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GANDY, WINTER WINNERS IN DEMO, CARMICHAEL GOP

2nd Primary To See Bates-Skinner Clash For Sheriff. Majority of County Offices Go Unchanged.

Tishomingo County voters flocked to the polls Tuesday with approximately 7,400 voters casting ballots in the August 7th First Primary Election. This figure, when compared with the approximately 7,900 in the First Primary in 1975, shows a decrease in voter strength. In the Governor's race, Lt. Governor Evelyn Gandy easily led over her five opponents state-wide. She will face William F. Winter for the run-off in the Second Primary. Unofficial state returns from UPI early Wednesday showed Gandy 207,212 to Winter's 172,660. County voters gave John Arthur Eaves 2,080 votes over Gandy's 2,008.

Brad Dye won by a landslide the Lieutenant Governor's post over two opposing candidates.

In other state offices, Ed Pittman was declared winner, along with John L. Dale for State Treasurer. In the Attorney General race, William Allain with 283,427 will meet W. O. Dillard with 190,662 for a run-off in three weeks. Other races to be run off August 28, will be Highway Commissioner and Public Service Commissioner. In these races, Richardson polled 91,070 and Stewart 69,093, and Alexander had 56,398 to D. W. Snyder's 76,228. At press-time details of the District Attorney and State Senate races were incomplete.

In the race for House of Representatives, District I, incumbent Richard O. Clark received 3,023; G. J. Parson, 340; Larry Tucker, 2,039; and Mack L. Wadkins, 2,617. Clark and Wadkins will meet for the Tishomingo-Alcorn County Post run-off.

A majority of candidates were seated in Tuesday's Primary County Election.

Of much interest was the 11-man Sheriff's race in which James Amos Bates, of Golden, and Robert Skinner, of Iuka, came out on top to run-off in the 2nd Primary. High men was Bates with 1,970, followed by Skinner with 1,631, and Jack Rye in third with incumbent

Dawson in fourth place.

Incumbent Chancery Court Clerk Robert Sims had a narrow victory over Richard Hayden Ables, 3,584 to 3,486 votes. A difference of 98.

In the County Superintendent of Education race, Alvia Blakney, incumbent, defeated Earl Alexander, 3,881 to 3,498 in another tight race for the county.

James H. Bishop, incumbent to the office of Tax Assessor and Collector, defeated Clifford Wiginton, 6,020 to 1,335.

Tishomingo County's five Supervisors will all be re-elected for four years without run-offs.

The August 28 Primary will also see run-off elections by First District Justice Court Judge, James Kirk, 768; and Larry Wilson, 660; Constable Bobby James, 593; and James Skinner, 327; Second District Justice Court Judge, James Blakney, 639; and Cynthia Crane, 431; Constable Ron Dingle, 492; and Spencer Thorne, 389; Fourth District Constable, Charles Harris, 670; and Bobby Kemp, 385; Fifth District Constable, Sidney Taylor, 775; and Marcus Ivey, 471.

Seated in the First Primary were Third District Constable Floyd Whitaker; 4th District Justice Court Judge, J. W. Southard; and Fifth District Justice Court Judge, Gene Thorne.

Hit & Run Accident Claims Life Of William Nobles

Charles W. Nobles, 25, Iuka, was pronounced dead on arrival at the Magdalen Hospital at about 11 p.m. Wednesday night, August 1.

Arnold Wilkerson, 65, of Iuka, was arrested as a suspect in the hit and run accident, which occurred on U.S. 72 railroad overpass in Corinth last Wednesday night, August 1, but had any connection with the accident. Wilkerson told Iuka County Sheriff Deane that he did not strike Nobles.

Early investigations revealed that Nobles was lying east on the overpass when a westbound automobile struck the young man, throwing him into the windshield head first. The car reportedly ran upon the body a few feet, and the impact of the collision reportedly had thrown Nobles into a ditch adjacent to the railroad tracks below. It is believed that Wilkerson left the scene of the accident and stopped at a service station to have

a flat tire repaired, according to Deputy Sergeant W.C. Mayhall. The service station attendant called the sheriff after seeing a broken windshield. Pieces of flesh imbedded in the broken glass and hair follicles.

The Iuka driver was jailed after sheriff deputies arrested him at the service station and took him to Magdalen Hospital for a blood alcohol test.

The Sheriff's Department received the call about 9 p.m., according to Dole, but he stated that later information from two teenage boys indicated the accident occurred about 8:10 p.m. The boys reported to the Sheriff Deputy, seeing the Wilkerson car stopped on the overpass, going to the overpass and discovering the body lying in a ditch next to the railroad tracks.

Dole said that Wilkerson claimed to have overturned his car in Hardin County and had not admitted to striking the pedestrian. He currently is being held in the jail while investigation continues.

Exam To Establish Register At Dennis Post Office

Charles Monroe, Postmaster, states that applicants (PS Form 2479-AB) on hand at his office this examination. The date for the opening of this examination is August 1, 1979, and the closing date is August 15, 1979. Examination is to establish a "Register of Eligible" from which future employees will be selected. Vacancies, should they arise, for the position of Mail Carrier at the Dennis Post Office.

Experience is required. All applicants will be required to take a written examination that consists of two parts: (1) Address Checking and (2) Test for Addresses. Test and completion of forms will require approximately 1 1/2 hours. Applicants will be rated on a scale of 100. They must score at least 70 on examination as a whole.

Additional points for veteran preferences are added to the actual test score in order to obtain the final numerical rating in the examination.

Age requirement is 18 years or 16 years for high school graduates. This age limit does not apply to persons entitled to veteran preference. There is no maximum age limit. All applicants must be citizens of or owe allegiance to the United States of America.

Starting salary for postal clerks at the Dennis Post Office is \$7.22 per hour.

Eligibility from this examination will be limited to two (2) years, unless after 18 months an applicant request that their eligibility be extended for one additional year. This request must be sent to the postal installation holding your eligibility at this time. Maximum eligibility is three (3) years.

New Main Post Office

The U. S. Postal Service is asking for construction bids to build and lease a new main post office at Burnsville, Postmaster Linda Stone said.

Bids are to be submitted not later than August 24, 1979 to: Margaret Roberts, acting field supervisor, Field Real Estate and Buildings Office, U. S. Postal Service, P. O. Drawer 2744, Memphis, TN 38103.

Bids will be opened at 2:30 p.m., August 24, 1979, Room 332, U. S. Postal Service Building, 1 North Front Street, Memphis, TN.

The proposed building will have 2,320 sq. ft. of interior floor space. It will be built with private funds and leased to the Postal Service for a basic period of 10 years with renewal options for an additional 20 years.

The Postal Service has acquired an option to buy a site for the new post office which will be assigned to the successful bidder.

The site, containing 20,038 sq. ft. of land, is located along Highway 72 east of the Sewage Treatment Plant and west of a two and four lane intersection.

Immunization For School Entrance

The immunization program for Mississippi's school children has been expanded this year. State Superintendent of Education, Dr. Charles Holladay, said it will include students entering kindergarten, first grade, tenth grade, and any who did not attend school in the state last year. Holladay said these students must show the blue Certificate of Compliance before they will be allowed to attend classes.

The program was first implemented during the 1978-79 school year following passage by the Legislature. At that time, it required students in grades one through eight to be immunized before school began.

State Health Officer Dr. Alton Cobb said immunization may be obtained from a private physician or the county health department.

CHIC FASHIONS FOR FALL

Gone are the bulky leg-warmers and boot-toppers. This season reveals the leg, then dresses it up with zesty hose! Textured thigh-highs with garters peek through slits in pared-down skirts. Patterns and glitter leap from disco circuits into day and evening wear for legs. The pattern story unfolds as ultrasheer hose and take on diamonds, pointed esprit, snowflakes, zig-zags, teardrops, stripes, herringbone and spiderweb prints. They surface as overall designs run up the side or back of the leg. Fishnets are back, too, in bright and dark shades. Black hose are sprayed with silver and gold flecks or with rhinestones. Seamed tights are also in demand.

Tights and thigh-highs come in nylon, jersey knit and cotton/spandex. Dark backgrounds provide for patterning in rich shades of black, charcoal, gray, wine, plum, brown, navy, red and green.

START SKIN CARE EARLY

It's never too early to begin good skin care. Teaching children to wash properly, carefully and frequently is well worth any mother's effort. Cleanliness and basic grooming habits help prevent skin problems later.

Often when children begin to do their own scrubbing, cleanliness standards de-

cline. Foreheads covered with bangs are often neglected, and the neck and throat may seldom come in contact with soap and water. Often, soap stops short of the ears.

Children do not realize the importance of good cleanliness habits to future complexion health. It does take constant reminding. In addition, make sure plenty of clean towels and soap are on hand. Each family member should have a washcloth or sponge and a set of grooming aids.

BANANA CHOCOLATE BROWNIES

2 eggs
2 env. Chocolate Alba "77"
1 sm. banana, mashed
1 tsp. vanilla extract
1/2 tsp. soda
1/2 tsp. baking powder
1/4 tsp. cinnamon
1 c. Cheerios

Combine all ingredients except Cheerios; beat with electric mixer at medium speed until well mixed. Add Cheerios; beat for 1 minute longer. Pour into vegetable oil-sprayed 8-inch square pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 15 minutes or until toothpick inserted comes out clean. Cut into 16 squares.

COUNTY AGENT'S NOTES

PASTURE WEED CONTROL

Weeds in summer perennial pastures often contribute as much or more to low forage production than any other factor. These weeds often require more nutrients, light and water than do forage plants.

Broadleaf weeds cause the most problems. Particularly troublesome are horseweed, tall dogfennel (cypripedium), smartweed, bitterweed and pigweed. These weeds often require chemical control with a herbicide containing dicamba (Banvel). A mixture containing one pound of dicamba and three pounds of 2,4-D per gallon will control most problem broadleaf weeds when applied at the rate of one to two pints per acre.

SOIL TEST:

You still have time to take soil samples to determine lime and fertilizer needs on pasture or row crop land to be planted this fall. Soil testing takes the guesswork out of lime and fertilizer programs. Be sure to take a representative sample from each field; the recommendation won't be a good one if it is based on a poor sample.

FALL GARDENS:

If you've started a late

tomato crop, you need to spray for early blight. This is the same disease that robbed many home gardeners of their spring tomato crops, and it will reduce fall crops unless controlled. For control, make weekly applications of a fungicide such as Maneb or Chlorothalonil. Make the first application when the plants are 7 to 10 inches tall and continue treatment every 7 days until frost. Be sure to start the treatment early, because early blight is much more difficult to control once established.

Maneb will also control other fall garden diseases, such as stem anthracnose on lima beans and fungus leaf spots on turnips and mustard greens.

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




Club Met

Many of us can remember with pleasure the singing and the Old Courthouse overflowed with music, a uniquely cultural trait.

Furthermore, there are a few among us who can remember other cultural functions which once thrived in our county. There were dramatic readings and full-fledged plays. There were lectures and presentations on various aspects of culture and art. At one time, there was even opera in Iuka. The renovation plans for the Old Courthouse, of course, includes the old courtroom itself. It is entirely possible that a Little Theater would be organized. The old courtroom will also be available for a variety of civic and club functions. Think of the possibilities. From arts and crafts to drama, from singing conventions to opera - the Old Courthouse could once again be a center of the cultural life of Tishomingo County. 



Women Take Active Part In Nuclear Plant Construction

Tradition has dictated that a woman's place is in the home and not serving as breadwinner for the family.

However, in the early 70's, we have witnessed dramatic changes in the thinking and acceptance of women holding jobs that traditionally belonged to males. To illustrate, women construction workers are no longer a novelty. At the Tennessee Valley Authority's Yellow Creek Nuclear Plant north of here, women workers play an important role. Besides the usual annual positions, there are many women currently working in trades and labor jobs both as apprentices and journeymen.

With jobs ranging from unclassified laborers to steamfitter apprentices, it is not a rarity to see females perspiring and toiling along with the men throughout the 95 - to 100-degree days of July and tramping around in a freshly fallen January snow. Nona Knight, Mary Jo Nunley, Paula Adamson, Alice Hamilton, Barbara Vandiver, Martha Kenaum, and Nancy Darby, to name a few, are proud of their jobs and feel a sense of accomplishment at their various jobs.

Ms. Knight, nicknamed "Sissy," is presently a grease truck driver on the second shift. A resident of Florence, Alabama, she has been employed on the site for one year. "I don't mind driving anything," said Ms. Knight. I drove a 35-ton back dump when I first came here and have eight years of driving experience from coast to coast with an 18-wheeler (tractor-trailer rig). The diminutive and energetic Ms. Knight stands a mere five feet tall and weighs 110 pounds. Her head doesn't reach the top of the tires on some trucks she drives. Her husband, Allen, works on the second shift here and is also a teamster.

Ms. Nunley, who came to work here on March 9, 1978, began her tenure serving as a classification 1 truck driver. Until May, when she was promoted to truck dispatcher, she drove pickup and flatbed trucks on the project. Now her duties include filling out time cards, recording overtime of all teamsters and coordinating the trucks and drivers for all other crafts on the project.

The first female teamster on the job, Ms. Nunley formerly worked with the Mississippi State Park Commission.

"I have found what I think I am suited for," remarked Ms. Nunley, a mother of four children from ages 7 to 18. "I love working with the drivers and being around trucks."

Dave Stanford, teamster superintendent, feels that both women "try to do whatever job is assigned to the best of their ability."

Ms. Adamson and Ms. Hamilton are both members of the TVA apprenticeship program. Apprentice training leads to craft journeyman status on the average of three years, less in some crafts. Skills are developed through supervised on-the-job experience. In each year of training, apprentices are given at least 144 hours of related classroom assignments, such as mathematics, trade, science and theory, and blueprint reading. Candidates are placed on occupational registers according to their education, work experience, interests, occupational aptitudes, and other factors. Apprenticeship training is available in approximately 15 different crafts.

Ms. Adamson, 22, from Muscle Shoals, Alabama, worked initially with TVA at Browns Ferry Nuclear Plant as a warehouse stores clerk. She transferred to Yellow Creek in May 1978 and later accepted a position as a road roller operator. She was selected four months later as an operating engineer crane apprentice. Presently, she is under the tutelage of Arnold Jeter, a veteran crane operator from Savannah, Tennessee, and operates a crane in the reactor areas.

"I have always been interested in crane operations," commented Ms. Adamson. "Construction work is really fascinating to me and always has been." Ironically, she recently married to another crane apprentice, Glen Whitlock, whom she met through the training program.

Ms. Hamilton was employed in March as a road roller operator and according to assistant construction superintendent John "Red" Hayes, "she is as good as any road roller operator we have here." She also worked with Clinton Construction Company of Union City, Tennessee, at the same position before coming here.

Nancy Darby, 50, who originally served as a laborer until June, is one of the oldest apprentices on the project. Now a member of the steamfitter apprentice program, she feels proud to have been selected for the program. She is currently working in the waste management building adjacent to the unit one reactor building where her son, Robert, works. Robert is a carpenter apprentice with miscellaneous work duties.

Barbara Vandiver, 23, and Martha Kenaum, 26, both of Iuka, are journeyman carpenters that work on a wooden deck area located next to the carpenter's shop. Their duties range from building door frames to loading shoring. Ms. Vandiver and Ms. Kenaum have worked here for approximately two months. Ms. Vandiver stands 5 feet 1 inch and weighs 115 pounds.

Both Ms. Vandiver and Ms. Kenaum were involved in residential home construction work before employment with TVA.

"They have really impressed me with their work," said their foreman, Bob McCarley. "Both girls take pride in their work and don't complain about any assignment."





emergency feed program to help U. S. livestock producers buy 3.2 billion pounds of feed (56.4 million bushels, corn equivalent). D. L. Triggs, Jr., State Director of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service in Mississippi, said that USDA has approved 49,290 (83 percent) of the 59,486 applications received nationwide during the first nine months of fiscal year 1979. Under the emergency feed program, the Secretary of Agriculture authorize financial aid to farmers when their livestock are threatened by conditions brought on by a natural disaster. Participants may be reimbursed up to 50 percent of the cost for feed purchased during the emergency period. This, however, may not exceed two cents per pound in terms of feed grain equivalent. During fiscal year 1978, the first year of the program, USDA provided \$169.4 million nationwide to help farmers buy approximately 8.97 billion pounds of feed.

forestry or timber production in the past five years must report the extent of their holdings. Holdings of less than one acre that produce less than \$1,000 in annual gross sales for the owners' personal or household use need not be reported. Those purchasing land recently have 90 days from the date of purchase to report. Further information on the reporting requirements is available

from county offices of the department's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. Foreign owners of U. S. agricultural land should contact the ASCS Office serving the county in which the property is located. Information concerning the location and phone number of county ASCS offices may be obtained by calling (202) 447-7421.

REQUEST FOR ACP PRACTICES - A limited amount of ACP Funds are now available for establishing high priority practices. Applications are now being accepted in the county office. The county committee will review each application and issue approvals within the funds available. 
USDA PLEDGES REASONABLE TREATMENT OF LATE REPORTS UNDER FOREIGN DISCLOSURE ACT: The U. S. Department of Agriculture will be reasonable in applying penalties to some foreign owners of U. S. agricultural land who miss the August 1 deadline for reporting those land holdings under the Agricultural Foreign Investment Disclosure Act of 1978, according to State ASC Director D. L. Triggs, Jr. However, Triggs urged all foreign land owners to report as quickly as possible to comply with the Act. Mr. Triggs said some foreign owners of small tracts of U. S. agricultural land may have had difficulty in obtaining information and forms on the reporting requirement. Those who fail to file by the deadline are technically in violation of the Act. However, the department will be reasonable in dealing with those who hold small tracts of agricultural land. "The purpose of the Act," Triggs said, "is to gather information on how much farm, forest and timberland is owned by non-U. S. citizens. It is not to prevent ownership or to penalize foreign owners. We will give every consideration to late filers, based on circumstances causing the delays." Under current law, foreign owners of land used for agriculture,

Children from families whose income is at or below levels shown are eligible for (free or reduced price meals). In addition, families not meeting these criteria with other unusual expenses due to unusually high medical expenses, shelter costs in excess of thirty percent (30%) of income, special education expenses to the mental or physical condition of a child, and disaster or casualty losses are urged to apply. Application forms are being sent to all homes in a district to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year. To discourage the possibility of misrepresentation, application forms contain statement above the space for a signature certifying that all information furnished in the application is true and correct. An additional statement is added to warn that the application is being made in connection with the receipt of Federal funds. School officials may, for cause, verify the information in the application, and that deliberate misrepresentation of information may subject the applicant to prosecution under applicable State and Federal criminal statutes. In certain cases foster children are also eligible

for these benefits. If a family has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for such meals for them, it should contact the school.

Under the provisions of the policy Principals will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official, he may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis.

If he wishes to make a formal appeal, he may make a request either orally or in writing to Aliva J. Blakney, Iuka, Ms. 38852 Phone 423-6061 for a hearing to appeal the decision. The policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure.

If a family member becomes unemployed or if family size changes, the family should contact the school to file a new application. Such changes may make the children of the families eligible for reduced price meals or for additional benefits such as free meals if the family income falls at or below the levels shown above.

In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, color, or national origin.

Each school and the office of the County Superintendent of Education has a copy of the complete policy which may be reviewed by any interested party.

Students may buy lunch for 60¢ and extra milk for 10¢. They may have a choice of the regular lunch, hamburger line or chefs salad each day.
