Christmas Seal Campaign Opens

The seventy-third annual Christmas Seal Campaign officially opened in Mississippi and the nation on November 1, and residents of Tishomingo County will be receiving the 1979 Christmas Seals and appeal letter, according to Mrs. Jo Ann Wimberly, Chairman of the Tishomingo County Chapter of the Mississippi Lung Association. The Mississippi Lung Association, with 86 chapters and over 7,500 adult and youth volunteers in Mississippi, is dedicated to prevention and control of lung diseases through programs of education, service and medical research.

Christmas Seal contributions will be used to combat emphysema, tuberculosis, chronic bronchitis, asthma, pediatric and occupational lung problems, and all other lung and respiratory diseases during the coming year.

Christmas Seals for 1979 are once again designed by the school children of America. Each seal represents a winning design from each of the 50 states, District of Columbia, Guam, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands.

Mississippi's own special Christmas Seal was designed by Stacy Lantrip, age 9, of Batesville.

Three Escape From Tishomingo County Jail

Three inmates of the Tishomingo County Jail successfully escaped the facilities early Tuesday morning, October 30, according to County Sheriff Chester Dawson.

The three making the get-away were: Lloyd Seay, of Iuka, serving 10 years for aggravated assault, waiting transfer to Parchman; Danny Weathers, of Florence, waiting trial for two counts of burglary and larceny; and Eugene Newsome, of Florence, waiting trial on two counts of burglary and larceny.

Dawson said the trio, who were housed together, escaped by prying open a visitor window in the cell, entering the main hallway of the jail, and leaving through an open door. The men were seen in the cell around 1:00 by another prisoner, making the time of escape to be in the early hours of Tuesday morning.

Seay and Weathers were captured by the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department, assisted by Alabama officials, near the Natchez Trace and Hwy. 72 intersection near Cherokee, Ala. Dawson said they practically had to "dig the men out" from hiding under a honeysuckle vine. The Sheriff's Department discovered the men after talking with various people between Iuka and Cherokee and following any leads that were given.

At press-time, Newsome remains at large, but is believed to also be in Alabama.

On Saturday, October 27, Richard Crume, who was waiting trial on charge of aggravated assault, escaped from the Tishomingo County Jail while talking with some visitors. He just slipped out.

ALABAMA MEN KILLED IN COLLISION

Two young Colbert County, Alabama men were killed and three others injured on Hwy. 72 East on the rain slick Miss.-Ala. State Line hill, Sunday afternoon, Oct. 28, at approximately 2:25 p.m.

According to authorities, dead on arrival at Tishomingo County Hospital were Anthony Marion Thomas, 15, and Dennis Thomas, 17, both of 500 East 13th, Sheffield. The young boys were both passengers in a 1967 Ford, driven by their older brother.

According to Floyd Whitaker, Third District Constable, it appeared that a 1967 Ford, driven by Vernon Edward Thomas, 21, also of 500 East 13th, Sheffield, was traveling east on 72. The

three young men were also towing a Pontiac behind their vehicle when the driver apparently lost control, causing the car being towed to jack-knife, throwing the front car into the path of an oncoming car. The westbound auto was a 1969 Chevrolet, driven by Kenneth Lee Trexler, 30, of Cherokee, and traveling with him was Sandra Trexler, 25, also of Cherokee.

The three injured were carried to Tishomingo County Hospital and later transferred to hospitals in Florence, Ala., where Thomas was reported having internal injuries; Trexler, a broken left arm; and Sandra Trexler was suffering from head injuries.

HOME ECONOMIST'S NOTES

LIGHTING MAINTENANCE

Home lighting equipment needs regular care and cleaning to keep it operating efficiently. A collection of dirt and dust on bulbs, tubes, diffusion bowls, lampshades and fixtures can cause a substantial loss in light output. You won't get the light you pay for.

Clean all lighting equipment at least four times a year. Bowls on portable lamps or hanging fixtures should be cleaned more often.

Wash glass and plastic diffusers and shields in a detergent solution, rinse in

clear warm water and dry. Wipe bulbs and tubes with a damp, soapy cloth; dry well.

Dust wood and metal lamp bases with a soft cloth and apply a thin coat of wax. Glass, pottery, marble, chrome and onyx bases can be washed with a damp soapy cloth, dried and waxed.

Lampshades may be cleaned by a vacuum cleaner with a soft brush attachment or drycleaned. Silk or rayon shades hand sewn to the frame, with no glued trim-

ings, may be washed in mild, lukewarm suds and rinsed in clear water. Dry shades quickly to prevent rusting of frames. Wipe parchment shades with a dry cloth.

Remove plastic wrappings from lampshades. Wrappings create glare and may warp the frame and wrinkle the shade fabric. Some are fire hazards.

Darkened bulbs reduce light output 25 to 50 percent, but use the same amount of current as a new bulb operating at correct wattage. Put darkened bulbs in closets or hallways where less light is needed.

BEWARE OF FRAUD
As homeowners gear up for winter by insulating their homes, they should beware of possible insulation fraud. Hundreds of products on the market today promise to save thousands of dollars in utility bills. Consumers should be skeptical of any product that promises too much. Consumers should consult people who know about these products. Beware of salesmen who insist you must buy now without giving you time to think it over.

**LOW CALORIE
CHEESE APPLE CRISP**
4 medium apples, cored and sliced
1/4 cup water
1/2 teaspoon lemon juice
2 tablespoons liquid artificial sweetener
1/2 cup flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
3 tablespoons butter
1/2 cup grated cheddar cheese

Place sliced apples in deep pie plate or baking dish. Combine water, lemon juice and sweetener; pour over apples. Combine flour, salt and cinnamon; cut in butter until the consistency of coarse meal; sprinkle over apples. Cover with grated cheese. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 to 40 minutes, or until apples are tender. Serve warm or cold. Makes 6 servings. Each serving contains 171 calories.

fall for better crops in 1980. Fall is the perfect time to subsoil cropland with traffic pans. A good job of subsoiling will increase water intake, rooting depth, soil aeration and crop yields. It will also reduce water runoff, erosion and, often, nematode problems. In tests in the Delta, subsoiling increased cotton yields an average of 130 pounds per acre.

Lime is critically needed on about four out of five acres of row crop and pasture land in Tishomingo County. Liming row crop land in the fall will give the soil time to react with the soil to correct acidity problems for next year's crops. Severely acid soils limed adequately will yield 7 to 10 more bushels of soybeans per acre or about 125 pounds of cotton.

Land forming will assure earlier planting, more precise application of chemicals and use of cultivation equipment. Another benefit is better water management without erosion. Land forming is a must if you plan to irrigate. If you're considering land forming, consult a professional engineer before starting.

COVER CROPS
From now until early November is the best time to plant wild winter peas, vetch or cereals for winter cover and a green manure crop to turn under next spring. Peas or vetch will provide organic matter plus 40 to 60 pounds of nitrogen per acre. Cereal crops, such as wheat or rye, will provide only organic matter. These annual green manure crops will build organic matter only temporarily; however, they may have great value in improving herbicide performance and soil tilth during the following growing season.

COMMITTEE ELECTION

A list of eligible voters has been prepared and is available in the county office for public inspection. If your name was inadvertently left off the voter's list, you should contact the county office if you wish to participate in the election. October 29 was the final date to submit a nominating petition. Since no nominating petitions were received by the deadline of October 29, the present community committee will meet November 5, to complete the slate of nominees. Ballots for voting will be furnished each eligible voter on or before November 23, 1979. The ballot must be returned to the County ASCS Office or post marked by

December 3, 1979. Ballots will be tabulated with a chairperson, vice-chairperson, regular member and two alternates elected for each community. The three regular members of the committee will meet Dec. 13, 1979 at the County ASCS Office to elect a County Committee Man to serve a three year term, a first and second alternate to serve a one year term and select the chairman and vice-chairman of the county committee from the three members. We urge every eligible voter to

participate in the election process.

MILK SUPPORT PRICE INCREASED

The government's support price for milk was recently increased from \$10.51 to \$11.22 per hundredweight, according to Elmer South, Chairperson of the Tishomingo County ASC Committee. The price is for manufacturing milk, with a milkfat content of 3.5 percent, produced in the year which began Oct. 1, 1979. The law requires that milk be supported at a level between 75 and 80 percent of parity to assure an adequate supply of milk, South said. This level must reflect changes in the cost of production and assure producers adequate income to help them maintain production levels sufficient for now and the future. "We believe the new support level will meet these criteria and assure adequate future milk production," he said.

The higher support level is not expected to have any appreciable effect on consumer milk prices. The ASCS official said market prices for butter and cheese are already above the new support price. However, in some locations non-fat dry milk prices are below the \$11.22 support price. Under the dairy price support program, the government buys butter, cheese and non-fat dry milk to enable manufacturing plants, on the average, to pay producers at least the support price for their milk.

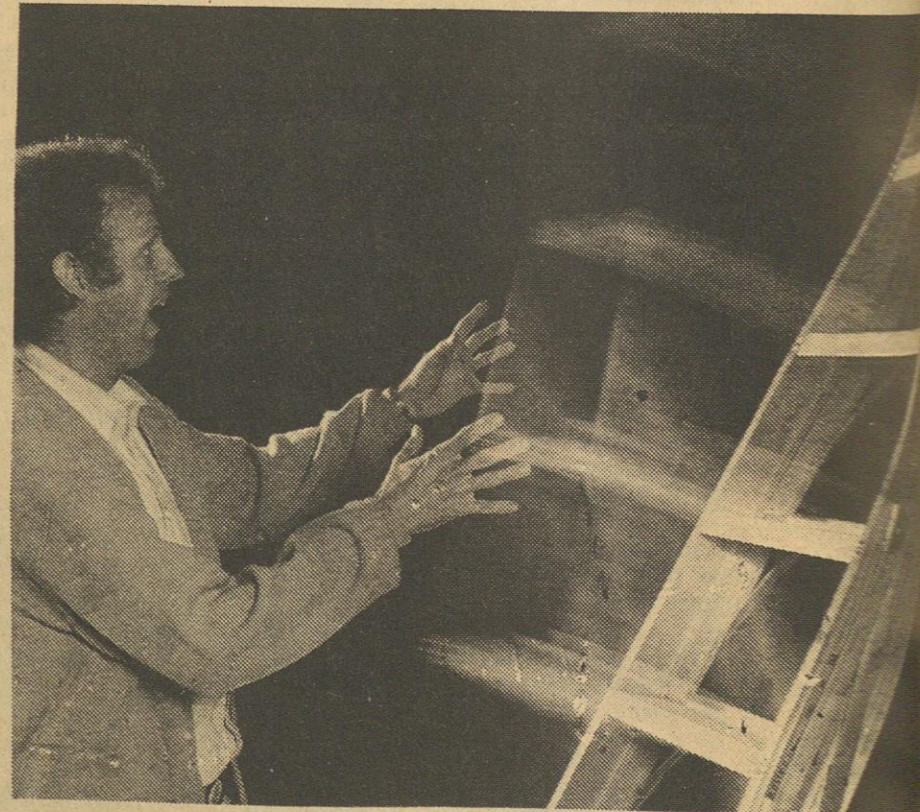

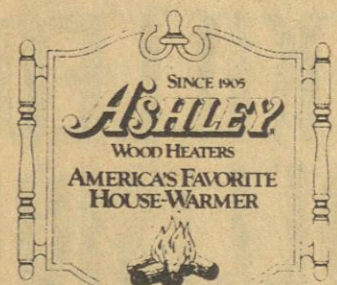

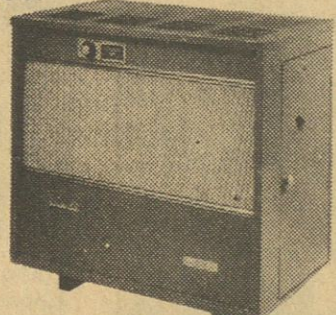

M.U.W. Dorms Furnished With Original Pieces

Interior designer Martha Wood Wheeler of Cleveland redecorated the lobbies of two of Mississippi University for Women's oldest dormitories without ever leaving her home in the Delta.
Mrs. Wheeler, a 1977 graduate of M.U.W., accomplished this "long distance" decorating feat by bringing what is believed to be the original furniture of Peyton and Fant dormitories out of storage and incorporating it into her basic design plan.
"It was a challenge in that I did this from long distance," Mrs. Wheeler explained after assessing her handiwork. "Today is the first time I've seen the lobbies since I lived here at The W," she said on a recent visit to the campus.
The M.U.W. alumna, a native of Indianola, used a traditional theme in refurbishing the lobbies of Peyton and Fant, both freshmen dormitories. For her basic color scheme, she chose gold, burgundy and navy blues -- tones taken from a selection of Oriental rugs.
Mrs. Wheeler worked with 20 to 30 photographs of the furniture, tiny floor plans and fabric swatches. After only two days of jumbling snapshots, coordinating fabrics and arranging couches, chairs and tables, she had used every piece of the furniture available. Her goal was to create "a more cheerful and homelike atmosphere," she explained.
"It's an honor for me to be able to do this," she said. "I'm glad to know that the school which gave me my education and did so much for me would ask me to do this. I have loved doing this, and I'm so glad to see the lobbies looking good. It's more like someone's home."
Mrs. Marcella Robinson, a residence hall director at Peyton for three years, assisted Mrs. Wheeler with the

project. Mrs. Robinson, also from Indianola, insisted that all I did was the legwork. Anyone could do what I did. Martha deserves all the credit. Both women donated their time and expertise to the project.
Mrs. Robinson's mother is a member of one of the first classes to live in Peyton, constructed in the 1920s. Mrs. Wheeler shares in the heritage of M.U.W., as well. Her mother is a 1947 graduate of The W.
Although Mrs. Wheeler and Mrs. Robinson put the redecorating plan in motion, Dr. Gloria Raines, vice president for student affairs, was the instigator of the project.
"About a year and half ago, I walked in and found the dorms, in shall we say, less than really good shape. The thing that bothered me was that the oldest and prettiest dorms were furnished with plastic and very modern furniture. It didn't fit."
"In looking around . . . I found a lot of old pieces up in storage in Hastings and Columbus (halls) that we think is probably the original furniture which belonged to these dorms," Dr. Raines explained.
"The furniture (in storage) was in horrible condition. The fabric was torn and stained . . . legs were missing, but it was very obviously beautiful and fine old furniture. Some of these pieces probably are 100 years old," she continued.
"We didn't have any money to cover it, so what I had Property Control do is for the last year and half, every time they found an old piece of furniture that nobody wanted . . . or anything that looked like it was old, they put it in a special place in Hastings. The whole second floor was just about filled with old furniture," she explained.
"The Peyton and Fant furniture has come home," she said, surveying the newly redecorated lobby of Peyton dorm. "The goal of this whole thing is to try to return the traditional look to buildings that have so much history."
After the furniture had been brought from storage, Mrs. Wheeler selected material for re-covering couches and chairs. With skillful shopping by Mrs. Wheeler and Mrs. Robinson, some \$6,000 worth of material was purchased for \$2,000. "The budget was extremely limited, you might say," Dr. Raines said. A local upholsterer re-covered the couches and chairs for a reasonable rate, she explained.
Modern furniture taken from Peyton and Fant dormitories was placed in the Magnolia, Goen and Kincannon dormitory lobbies. The Magnolia, Goen and Kincannon were all constructed in the 1960s. Five formitory lobbies were redecorated without the purchase of any new furniture, Dr. Raines said.
Additional furniture is still needed to complete the overall project, however. Contributions of furniture or funds are welcome.

HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 33

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION PRO-
POSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE
6 OF THE MISSISSIPPI CONSTITUTION
OF 1890, TO ADD A NEW SECTION,
TO BE DESIGNATED AS SECTION 177A,
AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO
CREATE A COMMISSION ON JUDICIAL
PERFORMANCE.

Amend Article 6 of the Mississippi Con-
stitution of 1890 by adding a new section, to be
designated as Section 177A, to read as follows:

"Section 177A. There shall be a Commission on Judicial Performance of the State of Mississippi, to be composed of seven (7) members; three (3) of whom shall be judges of courts of record in the state which are trial courts of original jurisdiction, other than justice courts; one (1) member who shall be a justice court judge; two (2) lay persons who reside in the state and who have never held judicial office or been members of the bar of Mississippi; and one (1) practicing attorney who has practiced law in the state for at least ten (10) years. All judicial members are to be appointed by the judiciary of the State of Mississippi as provided by law. Restrictions on the members of the commission may be imposed by statute. Members of the Commission on Judicial Performance not subject to impeachment shall be subject to removal from the commission by two-thirds (2/3) vote of the Supreme Court sitting en banc.

On recommendation of the Commission on Judicial Performance, the Supreme Court may remove from office, suspend, fine or publicly censure or reprimand any justice or judge of this state for: (a) actual conviction of a felony in a court other than a court of the State of Mississippi; (b) willful misconduct in office; (c) willful and persistent failure to perform his duties; (d) habitual intemperance in the use of alcohol or other drugs; or (e) conduct prejudicial to the administration of justice which brings the judicial office into disrepute; and may retire involuntarily any justice or judge for physical or mental disability seriously interfering with the performance of his duties, which disability is or is likely to become of a permanent character.

A recommendation of the Commission on Judicial Performance for the censure, removal or retirement of a justice of the Supreme Court shall be determined by a tribunal of seven (7) judges selected by lot from a list consisting of all the circuit and chancery judges at a public drawing by the Secretary of State. The vote of the tribunal to censure, remove or retire a justice of the Supreme Court shall be by secret ballot and only upon two-thirds (2/3) vote of the tribunal.

All proceedings before the commission shall be confidential, except upon unanimous vote of the commission. After a recommendation of removal or public reprimand of any justice or judge is filed with the Clerk of the Supreme Court, the charges and recommendations of the commission shall be made public. The commission may, with two-thirds (2/3) of the members concurring, recommend to the Supreme Court the temporary suspension of any justice or judge against whom formal charges are pending. All proceedings before the Supreme Court under this section and any final decisions made by the Supreme Court shall be made public as in other court law."

SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 507

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION TO
AMEND SECTION 254, MISSISSIPPI CON-
STITUTION OF 1890, TO PROVIDE THAT
THE LEGISLATURE SHALL APPORTION
ITSELF IN THE SECOND YEAR FOLLOW-
ING THE 1980 DECENTENNIAL CEN-
SUS AND EVERY TEN YEARS THERE-
AFTER AND MAY APPORTION ITSELF
FOLLOWING ANY OTHER FEDERAL
CENSUS; TO SET THE MEMBERSHIP OF
THE SENATE AND THE HOUSE OF RE-
PRESENTATIVES; AND TO REPEAL SEC-
TION 255, MISSISSIPPI CONSTITUTION
OF 1890, WHICH PROVIDES FOR APPOR-
TIONMENT OF THE MISSISSIPPI SEN-
ATE.

Amend Section 254, Mississippi Constitution
of 1890, to read as follows:

Section 254. The Legislature shall at its
regular session in the second year following
the 1980 Decennial Census and every ten (10)
years thereafter, and may, at any other time,
by joint resolution, by majority vote of all
members of each house, apportion the state
in accordance with the Constitution of the
state and of the United States into consecu-
tively numbered senatorial and representative
districts of contiguous territory. The Senate
shall consist of not more than fifty-two (52)
senators, and the House of Representatives
shall consist of not more than one hundred
twenty-two (122) representatives, the number
of members of each house to be determined
by the Legislature. Should the Legislature
adjourn, without apportioning itself as re-
quired hereby, the Governor by proclamation
shall reconvene the Legislature within thirty
(30) days in special apportionment session
which shall not exceed thirty (30) consecutive
days, during which no other business shall be
transacted, and it shall be the mandatory duty
of the Legislature to adopt a joint resolution
of apportionment. Should a special apportion-
ment session not adopt a joint resolution of
apportionment as required hereby, a five-
member commission consisting of the Chief
Justice of the Supreme Court as chairman, the
Attorney General, the Secretary of State, the
Speaker of the House of Representatives and
the President Pro Tempore of the Senate shall
immediately convene and within one hundred
eighty (180) days of the adjournment of such
special apportionment session apportion the
Legislature, which apportionment shall be final
upon filing with the office of the Secretary of
State. Each apportionment shall be effective
for the next regularly scheduled elections of
members of the Legislature.

Amend further the Mississippi Constitution
of 1890 by repealing Section 255, which pro-
vides for apportionment of the Mississippi Sen-
ate.
