
While the history of efforts to construct this project goes back a mere couple of hundred years, the use of the river as a hub of life goes back thousands of years. Proof of its early use, almost to the dawn of mankind, is being unearthed daily by teams of archeologists from nearly every major university

As a result, the entire Tenn-Tom Waterway has been surveyed by professionals in the field of cultural resources preservation with over 700 historic and prehistoric sites identified. The knowledge gained about these early inhabitantts of the Tombigbee River Valley is imfoot high lift lock at Bay measurable. These important discovering would not have been made and would not have been documented were it not for the Tennessee-Tombigbee construction project, according to officials.

> Actual construction of recreation facilities on the waterway has begun with work on recreation areas on both the Gainesville and Aliceville Lakes. The total 49 recreation areas are being constructed by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers on 13,000 acres at a cost of approximately \$33 million. It will create about 42,000 watersurface acres extending from Demopolis, Ala. to near Pickwick Lake at luka, Miss.

> While the past year has been "smooth sailing" for construction, the waters have been a little more turbulent for the Tenn-Tom in the courts. "The friends of the Tennessee-Tombigbee won another skirmish in the lower courts and are confidently awaiting word on the final action of the New Orleans Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals," according to Wilkins. "We are even more confident that we will finally win the environmental extremists and the railroads over to our side and join forces to give people of our region all the tools they need to insure a secure economic future," Wilkins

> On November 30, 1976 the L & N' Railroad and the Environmental Defense Fund brought suit to halt construction of the waterway charging it was not properly authorized by Congress and that it discriminates against alternate modes of transportation, primarily railroads. However, no other railroad has joined L & N in their action. Two years later, the Northern District Court of Mississippi heard three of the 15 counts, after setting aside the remaining points for a later hearing. After an eight day trial and presentation of hundreds of documents by the plaintiffs, Judge William C. Keady ruled in favor of the waterway.





ruling is expected soon. Relocation of bridges. roads and utilities, which are the responsibility of the states of Alabama and Mississippi, are progressing as scheduled. To date, eight of the 10 bridges in Mississippi and three bridges in Alabama are under construction or completed.

According to Wilkins, the waterway is expected to annually generate more than \$105 million savings in transportation costs.

In this era of acute awareness of the need to balance national energy supplies against a growing trade deficit, the transportation savings afforded by the shorter Tenn-Tom route will make a difference, Wilkins said. Coal, a principal commodity to move on the waterway, will be shipped at a savings of \$2.57 per ton, or about \$42 million in savings the first year. A study shows that the Tenn-Tom will be one of the busiest in the nation with tonnage equivalent to that now moving on the Tennessee River.

A number of grain elevators and terminals are being established along the waterway. The Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway, Wilkins said, is serving as an impressive "drawing card" for industrial growth because of the inherent need for water base for the region's economy and a dramatic rise in the per capital income.

Officials responded to the call shortly after 7:30 a.m. and found the body wearing only light clothing with no coat or hat, partially covered with water. The man, later identified as James C. Butler, from Huntington, Tenn., was believed to have been in the water only a few hours in the cold temperatures of Friday night and early Saturday morning. Butler is believed to have been in his 50's and no marks to indicate physical abuse were found on the according to authorities. Tishomingo County News call. that the car, a 1971 Oldsmobile station wagon, belonging to the deceased man, was involved in a hit and run accident in Wintergarden, Fla. on Saturday evening, several hours after the body had been found. Two white male subjects, from Tishomingo County, were believed to be driving the car. The two suspects were seen with Butler on Friday evening, January 4.

Authorities reported a Coroner's Inquest was held at the scene, where the Coroner pronounced Butler dead. No ruling on the cause of death has been given, although officials reported that death from drowning had been ruled out, and the case is still being investigated.



1980 by 10 percent from their 1979 plantings. No acreage set-aside will be required for 1980. South went on to explain that producers who reduce their 1980 upland cotton acreage from that planted and considered planted in 1979 by at least 10 percent will be assured of deficiency payments on their total planted acreage if the market price falls below the target

The target price provides income protection to cotton farmers, South said. If the national average price received by farmers for upland cotton during calendar year 1980 falls below the price, producers will receive a deficiency payment at a rate equal to the difference between the higher of either the average market price or the loan price of 48 cents per pound for 1980.

Mississippi should experience below normal temperatures in January, according to the National Weather Service Outlook distributed the Mississippi Cooperative Extension Ser-

The outlook also predicts drier than usual conditions for north Mississippi while wet weather is expected to prevail in the south, say agrometeorologists at the Environmental Studies Service Center in Stoneville who prepare the report.

Winter calving begins in many areas of Mississippi in January. Cattlemen should pay special attention to heavy springer and newborn calves to minimize losses. This is

especially true for heifers with first calves.

Pastures will grow slowly in the cold period, but good hay supplies are adequate. Extension specialists recommend the use of high energy feed for cattle. Cattlemen the feed intake with salt. However, salt toxicity may develop unless cattle have access to water. Extra effort must be made to keep

ponds and tanks free of ice. Poultry producers will pay higher heating bills for broiler houses. 





An Ordinance To Adopt Certain **Standard Codes** For the Town of Tishomingo and The Enforcement Thereof As Provided In Said Codes

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and the Board of Aldermen of the Town of Tishomingo, Mississippi:

SECTION I. WHEREAS, it is the desire of the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Tishomingo, to adopt in all respects certain standard codes relating to housing and other related matters; and

WHEREAS, the adoption of these codes is done to further facilitate the health, safety, and welfare of the citizens of the Town of Tishomingo;

NOW, THEREFORE, the Mayor and the Board of Aldermen of the Town of Tishomingo do hereby adopt the following codes by reference as though they were copied herein fully:

Standard Housing Code 1979 Edition

Standard Code For The Elimination Or Repair of Unsafe Buildings - 1977 Edition.

SECTION 2. Be it further ordained that any matters in said Codes which are contrary to existing ordinances of the Town of Tishomingo shall prevail and to that extent any existing ordinances to the contrary are hereby repealed in that respect only.

SECTION 3. Be it further ordained that within said Codes when reference is made to the duties of certain officials named therein, that designated official in the Town of Tishomingo who has duties corresponding to those of the named official in said Code shall be deemed to be the responsible official insofar as enforcing the provisions of said Code are concerned.

SECTION 4. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force thirty (30) days from and after its passage.




