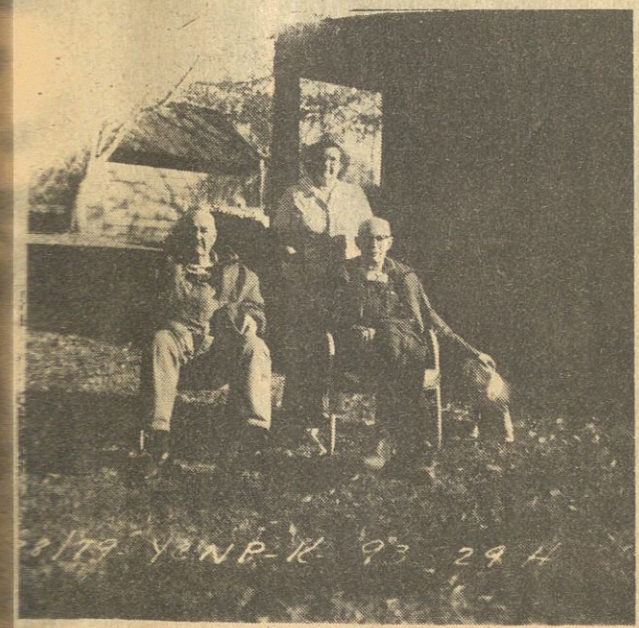

PLANT CONSTRUCTION CHANGES RURAL LIFESTYLE

"The road will not bother us any. It will be better than those mudholes we have to go through now." Those are the words of longtime Tishomingo County resident, Zeke Bullard, 81, concerning the Tennessee Valley Authority's clearing activities for the access road connecting Highway 25 to J. P. Coleman Park Road and the Yellow Creek Nuclear Plant main entrance road. Bullard, who lives on the road named for his family with his wife, Katie, 71, says that he is definitely looking forward to having it.

His sentiments are echoed by Grady Barnes, 85, also a resident along Bullard Road where the 4.4-mile stretch of road will pass. "It is the most important and beneficial thing that I can think of for me," noted Barnes, who has been a friend of Bullard's since childhood.

Another resident on Bullard Road, Mrs. Andrew (Mentia) Bullard, 75, has mixed emotions about construction of the road and the nearby plant. She feels that the road will be a disadvantage to elderly persons who live near the road.

"The road will be dangerous to old people because they can't hear as good and their reflexes are so slow," remarked Mrs. Bullard, who grew up in the area. Mrs. Bullard and her husband have been married for 53 years. "I fear for these people. Those big pieces of equipment can't be stopped as quickly as a pickup truck."

Nevertheless, she commented that nuclear power is definitely the way to solve the energy needs of the future. "With as many people as there are in the world today, many people want to salvage what is left and not worry about others coming behind them," said Mrs. Bullard. "At our age it doesn't bother us."

Bullard Road was built around 1910, according to Zeke Bullard and Barnes. They explained that nobody except horseback riders and mule-driven wagons originally used the road. Andrew Bullard, 76, recalls that mailmen didn't even deliver for years. Zeke Bullard says that he saw the first car, a Model-T Ford, in 1914 on the road. Zeke's nephew, Raymond Bullard, originally owned most of the land that TVA purchased for right of way for the access road. Zeke's father, Jeff, had 700 acres of land at one time. However, he

sold the land before TVA began buying.

Reminiscing, Barnes recalls living on the current plant site as a youngster. He lived just east of what is now cellular dam 3, a holding or settling pond used to contain runoff mud and water from certain areas of the plant. It filters the water into the river after settling occurs. He owned the land around Slick Rock Creek until the impoundment of Pickwick Lake flooded the land. That same area will be the future site of the plant's intake pumping station. In addition, he added that there used to be a road and a wooden bridge from the plant's present barge unloading dock to Goat Island before the lake was flooded.

Barnes and Zeke Bullard grew up together and also worked for TVA together. Barnes worked on clearing the Pickwick reservoir area in 1935 and later did maintenance work at Pickwick and worked on Lake malaria control. He also served stints at Wilson Dam, Colbert Steam Plant, and Wheeler Dam. Mr. Bullard worked 11 years on reservoir clearing and maintenance at Pickwick. He and Barnes worked together from 1941 to 1946.

"My grandfather floated down the Tennessee River from North Carolina to Coleman Park with three brothers in the early 1800's," Zeke Bullard remembers. "That's how the Bullards got to the area."

Barnes and Bullard say that the Hubbard-Salem Church, adjacent to the plant, was deeded by Green Hubbard over 100 years ago. It served as a school and church. Barnes attended school there, whereas Bullard was enrolled in the Patrick Church School. They also remember going to square dances on Saturday nights at people's homes and "the woods being full of moonshiners." According to Bullard, "The stills were just small operations."

TVA forces have cleared over two miles of trees and brush to date for the 2-lane access road with timber and pulpwood downed free to the public. Clearing is being achieved primarily by chainsaws and bulldozers. Road surfacing requirements call for a crushed stone base, stabilized base, a bituminous prime coat, a bituminous concrete base, a tack coat, and an asphaltic concrete surface of 1-1/2 inches.

The road will be a major artery for plant traffic from Corinth and the Tennessee state line. Alabamians and other traffic from the Iuka area will enter the plant from J. P. Coleman Park Road.

"The road will be a great help getting to Iuka and Tennessee," says Barnes. "It will be better than the old dirt road we had back in the 30's. It took a mule-driven wagon to pull us out when we got stuck."

Mrs. Andrew Bullard also attended school at Hubbard-Salem Church. The mother of four sons, she remembers the change from not seeing people for days as compared to the noise and traffic today. She had an oak tree standing in front of her house that fell to progress recently.

"I can't tell you how much that oak tree meant to me," declared Mrs. Bullard, who is related to Clyde Grisham, original owner of a pear tree near the main plant entrance which was identified and spared by construction personnel. "We had a swing in the tree that our children and grandchildren all played around. The change has brought trailers now, and it's like living in a little town. I still reminisce about kids playing under the tree."

In addition, Mrs. Mentia Bullard said that Anna Brown waterfall, located near Coleman Park, was a local swimming area in the past and remains that way today.

Concerning the nuclear plant construction nearby, Mrs. Bullard commented that people will need more energy as the population increases. "However, nobody knows exactly about the plant safety. I'm concerned about the storage and disposal of radioactive waste." It was pointed out that TVA is building every known safeguard into the plant and that safety of local residents is uppermost of TVA's priorities in operation of the plant and handling of radioactive materials.

According to Andrew Bullard, "With the road coming through, I won't be able to let my beagles run loose anymore. That's probably the only major change we will have."

1980 CHANGES

Beginning January 1, 1980 the maximum amount of earnings in a year that count for social security purposes will increase to \$25,900 - up from this year's \$22,900.

Also, in 1980, the maximum amount that a beneficiary can earn and still get all his social security checks will increase from \$3,480.00 to \$3,720.00 annually for people under age 65. For those who are age 65 or over in 1980 the earnings limit will be \$5,000.00.

Starting January 1, 1980 the Medicare hospital insurance deductible will be \$180.00. The 1979 deductible is \$160.00.

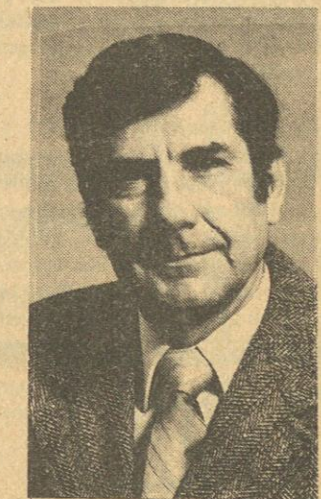
physicians.

Mr. Lambert told The News that the goal is to have the building near completion and perhaps in partial use within the next three months. The new five office Medical Building will enable our area to have increased medical service to meet the needs of a growing community.

Doyle Frederick Named USGS Mapping Official



Doyle G. Frederick, 44, a career cartographer with the U.S. Geological Survey, has been named associate chief of the USGS Topographic Division.

In his new assignment - the No. 2 post in the division - Frederick will share with division chief Rupert B. Southard in managing one of the major divisions of the Geological Survey, and the nation's largest civilian mapping operation.

The Topographic Division has nearly 2,000 employees and the annual budget of nearly \$80 million, or about 10 percent of the Survey's total budget. With headquarters at the USGS National Center in Reston, Va., it operates regional mapping centers in Reston; Rolla, Mo.; Denver, Colo.; and Menlo Park, Calif.; and conducts cooperative mapping programs with more than 40 states as well as many local governments.

The division is responsible for the National Mapping Program which assesses the nation's map-

ping needs, and produces a variety of topographic maps, satellite and aerial photograph image maps, and other cartographic products to meet these needs. About 10 million of the Survey's "topo" maps are distributed annually. The division also operates the National Cartographic Information Center, which provides users with information on the availability of maps, charts, satellite images and other cartographic products and data produced or held by federal, state, and private agencies.

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Frederick was born in Iuka, Miss. He received a bachelor of science degree in mathematics from Bethel College, Tenn., in 1957, and attended graduate school in astronomy at the University of Cincinnati, Ohio.

With more than 20 years of federal service, Frederick has played a key role in helping to organize and improve federal mapping organizations and programs in both civilian and

military agencies.

In the early 1960's, Frederick held a series of research and staff assignments in cartography, mathematics, astronomy, and geodesy for the Defense Department's Aeronautical Chart and Information Center, St. Louis, Mo. From 1965 to 1973, he served as program manager for the Department's surveys and basic data office. He also served as the Department's representative to the 1972-1973 Federal Mapping Task Force Report which reviewed for the Office of Management and Budget improved ways for using the nation's cartographic resources to meet national needs.

In recognition of his contributions to the cartographic profession, Frederick received the Defense Department's Outstanding Performance Award in 1967 and 1970, and Meritorious Service Award in 1973; the Interior Department's Meritorious Service Award in 1976; and the Geological Survey's Superior Performance Award in 1979.

Frederick joined the U. S. Geological Survey in 1973, and prior to his present position, was chief of the Topographic Division's office of plans and program development. A successor to Frederick has not yet been named.

Frederick and his wife, the former Betty Todd, of Cherokee, Ala., reside in Vienna, Va. They have two sons, Michael, 20, and Jeffrey, 17.

HOME ECONOMIST'S NOTES

USE SEAT BELTS

Auto accidents are the number one killer of children. Every year more than 1,000 children younger than five die from injuries received in highway accidents. Tens of thousands more are injured, many permanently.

In a moving vehicle, everyone needs a restraint. Safety belts, child restraints and infant carriers help to keep people from striking hard surfaces and each other inside a car, and from being ejected from the car.

Small children are top-heavy and have softer bones. Therefore, it is important to spread pressure absorbed by a child's body over the largest area possible.

There are several restraints for children - including infant car carriers, harness restraints, harnesses in wrap-around seats and seats with padded surfaces in front.

When you hold your child in your arm or lap or allow him to stand on the seat, you are risking his life. Ask your doctor what type of restraint your child needs. Set the right example: Always buckle up yourself.

WATCH FOR DIABETES

Diabetes is one of the most common ailments in America. More than 4.4 million Americans suffer from diabetes, and yet more than a third don't know they have it.

The cause of diabetes is unknown, but some people seem to be more pre-disposed to the disease than others. Its more frequent occurrence in persons

with a family history of the disease indicates that heredity plays a part. It occurs more often in women, overweight individuals and those older than forty. The onset of diabetes is so gradual and insidious that it may be present a long time, even years, before it is discovered in adults.

If overlooked or neglected, diabetes can lead to serious trouble. Yet diabetes is easily detected. Some complications can be prevented if caught early and treated promptly.

Some diabetics, especially those who are older, may experience few symptoms or no symptoms at all. Symptoms are: frequent urination, excessive thirst, extreme hunger, rapid weight loss, drowsiness, easily tiring, general weakness, blurred vision or change in vision, skin infections, boils, pain, numbness and tingling sensations in legs, slow healing of cuts and bruises and general nervous irritability. If you have symptoms, check with your doctor. To catch diabetes in its early stages, have a yearly physical.

SOYBEAN SEED QUALITY GOOD

Farmers should have high quality soybean seed for planting in 1980. Recent tests by the State Seed Testing Laboratory at Mississippi State University and other private labs show that germination of Mississippi grown soybean seed is exceptionally high. Accelerated aging tests also indicate quality is good. Supplies should be adequate.

YELLOWED LEAVES?

If your houseplants have yellowed leaves, they may be the result of overwatering, poorly drained potting soil or insufficient light. To help prevent this problem, provide plants plenty of light. Don't overwater them in low light areas. For better drainage, use a light, loose soil mixture of equal parts of builder's sand, sphagnum moss and loamy soil. Following these procedures will increase your chances of growing green, healthy plants.

SEED CATALOGS AVAILABLE

The 1980 garden seed catalogs are available now. You can find order forms in most popular magazines. While most Mississippi gardeners order catalogs from southern seed companies, consider obtaining your catalog from a northern company. Northern companies offer recommended varieties for the South, and they also have wider selections. The County Extension Office has a list of recommended vegetable varieties for this area. Order seed as soon possible.

DECEMBER 24, 1942

Stovepipe Safety

As burning wood for heat regains popularity, house fires are on the increase, according to dianne reed, farm safety specialist for the Cooperative Extension Service.

Reed says the connection between the stoves and the fires is the lack of precaution and care, rather than an inevitable result of wood heating. The house fires are not caused by flaws in the wood heaters' design, but by im-

proper installation and/or operation.

Common installation faults are placing the heater or stovepipe too close to walls, floors, or other combustible materials; allowing faulty flues to be used in walls and ceilings; and plugging stovepipes into faulty chimneys.

Proper installation methods for various types of wood burning stoves and a checklist of safety measures that wood stove owners should use to determine whether or not they're taking unnecessary risks are available in a publication of the Mississippi Energy Extension Center/Cooperative Extension Service—"Wood Heater Safety," order number MEEC-12.

Among the recommendations on the checklist are:

•The stove is spaced at least 36 inches away from combustible

material.
•Stovepipe of (thicker) metal is used.
•The total stovepipe is less than a double wall.
•A double wall stovepipe goes to the chimney.
•The chimney is lined with stovepipe.
•The stovepipe is sealed through a floor.
•The chimney is sealed space around the chimney in the attic.
•Wood Heater Safety guidelines for checking stovepipe, flues, and preventing woodstove fires are available through Extension Energy Center, Box 540, Mississippi State, MS 39762.
