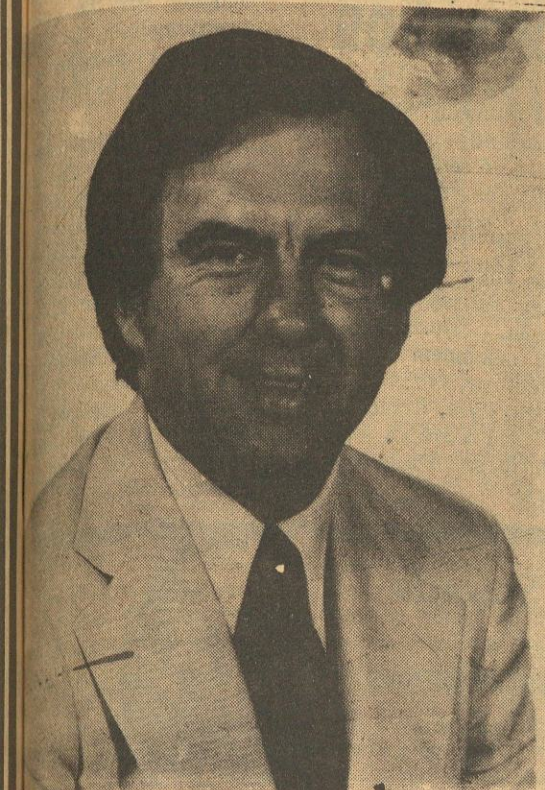

Richard O. Clark Seeks Re-Election

John Ed Ainsworth Announces Candidacy For Lieutenant Governor

State Land Commissioner John Ed Ainsworth today announced his candidacy for Lieutenant Governor for the August 7 Democratic Primary. Ainsworth is the second candidate to enter the race.

A native of Glen Allan, Ainsworth cited education, integrity in government and ethical conduct of public officials, a fair tax structure, and adequate funding for the completion of Mississippi's highway system as the issues at hand. Emphasizing his belief that the Mississippi State Senate must take a greater role in accepting the responsibilities of confronting directly the issues and problems at hand, Ainsworth stated that he will seek new ways to handle the problems confronting the state and will serve in a full-time capacity.

The current Land Commissioner, who sees the Lt. Governor's role as a voice in the Legislature for all the people, stated that the misuse of public office, property, or public service that has been revealed in our state is a blight that must be eradicated.

"The progress of this state cannot and should not be impaired or hindered by one senator whose power or committee chairmanship allows him to hold back badly needed legislation. To allow one man or a few to perpetuate their own political self-interest and their politics of personal profit over the politics of concern for the people as a whole is contrary to what I believe and I feel that such operates to retard Mississippi's progress," Ainsworth said.

Ainsworth cited his credentials for handling the Lt. Governor's office as experience in state government as State Land Commissioner and a record of results and efficiency. Ainsworth kept his 1975 campaign promise to abolish the elective Land Commission post and worked with the legislature in 16th section land reform which will mean an additional \$12 million a year to the support of Mississippi education.

Burnsville Woman Stabbed And Shot

One Man Arrested In Connection

Mrs. Carolyn Stanfield, of Burnsville, was shot several times and possibly stabbed twice when an intruder entered her home at about 11:40 p.m. Saturday night, May 19, according to Tishomingo County Sheriff Chester N. Dawson.

Sheriff Dawson said that Richard Crum, 32, has been arrested and is being held in custody in connection with the shooting and stabbing. Crum is originally from the Tishomingo County area and has spent some time in Hammond, Indiana.

Mrs. Stanfield, believed to be in her late 20's, was at home with her eight year old daughter, and her husband was at his place of employment at the time of the incident. The child was not harmed. Sheriff Dawson

stated that his office received a call about midnight on the night of the incident from the father of Mrs. Stanfield. It is believed that Mrs. Stanfield contacted her father after the child carried the phone to her mother and dialed the operator. Sheriff Dawson said that Crum allegedly entered the unlocked Stanfield home on Saturday night after spending part of the earlier evening with relatives of Mrs. Stanfield. No motives or details were available.

Ronald Dingler, Chief of Police, Burnsville, accompanied a Tishomingo County ambulance to the site of the shooting shortly after the incident occurred. He was assisted by Deputies John Moore and Mike Higginbottom. Chief Dingler said

that a spokesman for the Eliza Coffee Memorial Hospital said Mrs. Stanfield received four gunshot wounds and that stab wounds were present. He said several areas of the body were affected by gunshot wounds. According to Chief Dingler, the wounds were from a .38 caliber pistol. One bullet was removed from the wall at the scene of the shooting. Local and state authorities aided in the search of the assailant.

Mrs. Stanfield was taken to Tishomingo County Hospital and then transferred to Eliza Coffee Memorial Hospital in Florence, Ala., where her condition was listed as fair on Monday, May 21.

The Stanfield family reside just off Hwy. 72 in Burnsville.

HOME ECONOMIST'S NOTES

EXTEND LIFE OF CLOTHING

Get your money's worth by properly caring for each garment in your wardrobe.

Daily care requires little time, yet it will add to the wear life of your clothes.

As each garment is taken off, check it carefully for spots, stains, loose or missing buttons, hooks and eyes, sagging hem or rips. If you can't repair it then, hang the garment in a special spot so all garments needing attention can get it later.

Having a special time each week for mending simplifies the task. Repairing rips and tears while they are small keeps them from becoming larger.

A good time to check garments and mend is just before doing the laundry. The

career woman might prefer to set aside one night each week for clothes care.

Give spots and stains prompt attention. Pressing soiled or stained garments only sets the stain or soil into the fabric. Wash garments which can be laundered as soon as possible after the stain appears.

Clothes made of nonwashable fabrics should be dry cleaned. Tell the dry cleaner what the stain is and what fiber the garment is made of.

To help garments keep their fresh look, thoroughly

air each garment after wearing before hanging it back in the closet. Do not crowd clothes in the closet. There should be enough space between garments for

air to circulate.

INCREASING FOOD PRICES

Food prices in 1979 will advance although the increase will not be as great as in 1978. Part of the reason for the smaller increase is that farmers are increasing production this year. Crop production, pork production and broiler production are expected to be larger in 1979. Food prices will increase about 7.5 percent in 1979, compared to about 10 percent in 1978.

CHICKEN LIVER POLYNESIAN

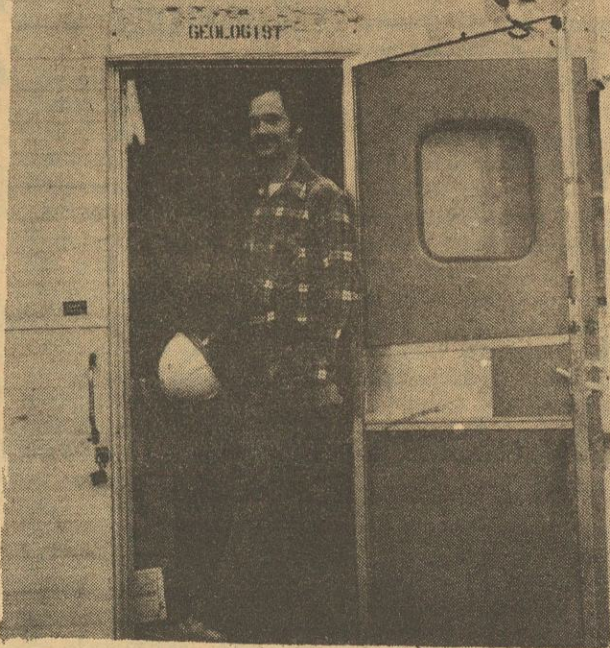
1 pound chicken livers
1 medium green pepper, diced
1/2 cup crushed pineapple, with juice
1/3 cup soy sauce
1 tablespoon dehydrated onion flakes
1 tablespoon prepared mustard
Artificial sweetener to equal 2 tablespoons sugar

Preheat oven to 350 degrees in large nonstick skillet, cook chicken livers and green pepper; divide evenly into two small casseroles. Combine pineapple, soy sauce, onion flakes, mustard and artificial sweetener; pour evenly over chicken livers. Bake in 350 degrees oven for 20 minutes. Divide evenly. Makes 2 servings.

"Rock Doctor" At Yellow Creek Plant

Most nuclear power plant construction projects are composed of civil, mechanical, and electrical engineers. However, the Tennessee Valley Authority's Yellow Creek Nuclear Plant north of here has one individual who doesn't fit into the above categories.

You might say that Charles Burshears is a one-of-a-kind person here. Burshears, a native of Downer's Grove, Ill., who currently resides in Savannah, Tenn., is the lone geologist on this massive construction site. Nicknamed the "Rock Doctor" by an assistant construction superintendent, he is an ever present figure in the nuclear island area, or "the hole," as it is referred to by construction personnel.

Burshears, 25, came to Yellow Creek in June of 1978 after receiving a master's degree in geology from Memphis State University. He obtained a bachelor's degree from MSU in the

same field in 1975. While at MSU, he worked with the Tennessee Department of Transportation during his first year of graduate school (observing thin sections of rock taken from the Tennessee Interstate Systems). According to Burshears, "There were problems on the interstates with concrete breaking up, and I ground rock samples down and observed them under the microscope." During his second year he gained invaluable experience while working as a graduate assistant in the MSU geology department laboratory.

Burshears' initial interest in geology came when he was very young on visits to his grandmother in Kansas. "There wasn't much for me to do except pick up rocks in the driveway," said Burshears. He never had a geology class until college, but he had decided long before in Kansas that he wanted to study what makes up the earth. His primary col-

lege courses included mineralogy and rock identification.

Burshears points out that there are four related fields that often get confused by other people concerning his work. For example, petrology is the study of rocks; geology is the study of the earth; archaeology is the study of man and his artifacts; and anthropology is the study of man.

Burshears, one of approximately 12,000 professional geologists in the U.S., is responsible for foundation inspection, mapping (describing the location of cracks and geologic features), monitoring blasts, photographing of rock walls, and inspecting the turbine building caisson foundation work. He explains that the rock photos are a part of the Nuclear Regulatory Commission's requirements for the reactor areas before concrete placement. Burshears is one of 47 persons in TVA's Geological Branch of Construction. His basic equipment consists of a rock hammer (actually a brick layer's hammer); a Brunton compass, which is used to measure trends and angles of fractures and structures; tape measures and excavation drawings. He

is also responsible for rock removal and safety features around rock.

Burshears said that estimates show that the rock in unit one reactor building, which is actually siltstone, is approximately 320 million years old.

He concludes that his most unusual find has been a 12-foot petrified log during earth excavation of unit two turbine building. However, the most excitement came upon the discovery of pyrite during rock excavation. "Everyone kept coming up to me thinking they were rich," Burshears explained, "but it was only fool's gold."

REPORT TO MISSISSIPPIANS



The Senate's overwhelming decision to acquire four so-called Iranian destroyers for the U.S. Navy will provide a much-needed boost for American naval superiority. These four modern ships which are being built at Ingalls Shipyard in Pascagoula were cancelled by the Iranian government after the fall of the Shah. The ships were then made available for our Navy.

As Chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee, I have become increasingly aware of the threat we face at sea. Our naval power is superior to that of the Russians, but we have been slipping in recent years. We can not let that happen.

It was encouraging to see that so many members of the Senate recognize this problem and are responding to the need to increase our naval forces as quickly and efficiently as possible.

The opportunity to add these four ships to the fleet at such a tremendous savings is a great one. It would be unthinkable to let it slip. Due to inflation and other factors, we will be able to purchase these ships at a savings of about \$200 million each below what it would cost to obtain similar ships ordered now. On top of that, these ships are far enough along in construction that they can become a part of the fleet within three years. It would normally take up to seven years to plan and build a new ship of the same type.

This is the only action before the Congress which is a positive step to provide the Navy with more needed modern ships at a very good price. It is clear from testimony that the Navy needs more ships of this type; that the low price and early delivery schedule surpasses anything comparable; that the four ships are recommended by the Chief of Naval Operations, the Secretary of the Navy, and the Secretary of Defense; and that rejection of these four ships would be a costly mistake.

These ships must yet be authorized by the House of Representatives, and appropriations must be made in both houses and the bill signed by the President. I will continue to point out the need we have and the great opportunity these ships present to help fill that need. I believe the Congress will continue to recognize the importance of these ships to our national defense.

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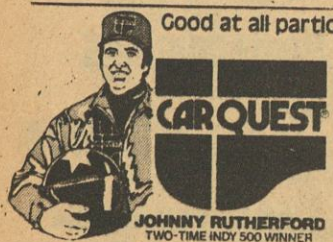
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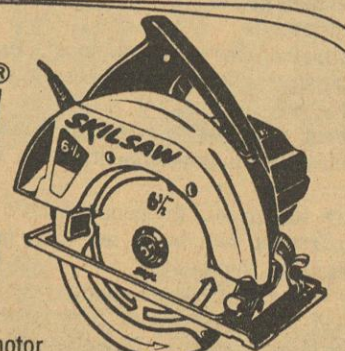
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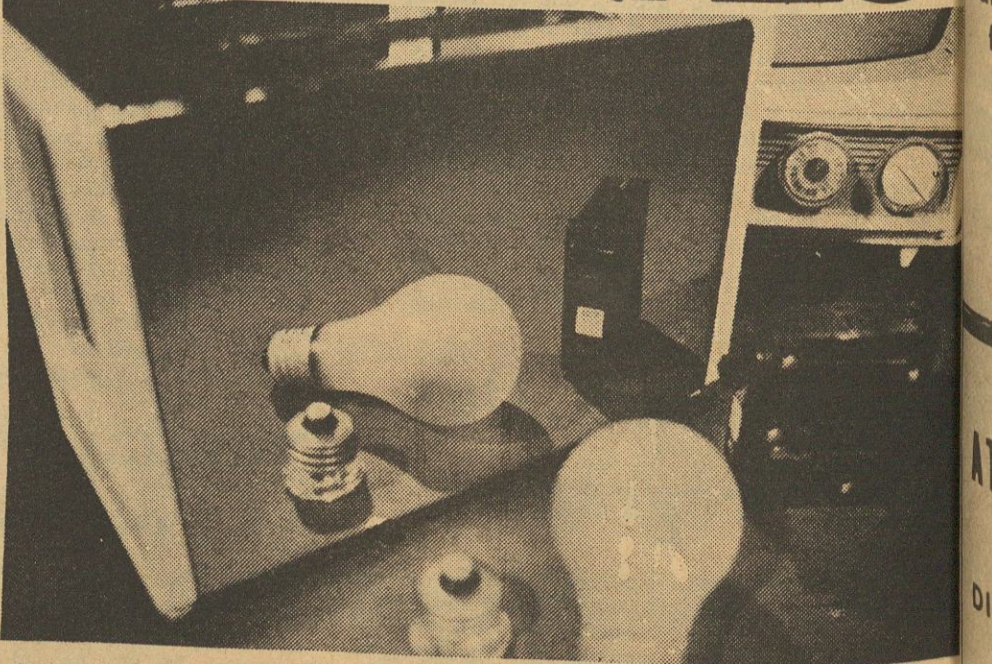
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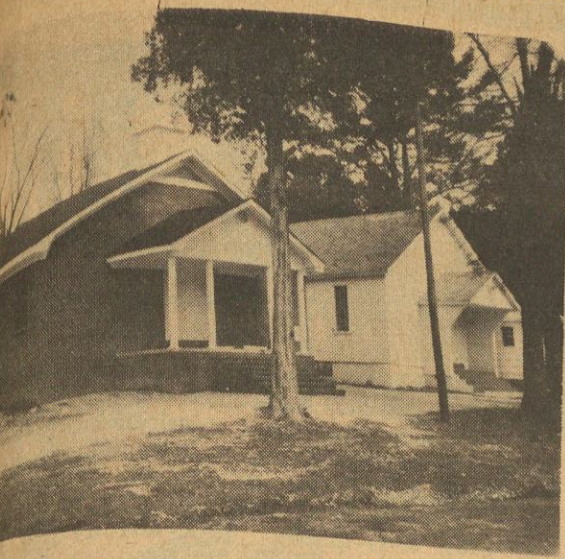

The History Of Eastport Baptist Church

The Eastport Baptist Church was organized September 30, 1908, with eight charter members; five coming from the Iuka membership and three from the New Salem membership. Only one of the eight is still living, Mrs. Mattie Skinner. Rev. C. S. Wales was moderator of the meeting and J. B. Skinner was elected church clerk.

In the organization meeting, it was decided to wait until the fourth Sunday in October for electing deacons and a pastor. Rev. W. L. Norman, of Burnsville, Miss., was elected as the first pastor. The church accepted the articles of faith of the Tishomingo Baptist Association and is associated with the Association at the present time.

This church was organized in a school building upon the hill from where the church stands at the present time, which was known as the Clement Chapel School. It was here that the church met for two or three years until the building was completed. That same building that was built then has been used for service for the past sixty-eight years and is still in good condition.

Beginning with the first pastor of Eastport Baptist Church to the present pastor, the church has been fortunate in having a number of good pastors over these past seventy years. The pastors were: Bro. W. L. Norman, Bro. C. B. Gurley, Bro. J. C. Henderson, Bro. C. C. Perry, Bro. W. C. Hamilton, Bro. R. E. Downing, Bro. J. E. Fuller, Bro. C. W. Moore, Bro. Dan Parish, Bro. Berrell Franks, Bro. Henry Gentry, Bro. Edger Agee, Bro. Dee Orner, Bro. George Bacon, Bro. Marvin Brown, Bro. Richard M. Brock, Bro. Bob Moritz, Bro. Hansel Russell, Bro. George Credille, Bro. James E. Holt, Bro. Perry Murphy, Bro. Earl Martin, and the present pastor, Bro. G. D. Jones.

In April 1971, the church voted to establish a cemetery. It was decided to use the church property on the hill above the church for the cemetery. The ground was cleared and graded off and a road built around the spot. The ground was then divided up into grave plots, thus establishing the Eastport Baptist Church Cemetery.

During the past years the church has made several needed improvements on the building along the way. Some of these were: three classrooms on the back of the building, two bathrooms, new carpet in the auditorium, new windows, new shingles on the roof, a central heating and cooling system, and also two more needed classrooms, along with many other needed improvements.

In 1972, with new job opportunities opening up in the area, such as the construction of the Tenn-Tom Waterway and the T.V.A. Nuclear Power Plant, along with other small industries, workers and their families from different places began moving into the area to work on these new jobs. With great hopes that these people will be looking for a place to worship and also seeking out the people of our own community and surrounding area, that don't go to church anywhere, the church began making plans to grow with the progress of our surrounding area.

On June 25, 1972, the first step was taken. The church voted to set up a Building Fund to build a larger, more modern church building to accommodate more people. Bro. Jerry Booker was elected as the Building Fund Chairman.

On June 27, 1972, the church voted to take two-thousand dollars out of the church treasury to go into the building fund. This started the ball to rolling, when the members of the church started contributing generously to the building fund. The church was then generously blessed when people of the community and from other areas began contributing to the building fund. Over a period of six years, a sizable amount was added to the building fund.

On March 19, 1978, the church voted to get started

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on the new building. Five men were elected to serve on the building committee. They were: Jerry Booker, chairman; Tulon Hughes, Kirk Brown, Ansel Jones and Terry Ray Booker.

The committee was set up to get the plans drawn up and to get bids from different contractors for the new building and also to make sure the building was constructed as the plans so specified.

Upon receiving several bids from different contractors, the church decided to sign a contract with the lowest bidder. On September 13, 1978, a contract was signed with Glidewell Brothers of Burnsville, Miss. for construction of the new church building.

On September 24, the church decided to let the building committee check on different prices of new pews and pulpit furniture. Upon checking out different builders and prices, the church voted to go ahead and order all new pews and furniture for the new building. Almost immediately after the order was placed for the pews, members of the church began contributing money for the pews. Once again the church was generously blessed when different families in the community and from other areas began contributing more money toward the pews and also to the building fund.

The Lord had blessed the church generously, because all of the new pews and all of the pulpit furniture was paid for before the new building was completed.

On November 1, 1978, the construction of the new building began. Although the construction of the building was held up for a while, due to bad weather, the new church building was completed on March 28, 1979.

On April 1, 1979, the church decided to have a dedication service on Sunday, April 8.

On this date, April 8, 1979, we, the members of Eastport Baptist Church, with a total of one hundred and thirty-two members, seventy-five resident members, and fifty-seven non-resident members, backed by our pastor, Bro. G. D. Jones, and our deacons, Bro. W. C. Booker, chairman; Bro. Kirk Brown, Bro. Jerry Booker, Bro. Ansel Jones, and Bro. Terry Ray Booker, vow to dedicate this new church building to the purpose of serving God to our utmost abilities.

Jacinto was originally named Cincinnati when the town site was laid out for a county seat of Old Tishomingo County in 1838. The name, however, was changed to Jacinto after the Texas battle of San Jacinto to prevent confusion with the town in Ohio named Cincinnati. The old Courthouse, one of the two original structures which still stands in Jacinto, was completed in 1854. It was used as a county seat until 1870 when the county divided into Alcorn, Prentiss and Tishomingo Coun-

ties. It was then used as a school until 1908 and as a Methodist Church until 1960. Eleven years ago the town of Jacinto, located in North-east Mississippi between Booneville and Corinth was almost destroyed by a wrecking company. Today, the town is destined to become another Williamsburg, Virginia. Jacinto, according to historians, was a rugged frontier town before

1860. A stage coach line ran through the town three times a day. When the town was in its prime, it had a newspaper, a doctor's office, jail, carriage maker, lawyers, masonic hall and a boys' prep school.

The Jacinto Festival '79 will be used as a tourist attraction and attention getting device for the foundation of Jacinto, in order that further restoration and de-

velopment of the 34 exhibits planned can be initiated.

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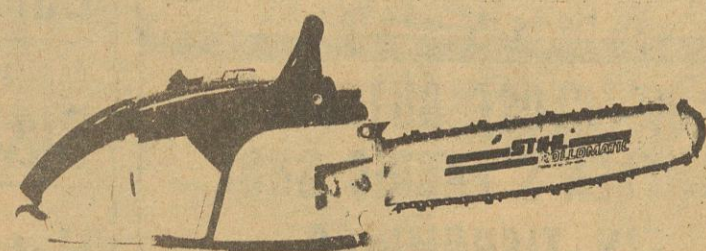

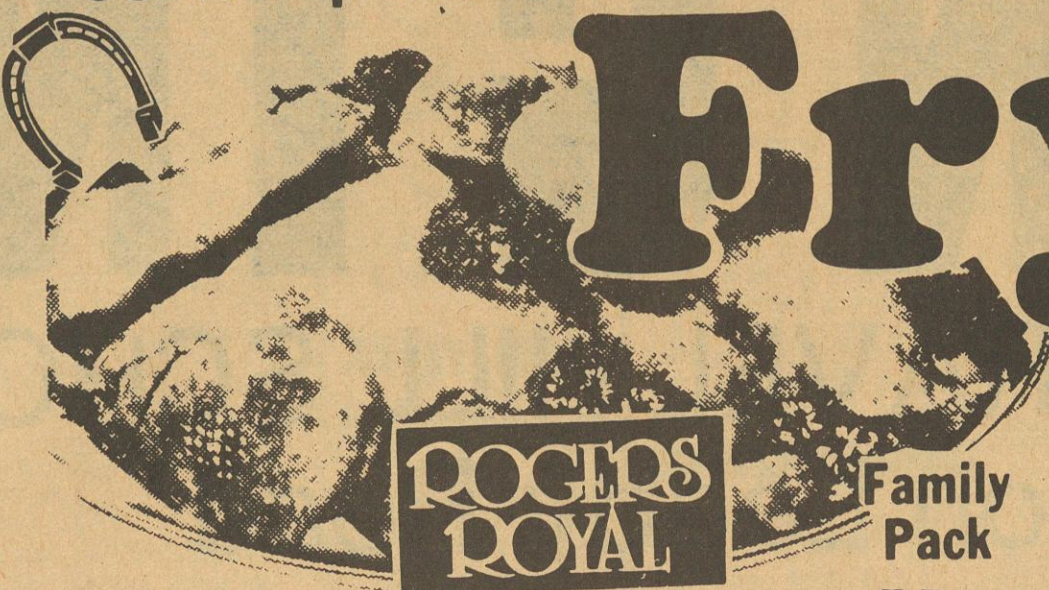

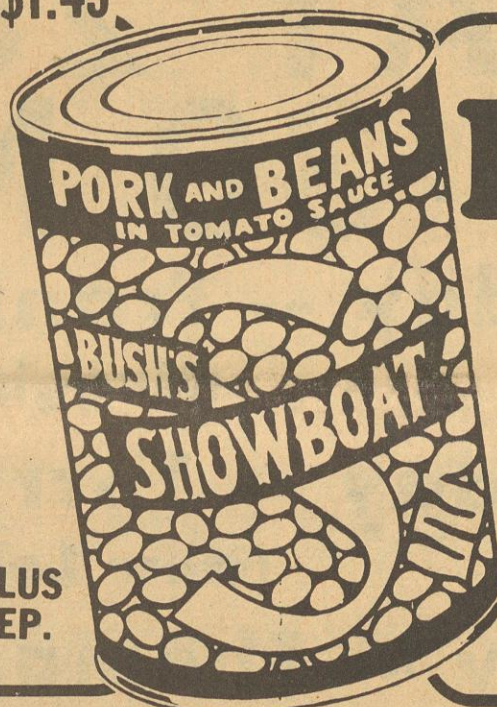

MAY 14, 1942

If you were headed to the arid zone, you were urged to ask at the filling station, after passing the state border, to get your gas ration card.

Hamilton, Publicity Chairman; and R. A. McRee, Treasurer. Private James L. Beard, son of Mr. and Mrs. Grover C. Beard, of Iuka, volunteered for the service and left here on February 11, 1942.

Grover Cleveland McAnally, son of Mr. and Mrs. K. G. McAnally, of Tishomingo, enlisted in the U.S. Marine Corps.

A. W. Clingan, of near Pleasant Hill Community, opened a new store in Massey Block No. 2, at Iuka, known as Iuka Cash Gro.

"Save pennies in a jar -- and help win the war" -- Little Billy Ramsey, 15 months old son of Mr. and Mrs. Buster Ramsey, had been saving his pennies in a quart fruit jar since birth. In March, 1942, when Billy was home for a visit, his parents took his pennies to the bank and bought a U.S. Savings Bond.

Lamoyne Woodall had enlisted in the Enlisted Reserve of the Army Signal Corps.

Jarvis Glenn was stationed in San Diego, Calif.

Swimming season had apparently opened, as there were several couples swimming in the lake on the previous Sunday and reported that the water was just fine.

The Commencement Calendar for Iuka High School was announced by J. O. Epps, Superintendent: Sun-

day, May 17, 1942, at 11 a.m. - Sermon; May 19, Senior Play "The Antics of Andrew"; May 20, Eighth Grade Graduation; May 21, High School Graduation.

From the movie titles the Majestic Theatre offered quite a rousing line up of entertainment, "Swamp Waters", "Sign of the Wolf", "Riders of the Purple Sage", "All Through the Night", and a war reel "Rings of Steel".

Hints for the homemaker included a tip on keeping kitchens cooler: Keep your kitchen well ventilated. Warm air usually rises, so keep your windows open from the top. Place an electric fan above the stove so that it fans the warm air right out the windows.

Unwrap soap before storing: The soap dries out and lasts longer when exposed to the air several days before using.

R. E. Dexter advertised "We pay \$21.00 per thousand for paying blocks delivered in Iuka".

Tailored button holes were advertised on the classified page at 20 to 25¢ per dozen, made to order.

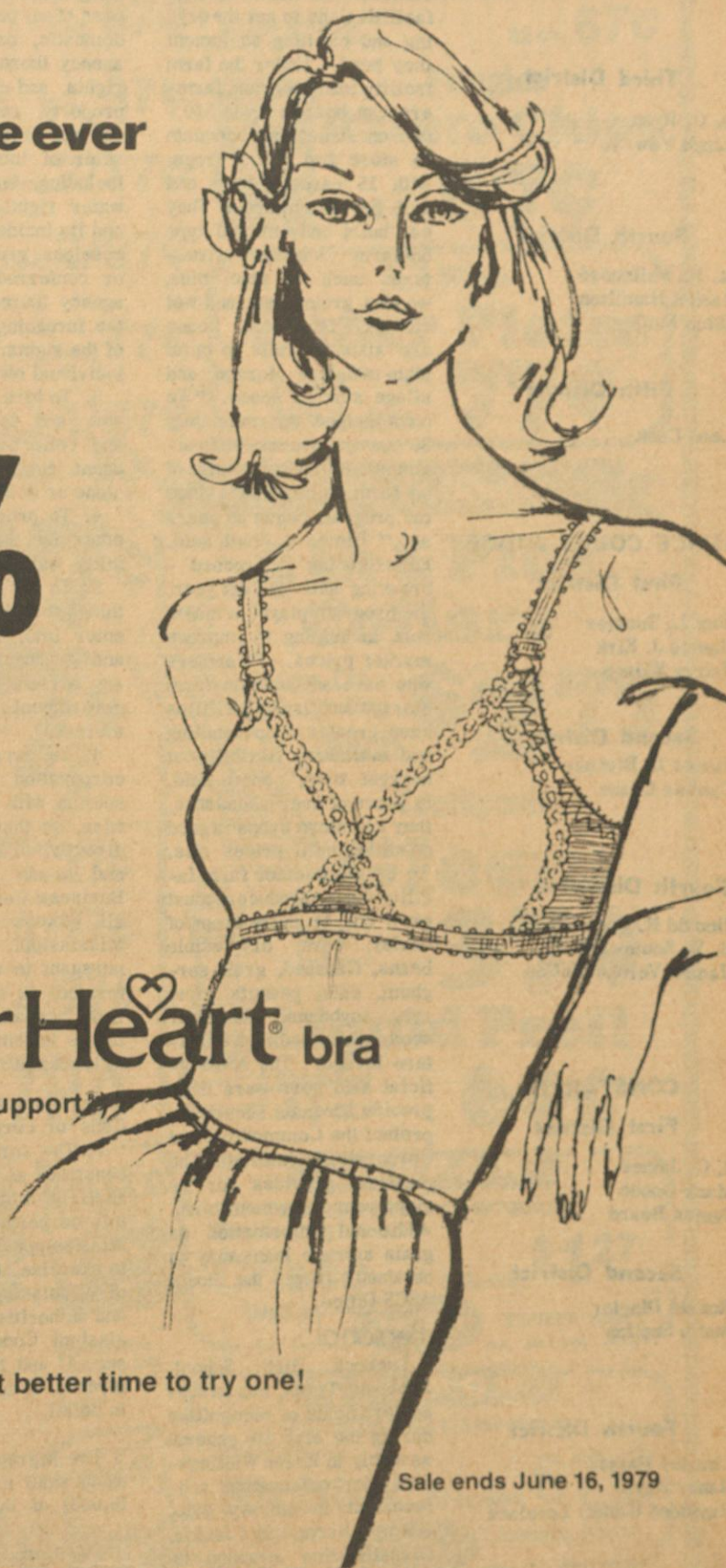

By: Henry L. Knox, County Executive Director ANIMAL WASTE CONTROL INCLUDED IN CONSERVATION PROGRAM - "There has been a growing concern for the quality of the Nation's water supply" Elmer A. South, Chairperson of the ASCS Committee, said. It is being threatened by not only one, but two areas of pollution: point and non-point sources of pollution. South stressed that point pollution originates primarily from industrial and municipal waste systems and non-point originates on farms, forests, etc. "One of these non-point sources has been further identified as agricultural waste and chemical run-off," he added. Under provisions of the 1979 Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP), animal waste control practices have been designed to provide facilities for the storage and handling of livestock and poultry waste and the control of surface run-off water, for areas on farmland where animal waste constitutes a significant pollution hazard. "ASCS has been involved in helping solve non-point agricultural pollution for a number of years," South said. Presently 28 demonstration projects to improve water quality are being funded by the ACP in 24 states. South continued, "Each county, however, has established a priority of practices reflecting this need for conservation and is making available cost-sharing assistance for storage and diversion facilities that will contribute significantly to maintaining or improving the soil and water quality." Requests may be filed, and additional information obtained from the local ASCS Office at 205 Eastport St., Iuka, Ms. telephone 423-5036.

GRAIN STORAGE LOANS AVAILABLE: The Tishomingo County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee reminds farmers that funds are available to buy, build, or remodel on-farm storage facilities and to get the drying and handling equipment they need. Under the farm facility loan program, farmers can borrow up to \$50,000 on structures adequate to store two years crops, with 15 percent down and 10.5 percent interest. They can build conventional type on-farm storage structures such as steel bins, wooden grainaries, and wet storage facilities. Loans are also available to build high-moisture forage and silage storage space. "We have helped approximately 30 county farmers obtain almost 150,000 bushels of on-farm storage space since the program began 30 years ago," Elmer A. South said. Experiencing record-breaking activity last year, the program played a major role in helping to improve market prices. "Farmers who have adequate on-farm storage and drying facilities have greater crop handling and marketing flexibility at harvest time," South said. In years of over-abundance, they can store crops in good condition until prices rise. To be eligible for farm facility loans, producers must grow one or more crops of barley, corn, dry edible beans, flaxseed, grain sorghum, oats, peanuts, rice, rye, soybeans, sunflower seed, wheat and high-moisture forage. The ASCS official said borrowers must provide adequate security to protect the Commodity Card Corporation's interest. The program provides for an eight-year repayment term. Additional information on grain storage loans may be obtained from the local ASCS Office.

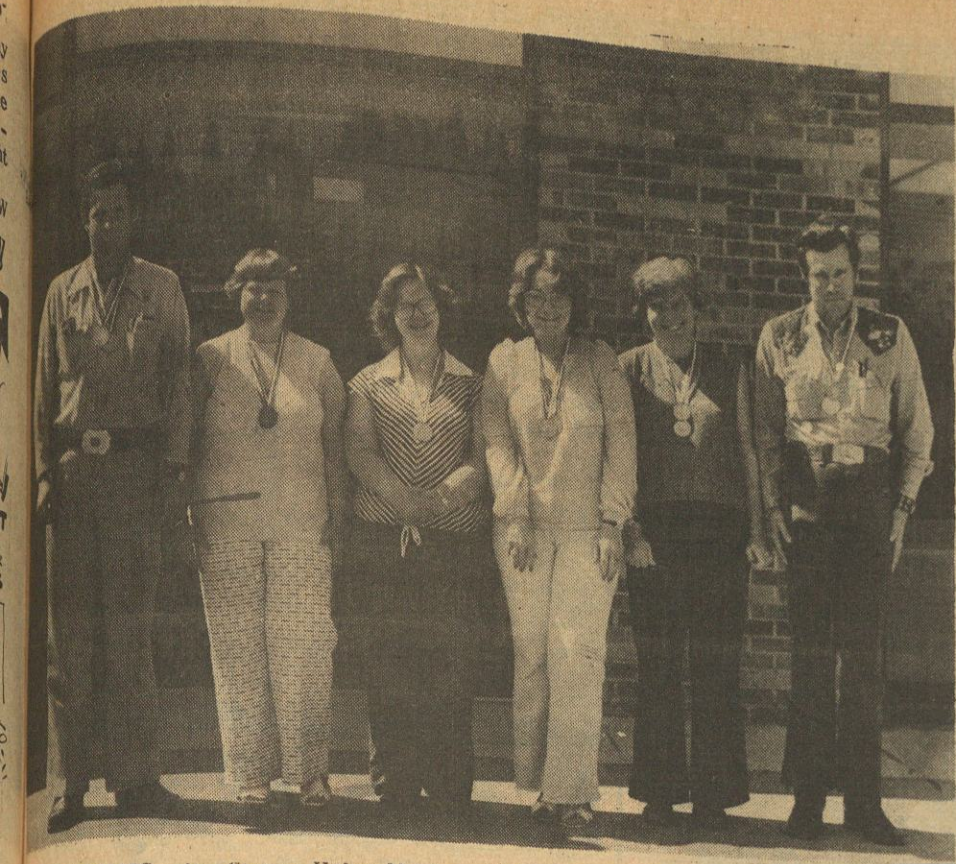
