Sales Tax Collections Up Slightly

A slight increase in county sales tax was seen in November, 1979, over September, 1979, with the municipalities taking in a total of \$42,907.33 in sales tax collections for the Thanksgiving month of November. The figure is only \$332.37 above the September figure of \$42,574.96.

Contract Awarded

The U. S. Postal Service has awarded a contract to build and lease a new main post office at Burnsville, Postmaster Linda Stone said.

The contract was awarded to: T.N.K. Enterprises, Inc., 9620 S.W. 72nd Avenue, Miami, FL 33156.

The new post office will have 2,320 sq. ft. of interior floor space. It will be located on the south side of Highway 72 at the intersection of an unnamed public road.

Construction costs will be paid with private funds and the building will be leased to the Postal Service for a basic period of 15 years with renewal options for an additional 25 years.

The building is expected to be completed in August, 1980.

IUKA MEN CHARGED WITH MURDER

Three county men are charged with murder, auto theft and robbery in connection with the death of James C. Butler who was found in Indian Creek near Iuka on January 5.

One man has been released from the Tishomingo County Jail on a \$60,000 bond and two others are being held in lieu of a \$60,000 bond each in connection with an incident occurring on January 5, when the body of James C. Butler, Huntington, Tennessee was found in the shallow waters of Indian Creek in

Tishomingo County, according to State Investigator Jerry Howie.

Gary Walker has been released on \$60,000 bond, while George Allred remains lodged in the Corinth jail and Joe White in the Tishomingo County Jail in lieu of bonds in the same amount. The trio, all from Iuka, is being charged with murder, auto theft and robbery, Mr. Howie said.

Sheriff Amos Bates and his Department, acting on an anonymous tip, arrested White and Allred at the White home. The pair, according to

their statement, hitchhiked to Tishomingo County from Florida on January 9, after fleeing the Indian Creek scene in the deceased man's car. Walker had turned himself in to authorities last week.

The stolen car, a 1971, Oldsmobile Station Wagon, belonging to the deceased James C. Butler, was recovered on January 14, abandoned by the two men, in an orange grove by authorities in Lake County, Florida.

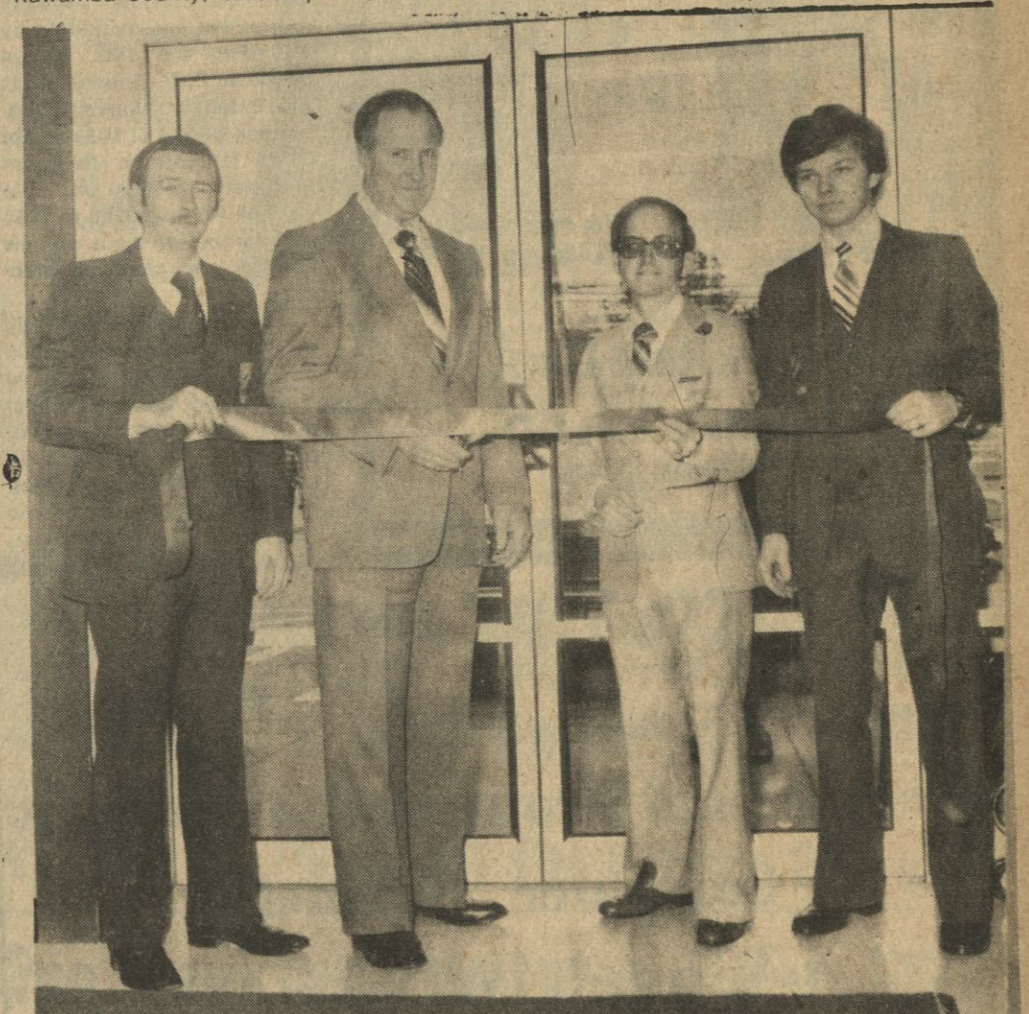

EXTENSION HOMEMAKERS CLUBS

PLUG LEAKS IN SPENDING

Spending is a family affair. Cut out waste. Learn and practice sound habits in

selecting, buying and using goods and services. Work together as a family to: Keep informed - Check prices of products and services you need. Make a list. Seek reliable information about products, and dealers before you buy. Read product labels and guarantees.

Plan purchases - Before you shop, remove unnecessary items. Decide when and how much you can pay. Then shop by your plan.

Seek best buys - Buy only what is planned for, needed and worthwhile. Don't buy such items as gadgets, conveniences or aesthetic appeals on impulse. Beware of misleading advertisements or sales pitches. Weigh value of product in terms of cost and satisfactory service it will give you.

Keep credit purchases to a minimum - Consider what credit will cost and how else you might use that money. Remember, credit charges add to the cost.

seller and request an adjustment - Buy from reliable dealers. Make wise selections to meet your needs. Use and care for the product according to the manufacturer's instructions; keep all purchase records. If problems develop with a product, make a consumer complaint to dealer and persist until satisfaction is reached.

Get full value from tax dollars - Keep accurate records and pay only taxes due. Use public goods and services to advantage. (Your tax dollars support libraries, Extension Service, schools and parks.) Report incidences of abuse of public goods to the law officials.

Substitute time, talent and positions for money when possible - Make items or do the services (painting, sewing, etc.) instead of buying.

MOISTURE HURTS STORED BEANS

If you are storing soybeans in metal bins this year, be sure to check them periodically for high moisture areas. High moisture will damage stored seed beans and reduce germination. The problem is big changes in temperature which cause air movement in bins and result in moisture migrations. These produce high moisture areas. This problem can be prevented by aerating the beans during periods of large temperature changes.

CATTLE CARE

Cattlemen should use poor quality hay first and save higher quality hay for January and February. Cattle will need additional protein this winter if good quality winter grazing is not available. They will also need plenty of water. Cattle don't drink as much in winter as they do in summer, but they will still need fresh water, especially if they have access to salt.

4. Allow the pullets exhibited to be sold at auction to highest bidder.
5. Allow cash received from auction to be used in starting other poultry projects on same basis the following year. Proceeds from this sale to be in custody of agent in charge of club work.
6. Pay for the cost of chicks if they are killed or die.
7. A personalized post dated check to be attached to the original contract to cover the cost of the chicks if applicant fails to exhibit them at the county fair.

ASCS FARM NEWS

ASCS CONDUCTS REGISTRATION FOR BEEF PRODUCERS

Beef producers who wish to vote in an upcoming referendum should register between January 28 and February 6 at the local office of Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS). Elmer (Booster) South, Chairperson of the Tishomingo County ASCS Committee, said the producers will vote by secret ballot February 19-22 on whether they want a nationally coordinated beef research and information program. A similar referendum, conducted in 1977, did not receive the required two-thirds approval, although it was favored nationally by 56.4 percent of voting producers. Since that time, the Beef Research and Information Act has been amended so that a majority of producers will be sufficient for approval, according to South. "Rules for registering and voting have changed," the ASCS official said. It was determined that 10 days would be sufficient for all producers to register and that the four-day voting period would result in a more efficient voting procedure and reduce administrative costs. "Copies of referendum rules can be completed by mail if information and ballots are requested in advance. The Beef Research and Information program would be administered by a board of up to 68 producers and five non-voting consumer advisors. Each state would be

represented on the board in proportion to its share of the cattle industry. The Program would be funded by assessments based on the value of cattle sold. "All sellers in the marketing chain would be assessed and buyers at the point of slaughter would deduct the total assessment and forward it to the board," South said. Any producer could request and receive a refund to the assessment paid. For more information on the referendum contact the local ASCS office.

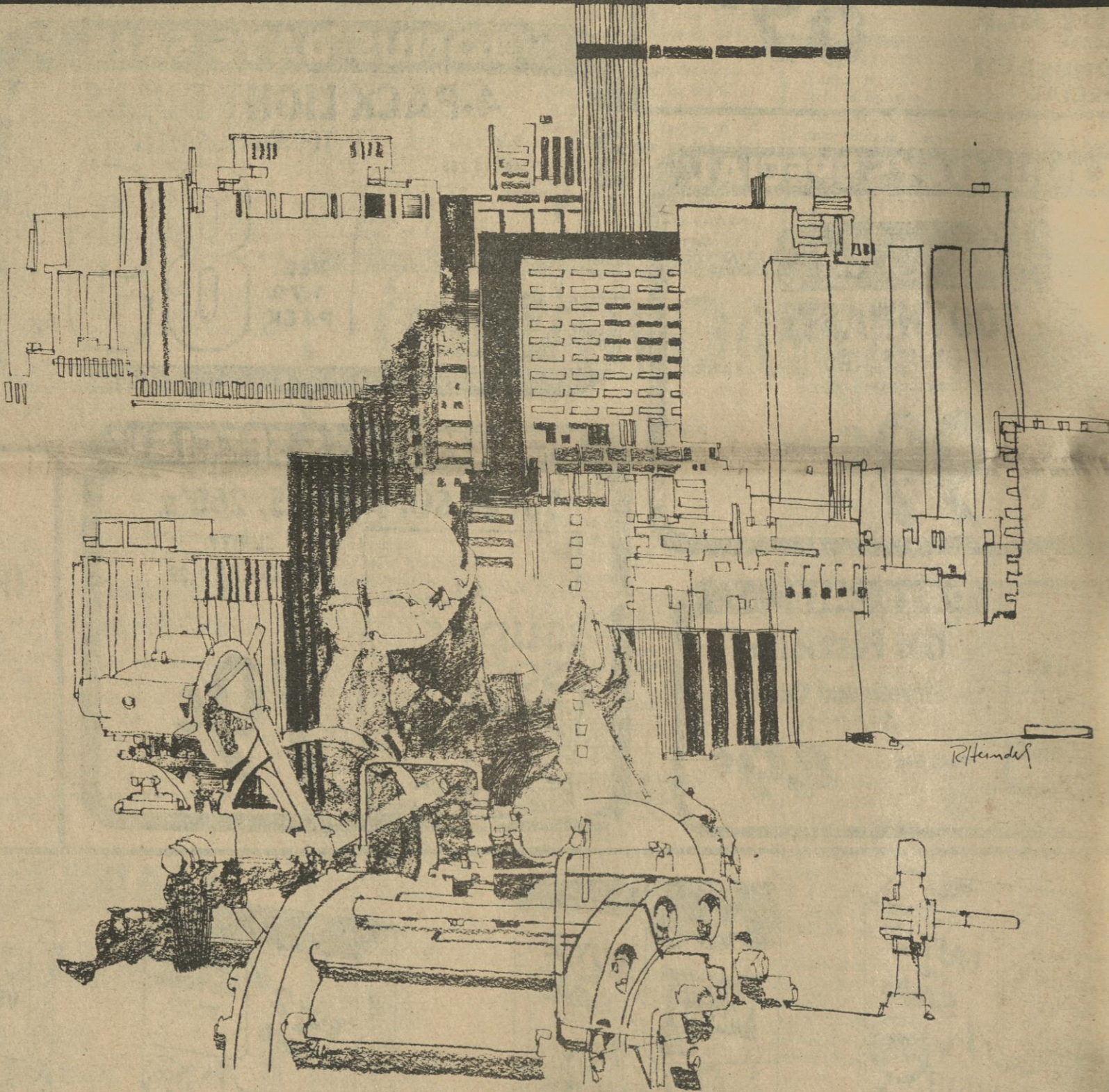
Burnsville Captures Tourney
