# **Energy Crisis Funds Available**

The Governor's office of Human Resources has announced the release of Energy Crisis Assistance Program funds on November 19, 1979. Alcorn, Prentiss and Tishomingo County residents will be channeled through the Northeast Mississippi Community Agency Applications are being accepted now at the followin locations: In Alcorn County, Neighborhood Service Center, City Hall, Corinth or call 287-5546; in Prentis County, the Neighborhood Service Center, Courthouse Booneville, or call 728-8141; in Tishomingo County Neighborhood Service Center, Courthouse, Iuka, or cal

These funds will be granted to low income resident who find themselves unable to pay for heating utilit bills and therefore face a heating crisis. Grants ar limited to the payment of current utility bills an payments will be sent directly to the energy vendo and not to any individuals.

Eligibility requirements have been mandated by th Community Services Administration who has mad the funds available throughout the U.S., according CSA guidelines. An applicant must have a pover level income. Income eligibility persons to be serve fall into four priorities which are: First priorit low income elderly; second, low income handicapped third, low income unemployed; and fourth, low incom employed. Funds in this program are limited ar grants will be made on the priority basis. It is expecte that many otherwise eligible persons will not receive grants because of this limitation of funds.

However, persons falling in the low income/pover level category and who are experiencing or expect experience an energy crisis should contact the appro priate Neighborhood Service Center to submit an appl cation for assistance. An applicant should carry wi him to the Center his current utility bill, which I cannot pay and some proof of whatever income he ha had within the past three to twelve months. Person are encouraged not to wait until a crisis does occu whenever this is possible, but to contact the Neigl borhood Service Center and other help or information may be available to them.

The Northeast Mississippi Community Action Agend whose offices are located in the Bank of Mississip Building in Corinth is under the leadership of Executiv Director Rev. Nolen U. Embry. The Energy Crisi Assistance Program Coordinator is Hardy C. GARDENS

Now is the time to patch wounds and get ready for the 1930 gardening season. Be sure to finish the year right so you can start the new year in good form.

\* Clean up the garden by removing all dead plants, bean poles and tomato stakes.

\* Winterize tools by cleaning, sharpening, and oiling them. Change the oil in the tiller and put it in a protected place out of the

\* Take a soil sample since fall is the best time to lime.

\* Throw away that leftover seed that has been sitting in the tool shed or utility building all summer. If you don't have it, you won't be tempted to plant it in 1980.

Row up part of the garden so you'll be ready to plant Irish potatoes, greens, and peas while other gardeners are still waiting for the soil to dry.

\* Get the cold frame and hot bed ready for starting cabbage, broccoli, and cauliflower.

\* Store leftover fertilizer in a dry place, and put pesticides where they won't freeze or get wet. Keep all chemicals away from children and animals. Make a list of what and how much

REPORT TO MISSISSIPPIANS



There is a lot of talk going around to the effect that the United States has lost its military superiority. I want to lay that rumor to rest. We are still the strongest nation in the world, and we are not to lie down and let any other nation gain superiority over us.

The Senate recently appropriated \$131.7 billion for the Department of Defense for fiscal year 1980, the largest appropriation ever approved in one bill in peactime or wartime. As Chairman of the Defense Appropriations Subcommittee, it was my responsibility to oversee the drafting of that bill, and also to act as manager of the bill on the floor of the Senate.

In drafting the bill, the Appropriation Committee studied over 3,000 separate, distinct items proposed for funding. To give an idea of how large this appropriation bill has become, the research and development portion alone totaling \$13.3 billion is greater than the entire defense budget for fiscal year 1949.

True, some of the increase is the result of inflation. But the real increase in defense spending over recent years is considerable. We have worked hard to use defense funds wisely so that we could get the most possible out of the defense dollar. I have always contended that one does not have to be a wastrel to support a strong national defense.

The bill just passed by the Senate contains new starts for modernization of all phases of U.S. forces. Funds for full scale engineering development of the MX missile are provided to give us a new intercontinental ballistic missile which will be less vulnerable to attack by opposing forces. The bill also provides \$2.1 billion for a nuclear powered aircraft carrier which is capable of powering itself for 13 years of normal operation without any need for 'refueling.' These floating airfields would prove extremely valuable in time of war, but they are also very effective deterrents which can be sent to any part of the world when trouble develops.

The bill includes \$13.5 billion for procurement of aircraft, including a continuing modernization of our fighter/attack forces which already includes the most modern fighters in the world. There are also provisions for continued modernization of our Army ground forces with procurement of new tanks, and new air defense missiles for the Army called the Roland.

Although the Soviets have been building their military capability in recent years, it is evident that we have not been standing still either. Of course, we can not afford to slow down, and I will certainly do all I can to see that we continue to move forward.

I am fully convinced that the weakest part of our military preparedness is that we do not have enough skilled people to man all of the highly technical weapons systems we have developed. We must address this problem and find a way to bring more men and women into the service who are capable of taking the training and the discipline real military service demands. That is where there is weakness, and that is where the emphasis should be placed in our continuing efforts to keep our national defense strong.
