Winter Makes Clean Sweep In Governor's Race

The 110 year tradition of the Mississippi State house will go unchanged following Tuesday's General Election balloting.

At press-time, United

Press International has declared William Winter as Governor by a landslide. The Democrat won the coveted Chief Executive post, which he has sought unsuccessfully

for 12 years. With 1,273 of the State's 2,168 precincts reporting, Winter had 227,736 votes, or 59.4 percent, to Republican Gil Carmichael's 155,226 - or 40.6 percent.

Approximately 35% of registered voters in the county went to the polls. Of this number, better than 65% of the voters cast ballots for the Democratic gubernatorial candidate.

The Democratic nominees for Governor, Secretary of State, Attorney General, Commissioner of Insurance, Highway Commissioner, and Public Service Commissioner all won over their Republican and Independent opponents.

The unofficial county tabulations were: For Governor - Winter, 2,489, Carmichael, 1,365; Secretary of State - Pittman, 2,790, East, 573; Attorney General - Al-lain, 2,196, Pickering, 1,398; Commissioner of Insurance - Dale, 2,552, Fulton, 484; Highway Commissioner - Richardson, 2,194, Stanton, 1,180; Public Service Commissioner - Snyder, 2,673, Lewis, 369.

ECONOMIST'S
NOTES

COST CUTTERS

After you put your spending plan on paper and try it out, make adjustments and take advantage of consumer education so you can stretch your dollars and follow your budget.

You will need to keep records of day-to-day expenses and fixed expenses. Watch the use of cash and credit carefully.

To reduce the impact of increasing prices on the budget, each person or family member must develop his/her own system of controlling money leaks. The degree to which the leaks should be reduced and the types of money leaks differ among families. Each control system must be designed for the specific person or family. For greater success, involve all persons who spend money in designing and following the system of controlling money leaks.

The cost cutters involve everyday living habits. Cut the prices paid for good and services in the marketplace. Make a shopping list. Plan for fixed obligations and basic needs. Set aside a realistic amount of saving for the emergency fund and future purchases. Buy few-

er goods and services which are not necessary. Learn to do many of the services yourself. Shop to get the best buy for your need. Use store brands instead of nationally advertised brands. Compare prices and quantities. Use seasonal sales for purchases. Pay cash instead of credit when possible. Buy seconds when they will serve the purpose. Don't buy excessive amounts, quantities or features in goods. Buy only what is really meaningful and worth the money invested.

To reduce total investments and goods, buy only needed items. Keep an ongoing inventory of goods and substitute or recycle goods.

Conserve energy costs. Decide how much you want to cut back on your energy bills and be sure every member of your family understands what you are trying to do. Dress warmly and maintain heat at a minimum level for comfort in winter. Change cooking and living habits to reduce fuel for cooking and hot water heating. Reduce transportation costs. Learn simple maintenance repairs and pool

transportation. Plan home activities and adjust habits to reduce the need for light and water, especially hot water.

Remember: the key to curbing the cost of everyday living is to simplify your needs and practice the loss-prevention approach to life. Recognize and reduce source of loss and capitalize on human ability by learning and practicing do-it-yourself skills.

APPLE OATMEAL BARS
1 cup flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon soda
1/2 cup brown sugar
1 cup quick oatmeal
1/2 cup shortening
2 1/2 cups thinly sliced apples
2 tablespoons butter
1/2 cup white sugar
Sift together flour, salt and soda. Add brown sugar and oatmeal. Cut in shortening until crumbly. Spread one-half the mixture on a greased 7 x 11 baking dish (or 8 1/2 x 8 1/2 x 2). Arrange apples over this. Dot with butter and sprinkle with sugar. Cover with rest of mixture and bake 40 to 50 minutes in 350 degree oven. Cut in squares and serve with cream.

COUNTY AGENT'S NOTES

MANAGE STORED SOYBEANS

Proper management of soybean seed in storage is essential for high quality seed. Seed harvested at 13 to 14 percent moisture content will not need drying. However, if the seed are above 14 percent moisture, they should be dried to about 13 percent for safe storage. Drying of this nature usually can be done with natural air; no heat is needed. Temperatures of 50 to 60 degrees F are desirable for storage.

Aeration of seed in bins is needed regardless of the moisture content at time of storage. Aeration reduces the temperature of the seed mass at time of storage; this helps maintain seed quality. Periodic aeration also prevents moisture migration caused by large changes in outside temperature. These temperature variations create air currents which cause moisture to migrate from one area of the bin to another. This increases the moisture content in the beans, usually in the interior of the mass. Moisture can increase to the point where the beans will heat unless aeration is used.

FERTILIZER AND LIME SOYBEAN FIELDS

If your soybean fields have not had a soil test in three years, they need it now. Most soybean fields in the state need fertilizer and lime. Lime will do a better job when applied and disked into the soil in the fall. Phosphate and potash can also be applied now for soils with a Ph of nearly 6.0 and those not too sandy. Where small grain or ryegrass is fertilized, the amount needed for soybeans can be added this fall to eliminate this job next spring. Adequate lime and fertilizer can increase yields on most non-Delta soils and on many soils in the Delta where phosphate and/or potash are low.

REPORT ACP PRACTICES:

PEANUT COMMENTS DUE:
NOV. 15: Elmer South, Chairperson of the Tishomingo County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, reminds all farmers and other interested persons that comments on acreage allotment and poundage quotas for the 1980 pea-

nut program must be received by November 15 to be considered. Written comments should be addressed to the director, price support and loan division, U. S. Department of Agriculture, ASCS, Room 3741-South building, P. O. Box 2415, Washington, D. C. 20013. Legally, the national acreage allotment must be at least 1,614,000 acres and the poundage quota at least 3,032 million pounds, according to South. "Farmers should include suggestions and recommendations for the allotment and poundage quota and the apportionment of such allotment to States," he said. The poundage quota will establish the quantity of 1980 peanuts eligible for loan. South said the Secretary of Agriculture could increase the quota if he determined that estimated requirements for domestic edible use and a reasonable carryover will require additional production. More than five farmers in the county participate in the ASCS peanut price support program.

NOVEMBER 19, DEADLINE FOR COTTON COMMENTS:
Cotton producers and other persons interested in commenting on, or making recommendations for the 1980 upland cotton program should do so prior to Nov. 19, the deadline for receiving such statements. Mr. South said that the Secretary of Agriculture will consider any written comments received by that date concerning the upland cotton target price,

the national program acreage and allocation factor, and the voluntary reduction from 1979 cotton acreage to guarantee target price protection on total 1980 planted acreage. He pointed out that farmers should also express their views regarding whether there should be a set-aside requirement, acreage limitation and additional diversion of upland cotton. "Those in favor of these provisions should specify the amount and extent of such requirements," South said. Cotton comments should be mailed to the director, production adjustment division, U. S. Department of Agriculture, ASCS, P. O. Box 2415, Washington, D. C.

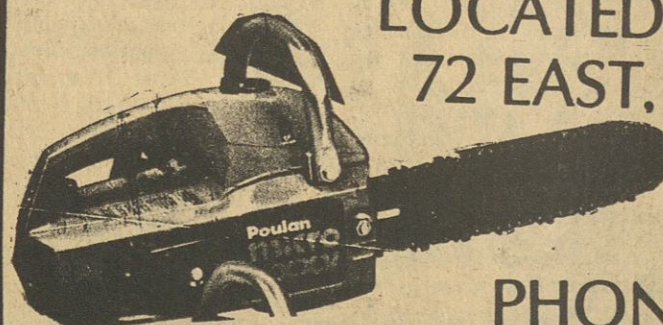

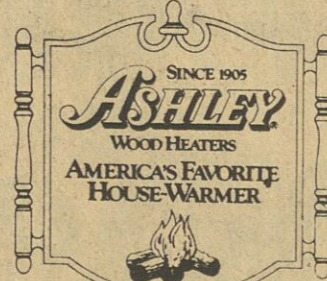

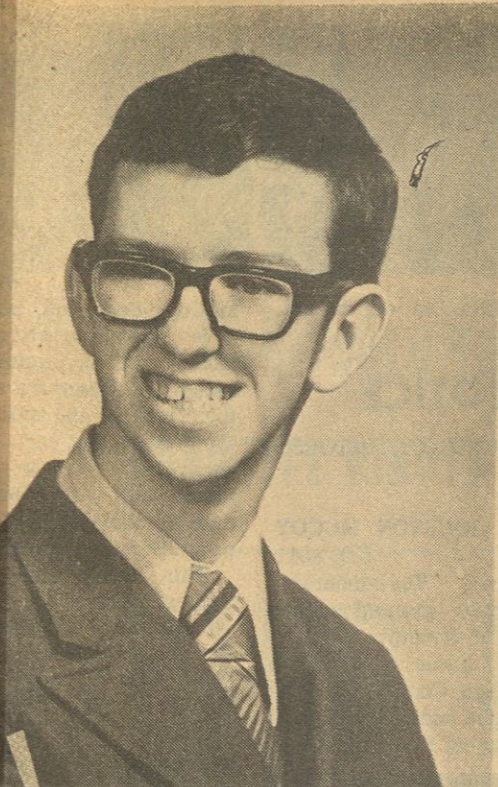

Arthur Harwell Strives To Achieve And Does!

In his life he has strived to perform everyday tasks that most people take for granted. With a lead in each shoe, he learned to walk. Through occupational therapy he developed hand and motor skills. His speech therapy has enabled him to talk. Arthur Harwell, 27, of Farmington Hills, Michigan, has brain damage at birth because of the Rh factor. He is mentally retarded.

On September 19, 1979 Arthur added another achievement to his list. Arthur was named the 'Glen D. Smith Award for the Year' by the staff and his peers at New Horizons, a workshop for vocational training and employment opportunity for the mentally and physically handicapped.

Arthur attended Farmington Public schools until 1969. He was enrolled in the Special Education program. He learned to read, write and do arithmetic. In January 21, 1969 at age 17, Arthur began at New Horizons. They have trained him to do various jobs such as packaging booklets for an auto parts store, seashells for a tree nursery and doing dishes in a restaurant.

Mandatory Education Law required Arthur to receive his academic education which New Horizons provided.

Arthur is employed by New Horizons and he has numerous job assignments in the workshop. He assembles booklets part-time for Key Steel Products.

Arthur is representative of thousands of mentally and physically handicapped persons that have benefited from New Horizons.

Through a grant from the Junior League of Birmingham, New Horizons began in 1965. With a budget of \$10,000, a very small building was rented in Royal Oak, Michigan and only a few clients were serviced at the time. A Board of Directors was chosen and a Director was named to establish an organization to provide services to the mentally retarded. "From the beginning, we had organization," said Israel Hochberg, Executive Director of New Horizons.

Fifteen years later, New Horizons services more than 250 handicapped persons per day in three facilities located in Pontiac, Madison Heights and Farmington Hills.

New Horizons is an organization that trains the handicapped for a vocation in society. More importantly they accept those that may not reach this goal and offer to them job assignments within the workshop.

Handicapped persons are referred to New Horizons through various community agencies. Records of the individual are requested and reviewed. Each person is interviewed and given a tour of the facility. And according to Lori Keebaugh, In-Take Counselor at New Horizons, "The most important thing we strive to do is to make the person feel comfortable with us. We let them know what they will be doing here and who they can go to if they need assistance."

New Horizons diagnostically tests individuals to see what their capabilities and potential is. "In addition to a laboratory evaluation, clients are also observed in a simulated or real work situation to assess stamina, productivity and behavior," said Keebaugh. The vocational evaluation may vary in length from one to six weeks.

Once the diagnostic testing is completed, the client can be placed into a regular program.

Each person has a counselor who writes a program for them. New Horizons calls it the "Rehabilitation Prescription." The program details problem areas, means to change and goals of the client. This program is followed by all New Horizons personnel.

Vocational training at New Horizons is provided in several areas such as: janitorial, clerical, inspection, packaging, food service, bench assembly, woodworking, machine operation and material handling/warehouse training. The workshop is divided by these areas and clients can actually get "on the job training."

In 1978 sixty-nine individuals were placed in jobs in the community. However, Hochberg says, "Progress is not measured by how many are placed in the community. Many need life long programming and New Horizons provides this for them. It is an alternative to institutionalization."

For those who cannot work in the community, they remain in the New Horizons workshop and work on job assignments obtained through company contracts. For example, one job may be pasting labels for a bottling company, packaging scratch pads for a consumer goods store, or sorting nuts and bolts for a manufacturing firm.

Each individual is paid for their labor. Rate of pay is based on the level of productivity of each client. For some jobs, an hourly rate is paid. Hochberg says, "Paychecks are an indicator to the client of how they are doing."

Most of the money received from contract work is turned back into buying materials and machinery for the workshops, paying client paychecks and maintaining upkeep of the workshops.

New Horizons, a non-profit organization, obtains additional funding for its 1.75 million dollar budget from the United Fund, agency grants and membership donations. "Most of the funding for New Horizons comes from fees obtained from services provided by several agencies in the community," said Hochberg. "Membership donations are very important also," he continued, "if everyone puts forth a little effort, it works out. It is a big responsibility and we cannot do it all ourselves."

"Ten years ago over half of the handicapped in our workshop would have gone to institutions," said Hochberg, "But today the trend is to develop programs for

placing the handicapped in the community."

At New Horizons, both low-level and high-level functioning persons are serviced. For example, a college educated accident victim cannot be placed in the same program as a moderately retarded person. The program is diversified enough to service both.

In conjunction with the vocational program, New Horizons provides an Adult Education Program. Clients can learn reading, writing and math. More sophisticated courses are offered too, such as money management and checkbook balancing.

Group counseling and group dynamics are other facets of the program. They are offered so that vocational problem areas can be cited and corrected. Sessions on coping with criticism, decision making and interpersonal communication are given.

Job seeking skills classes are suggested for those applying for a job. Lessons on making an application, answering problem questions and selling yourself to a prospective employer are prime topics. Video tapes of the client applying for a job are played back to the client so he or she can see how they present themselves.

So much is accomplished in the 8:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. day. New Horizons provides more than just work and pay. More importantly clients are exposed to the outside world and the people in it. New Horizons gives the handicapped individual an opportunity to feel self worth and accomplishment, something we also take for granted in our daily lives.

Tishomingo County Food Stamp Program

The Food Stamp Program was implemented in Tishomingo County in May, 1972. This program has proven beneficial to the county by enabling the aged, disabled, and low income households to buy the quantity of nutritious food needed to feed their families that they could not otherwise afford. This program also benefits the farmers, retailers and wholesalers, and through them other businesses in the county, by increasing the families purchasing power. It also brings federal dollars into the area stimulating the economy.

The Food Stamp Program is available to all eligible households without regard to race, color, sex, religious creed, national origin or political beliefs.

The Tishomingo County Food Stamp staff consists of three eligibility workers, two clerks, and a cashier under the supervision of the County Director. These people work together to serve the food stamp recipients in the most efficient manner possible.

In January, 1979 new food stamp regulations were put into effect. All food stamps received by the household were free. In the past, most households paid for their food stamps, receiving stamps worth as much as they paid, plus some bonus stamps. They now receive only the bonus stamps at no cost. Instead of using money to buy food stamps, they can spend it, along with their bonus stamps, directly for

food at the grocery store. As a result of these new regulations, households participating in the food stamp program increased from 562 in December, 1978 to 737 in October, 1979. These households received \$45,049 in free food stamps. The majority of these households can be categorized as aged or disabled.

The Food Stamp Mail Issuance Program is available to all recipients. There were 435 households participating in mail issuance in October, 1979. This program eliminates transportation to the Food Stamp Office and the amount of time required to stand in line to receive food stamps.
