The U. S. Postal Service is asking for construction bids to build and lease a new main post office at Burnsville, Postmaster Linda Stone said.

Bids are to be submitted not later than August 24, 1979 to: Margaret Roberts, acting field supervisor, Field Real Estate and Buildings Office, U. S. Postal Service, P. O. Drawer 2744. Memphis, TN 38103.

Bids will be opened at 2:30 p.m., August 24, 1979. Room 332, U.S. Postal Service Building, 1 North Front Street, Memphis, TN.

The proposed building will have 2,320 sq. ft. of interior floor space. It will be built with private funds and leased to the Postal Service for a basic period of 10 years with renewal options for an additional 20 years.

The Postal Service has acquired an option to buy a site for the new post office wpich will be assigned to the successful bidder.

The site, containing 20,038 sq. ft. of land, is located along Highway 72 east of the Sewage Treatment Plant and west of a two and four lane intersection.

Immunization For School Entrance

The immuniztion program for Mississippi's school children has been expanded this year. State Superintendent of Education, Dr. Charles Holladay, said it will include students entering kindergarten, first grade, tenth grade, and any who did not attend school in the state last year. Holladay said these students must show the blue Certificjte of Compliance before they will be allowed to attend classes.

The program was first implemented during the 1978-79 school year following passage by the Legislature. At that time, it required students in grades one through eight to be immunized before school be-

State Health Officer Dr. Alton Cobb said immunization may be obtained from a private physician or the county health department.

CO UNTY AGENT'S NOTES

Weeds in summer perennial pastures often contribute as much or more to low forage production than any other factor. These pests often require more nutrients, light and water than do forage plants.

PASTURE WEEDCONTROL

Broadleaf weeds cause the most problems. Particularly troublesome are horsenettle, tall dogfennel (cypressweed), smartweed, bitterweed and pigweed. These weeds often require chemical control with a herbicide containing dicamba (Banvel). A mixture containing one pound of dicamba and three pounds of 2,4-D per gallon will control most problem broadleaf weeds when applied at the rate of one to two pints per acre.

SOIL TEST:

You still have time to take soil samples to determine lime and fertilizer needs on pasture or row crop land to be planted this fall. Soil testing takes the guesswork out of lime and fertilizer programs. If you've started a late

tomato crop, you need to spray for early blight. This is the same disease that robbed many home gardeners of their spring tomato crops, and it will reduce fall crops unless controlled. For control, make weekly applications of a fungicide such as Maneb or Chlorothalonil. Make the first application when the plants are 7 to 10 inches tall and. continue treatment every 7 days until frost. Be sure to start the treatment early, because early blight is much more difficult to control once established.

Maneb will also control other fall garden diseases, such as stem anthracnose on lima beans and fungus leaf spots on turnips and mustard greens.

Tradition has dictated that a woman's place is in the home and not serving as breadwinner for the

However, in the early 70's, we have witnessed dramatic changes in the thinking and acceptance of women holding jobs that traditionally belonged to males. To illustrate, women construction workers are no longer a novelty. At the Tennessee Valley Authority's Yellow Creek Nuclear Plant north of here, women workers play an important role. Besides the usual annual positions, there are many women currently working in trades and labor jobs both as apprentices and journeymen.

With jobs ranging from unclassified laborers to steamfitter apprentices, it is not a rarity to see females perspiring and toiling along with the men throughout the 95 - to 100-degree days of July and tramping around in a freshly fallen January snow.

Nona Knight, Mary Jo Nunley, Paula Adamson, Alice Hamilton, Barbara Vandiver, Martha Kenaum, and Nancy Darby, to name a few, are proud of their jobs and feel a sense of accomplishment at their

Ms. Knight, nicknamed "Sissy," is presently agrease truck driver on the second shift. A resident of Florence, Alabama, she has been employed on the site for one year. "I don't mind driving anything," said Ms. Knight. I drove a 35-ton back dump when I first came here and have eight years of driving experience from coast to coast with an 18-wheeler (tractor-trailer rig). The diminuitive and energetic Ms. Knight stands a mere five feet tall and weighs 110 pounds. Her head doesn't reach the top of the tires on some trucks she drives. Her husband, Allen, works on the second shift here and is also a teamster.

Ms. Nunley, who came to work here on March 9. 1978, began her tenure serving as a classification 1 truck driver. Until May, when she was promoted to truck dispatcher, she drove pickup and flatbed trucks on the project. Now her duties include filling out time cards, recording overtime of all teamsters and coordinating the trucks and drivers for all other crafts on the project.

The first female teamster on the job, Ms. Nunley formerly worked with the Mississippi State Park

"I have found what I think I am suited for," remarked Ms. Nunley, a mother of four children from ages 7 to 18. "I love working with the drivers and being around trucks."

Dave Stanford, teamster superintendent, feels that both women "try to do whatever job is assigned to the best of their ability."

Ms. Adamson and Ms. Hamilton are both members of the TVA apprenticeship program. Apprentice training leads to craft journeyman status on the average of three years, less in some crafts. Skills are developed through supervised on-the-job experience. In each year of training, apprentices are given at least 144 hours of related classroom assignments, such as mathematics, trade, science and theory, and blueprint reading. Candidates are placed on occupational registers according to their education, work experience, interests, occupational aptitudes, and other factors. Apprenticeship training is available in approximately 15 different crafts.

Ms. Adamson, 22, from Muscle Shoals, Alabama, worked initially with TVA at Browns Ferry Nuclear Plant as a warehouse stores clerk. She transferred to Yellow Creek in May 1978 and later accepted a position as a road roller operator. She was selected four months later as an operating engineer crane apprentice. Presently, she is under the tutelage of Arnold Jeter, a veteran crane operator from Savan-

nah, Tennessee, and operates a crane in the reactor

"I have always been interested in crane operations," commented Ms. Adamson. "Construction work is really fascinating to me and always has been." Ironically, she recently married to another crane apprentice, Glen Whitlock, whom she met through the training program.

Ms. Hamilton was employed in March as a road roller operator and according to assistant construction superintendent John "Red" Hayes, "she is as good as any road roller operator we have here." She also worked with Clinton Construction Company of Union City, Tennessee, at the same position before coming

Nancy Darby, 50, who originally served as a laborer until June, is one of the oldest apprentices on the project. Now a member of the steamfitter apprentice program, she feels proud to have been selected for the program. She is currently working in the waste management building adjacent to the unit one reactor building where her son, Robert, works. Robert is

a carpenter apprentice with miscellaneous work duties. Barbara Vandiver, 23, and Martha Kenaum, 26, both of luka, are journeyman carpenters that work on a wooden deck area located next to the carpenter's shop.
