Homes To Get Home Repair Grant

Northeast Mississippi
Community Action Agency,
serving Alcorn, Prentiss and
Tishomingo Counties, has
been given a grant to pay
for materials needed to weath-
erize thirty-two homes in
the three county area. The
priority for selecting these
homes will be given to eld-
erly or handicapped with
low income. Up to \$400
will be provided for paying
for materials to weatherize
each home. This would in-
clude underpinning, repair-
ing doors and windows and
adding insulation in the at-
tics. Labor will be fur-
nished by Title VI Compre-
hensive Employment Train-
ing Act (CETA) with no cost
to the homeowner.

The main purpose of the

program is to reduce energy
costs. In many cases the
heat bills can be cut in half
with a good job of weatheri-
zation.

able in the Alcorn County
Neighborhood Service Cen-
ter located on Second Floor,
City Hall Building, Corinth;
Prentiss County Neighbor-
hood Service Center, lo-
cated on Second Floor, Pren-
tiss County Court House

County Court House, Iuka,
Miss. All applications will

ECONOMIST'S
NOTES

CLEAN COFFEE MAKER PRODUCES BEST BREW
No matter how it is brewed, coffee tastes best when the coffee maker is clean.

Follow this routine after each brew: take the pot apart, remove the grounds and wash it (including basket, stem and cover) in hot suds. Merely rinsing, even with hot water, will not remove the oily coffee residue which eventually becomes rancid and gives subsequent brews a bitter taste. Use a well-lathered percolator brush to scrub out the stem and spout where coffee sediment and oils accumulate.

If necessary, scour lightly with cleaner, either on a dishcloth (for stainless steel) or fine steel wool (for aluminum or glass) -- according to the type of pot. Rinse all parts with hot water, wipe dry and leave the coffee maker unassembled.

If a special or large capacity coffee maker has been stored, rinse it with hot suds and clear water to remove surface dust. To recondition "sweeten" a neglected coffee pot, let it perk for about 10 minutes -- using a solution of water and cream of tartar for alumi-

num, and water with baking soda for other types. An electric coffee maker needs to be washed inside and out; immerse only if the manufacturer advises.

TAKE CARE OF PLUMBING

You can prevent clogged drains. Be careful about what goes in the toilet bowl or down the drain.

Don't put anything solid in the toilet -- no paper towels, newspaper or cloth! Do not let socks or other small items slip down the drain or fall into the toilet. Don't use the toilet bowl for a trash can.

Don't put grease, paint or coffee grounds down the sink drain. Grease is the culprit of most clogged kitchen drains. Discard grease with the garbage, not down the drain.

Don't let hair and ravelings go down the drain. Hair stops up lavatory drains. Remove hair before washing out the bowl. Occasionally lift out the stopper and remove hair.

BAKED STUFFED POTATOES

3 med. baked potatoes
1/3 c. hot water

DEXTER SARTAIN



3 tbsp. nonfat dry milk powder
1/2 tsp. salt or butter-flavored salt
Dash of pepper
Paprika

Scrub baking potatoes; puncture skins with fork. Bake at 425 degrees for 1 hour. Cut potatoes in half lengthwise; scoop out insides. Mash. Combine the water, dry milk powder, salt and pepper. Add to mashed potatoes; beat until fluffy, adding more hot water, if needed. Pile lightly into shells; sprinkle with paprika. Return to oven and bake for about 10 minutes or until heated through. Yield: 6 servings/60 calories per serving.

COUNTY AGENT'S NOTES

VEGETATIVE PRACTICES TO PREVENT SOIL LOSS

August and September is the time to plan for fall established conservation crops. Vegetative cover is needed for field borders, waterways, parallel row adjustment strips and critical erosion areas. Any disturbed area should have cover established; crop residue should be left on the soil. Finely shred all crop residue so that it will provide better cover to hold the soil in place. Residue spreaders on combines should be of a type that will give uniform distribution of residue. Field stalk shredders for corn, cotton, etc. should chop the material fine and spread it uniformly. A flail type shredder should be considered. Only chisel plowing or subsoiling should be done after shredding of stalks until spring seedbed preparation.

Selection of plants for cover is quite important. Plant characteristics to consider are (a) time of year growth is active; (b) how well it will hold soil in place; (c) will it spread as a pest to areas outside the waterway, border, etc.; (d) can it be used for hay, seed production, etc.; (e) is it adapted to the soil you want to establish cover on; (f) how much lime and fertilizer does it require to get acceptable establishment and maintain a cover? Grasses and legumes that

can be established this fall are: Kentucky 31 fescue, red or white clover, combinations of fescue and clover, annual clovers, crimson, sub., etc.; rye, wheat, ryegrass, or combinations of these; and vetch or wild winter peas. All legume seed should be inoculated with the proper bacteria before seeding.

The only perennials for fall seeding are fescue and white clover. They should be seeded on a prepared seedbed with the fescue planted at a rate of 25 pounds per acre in September and the white clover seeded at three pounds per acre in mid-October when planted in combinations. Dalis grass could also be planted in early spring of the following year at a rate of 15 pounds of live seed per acre. Lime soils to a pH of 6.0 to 6.5 for these combinations and use a complete mixed fertilizer based on soil test. If soil tests are not available, use 60-60-60 of nitrogen, phosphate and potash per acre where no clover is planted and 30-60-60 where clover is to be planted.

The annual wintergrasses such as rye, wheat, ryegrass should be planted only where temporary winter cover is needed and a perennial is to be planted the following spring. Use 60 pounds each of nitrogen, phosphate and potash per acre at establishment and 50 pounds of ryegrass or four bushels of rye or wheat per acre in the fall.

For establishment of field cover crops for green manure, turn under and use wild winter peas, vetch, or one of the cereals. No fertilizer should be required at planting on well-fertilized cropland areas. The cereals would need 60 pounds of nitrogen in the early spring to produce a good crop for turning under. Seeding rates of two bushels of rye or wheat, 30 pounds of betch or wild winter peas should be seeded as soon after harvest as possible.

WHEREAS, the amount above specified is not now available in the treasury of said County to provide for the aforesaid expenditures; and

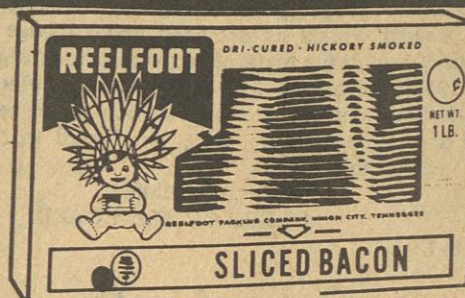
