## Lives Of Two Young Iuka Men Claimed In Firey Crash On U. S. 72

An accident in the early morning hours of March 21, near Iuka, involving two vehicles, claimed the lives of two young Iuka men and injured an Alabama man, Karrey M. Parrish, 18, son of Mrs. Shirley Parrish, of Iuka, and J.R. Parrish, of Counce, Tenn.; and Edwin G. Gregory, Jr., 25, son of Mr. and Mrs. Edwin G. Gregory, Sr., of Iuka, were both apparently killed instantly in the crash with a tractor-trailer truck, approximately 1/4 mile west of Iuka on Hwy. 72.

According to Mississippi Highway Patrolman, Jerry Boyd, the two young men were traveling east in a 1978 Ford Thunderbird, when it evidently veered from its

lane into the west bound lane of 72, hitting the left front of an on-coming tractor-trailer rig, causing the car to go into a spin. Patrolman Boyd said that according to an eyewitness, who had been awakened by the impact, the car came to a stop from the spin in the east bound lane, headed west and burst into flames.

According to authorities, the men were trapped in the automobile and authorities were unable to identify the bodies at the scene of the accident. The two were later identified as Gregory and Parrish.

The driver of the truck, owned by South Eastern Container Steel Co., of Bir-

mingham, Ala., was Lowell Thomas Hawkins, 39, of Warrior, Ala. Mr. Hawkins received lacerations to the head and a fractured right knee. He was taken to the Tishomingo County Hospital by ambulance and later transferred to a Birmingham hospital.

Floyd Whitaker, Iuka Fire Chief, said his department received a call around 4:30 a.m., asking him to send an ambulance to the scene of the accident. While Whitaker secured the ambulance, an Iuka City Police Officer arrived at the crash and immediately summoned Whitaker to bring the fire truck. "The car was engulfed in flames when we arrived," said Whitaker, "but we were able to confine the blaze to the car until it was extinguished, but the car was demolished."

Services for Edwin Gregory, Jr. were at 2:00 p.m. Saturday, March 22, at Cutshall Funeral Home Chapel with Reverend Charles Dampier and Reverend Harris Counce officiating. Burial was in Oak Grove Cemetery.

Survivors include his wife, Genia Pittman Gregory; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Edwin G. Gregory, Sr., of Iuka; grandparents, Mrs. Estelle Ford, of Ripley, and Mr. and Mrs.

M.G. Gregory, of New Albany. Services for Karrey M. Parrish were at 4:00 p.m. on Saturday, March 22, at the Cutshall Funeral Home Chapel with Reverend Charles Dampier and Reverend Harris Counce officiating. Burial was in Oak Grove Cemetery.

Survivors include his mother, Mrs. Shirley Parrish, of Iuka; his father, J.R. Parrish, of Counce, Tenn.; a sister, Miss Dedra Parrish, of Hattiesburg; a half-brother, Randy Parrish, of Counce, Tenn.; his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Morris, of Iuka.

## Citizens Speak Out On Zoning

Residents of Iuka strongly voiced their opinion against the proposed zoning ordinance at Tuesday night's public meeting.

Approximately 200 citizens of Iuka attended the meeting, which was held at the Youth Center in Mineral Springs Park in Iuka.

The ordinance involves the zoning of Iuka into portions, which include residential, commercial, industrial, and agricultural. For some time the Planning Commission, of Iuka, which consists of Dr. Bobby King, W.S. Brown, Jr., D.O. Jourdan, Jr., Mrs. Jean Sims, Dr. Harry Cosby, Charles Lewis, and O.C. Nelson, appointed by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen, and the Research and Development Center in Jackson, have been studying Iuka and trying to develop a long range plan of land use and develop a zoning ordinance. According to Mayor George Cutshall, this meeting was held to inform the citizens of Iuka as to the pros and cons of the ordinance and to give the people of Iuka the opportunity to voice their opinions.

According to opinions of the citizens who attended this meeting, strong opposition was voiced. Mr. Rex L. Tucker, former City Board Member, told The News that with a show of hands of the approximately 200 in attendance, around 195 were opposed, while 3-5 were in favor of the ordinance.

At a regular meeting of the Mayor and Board of Aldermen on Tuesday night, April 1, at City Hall in Iuka, the ordinance will be put to a vote by the Board. Time for the meeting will be 7:00 p.m., and all citizens of Iuka are strongly urged to attend and lend their support at this meeting.

### Getting Ready For Tomorrow

The furnishings we select are tools for living.

Montgomery Ward has recently installed a new furniture department prototype. The furniture department prototype includes a host of innovations designed to make the furniture department more attractive and appealing to consumers. It includes such techniques as multi-level displays and less crowding of merchandise than in the past. Lighting gets special attention.

Product quality is a major concern of today's home furnishings consumer and will be even more important in the years ahead.

There is no formula for lifestyle. Most manufacturers feel styling in the 80s will be firmly based on already developed lifestyles and, although new trends will be embraced, little dramatic change will occur in styling. The coming upgrading of products means upgrading of prices, too.

KD or consumer-assem-

bled furniture will increase in use. Manufacturers are using innovative technologies to simplify assembly and reduce the amount of time necessary to assemble pieces.

In the lifestyle market, the KD method of construction is a primary cost cutter. Unless the retailer concerns himself with maintenance, he can serve neither his customer nor himself well.

### Color Palette

Some colors change as the furniture market changes. Purity and depth of tone will be the hallmarks of the '80s color palette.

New prints are moving towards purer colors, less blending of tones and jewel tones like lacquer green, a deep, pure green like emerald. It's a deep, rich color.

Earthtones first came into the mass market about six years ago. Today's palette is much more to the red side, with warmer browns and raisins. The earthtones will always be good colors in backgrounds, furnishings

and accessories.

In reaction to all this red, we are now seeing an influx of greens, both dark and light, but all to the blue side.

The trade with China will be a major influence on colors in the '80s. This will help bring in deep, rich colors and the jewel tones.

The importance of color as a marketing force is recognized by more home furnishings fabric producers, too.

### Ham Stroganoff

2 cups cooked chopped ham  
2 tablespoons butter  
1/2 cup chopped onion  
1/3 cup sliced green pepper  
4 oz. can mushrooms  
1 can mushroom soup  
1/2 cup milk  
1/2 cup sour cream  
1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce  
Cooked noodles or toast points

Melt butter in heavy skillet. Add onion and green pepper. Brown lightly. Add mushrooms. Stir in soup, milk, sour cream, and Worcestershire sauce. Add ham and cook over low heat for 10 minutes. Stir occasionally. Serve over noodles or toast points.

## County Agents Notes

### MULCH GARDENS

If you have not planned to mulch your summer garden I urge you to consider this important practice. Several organic materials can be applied underneath plants as mulches. They include sawdust, pine straw, wood chips, corn cobs and grass clippings. Mulches will reduce weed problems, maintain a uniform soil moisture and reduce erosion.

By mulching, you won't have to water as often. Less fertilizer also will be needed during the growing season. Fruit will be kept cleaner, and there will be less fruit rot loss. Mulches also add organic matter to the soil when turned under at the end of the growing season.

### FERTILIZE CORN

There is always the question of when to fertilize corn. If you use ammonium nitrate as a source of fertilizer, I suggest you split the application. Apply 25 to 50 percent of the material preplant or at planting and side or top dress the rest when the corn is about 12 to 14 inches tall. It is not practical to split applications on anhydrous ammonia. For fertilization rates and other information, contact my office.

### GARDENS

Mulch English peas to keep the roots cool and the plants producing longer.

Bed sweet potatoes in April to have slips for setting out in May and June. Bed only those roots free of rots and diseases such as scurf and black rot.

All vegetables need space to develop properly, even the cool season early vegetables. Head lettuce and some leaf lettuce types require 1 foot between plants. Butterhead types like buttercrunch and Bibb need only 9 inches between plants. Thin beets to 3 to 4 inches apart and carrots to 2 inches apart.

Use onions that make flower stalks for green onions. They will not make a good bulb.

Carefully watch hot bed.

and cold frame temperatures. High temperatures on a sunny day as a result of insufficient ventilation will kill plants. Water seedlings early in the day so the leaves dry before night. Try not to water on cloudy days to help prevent diseases.

## ASCS FARM NEWS

**National Flood Insurance** - Farmer and other Rural Residents of Tishomingo County may now be eligible to purchase limited amount of Flood Insurance coverage on your home, farm buildings, and their contents. This flood insurance is available

through the Emergency phase of the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP), administered by the Federal Insurance Administration. The agency of State Government which serves as coordinator between your community and the Federal Government on flood insurance is Director, Mississippi Research and Development Center, P.O. Drawer 2470, Jackson, MS 39205. The Federal Insurance Administration (FIA) regional office for Mississippi is: Regional Director, 1375 Peachtree Street N.E., Suite 778, Atlanta, Georgia 30309. Additional information, including rates, is available from the FIA regional office.

**Payment Limitation** - The Food and Agriculture Act of 1977 provides a payment limitation of \$40,000 for each "person" under one or more of the annual programs of wheat, feed grain, and upland cotton for the 1978 crop and \$45,000 for the 1979 crop. Payments for all crops shall not exceed \$50,000 for each of the 1980 and 1981 crops. The Secretary is directed to define the term "person" and to prescribe such rules as deemed necessary to assure a fair and reasonable application of the limitation.

Over the years, some serious problems have grown that threaten these resources. The Resources Conservation Act (RCA) will help us address their problems on nonfederal land. 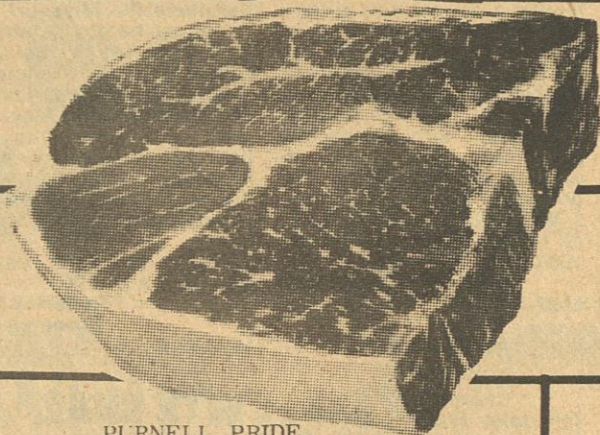

## LEGAL

### The Board of Supervisors Tishomingo County, Miss.

We have reviewed the internal accounting control procedures, including the accounting records and supporting documentation, of the Purchase Clerk of Tishomingo County, Mississippi that we considered relevant to the criteria established by House Bill Number 975, Laws of 1974 and House Bill Number 670, Laws of 1975 of the Mississippi Legislature. Our review included tests of compliance with such procedures during the period from October 1, 1978 through September 30, 1979.

The objective of internal accounting control is to provide reasonable, but not absolute, assurance as to the safeguarding of assets against loss from unauthorized use or disposition, and the reliability of financial records for preparing financial statements and maintaining accountability for assets. The concept of reasonable assurance recognizes that the cost of a system of internal control should not exceed the benefits derived and also recognizes that the evaluation of these factors necessarily requires estimates and judgements by responsible officials.

There are inherent limitations that should be recognized in considering the potential effectiveness of any system of internal control. In the performance of most control procedures, errors can result from misunderstanding of instructions, mistakes of judgement, carelessness, or

other personal factors. Control procedures whose effectiveness depends upon segregation of duties can be circumvented by collusion. Similarly, control procedures can be circumvented intentionally by individuals. Further, projection of any evaluation of internal control to future periods is subject to the risk that the procedures may become inadequate because of changes in conditions, and that the degree of compliance with the procedures may deteriorate.

We understand that procedures in conformity with the criteria referred to in the first paragraph of this report are considered by the Board of Supervisors to be adequate for its purpose in accordance with the provisions of House Bill Number 975, Laws of 1974 and House Bill Number 670, Laws of 1975, and that procedures not in conformity therewith indicate inadequacy for such purposes. Based on this understanding and on our review, in our opinion the purchasing records and internal accounting control procedures of the Purchase Clerk of Tishomingo County, Mississippi during the period October 1, 1978 through September 30, 1979 were adequate for the purposes of the Board of Supervisors and were in compliance in all material respects with the requirements of House Bill 975, Laws of 1974 and House Bill 670, Laws of 1975.

On Wednesday, HB-190, to change the method of determining the amount of reimbursement for drugs under Medicaid, was passed. HB-949, to base eligibility for Medicaid on supplementary security income, require co-payment on drugs, raise expenditure ceiling, was gutted in committee and the committee sub. As before us only raised the Medicaid ceiling to \$8.5 million dollars. The other issues as indicated in the title were taken out of the bill.

Thursday's action included HB-935, to provide additional judges and assistant district attorneys evoked over 3 hours of debate as various Judicial District Representatives tried to put amendments into the bill. Another 2 hours of debate was evoked by HB-78, dealing with the Credit Life Industry. The bill was defeated by a vote of 60-53.

Most of Friday's action was centered around a bill to insulate the highway director from harassment from the 3 highway commissioners. He can only be removed for cause and must be hired by a unanimous vote of all 3 commissioners and dismissed by a unanimous vote of the commissioners under the House version of the bill. The intent of the bill is to allow the director to build roads in areas of need rather than according to the whims of the commissioners. We hope to see some road improvements in Northeast Mississippi.

### Legislative News

Monday's session opened at 2 p.m. HB-819 was called up. This bill will create a Ms. Energy and Transportation Board, and in effect will adhere to some provisions as noted in Public Law 94-163 as enacted by the National Congress.

Eight Appropriations Bills were passed, including HB-340, to re-enact the Mississippi National Guard Assistance Law. By a 108-3 vote, the bill to legalize the production of ethyl alcohol for fuel was passed, and it now goes to the Senate. We also passed a bill reinstating the division of Federal-State and Local Programs within the Office of the Governor.

Tuesday we convened at 10 a.m. and passed 23 non-controversial bills and defeated one bill by noon. One of the first actions of the afternoon was to pass HB-1062, to provide statewide motor vehicle title registration system by computer. Another bill, HB-806, to recreate air and water pollution control commission, was passed. There were 59 bills handled, with
