

A spokesman for the Sheriff's Department said that a few accidents occurred as a result of the weather conditions. Some schools in the area started their Monday session an hour late because of weather and road conditions.

To those who are signing Homestead for the first time or for those over 65 years of age: You must bring your deeds, Social Security numbers, and **everyone** must have their automobile license plate numbers.

If you do not bring these, it is impossible for you to sign Homestead.

### Head Start Pre-Registration

Mississippi Action for Progress, Inc. will pre-register children at your local Head Start Center on Monday through Friday of the following weeks: March 3 - April 9, from 8 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.; April 10 - 11, from 8 a.m. to 6:30 p.m.

Children pre-registered at this time will be screened by your local Center Committee for enrollment when centers re-open in September, 1980.

All children meeting the following requirements are eligible: 1) 4 or 5 years of age (3 years old where authorized); in addition, children who will be 6 after September 1, 1980 and before January 1, 1981 are also eligible; 2) with or without a handicapping condition; 3) family income below OMB poverty guidelines and/or welfare (children from families whose incomes are above these guidelines will be enrolled if space permits).

Please assist us in this important effort by doing the following: 1) coming to the center between March 3rd and April 11th - to re-register your child if he or she is not graduating; 2) to register other children in your family ages 3 to 5.

A certified copy of your child's birth certificate, your child's medicaid number, if eligible for this service, immunization record and proof of annual family income are requested for pre-registration.


The singing groups will consist of The Harmoniers, The Sullivan Family, and The Singing Hills.

## Yellow Creek Nuclear Plant To Begin New Phase Of Construction

Construction of the Tennessee Valley Authority's Yellow Creek Nuclear Plant north of here is nearing a new phase.

The immediate goal for concreting the unit 1 reactor building is to complete the first phase concrete required before beginning steel containment vessel erection in April of this year. Currently, the unit 1 auxiliary area is 29 percent complete.

Cumulative concrete placement in the unit 1 reactor building, including fill and

structural, totals over 24,000 cubic yards. Total permanent concrete placed for the project to date stands at approximately 105,000 cubic yards.

On January 24, work began in the unit 1 reactor auxiliary area on installation of component cooling water heat exchangers. The heat exchangers, six for each reactor building, cost approximately \$200,000 each, are 44 feet long and 7 feet in diameter, and weigh 113,000 pounds empty and 194,000 pounds

when full of water.

According to Yellow Creek Mechanical Engineer Ray Newby, who resides in Corinth, the heat exchangers are part of two separate piping trains within the component cooling system. "Each train contains normal and emergency pumps, a surge tank, three component cooling water heat ex-

changers in series, piping, and valves," remarked Newby, who also worked at TVA's Bellefonte Nuclear Plant before coming here.

"The component cooling system is a closed recirculating cooling water system that serves to remove waste heat from plant equipment," said Newby.

He added that during normal operation the temperature of the water in the equipment side of the system will be between ambient temperature and 100° F.

The initial heat exchanger was installed on the east side of the unit 1 reactor building auxiliary area on January 24. The remaining heat exchangers will be installed as soon as possible. The same procedure will be followed on the west side of the building.

The rigging equipment used to lift the first heat exchanger was a 4100 Manitowoc crane with 100 feet of boom and a five part line.

The heaviest equipment to be installed at Yellow Creek will be the steam generators (two per unit) which weigh approximately 800 tons each, are 69 feet long, and are 20 feet in diameter.

Yellow Creek's heat exchangers were supplied by combustion Engineering and were transported by rail from Camden, New Jersey, to the Yellow Creek Port. They were then loaded onto a low-boy tractor-trailer rig and transported to the plant site.

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## Chatting With Your Home Economist

### Tornado Season Ahead

A tornado can strike any time, but April, May and June are the months of highest incidence. Would you know what to do if you heard a tornado watch bulletin? Being prepared will reduce risks.

A tornado watch means the conditions are right for one to form. In a watch situation, look for threatening weather and listen to the radio or TV for further information.

A warning will be issued when a tornado has actually been sighted or indicated by radar. But since they are not always sighted or picked up on radar, warnings may not always be given. Be on the lookout for the possibility of such storms whenever threatening conditions approach.

Whether you hear a warning or see the approaching tornado yourself, take cover immediately. Go to the basement or to an interior part of the lowest level - closets, bathrooms or interior halls. Get under something sturdy. Stay away from windows, doors and outside walls.

Leave mobile homes or vehicles and go to a substantial structure. If there is no shelter nearby, lie flat in the nearest ditch or ravine with your hands shielding your head.

Keep a battery-operated radio with fresh batteries handy to get late bulletins.

Have a practice run with your family so every member

will know what to do and where to go if the danger arises.

### ENERGY—SAVING TIPS

Turning the water heater can save energy. Many families have reduced the temperature to 120 degrees or even lower, but the dishwasher owner has been reluctant to operate the machine on water cooler than 140 degrees.

Other families are using timers to turn the water heater on and off at selected times.

Some dishwasher manufacturers now advertise excellent dishwashing results with 120 degree water. By lowering the water heater 20 degrees, the family can save about 10 percent of the energy needed to heat water.

### Perfect

#### Tuna Casserole

- 1 can (10 3/4 oz.) condensed cream of celery, chicken or mushroom soup
- 1/4 cup milk
- 1 can (about 7 oz.) tuna, drained and flaked
- 2 hard-cooked eggs, sliced
- 1 cup cooked peas
- 1/4 cup slightly crumbled potato chips

In 1-quart casserole, blend soup and milk; stir in tuna, eggs and peas. Bake at 350° F. for 25 minutes or until hot; stir. Top with chips; bake 5 minutes more. Makes about 4 cups.

### Still Time To Test

It's not too late to soil test and get the results back before planting. Consider these facts: About 33 percent of the state's cropland needs lime critically, 21 percent needs phosphate and 39 percent needs potash. These figures are from more than 300,000 soil samples tested in the last five years by the Extension Soil Testing Laboratory. They represent 4.5 million acres of Mississippi cropland.

The only way a farmer can be sure his soil is not deficient in nutrients is to have it tested. The results will tell how much lime or fertilizer is needed for top yields and profit.

### WHEAT MANAGEMENT

If you're growing wheat for grain, fertilize it by mid-March to keep it producing at the highest rate. Control garlic and wild onions with 2,4-D or mixtures of dicamba and 2,4-D. Don't apply after plants have begun to joint. For disease control, apply fungicides in April or May. Contact the Extension Office for rates and other production information.

### Control Spring Weeds

Weeds will cause a poor grass stand in early spring lawns of bermuda, St. Augustine, centipede and zoysia. To reduce these spring weed problems, mow the grass about mid-March. Set the mowing height one-half inch lower than the last mowing in the fall. Close early mowing will remove dead stems and leaves, prevent thatch buildup and promote better growth.

### Vegetables Need Sunlight

Will your spring garden receive enough sunlight to produce as much as it should? Many gardeners don't take into account that trees around gardens grow larger each year and shade more of the garden area. As a result, the garden doesn't receive the light it needs to produce at its full potential. Evaluate your garden spot now and remove any unnecessary growth that can reduce yields.

One of our most popular contests, the County Rifle Match, was held February 20, at the fairgrounds. Conservation officers, Jim Barnes and Robert Patrick, assisted with the contest. 4-H'ers from the Iuka and Burnsville areas participated and high scores of 134 (Senior) and 120 (Junior) won the two divisions. Before the contestant can compete he/she must complete the Hunter Safety Program, sponsored

by 4-H. Our most recently completed session was taught by Larry Martin at Burnsville High School.

Hunting and accidents are often associated. Accidents do happen in the field, but over 50 percent happen in the home. The Hunter Safety Program familiarizes you and your family with the importance of handling and storing guns properly. Make guns in the home and field more safe by enrolling in a safety program in your community or school.

February 19 through 22. Twenty-seven (27) cattle producers voted, and 9 voted for and 18 against. Therefore, 33 percent voted for the referendum and 67 percent voted against the referendum.

New Peanut Loan Rates Announced - Tishomingo County farmers will be eligible for national average support levels of \$455 per short ton for their 1980-crop quota peanuts. Elmer (Booster) South, Chairperson of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conser-

vation (ASC) Committee, said local producers would also be eligible for \$250 per short ton support on peanuts produced above their quotas. Legislation requires a two-tier price support level for quota and additional (non-quota) peanuts. The 1980 loan rate for quota peanuts is \$35 more than the 1979 level and the additional rate is \$50 lower. "The increase in the quota price support level is based on rising production costs," South said. It was necessary to lower the support level for additional peanuts because the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) expects 1980 peanut oil and meal prices to be lower. The additional support level is based on estimated export and domestic demand for peanuts and peanut oil and meal, he said. Under the peanut price support program, farms are assigned an acreage allotment and a poundage quota. Peanuts grown on allotted acres and within the farm's poundage quota are considered quota peanuts. Those grown on allotted acres, but in excess

of the farm's poundage quota are considered quota peanuts. Those grown on allotted acres, but in excess of the farm's quota are additional peanuts. Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) will sell quota and additional peanuts for domestic edible use and for seed at no less than 105 percent of the loan rate, plus costs, if the sale is made on or before December 31, or 107 percent of the loan value, plus cost, if the sale is after December 31. "The exception to this policy is that sales of additional peanuts for domestic edible use, if sold and paid for during the harvest season at the time of delivery by the producer, will be made at no less than 100 percent of the quota loan value, plus costs," the ASCS official said. Additional 1980-crop peanuts will be sold by CCC for export edible use at no less than \$435 per short ton.

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



### Farms Problems

As a member of the Senate Agriculture Committee, I am very concerned about the serious problems facing American farmers.

All businesses today are under a severe strain because of inflation and tight credit. Farm operations are no different.

Farm prices simply have not kept pace with sharply rising production costs, especially items such as fuel and fertilizer. Diesel and gasoline costs, for example, have jumped nearly 85 percent the past year. Interest rates are skyhigh, and adequate credit is not available to many farmers as Spring planting approaches.

In the Senate, we are working to improve and extend through September 1981 the emergency farm credit program Congress enacted two years ago. This emergency loan program, available through the Farmers Home Administration, has exhausted its lending authority and will expire May 15 unless Congress acts.

The Agriculture Committee has unanimously reported the bill to extend the emergency farm credit program, and we hope to pass this legislation, which I am cosponsoring, very soon and have it on the President's

desk for his signature.

In Mississippi, bad weather in recent years has hurt many of our farmers, and their economic burdens have been aggravated as a result.

Our tax laws also make it very difficult in many circumstances for farm owners to continue a farming operation.

I have sponsored, and am seeking to pass, legislation to help farm families keep their land intact from generation to generation and maintain their family farms. This can be done by more realistic estate tax laws that do not require farm families to sell off their land to pay inheritance taxes.

Agriculture is immensely important to the health of the economy of the United States. About one-fifth of all the employment in the nation results from agriculture and related industry.

Mississippi's economy is even more heavily dependent on the health and stability of our agricultural sector. About one-third of our state's total economic activity and employment involves farming and those industries processing, transporting and marketing agricultural products.

The stability and growth of markets for our agricultural exports cannot be over-em-

phasized as a factor in the overall health of agriculture. This year alone, our farm exports are expected to total about 38 billion dollars, or several billion above the 1979 figures.

About forty percent of all agricultural products in Mississippi are sold to foreign purchases.

Further development, and expansion, of our overseas markets is a major goal of mine. As a member of the Foreign Agricultural Policy Subcommittee I am striving to improve the incentives and opportunities for exporting farm commodities and products.

Our farmers are the most productive in the world, effectively providing food and fiber for American consumers as well as purchasers from overseas. It is essential that our federal laws and our national policies reflect a genuine commitment to maintaining the opportunity for conducting a profitable farm operation.

We cannot afford to allow our fertile lands to lie fallow because of the inadequacies of our credit systems and the vagaries of inflation. Finding solutions to these problems should be among the highest priorities of our government.

March 4, 1943

A mass meeting, regardless of the weather a meeting was to be held in the warm-auditorium of the Iuka Baptist Church on March 7, 1943, at 3:00 p.m. Everyone in a radius of several miles was urged to attend this meeting and hear the special speaker, Rev. Lloyd L. King (The Parson). The Parson's Column was published weekly in

those issues of The Vidette. A N.Y.A. Defense Training Center representative was to be in Iuka each week to interview interested young people.

The Mayor and Aldermen of Iuka agreed to have the street light turned on again in Iuka. The lights had been turned off in an effort to save electricity. The city had cooperated with the war efforts by having street lights turned off.

The men in service mentioned in this issue were: Pvt. Coleman Barnes, Pfc. Marcus Parnell, Avon Whitfield, Charles Shackelford, Sgt. James Skinner, Pvt. Talmadge K. Arnold, Pvt. Orlan R. Bullard, Johnny C. McVay, O.C. and Merle Nelson, Ray Perry, Weldon Hanks, Pfc. R.C. (Ross) Hamilton, Sgt. Sidney Belue, George Belue, John Belue and Robert Belue.

### Conservation Notes

By: Phil Purvis

Though you may not think about it, you are dependent

upon the soil for your very existence. Try naming something that doesn't come directly or indirectly from the soil.

American society as a whole eats well, is clothed and sheltered from the heat and cold. Each of us enjoy these things whether we deal with the soil directly or not. Only three or four percent of the population is farming to assure that food and fiber is available for all people.

The process of farming involves many risks. One thing that increases risk is soil erosion. For all cropland in the United States, the average sheet and rill erosion in 1977 was estimated to be 4.8 tons per acre per year. That same year the average annual erosion rate was considered to be 10.9 tons per acre in Mississippi.

Soil erosion may decrease the productivity of a soil if it occurs at a rate faster than the topsoil can be replenished by natural processes. Although soils differ from one another, the average soil loss tolerance on cropland, pasture and forest land is 5 tons per acre per year. Tolerance as described here is the maximum rate of soil erosion that will permit a high level of productivity to be obtained economically and indefinitely.

There are 2,950 local conservation districts established under various state laws in the fifty states. Their function is to provide leadership in recognition of soil and water related problems and to offer solutions to these problems. The Tishomingo County Soil and Water Conservation District can help landusers to plan land use and treatment

that will be both beneficial in conserving the soil and increasing production.

**Legislative News**  
(February 25 - 29)  
On Monday, February 25, HB-10, to revise Chancery Clerk fees for recording certain documents were vigorously debated. Two amendments were offered, one was adopted, the second amendment was questioned on a point of order. Then the bill was laid on the table, subject to call.  
Tuesday, HB-10 was passed. HB-204, to increase penalty on delinquent ad valorem taxes, a ways and means bill, was passed.  
The House Calendar for Thursday included 12 general bills, including HB-469, the Usury Bill for financial institutions, and HB-565, to increase use tax on interstate commercial carriers motor fuel, along with 6 other miscellaneous bills.  
We received the conference report on HB-232, in that the conference deleted the Senate amendments, and adopted the bill as originally passed the House for a 2 million dollar deficit appropriation to continue Medicaid services the balance on this fiscal year. This 2 million dollars will generate an additional 8 million dollars in Federal monies for the program.

## Newsletter From

### Senator Bill May

The week of February 25th saw the first legislative deadline. This deadline was for the introduction of general bills and Constitutional amendments. To date, the Senate has filed 855 regular bills and 45 concurrent resolutions.

Most of this week was spent in various committee meetings. The two major committee meetings I had were Judiciary and Highways and Transportation. In the Judiciary meeting we discussed increasing the Attorney General's powers so that it may better enable him to investigate, w.o. tie collar crime. I personally feel that more authority is needed in the Attorney General's office for this purpose. It is a shame that we have to rely on the Federal Bureau of Investigation to clean up the corruption in our state. I feel that the State of Mississippi is very capable of doing this itself.

The other major committee meeting this week was in the Highways and Transportation Committee. This committee heard the subcommittee report on the increase of the truck weights. The subcommittee report was followed by various questions and answers by other committee members. This bill was tabled in the committee to enable various Senators to prepare amendments to the bill.

On February 29th, the Senate passed six Senate bills and one House bill. The House bill which passed was H.B. No. 43, which gives the Department of Education the discretion to reduce the number of school days by ten for the purpose of emergency conservation of energy. The school district will, however, receive full payment based on the present school term.

I am continuously receiving responses from various ones of you on particular issues. 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## You and Your Credit Bureau

Your Credit Bureau is located in Corinth, Miss. It has a staff of persons trained in credit reporting and interviewing consumers regarding their credit file. This bureau is centrally located and serves a six county area; Alcorn, Tishomingo, Prentiss, and Tippah in Mississippi, and McNairy and Hardin counties in Tennessee. The bureau is affiliated with two National Systems of credit reporting; Associated Credit Bureaus of America and Credit Bureau Reports, Inc. In addition to the Credit Reporting Department there is the Collection Department. The main objective of this unit is to help medical and professional people collect past due accounts. Five full time telephone collectors, in a very efficient and courteous manner contact the debtors, in an effort to help them clear up their delinquent accounts. This also helps them get their credit record up to date. You must be a member of the bureau to get reports. Many times, collection of one bad account would more than pay your dues for a year. On the other hand, anyone can turn in delinquent accounts for collection. Just contact your bureau and they will be glad to explain our policies.

**Three-Quarter Way House**  
The first three-quarter way house in Northeast Mississippi, which was opened by Timber Hills Mental Health Services in September, 1979, in Corinth, is working well.  
The 12-bed house is available to recovering male alcohol abusers 18 years old and older. It is available to persons who are having difficulty in securing housing after being released from Haven House, the agency's intensive treatment center for alcohol abusers.  
"In the past, because of limited housing in the area, we have been forced to place clients in low cost motels and other inadequate living environments, said Jay Lee, Timber Hills Alcohol and Drug Coordinator. "The results, in many cases, were disastrous."  
"The 'three-quarter way' house allows men to live in a protective environment until they are ready to re-enter the community. Residents must have a job to live in the house."  
According to Lee, the facility is fast becoming self-supporting. "We should be completely self-supporting in a few months," he said. "At this time, we have eight residents working and paying their way."

## Worker-Trainee Program For Tenn-Tom Waterway Project

The Nashville District of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers has established a Worker-Trainee Program for the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway Project.

The program is designed to give contractors an incentive to hire and train local unskilled workers. Contractors develop their own plan to meet their individual needs. The Bureau of Apprenticeship and Training (BAT) of the Department of Labor assists in the development of the plan, and must approve it prior to implementation.

Two of Nashville District's

major construction contractors have adopted the program -- Tenn-Tom Constructors and Al Johnson Construction Company. This is the first time the Corps has included such a program in its contract provisions.

The first two individuals to complete the program, Bobby H. Shannon and Curtis Long, both of Iuka, underwent their on-the-job training with the Tenn-Tom Constructors. Shannon and Long began their training in September 1979, after graduating from the Operating Engineer Pre-Apprentice Training Center in

Russellville, Ala. Shannon is working as a scraper operator and Long as an equipment mechanic.

Tenn-Tom Constructors is currently excavating Sections 4 and 2A of the Waterway, a \$270 million contract; and Al Johnson is building the Bay Springs Lock and Dam, a \$76 million contract. Each contract provides for 100,000 hours of on-the-job training. Presently there are 23 participants in the program.

### Do Your Own Thing

#### APPLESAUCE PUDDING CAKE

If your family is fussy about some ingredients, nuts and spices for instance, here's a recipe that lets you do your own thing. Instead of starting from scratch, it starts with one of the new pudding cake mixes so it's called Applesauce Pudding Cake. Directions on the package advise adding eggs, water and oil to the mix. When applesauce is used you don't have to add water or oil as the sauce furnishes liquid as well as flavor.

The recipe below makes a plain applesauce cake—no spices, no nuts, no raisins. But if you want to add what your family favors, note suggested amounts in the variations at the end of the recipe. The recipe calls for a 15 oz. jar of applesauce. Either smooth or chunky styles may be used.

APPLESAUCE PUDDING CAKE  
1 package (18-1/2 oz.) Pudding Cake Mix  
1-2/3 cups applesauce (15 oz. jar)  
3 eggs

Heat oven to 350° F. Grease and flour a 12-cup bundt or 10-inch tube pan. In a large bowl, blend apple-



sauce, cakemix and eggs until moistened. Beat 2 minutes at high speed. Transfer the batter to a prepared pan. Bake at 350° F. for 35 to 40 minutes, or until a pick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool upright in pan about 20 minutes, then turn onto serving plate and cool completely. You may dust with powdered sugar or frost. 16 servings.

1/2 cup raisins  
1/2 cup chopped walnuts  
1 teaspoon ground cinnamon  
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg  
1/4 teaspoon cloves
