Highway 25 North of Tishoand injured five. Dead on arrival at Tishomingo County Hospital following the headon crash was Mrs. Loraine Harvill, 57, of Dennis; James Byars, 28, and Ricky Rogers, 19, both of Collierville, Tenn.

According to Mississippi Highway Patrolman, Bill Bingham, the collision occured around 8:50 Saturday night, three miles north of Tishomingo near Pat's Drive-In. An investigation at the scene found that the 1968 Ford pick-up, occupied by the two young Tennessee men, was traveling south on 25, when it apparently crossed the center line into the north-bound lane and hit head-on with a 1966 Buick, traveling north. Six people were in the car at the time: Mrs. Loraine Harvill, a

challenge the regulation in court. Obviously, this concept gives an unfair advantage to federal agencies. The time and money required to show in court that a particular rule or regulation exceeds the statutory power and authority of the agency is prohibitive for most businesses and

industries which are saddled with federal regulations

If the change the Senate has approved becomes law, federal agencies will be required to prove the validity of any of their regulations which are challenged in court. This reversal of the burden of proof will make it much easier for those who are subject to federal regulations to

While this is not a complete answer to the problems and burdens our people face in the regulatory field, it is

certainly a useful, welcome, and helpful step in the right direction. American businesses and industries, large and small alike, are literally staggering under the everincreasing burden of federal regulation. It is encouraging to see that the problem is being widely recognized and that

# CO UNTY **AGENT'S NOTES**

SELECT WEED-FREE GRAIN FIELDS

It's time to select and prepare fields if you plan to grow small grain crops this winter. Plowing or disking these fields now will destroy many weeds and grasses and also help conserve soil moisture.

It's especially important to keep wild onions and garlic out of small grain crops. Start by selecting fields that are free or nearly free of these weeds. These weed pests can cost you a lot of money next spring if they are mixed in with the grain. Wild onions and garlic are difficult to control in late winter and early spring; so it's best to start with fields that don't have these weed problems.

START NOW FOR

BEAUTIFUL LAWN September is preparation time for a beautiful lawn this winter, next spring and summer. To prepare your lawn for this winter, it's a good idea to apply lime and fertilizer based on soil test recommendations. If you don't have a soil test, a general recommendation is three pounds each of phosphate and potash per 1,000 square feet of lawn area. Apply the fertilizer between now and November if you don't plan to overseed your lawn. You can obtain this rate by applying 15 pounds of 0-20-20 mixed fertilizer per 1,000 square feet.

SOYBE AN INSECTS

Don't let up with your soybean insect control program yet. Damaging insects are increasing in many of the state's soybean fields, especially in late planted beans. Included are the green cloverworm, stink bug, velvetbean caterpiller and bollworm. The highest insect populations are occurring on varieties planted after mid-June. In a normal year, this would be a small portion of the crop. However, because of the late start this spring, much of the crop is still attractive to in-



> A RESOLUTION DECLARING THE INTENTION OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF TISHOMINGO COUNTY, MISSISSIPPI, TO ISSUE A PROMISSORY NOTE OF SAID COUNTY TO RAISE MONEY FOR THE PURPOSE OF ERECTING A MEDICAL CLINIC AND RELATED FACILITIES ON THE GROUNDS OF THE TISHOMINGO COUNTY HOSPITAL AND DIRECTING PUBLICATION OF NOTICE OF SUCH INTENTION.

> WHEREAS, this Board of Supervisors does now find and determine that it has become and is necessary to raise money for the purpose of erecting a medical clinic and related facilities upon the grounds of the Tishomingo County Hospital for said County at an estimated cost of \$125,000; and

> WHEREAS, the amount above specified is not now available in the treasury of said County to provide for the aforesaid expenditures; and

WHEREAS, this Board of Supervisors is authorized by provisions of Section 19-9-1, et seq, Mississippi Code, 1972, Annotated, to issue promissory notes for the aforesaid purpose; and

WHEREAS, this Board of Supervisors does determine that the amount of the aforesaid promissory note now proposed to be issued, when added to the amount of indebtedness now outstanding, will not exceed ten per centum (10%) of the assessed valuation of said County;

WHEREAS, this Board does now further find and determine that it is necessary and in the public interest that the aforesaid promissory note of said County be issued as hereinafter set forth;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF TISHOMINGO COUNTY, MISSISSIPPI, as follows:

SECTION I: That the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, hereby declares its intention to issue its promissory note of said County in the maximum amount of \$125,000 to raise money for the purpose of erecting a medical clinic and related facilities upon the grounds of the Tishomingo County Hospital.

SECTION II: That the said promissory note, in the amount and for the purpose aforesaid, will be issued at a meeting of said Board of Supervisors to be held at 10 o'clock A.M. on Monday, the 8th day of October, 1979, or at some meeting held subsequent thereto. OUR SCHOOL

by Jerry C. Stone, Superintendent ARTICLE I

Ove the next few weeks, I would like to discuss the Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District. I will discuss progress to date, curriculum changes, faculty improvements, school plants, immediate needs and long range needs. As Superintendent, the need for short range plans and long range plans is vital to our decision making process. The school is a reflection of the community and by many people is viewed as the outreach arm of the community. Further, the future of a community is closely tied to the school; by providing community services the school enriches the life of the community and through academic and vocational education the school creates the community of tomorrow. The public's right to be informed about the school is reflected in the governmental concept that the school should be locally administrated. I welcome comments concerning this column and the columns to follow. Comments should be mailed to the Office of the Superintendent; Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District; Luka, Mississippi.

This first column will be utilized to illustrate the valuable contribution that the local community makes to the school. Without this support, both financially and physically, the school would not exist.

During the first two days of our administration, the high school PTA sponsored a work-day. Mrs. Martha Segars, President, joined thirty to forty other concerned parents and assisted the school in providing a general cleaning to the high school grounds. Mr. otton Wade, Supervisor, provided gravel and machinery to clean the ditches and generally improve the grounds. That day was a great success and I cannot mention all who participated but it was hot and it was fun and it was app .... and by the students.

The Iuka Board of Aldermen, James L. Dean, Leroy Dean, Carl Smith, Floyd Curtis, E. N. Allen, and Mrs. Mamie Culver and Mayor George W. Cutshall, allowed us to close the through street at the high school and provided us with some of the funds to begin the restoration of the high school. This action was prompt and established early that the Aldermen were

The Board of Supervisors shared with the Tishomingo County Schools and our school a grantfrom Economic Development Administration. This allowed us to paint the interior and install a new heating and cooling system for Howard Auditorium. The Board, Lyonel Wade, Gerald Parsons, A. C. Ryan, M. R. Whitehead and Leon Cook, not only provided us with this assistance, but they have aided the school in many ways.

Dr. Frank Lovell, Director of the Educational Finance Commission, aided us in securing funds to remodel the high school. Barry Finch provided the legal consultation for this rather involved proposal. With these monies, we repainted the high school, installed fluorescent lights, installed new restrooms, and air conditioned the library, the business education room, the teachers' lounge and the cafeteria.

During this time, the school auxiliary clubs had provided their continued support of the school. The Athletic Boosters' Club, headed by Cliff Daniel and Charles Curtis, provided the leadership to furnish the athletes with an annual banquet with awards, letter jackets and several weigh machines. In addition, the Boosters' Club provided on-going support for all athletic teams. The Band Parents' Auxiliary has been under

the leadership of Mr. and Mrs. Gene Crane and Mr. and Mrs. Joe Hussey and has provided funds for the purchase of new uniforms for the band. They have also assisted with travel expenses for the band on all band trips. The luka Elementary School PTA, under the leadership of Tommy Jack Ramsey and Mrs. Glenda Milligan serving as President and Mrs. Sandra Skinner and Mr. Ed Hunley as Projects Chairman, has led the community and school in establishing the "Amy Skinner Memorial Fund" for the on-going development of the school playground. Funds have been provided for eye and ear check-ups; bookcases, maps and globes for classrooms; and black-out shades for the cafeteria. Mrs. Martha Segars and Mrs. Marie Ramsey have served as President of the luka High School PTA and have sponsored an Open House; Clean-up, Fix-up Day; fund raising with the money being used for needed items and the Home Economics Department, ETV cable, landscaping the school grounds, and assisted in purchasing chairs for the cafeteria.

John Hendrix, with his contacts in TVA and with the federal government, assisted the school in qualifying for funds to offset the impact felt by our school during federal and TVA activity in the area. These funds have allowed the school to purchase three school buses and construct six classrooms at the elementary school and strengthen our remedial program. Assistance in this project was supplied by many people including Gerald Pevey, Mississippi State Department of Education; Robert Allgood, Atlanta office of HEW; Curtis Mills, Washington office of HEW; Dennis Mynatt, Knoxville office of TVA, and others.

Dr. Louie Finch, Grady Howell and Steve Haliburton worked closely with the school to make it the funding agent for the Governor's Office of Job Development. This program has supplied summer employment and vocational training to many Tishomingo County youths.

This column cannot contain all of the people, organizations and clubs who have aided the school during the last two and one-half years. But their efforts have been appreciated. The patrons who have purchased season athletic tickets, the merchants who support our yearbook, Mrs. John Young who headed a drive to restore the grand piano in Howard Auditorium. the employees of the luka Shirt Company who provided the labor for part of our band uniforms, the organizations and clubs who provide awards for our students on Awards Day, Ed Hunley who is director of the Yellow Creek Watershed Authority has aided in many ways, and the merchants who give our many organizations special prices -- all of these and many more

have provided the impetus to the reconstruction of the luka schools.

However, the prime leading force in any change in the schools is the local school board. The civic minded individuals who have served and who are now serving on our Board of Trustees are J. R. Long, Barry Finch, V. W. Grisham, Neil Davis, Charles Lewis, Jim Carpenter and Frank Crossett. They have provided the leadership and the know-how to allow the administration to seek and secure the funds that are necessary to operate a school.

To all the people mentioned and to the hundreds that have not been mentioned, the Superintendent of the Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District would like to publicly say "thank you." Your school and your children will profit for years because of your efforts. Next week we will discuss the progress

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

# Narcotics Agent Shot To Death

A 25-year-old state narcotics agent from Corinth was shot to death Friday afternoon in the city while helping an Alcorn County deputy sheriff investigate a disturbance call.

Harold Lane Caldwell died Friday afternoon with bullet wounds to the chest and head.

He is the grandson of Mrs. Lizzie Rast and the late Fred Rast, of Iuka.

Sheriff Edwin Coleman said the man suspected of firing the shots, Chester A. Barnes, 75, of Booneville, is being held without bond in the county jail on charges of capital murder, kidnapping and aggravated assault on a police officer.

The shooting occurred at 1:10 p.m. Friday as Caldwell, whose office was in the Sheriff's Department building, and Chief Deputy Sheriff Terry Doles arrived at a Corinth service station to answer a call about a possaid.

Caldwell had served as a deputy sheriff in Alcorn County for several years before he joined the narcotics bureau, Coleman said. He was assigned to the bureau's Corinth office and worked with the department on cases, the sheriff added.

"He was like a brother to all of us down here," the sheriff said.

At the service station, the two men went to an automobile where a man, with his hand in his right front pocket, was seated and asked him to leave the car. When he refused Caldwell and Doles attempted to forcibly remove him.

The sheriff said that, when the man moved his hand behind his back, Caldwell, standing on the driver's side of the car, saw the gun in his hand and "went for it." Coleman said the man fired the gun twice into Caldwell's armpit and then fired once at Doles, missing him.

He then dropped the gun, the sheriff said.



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
