as William E. Hall, of Montgomery, Ala., and the wounded man as Sonny Kyle Livingston, also of Montgomery. A third Alabama man, identified as A. C. Chapman, was not injured. Livingston is owner of the Sonny Livingston Bail Bonds Co., and Hall and Chapman are believed to be employees of the company.

According to Mr. Jernigan, the trio had come to Tishomingo County to apprehend Horace Hubbard, who had allegedly jumped bail on charges that were pending in Montgomery, Alabama City Court stemming from a Klu Klux Klan march on the city of Montgomery during the summer of 1979. The three charges against him being, parading without a permit; carrying a concealed weapon, to wit: a knife and carrying a firearm within 1,000 feet of a parade.

According to Prosecuting Attorney Jernigan, Sheriff Bates received a radio call around noon on Saturday to meet deputies being dispatched to Walker Switch Road near Burnsville to investigate possible trouble. Sheriff Bates, along with the Prosecuting Attorney and deputies proceeded to the scene of the alleged trouble and upon arriving found three armed men, who approached the Sheriff's vehicle, later identified as the Hubbards. Upon the Sheriff's orders, the men laid down their weapon, and one of them indicated that he believed one bondsman was shot and also the possibility of a second bondsman being shot. The third bondsman had apparently left the scene before the shooting fearing possible trouble and had sought assistance from the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department.

The defendants were placed under arrest by Sheriff Bates and a search was instigated for the two injured individuals believed to be at large in the vicinity . Deputies Payne and Boyd tound Mr. Hall, approximately 200 feet from where the shots were believed to have been fired, lying in a pool of blood near school position, tackle, son \$ the Walker Switch Road. An ambulance was summoned to the scene and prior to its arrival Livingston emerged from the woods on the Walker Switch Road and was found to have been wounded by an apparent gunshot.

The Tishomingo County Hespital Ambulance Service transported the victims to the local facility where unsuccessful attempts were made to revive Hall. Livingston was treated and released and advised by medical authorities to check into a hospital in his hometown for observation.

The suspects were taken to Tishomingo County Jail and later transported to Aberdeen, Ms., to the Monroe County Jail where they are being held on \$50,000 bond each. Livingston is listed in satisfactory condition in a hospital in Montgomery.

Fertilizer Prices Higher

Farmers will pay 16 to 20 percent more for fertilizer this spring than they did last year. es are expected to be 10 percent higher; phosphate, 12 to 15 percent; and potash, 8 to 10 percent. Higher costs for labor, transportation and energy are mainly responsible. Because prices are expected to rise again before planting season, farmers should arrange for their fertilizer early to insure getting the analysis they need, a better delivery date and a lower price.

1980 Vegetables

Gardeners will have a new tomato variety for 1980 gardens -- Miss America Hybrid. This red tomato is resistant to tobacco mosaic virus, root knot nematodes and certain types of fusarium. It was developed by the Mississippi State University experiment station at Crystal Springs. Miss America Hybrid is not listed in the 1980 seed
