Perry Appointed

Leon Perry has been appointed the Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service area agent for Alcorn, Prentiss, Itawamba and Tishomingo counties. He has served nine years as extension service special watershed agent for the same counties.

"Mr. Perry's appointment will assist county agents in the Tennessee Valley Authority counties with resource management and rapid adjustment farm programs," said W. M. Bost, extension service director. "These are intensive farm management programs sponsored cooperatively by (the extension service) and TVA."

"He will also maintain records on agricultural adjustments made by farm associations in the valley counties," Bost said.

Energy Crisis Funds Available

The Governor's office of Human Resources has announced the release of Energy Crisis Assistance Program funds on November 19, 1979. Alcorn, Prentiss and Tishomingo County residents will be channeled through the Northeast Mississippi Community Agency. Applications are being accepted now at the following locations: In Alcorn County, Neighborhood Service Center, City Hall, Corinth or call 287-5546; in Prentiss County, the Neighborhood Service Center, Courthouse, Booneville, or call 728-8141; in Tishomingo County, Neighborhood Service Center, Courthouse, Iuka, or call 423-3842.

These funds will be granted to low income residents who find themselves unable to pay for heating utility bills and therefore face a heating crisis. Grants are limited to the payment of current utility bills and payments will be sent directly to the energy vendor and not to any individuals.

Eligibility requirements have been mandated by the Community Services Administration who has made the funds available throughout the U. S., according to CSA guidelines. An applicant must have a poverty level income. Income eligibility persons to be served fall into four priorities which are: First priority, low income elderly; second, low income handicapped; third, low income unemployed; and fourth, low income employed. Funds in this program are limited and grants will be made on the priority basis. It is expected that many otherwise eligible persons will not receive grants because of this limitation of funds.

However, persons falling in the low income/poverty level category and who are experiencing or expect to experience an energy crisis should contact the appropriate Neighborhood Service Center to submit an application for assistance. An applicant should carry with him to the Center his current utility bill, which he cannot pay and some proof of whatever income he has had within the past three to twelve months. Persons are encouraged not to wait until a crisis does occur whenever this is possible, but to contact the Neighborhood Service Center and other help or information may be available to them.

The Northeast Mississippi Community Action Agency whose offices are located in the Bank of Mississippi Building in Corinth is under the leadership of Executive Director Rev. Nolen U. Embry. The Energy Crisis Assistance Program Coordinator is Hardy C. James. Mr. James has advised that where questions or problems may arise during the program, he will be available to both potential applicants and other interested parties by calling 286-9262.

HOME ECONOMIST'S NOTES

EXTENSION HOMEMAKERS CLUBS

Would you like to become a Homemaker? A good way is to join an Extension Homemaker Club. These clubs meet in the community where the members live. They meet monthly for educational programs that help them to become a better individual and homemaker. There are twelve Extension Homemaker Clubs in Tishomingo County with a membership of one hundred and fifty-five members. To join an Extension Homemaker Club you need eight members. HOW TO HAVE

EVERYTHING YOU WANT to have all the things you want, you must stop and control the use of credit. The changing world of today has brought about the availability and easy availability of credit. Our ability to buy is determined by the flow of money. The amount of money we have access to on a daily basis for bills, follows these basic rules:

- Eliminate emotional and impulsive buying. Think, plan and consider alternative and consequences before making any buying decisions.
- Develop sales resistance. Learn when, where, why and how to say no to yourself and to a sales person.
- Be aware of your monthly payments and expense picture as well as your total indebtedness.

Controlling your credit and cash spending is an absolute MUST if you are to be a successful money manager. Remember, the key to good credit is within you if you are going to have the things you've always wanted.

INSPECT FIREWOOD FOR INSECTS

If you're not careful, you can bring insect pests into your home on firewood. For example, ants may be under the bark of wood and become active when the wood is placed in a warm area. Cockroaches may also enter your home on damp or partially decayed wood. To keep insect pests out of your home, inspect firewood carefully and remove insects by tapping the wood on the ground.

SWEET POTATO CASSEROLE

2 eggs, beaten

- 1 1/2 cup evaporated milk
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 stick margarine
- 2 cups grated sweetpotatoes
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- Pinch of salt

Mix all ingredients together. Beat well. Put into 1 1/2 or 2 quart casserole. Stir once when mixture begins to thicken. Cook at 350 degrees until done, about 30 or 40 minutes. Serves 6 or 8 people.

COUNTY AGENT'S NOTES

GARDENS

Now is the time to patch wounds and get ready for the 1980 gardening season. Be sure to finish the year right so you can start the new year in good form.

- * Clean up the garden by removing all dead plants, bean poles and tomato stakes.

* Winterize tools by cleaning, sharpening, and oiling them. Change the oil in the tiller and put it in a protected place out of the rain.

- * Take a soil sample since fall is the best time to lime.
- * Throw away that leftover seed that has been sitting in the tool shed or utility building all summer. If you don't have it, you won't be tempted to plant it in 1980.

* Row up part of the garden so you'll be ready to plant Irish potatoes, greens, and peas while other gardeners are still waiting for the soil to dry.

- * Get the cold frame and hot bed ready for starting cabbage, broccoli, and cauliflower.

* Store leftover fertilizer in a dry place, and put pesticides where they won't freeze or get wet. Keep all chemicals away from children and animals. Make a list of what and how much you have.

STORED VEGETABLES:

Keep a close watch on the stored vegetables. Pumpkins, winter storage squash, and sweet potatoes need to be kept warm (55 to 60 degrees F.). Sweet potatoes also need high humidity to prevent shriveling. Irish potatoes and onions need cold storage but must be protected from freezing. Carrots and turnips can be left in a well-drained garden soil if protected from freezing.

FRUIT AND NUTS

Winter Control of Insects and Diseases of Peaches: SAN JOSE SCALE; This

tiny sucking insect feeds on the sap of limbs, twigs, and in severe infestations, fruit. The full-grown scale is about the size of a pin head. It is protected by a waxy covering, which is oval to round in shape and ash gray in color, with a raised nipple-shaped spot in the center. The insect itself is legless and orange, and never moves after attaching itself to the tree to feed. Severe infestations weaken a tree so that it eventually dies. Less severe infestations reduce tree vigor and yields.

To control this pest, use dormant sprays of emulsifiable oils at the recommended strength or lubricating oil emulsions containing 3 percent actual oil. In cases of heavy infestation, apply once in early fall and again in late winter. Where infestation is light, one application is sufficient.

WHITE PEACH SCALE: The females are brownish-white and circular and do not have the nipple-shaped raised area in the center that is characteristic of the San Jose scale. Males are found in clusters and are pure white and elongated. Damage is similar to that caused by the San Jose scale.

Apply a 3 percent lubricating oil emulsion or an emulsifiable oil at the recommended strength during the dormant period for satisfactory control of this pest. Two applications two weeks apart may be required to control heavy infestations.

BROWN ROT: The fungus overwinters in twig cankers and on mummified fruits that lie on the ground or hang on the tree. You usually find the cankers on twigs that supported diseased fruit the previous season. Small twigs that bore diseased fruit will die as if killed by cold. General sanitation may alleviate this rot problem. Remove all mummies from the trees in the dormant season and bury them 1 foot deep. Then remove and burn diseased twigs.

REQUEST FOR PROPOSALS TO PROVIDE SERVICES UNDER TITLE XX OF THE SOCIAL SECURITY ACT

The State Department of Public Welfare hereby solicits proposals from responsible service providers for the provision of transportation, defined as: transportation of a service recipient to and from community or state service resources for the receipt of services.

This service is to be provided in the geographical area of Tishomingo County to approximately 75 individuals who are 60 years of age or over.

Funds are available for the provision of this service for a one-year contract, 25%

of which must be furnished by the provider agency or donated to the Department by a third party private or public agency. The provider agency is assessed an administrative fee of 5% of the total program cost.

Public or chartered private, non-profit provider agencies interested in contracting with the State Department of Public Welfare to provide this service may apply in person at the Tishomingo County Welfare Department through January 15, 1980.

Applicants will be considered on the basis of compatibility with Title XX requirements, the proposed method of service delivery, qualifications and experience of agency and personnel to provide the service, and cost of the service.

REPORT TO MISSISSIPPIANS



There is a lot of talk going around to the effect that the United States has lost its military superiority. I want to lay that rumor to rest. We are still the strongest nation in the world, and we are not to lie down and let any other nation gain superiority over us.

The Senate recently appropriated \$131.7 billion for the Department of Defense for fiscal year 1980, the largest appropriation ever approved in one bill in peacetime or wartime. As Chairman of the Defense Appropriations Subcommittee, it was my responsibility to oversee the drafting of that bill, and also to act as manager of the bill on the floor of the Senate.

In drafting the bill, the Appropriation Committee studied over 3,000 separate, distinct items proposed for funding. To give an idea of how large this appropriation bill has become, the research and development portion alone totaling \$13.3 billion is greater than the entire defense budget for fiscal year 1949.

True, some of the increase is the result of inflation. But the real increase in defense spending over recent years is considerable. We have worked hard to use defense funds wisely so that we could get the most possible out of the defense dollar. I have always contended that one does not have to be a wastrel to support a strong national defense.

The bill just passed by the Senate contains new starts for modernization of all phases of U.S. forces. Funds for full scale engineering development of the MX missile are provided to give us a new intercontinental ballistic missile which will be less vulnerable to attack by opposing forces. The bill also provides \$2.1 billion for a nuclear powered aircraft carrier which is capable of powering itself for 13 years of normal operation without any need for 'refueling.' These floating airfields would prove extremely valuable in time of war, but they are also very effective deterrents which can be sent to any part of the world when trouble develops.

The bill includes \$13.5 billion for procurement of aircraft, including a continuing modernization of our fighter/attack forces which already includes the most modern fighters in the world. There are also provisions for continued modernization of our Army ground forces with procurement of new tanks, and new air defense missiles for the Army called the Roland.

Although the Soviets have been building their military capability in recent years, it is evident that we have not been standing still either. Of course, we can not afford to slow down, and I will certainly do all I can to see that we continue to move forward.

I am fully convinced that the weakest part of our military preparedness is that we do not have enough skilled people to man all of the highly technical weapons systems we have developed. We must address this problem and find a way to bring more men and women into the service who are capable of taking the training and the discipline real military service demands. That is where there is weakness, and that is where the emphasis should be placed in our continuing efforts to keep our national defense strong.

They will not serve except in the highest of offices. If asked to take a lesser position, you can count on hearing a resounding, "No way". They are so constituted that they will either rule or ruin. It's the chief seat or no seat.

I have known businessmen hasten to take an early retirement rather than suffer a demotion with their company - even if it's in the name of a promotion. They are too smart to be "kicked upstairs".

But let me tell you about another man. Two years after he completed his term of office as the sixth President of the United States, John Quincy Adams took his seat in the House of Representatives. He was the son of a distinguished second President of the republic; he served as an eminent diplomat to both France and Russia; and then became President. Most people would have stepped into retirement, but not John Quincy. He left Quincy, Massachusetts, and went back to Congress in the District of Columbia as a working member of the House of Representatives from 1831 until he died in that building in 1848. People were amazed. They felt the same way people feel today. "It's just not done. One does not become the President of the United States and then go back to the lower hall of Congress. What will other people think?"

But Adams had an answer. "I have something to say to the people of the United States. I am not an abolitionist, but I do have a conscience and a love for my country. By the grace of God, as a member of the lower house, I shall do patiently what I can for liberty and justice." Hurry for you, Mr. President. That's the spirit!

"Happy are you who sow beside all waters", Isaiah said. We must do the work that lies at hand rather than merely dream of "Far-off goals". May nothing divert us from our daily task, or move us from the habit of continuous useful labor. Happiness lies in sowing beside all waters.

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

SPECIAL REPORT:

FBI Charter Legislation



During the last few weeks my Senate Judiciary Committee has been conducting hearings on legislation to approve and implement a charter for the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

Although the FBI has been the main federal law enforcement agency for many years, there has never been a specific definition of its powers and authority approved by Congress.

This lack of legal authority has resulted in threats to the federal efforts to combat crime and protect American citizens from abuse by the criminal element.

There have also arisen new concerns that the Constitutional rights of Americans to privacy and freedom of expression, and assembly are not adequately respected by certain law enforcement activities.

The FBI charter seeks to both strengthen the powers of the Bureau and protect citizens' rights.

To do this effectively, our Committee has been engaged in a careful review of the techniques and procedures the FBI is using to

detect criminal activity and bring law violators to justice.

It has been my privilege to preside at some of these hearings as we heard testimony from representatives of the Department of Justice, FBI, legal community and citizen groups.

Because modern criminals now employ the most sophisticated, devious and imaginative schemes to accomplish their goals, equally effective measures must be authorized to combat them.

Specific procedures for using investigative techniques such as informants, undercover agents and electronic surveillance will be prescribed by the law under this new charter. Not only will this give the legal authority to the FBI to use these techniques, it will provide a new measure of protection to innocent citizens.

Access rights to documents and records held by institutions such as banks, insurance companies, and telephone companies will also be clearly defined. When necessary such vital sources of information can be used in an investigation but only after

a showing is made to proper judicial or Justice Department officials that criminal activity has probably occurred.

Complex issues surround the infiltration of agents or informers into organizations and groups whose aims may be subversive or dangerous to U.S. citizens. Special problems associated with terrorist groups also exist.

As we work to develop legal powers, and restrictions on those powers, to meet the law enforcement challenge that is presented to our government, the Committee is well aware of the importance of our efforts.

Decisions we make during these deliberations must equip our nation with a strong and aggressive law enforcement potential. At the same time care will be taken to eliminate the opportunity for abuse of legitimate rights of innocent persons.

These twin goals can be achieved. They must be achieved, to restore respect for our laws and our law enforcement personnel as they work to uphold those laws.

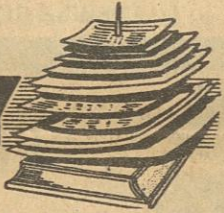

The big turkey, our mental image of a Thanksgiving dinner, was shown on the front page of The Vidette for November 26, 1942, and these words began a Thanksgiving article:

"This year, of all Thanksgiving Seasons, we have reason to stop and voice an humble and deep gratitude for the many blessings that are ours. Let us truly and prayerfully thank God that we are Americans" . . . 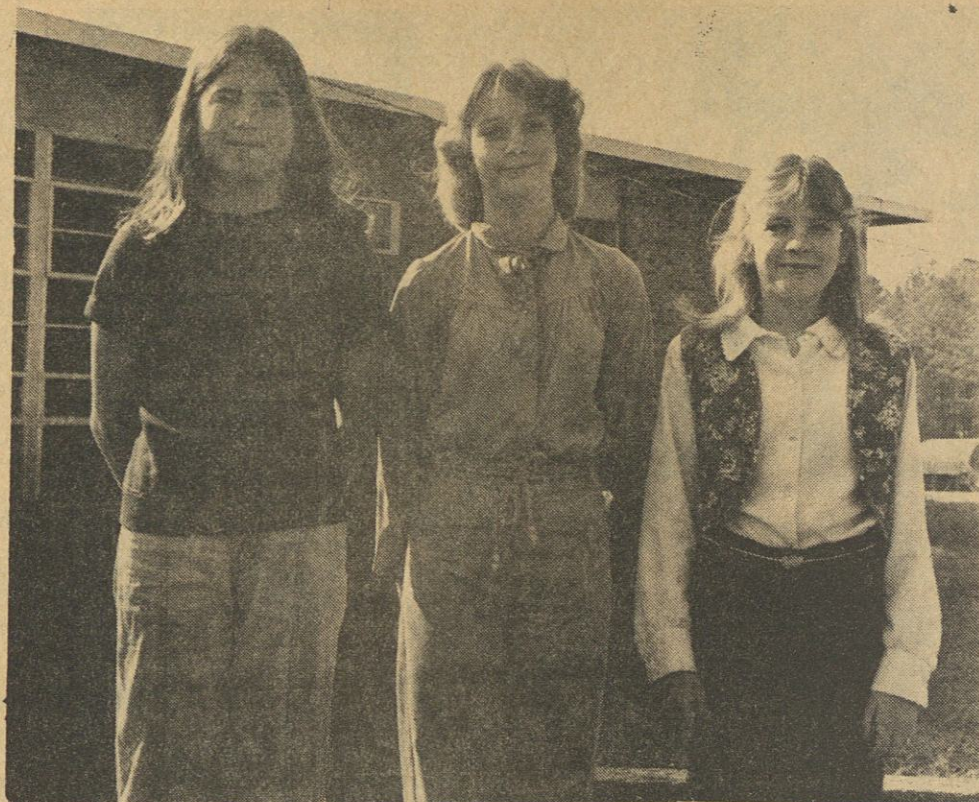

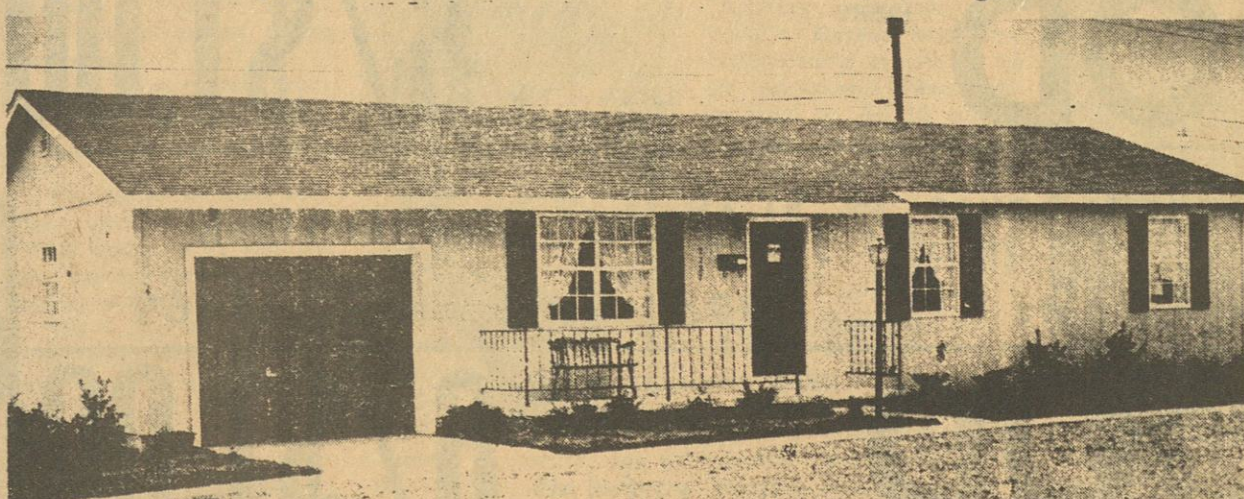
