Funeral Services Held for William J. Brinkley

William J. Brinkley, well known Iukan, died early last Thursday morning at the Tishomingo County Hospital. He had been ill for several months.

Mr. Brinkley was manager of Tishomingo County Electric Power Association for 17 years, retiring in August, 1976. He was a past president of the Iuka Rotary Club; an Episcopalian; a life member of the Executive Board of Yocona Area Council, Boy Scouts of America; a longtime Scoutmaster and holder of Scouting's highest award, the Silver Beaver. He was a member of the Iuka Chamber of Commerce. Born in Iuka, he graduated from Iuka High School and attended Northwestern University where he led a popular dance band, The Royal Allegians.

In September, 1939, Mr. Brinkley accepted the position of general manager of Tishomingo County Electric Power Association. As manager, his basic aim was to provide electric power to anyone who wished it and to restore interrupted service any hour of the day or night, regardless of weather. His friends remember him as a very patient man, always in a good humor, ready to talk and especially to laugh with anyone, an eternal optimist and one with never a unkind word to or about his fellowman.

Funeral services were

held at 2:00 p.m. Friday, September 14, at the Iuka Methodist Church with Rev. Dudley Brown, of Iuka, and Rev. Jack Williams, of Tupelo, officiating.

An Episcopal graveside service was conducted by the Rite Rev. Edward Hale, of Corinth, Miss.

Mr. Brinkley is survived by his wife, Mrs. Flora Lee Craddock Brinkley; two sons, William J. Brinkley III and Frank M. Brinkley; six grandchildren; one grandson; a niece, Mrs. Lynwood Buntin, of Little Rock, Ark.; and an aunt, Mrs. Helen Lake King, of Tusculum, Ala.

Iuka Woman Dies In Crash

Services were held Wednesday for Mrs. Betty Sue Newcomb, a teacher's aide who was killed Monday in a two-vehicle accident near Corinth while driving home several students from the Timber Hills Mental Health Center in Corinth.

Alcorn County Sheriff Edwin Coleman said Mrs. Newcomb had six children passengers with her, including her 13-year-old daughter, Tammy, and five members of another family when she collided head-on with a log truck on a county road several miles east of Corinth. Five of the six children, whose ages range from 2 to 13, were treated for minor injuries at Magnolia Hospital in Corinth and released, the sheriff said. A hospital spokesman said Tuesday the

sixth passenger, Edna Bradstock, 13, was in stable condition at the hospital, where she was being treated for injuries she received in the accident.

Randy L. Hickox, driver of the log truck, was charged with manslaughter, the sheriff said. No court date had been set Tuesday for Hickox, who was uninjured, he said.

Coleman said the wreck occurred at 3:45 p.m. Monday in a curve on the rain-slick blacktop road near Jacinto.

Services for Mrs. Newcomb were held Wednesday at Pleasant Grove Church of Christ with burial in the church cemetery. Coleman Funeral Home, east of Corinth, had charge.

She leaves five daughters, Mrs. Betty Gail Hatch, of Corinth, and Miss Tammy Newcomb, Miss Teresa Newcomb, Miss Tina Newcomb, all of Iuka; a son, Troy Newcomb, Jr., and her mother and stepfather, Mr. and Mrs. Willie Reynolds, all of Iuka.

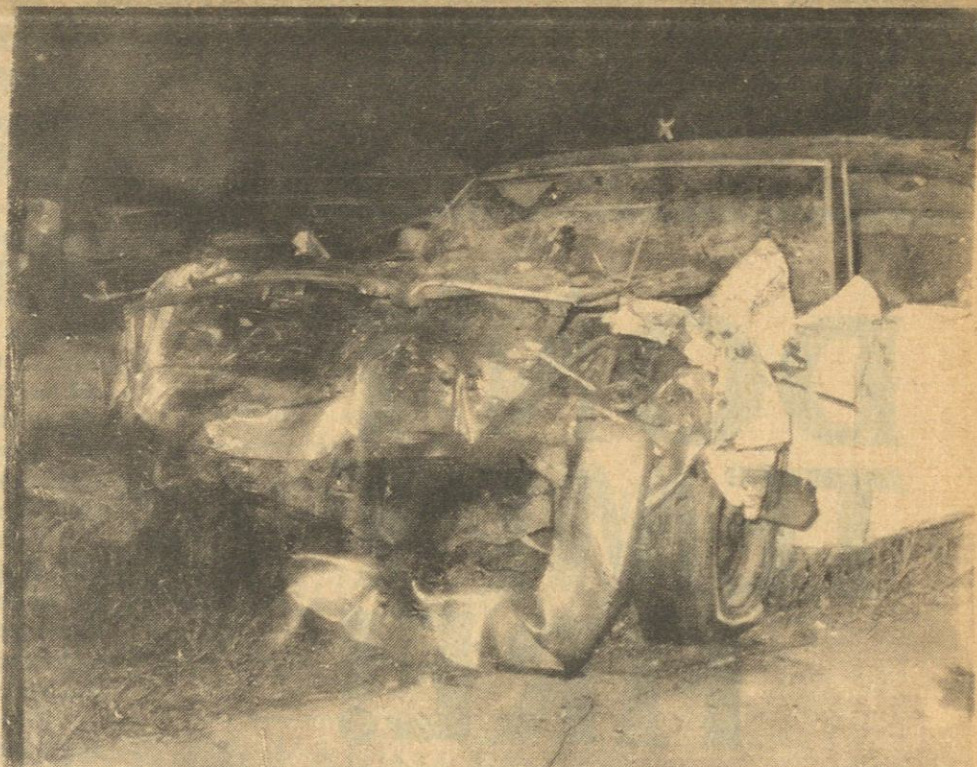

Three Killed, Five Injured In Collision

A two-vehicle accident on Highway 25 North of Tishomingo on Saturday evening, claimed the lives of three and injured five. Dead on arrival at Tishomingo County Hospital following the head-on crash was Mrs. Loraine Harvill, 57, of Dennis; James Byars, 28, and Ricky Rogers, 19, both of Collierville, Tenn.

According to Mississippi Highway Patrolman, Bill Bingham, the collision occurred around 8:50 Saturday night, three miles north of Tishomingo near Pat's Drive-In. An investigation at the scene found that the 1968 Ford pickup, occupied by the two young Tennessee men, was traveling south on 25, when it apparently crossed the center line into the north-bound lane and hit head-on with a 1966 Buick, traveling north. Six people were in the car at the time: Mrs. Loraine Harvill, a

back-seat passenger, who was killed, and five others, who were taken to the Tishomingo County Hospital and later transferred to area medical centers. Treated at Coffee Memorial Hospital in Florence were: Joyce Harvill, 22, of Dennis, in the intensive care unit; Jennifer Harvill, 18 months, of Dennis; Dorssie Harvill, of Arab, Ala., both in satisfactory condition; Curtis Terrell, of Arab, was hospitalized at the Tishomingo County Hospital; J. C. Harvill, 24, of Dennis, sustained multiple lacerations and fractures and was in the surgical intensive care unit of North Mississippi Medical Center in Tupelo, Monday.

The accident is still under investigation by the Mississippi Highway Patrol.

Carr Funeral Home, of Guntersville, Ala., was in charge of the Harvill services.

BODY-CONSCIOUS STYLES POPULAR THIS FALL

Hemlines and jackets are shorter, skirts slim, waists defined and shoulders emphasized in body-conscious shaping for fall. It's a throw-back to the fashion silhouette popular in the 50's and highlighted by the suit.

New textures make fabrics important. The most popular fabrics this season are naturals such as wool, cotton and silk. Suit fabrics include tweeds, cords and corduroys. Twills, gabardine and herringbone replace plain-weave poplin. Crepe is brushed for softness.

Embossed nylon knits have the texture of velveteen and smooth leather. Loopy knits give a combined surface of velour and panne. New ways with velour include twill stripes, wave patterning or flowers inside diamond shapes.

Chenille in wool, rayon and cotton or wool and polyester is popular, as is cotton terry toweling. Terry and chenille are also combined to incorporate the surface interest in both. Shaggy terry, a new look between terry and chenille, is featured in polyester and blends of polyester with other man-made fabrics or with wool. Poodle cloth and chinchilla cloth are novel materials.

Shine and iridescence are everywhere in knits and wovens. Iridescence is achieved by sheining (embossing 125-500 lines per inch on fabric surface to give a silk-like luster). Two different colors of yarn or a combination of matte and shiny yarns may be used. Vibrant colors appear alone or include black accents. Bright, multi-colored flecks appear on dark backgrounds, especially black and plum. With the emphasis on shine, tweedy flecks and texture, prints are used sparingly.

A return to the ensemble or costume of the 50's boasts slim and simple suits, dresses with jackets and two-piece dresses and jumpers. Collars are small, rounded or V-necked. In suiting, many jackets are collarless. Shoulder interest includes padding, shirring, flanges, puffs and buttons. Nipped-

in waistlines are accented with sashes, ties and belts. The jacket highlights fall coordinates, whether it completes a suit or provides mix and match possibilities. Jackets are short and boxy, fitted or casually draped with one-button center closure or side-closure. Another look is the wrapped jacket. Accents include piping, some in leather, and belts which cinch the jacket into shape. For inside flattery on suit jackets, try tacking on embroidered ribbon for braid over the lining edge where it meets the front facing. A tailor's weight in the form of a gold chain hand-tacked to the inside bottom edge of the suit jacket adds decorative trim and makes a jacket hang straight. Remove it, though, when

REPORT TO MISSISSIPPIANS



A small but significant step toward curbing excessive federal regulation was taken in the Senate recently when we voted to place the burden of establishing the validity of a federal regulation upon the agency which originates it.

Under present law, the courts presume that regulations imposed by federal agencies are valid. The burden is placed on an individual, business, or industry to prove that the regulation is not valid should they decide to challenge the regulation in court. Obviously, this concept gives an unfair advantage to federal agencies. The time and money required to show in court that a particular rule or regulation exceeds the statutory power and authority of the agency is prohibitive for most businesses and industries which are saddled with federal regulations which are sometimes unfair and often conflicting.

If the change the Senate has approved becomes law, federal agencies will be required to prove the validity of any of their regulations which are challenged in court. This reversal of the burden of proof will make it much easier for those who are subject to federal regulations to challenge those which they feel are unjustified.

While this is not a complete answer to the problems and burdens our people face in the regulatory field, it is certainly a useful, welcome, and helpful step in the right direction. American businesses and industries, large and small alike, are literally staggering under the ever-increasing burden of federal regulation. It is encouraging to see that the problem is being widely recognized and that the Congress is beginning to correct its mistakes in this area.

Complex, costly and burdensome rules and regulations which are being imposed upon businesses and industries by federal agencies are threatening the free enterprise system. We must reverse this trend.

Abuse of regulatory power is a matter of great concern which the Congress must deal with in a decisive way. Over-regulation is creating unnecessary costs and a mass of paperwork. It contributes to inflation, higher taxes and an unbalanced budget. It places an intolerable burden upon business. We have a special duty to do something about it.

Homes To Get Home Repair Gr

Northeast Mississippi Community Action Agency, serving Alcorn, Prentiss and Tishomingo Counties, has been given a grant to pay for materials needed to weatherize thirty-two homes in the three county area. The priority for selecting these homes will be given to elderly or handicapped with low income. Up to \$400 will be provided for paying for materials to weatherize each home. This would include underpinning, repairing doors and windows and adding insulation in the attics. Labor will be furnished by Title VI Comprehensive Employment Training Act (CETA) with no cost to the homeowner. The main purpose of the

program is to reduce costs. In many cases, heat bills can be cut with a good job of weatherization. Applications are available in the Alcorn Neighborhood Center located on Second Street in the City Hall Building, Prentiss County Courthouse, Second Street, Tishomingo, Mississippi. MR. AUTREY W. MANGUM, age 83, of Iuka, is shown here in his yard, building his very own log cabin, and is doing the work all by himself. Mr. Mangum always wanted to build a log cabin but never really had the time. He lived on a farm for 25 years before moving to the city, raising cattle and doing the ordinary farm work. Now that he is living in the city, he says he needs the storage space and since he always wanted a log cabin he decided that's what he would build. Mr. Mangum stated that anyone of average physical strength can build such a cabin if they want to

bad enough and have the willpower. He claims he can do just as much now as he could in his younger days - it just takes him 1/3 of the time longer. The building size is 12 x 18, and has a front door and a window on the end and at the side. Mr. Mangum had "Ready Mix 'Concrete'" pour the floor about 1 1/2 years ago, and a few months later Mr. Mangum laid the bricks, using mortar and cement. He had the bricks for 26 years before he used them, and had 80 acres of land on Indian Creek Road where he got all the trees to make his logs for the cabin. He

cut all the logs and peeled them. It took 98 hours to peel 48 logs, which average about 7 1/2 inches in diameter. It took an estimate of 148 hours to get the logs up in place and fastened. He nails he used are 6 to 7 1/2 inches long. He says he plans on filling all the openings with concrete so it will be practically air tight. The rafters are made from pine logs, 3 to 5 inches in diameter and there are 22 of them. It took him about 10 hours to peel them, erecting the rafters took about 75 hours. He plans to use galvanized steel roofing. Mr. Mangum says it has cost him around \$160.00, so far. He still has the roof to do, and figures that the total amount for the entire project should not exceed \$300.00. He says that if you contracted the job it would probably have been built out of lumber and metal and cost anywhere from \$500 to \$600. The cabin is 10 logs high. To erect it, he rolled 5 logs up first using a skid, then he used a come-a-long to put the other five up. So, see what a little work yourself can save you. It may take a little longer, but you'll sure be proud of the work when you're done.

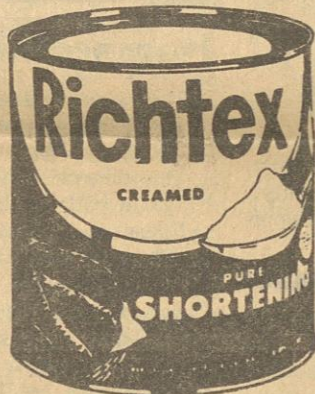

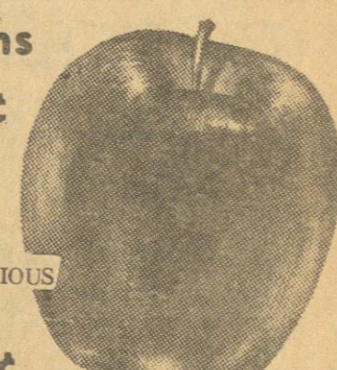

Narcotics Agent Shot To Death

A 25-year-old state narcotics agent from Corinth was shot to death Friday afternoon in the city while helping an Alcorn County deputy sheriff investigate a disturbance call.

Harold Lane Caldwell died Friday afternoon with bullet wounds to the chest and head.

He is the grandson of Mrs. Lizzie Rast and the late Fred Rast, of Iuka.

Sheriff Edwin Coleman said the man suspected of firing the shots, Chester A. Barnes, 75, of Booneville, is being held without bond in the county jail on charges of capital murder, kidnapping and aggravated assault on a police officer.

The shooting occurred at 1:10 p.m. Friday as Caldwell, whose office was in the Sheriff's Department building, and Chief Deputy Sheriff Terry Doles arrived at a Corinth service station to answer a call about a possible kidnapping, Coleman said.

The call came from Fay Bennett, 37, of Blue Mountain. Coleman said Ms. Bennett ran errands for Barnes, such as "taking him to the grocery store."

The sheriff said Ms. Bennett told officers that when she arrived at Barnes' Booneville home Friday, he was packing his clothes, saying that he had to "get out of town."

Ms. Bennett told officers that Barnes asked her to drive him to a Corinth motel. Ms. Bennett said that as they were leaving Booneville, Barnes pulled out a .25 caliber automatic pistol and began telling her that he knew she loved him, Coleman said.

Coleman said that this frightened Ms. Bennett, who continued driving to Corinth. He said she stopped at the Holiday Inn Exxon on U. S. 72, walked behind the building to a restaurant and telephoned the sheriff's department.

The sheriff said Doles took the call. As he was leaving the building, "Lane asked Terry if he wanted him to go along," Coleman said.

Caldwell had served as a deputy sheriff in Alcorn County for several years before he joined the narcotics bureau, Coleman said. He was assigned to the bureau's Corinth office and worked with the department on cases, the sheriff added.

"He was like a brother to all of us down here," the sheriff said. At the service station, the two men went to an automobile where a man, with his hand in his right front pocket, was seated and asked him to leave the car. When he refused Caldwell and Doles attempted to forcibly remove him.

The sheriff said that, when the man moved his hand behind his back, Caldwell, standing on the driver's side of the car, saw the gun in his hand and "went for it," Coleman said the man fired the gun twice into Caldwell's armpit and then fired once at Doles, missing him.

He then dropped the gun, the sheriff said. Caldwell was pronounced dead on arrival at Magnolia Hospital.

Coleman said Caldwell, the father of two young children, was "a real top-notch guy. He'll be missed."

Doles was not injured in the shooting, although Coleman said the chief deputy was "very shaken" by it.

Even though Caldwell was not working for the narcotics bureau on a case when the shooting occurred, he was serving as an officer in the line of duty, Coleman said.

A preliminary hearing has not been scheduled for Barnes. "No bond will be set," Coleman said.

Services were held at 4 p.m. Sunday at Pleasant Hill Methodist Church. The Rev. Greek Millin and Rev. Cole Eaton officiated with burial in the church cemetery.

He was a graduate of Kossuth High School and the University of Mississippi.

Survivors are his wife, Mrs. Donnita Caldwell; two sons, Chancey and Justin Caldwell; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Bobby Caldwell; one brother, Joe Caldwell; two sisters, Mrs. Tammy Ashe and Miss Lori Caldwell, all of Corinth; and his grandparents, Mrs. Lizzie Rast and Mrs. Edna Caldwell.

Feeding Program For Senior Citizens In State

Morrison Food Services, the largest contract feeding company in the South, will soon begin feeding 9,000 senior citizens daily in a statewide government funded elderly meals program in Mississippi.

The meal program, recently awarded to Morrison's on contract by the Mississippi Council on Aging, will begin operation on October 1. According to Everett C. According to Mills the program is funded by Title III of the Older Americans Comprehensive Service Amendments of 1978 and Public Law 95-478. This is the largest government funded elderly feeding program operated by Morrison's. The southern company also feeds 1,600 senior citizens in other government title funded programs at 5 separate congregate sites.

The team from Ohio was the only one that seemed to give the Pepsi Cola Tigers any trouble. That was their only defeat in the double elimination tournament. 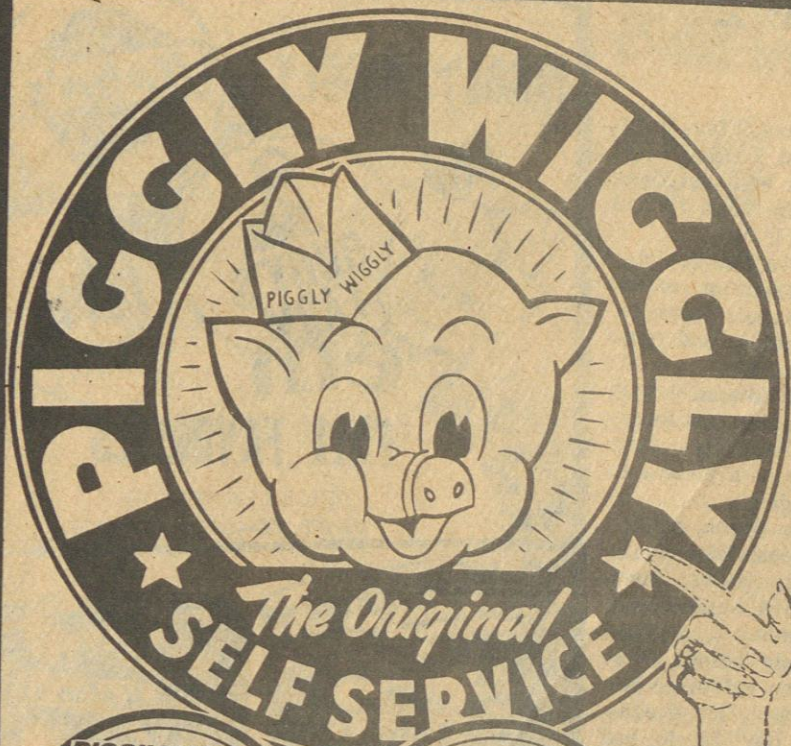
