### Fairview Man Burns To Death

An elderly Fairview com-  
munity man was burned to  
death while trying to put out a  
grass fire at his home Mon-  
day, Itawamba County  
Forester Charles Guinn said  
Tuesday.

Sumpter Johnson, 83, of  
Golden, apparently collapsed  
and fell unconscious into the  
flames while carrying a  
bucket of water to an out-  
building that caught fire after  
the grass fire got out of con-  
trol, Guinn said.

A neighbor discovered  
Johnson's body near the  
building, he said.

Danny Cody, a forestry of-  
ficial manning the Fairview  
forestry tower, reported the  
fire shortly after 3 p.m. Mon-  
day.

Guinn said he and other  
Itawamba County forestry of-  
ficials arrived at the Johnson  
residence at about 3:30 p.m.  
Johnson's body was found  
about 15 minutes later, he  
said.

Services were held at 2  
p.m. Wednesday at Fairview  
Baptist Church with burial in  
the church cemetery. The  
Rev. Roy Gholston and Rev.  
Bobby Robinson officiated  
with Dean Deaton Funeral  
Home in charge.

of Vina, Ala.; a son, Herchel  
Johnson, of Red Bay; three  
brothers, Eddie, Flavis and  
Melvin Johnson, all of

## FmHA Borrowers May Be Eligible For Compensation

Some borrowers who  
received loans from the Farm-  
ers Home Administration to  
buy new homes during parts  
of 1976-77 have been given  
additional time to apply for  
compensation for structural  
defects which may have oc-  
curred in their homes.

A provision of the Housing  
and Community Development  
Act of 1979 authorizes those  
who received housing loans  
between April 12, 1976 and  
October 12, 1977 to make  
claims for construction  
defects until October 12,  
1980, said Mark Hazard, State  
Director.

Since October 12, 1977,  
Farmers Home Ad-  
ministration, the Rural  
Development Service of the  
U.S. Department of  
Agriculture, has offered a  
program of compensation for  
construction defects to its  
borrowers who purchase new  
homes. Borrowers can file  
claims for 18 months after  
they purchase homes.

If defects are noted in an  
FmHA financed home, the  
borrower first should contact  
the builder or contractor who  
issued the builder's warranty  
to try to resolve the program.

If problems cannot be  
resolved with builders and  
the defect "directly and  
significantly reduces the  
useful life or habitability of  
the dwelling," borrowers  
should contact the nearest  
FmHA county office.

"Compensation can be  
made for defects which affect  
the basic components of a  
dwelling, such as its founda-  
tion, basement, walls,  
floors, framing or roof, or the  
heating system, water supply,

or sewage disposal system,"  
Mr. Hazard said.

Farmers Home Ad-  
ministration has advised its  
field offices to notify by letter  
all borrowers who may be  
eligible to file compensation  
claims during the extended  
period. The letters will inform  
borrowers how and when they  
may apply and explain the  
type of defects covered.

During the 18-month period  
affected by the extension,  
FmHA financed about 6,000  
homes in rural Mississippi.  
Approximately 5,000 of them  
were newly built for FmHA  
borrowers and could be  
eligible under the program.  
The remaining homes were  
purchased from the existing  
stock and do not qualify for  
the program.

"Up to \$5 million is  
available nationwide for  
compensation for structural  
defects during fiscal year  
1980," Mr. Hazard said.  
"However, the number of  
complaints is small. As of  
March 12, only \$220,604 had  
been expended for 121

claims." He added that in  
fiscal year 1979, \$1 million  
was allocated for the national  
program, but \$383,188 was  
paid for 229 claims.

The Home Ownership  
Program of Farmers Home  
Administration is conducted  
through 82 county offices  
serving every rural county in  
Mississippi. The agency's  
housing program - including  
home ownership, rental  
housing, farm labor housing,  
and site development - is  
budgeted at approximately  
\$125,000,000 for Mississippi  
during fiscal year 1980.

## New Number For Telephone Directory Assistance In Iuka

Telephone customers in  
Iuka will begin using a new  
number to reach Directory  
Assistance on May 3, 1980,

their directory will dial 1 Plus  
411 to reach Directory

number change is made  
those customers who today  
report their calling number to  
the operator on direct dialed  
calls will be asked to give this  
same information on Direc-  
tory Assistance calls.

"This calling information is  
being collected for record  
purposes only and does not  
mean that our customers will  
be charged for the Directory  
Assistance call," Bartley em-  
phasized.

## Chatting With Your Home Economist

### ENZYME PRESOAKS

Enzyme presoaks received a lot of attention when they first appeared on the market. They are still available and effective for certain types of stains.

These laundry aids contain enzymes which are catalysts that speed up a reaction. Enzymes are most effective in breaking down protein stains such as body soil, perspiration, urine, blood, egg and food stains.

They work well on new stains and are often effective on old stains that have "set". If old stains are allowed to soak for 30 minutes up to four hours, many can be removed.

Presoaks are most effective in warm to hot water. Dissolve the presoak in the water, then add the clothes. They work best when allowed to soak, but can be added as a cleaning booster to the wash.

They do not work well on rust and ball point ink. Don't use bleach with an enzyme product; it inactivates the enzyme action.

### OVEN—BARBECUED RIBS

2 to 3 lbs. country or farm style ribs  
Oil  
Salt and Pepper  
2 Tablespoons vinegar  
2 tablespoons brown sugar  
1 teaspoon prepared mustard  
2 cans (8 ozs. each) tomato sauce with onions

In 2-quart baking dish arrange ribs; brush lightly with oil and sprinkle with salt and pepper. Bake at 400 degrees for 45 minutes, turning once; pour off fat. Com-

bine vinegar, brown sugar and mustard; spread over meat. Pour tomato sauce over meat. Bake, covered, at 350° for 45 to 50 minutes or until done; baste occasionally with sauce. Makes 6 generous servings.

## County Agent's Notes

### Planting Time Here!

What a farmer does the rest of April will affect crops throughout the growing season.

If farmers will use these proven practices to the best of their ability, I believe they can increase yields and lower production costs in 1980.

Fertilize according to crop needs based on a soil test to take the guesswork out of lime and fertilizer requirements.

Delay planting until soil and climatic conditions are right.

Prepare a good seedbed and do everything necessary to get a good stand with the first planting.

Plant the best seed available. High quality seed and good drainage are especially important for good stands of early plantings.

Apply nitrogen as near to the time the crop will use it as is practical.

Know the weed problems of each field and the chemicals needed to control them.

Farmers are a dedicated

group, and with any luck at all, I know they will produce a successful crop in 1980.

## Cattlemen Short Course At MSU

Mississippi State University's first cattlemen's short course is set for May 12-14. The program will center on cow-calf production and will be taught by Extension, MAFES and MSU animal scientists.

## Pasture Management

To produce a profit, permanent pastures must be managed with the same intensity as other field crops.

As the cost of fertilizer increases, a farmer cannot afford a scattergun approach to pasture fertilization. The surest way to profit from each dollar spent on fertilizer is to soil test. Apply fertilizer according to specific soil and forage needs.

Weeds must be controlled by spraying and/or clipping. Research shows most pasture weeds contain twice the nitrogen and phosphorus and three times the potassium as desirable forages. Weeds may also produce nitrate poisoning, other toxicity problems and off-flavors in meat and milk.

## ASCS Farm News

### PREMEASUREMENT AND EARLY MEASUREMENT SERVICES AVAILABLE THROUGH ASCS:

Farmers can assure that they comply with provisions of the 1980 programs by taking advantage of premeasurement and/or early measurement services offered by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS). Elmer A. South, Chairperson of the Tishomingo County ASCS Committee, said farmers can obtain services by contacting the county ASCS Office. "We will measure, reference and mark out fields with stakes prior to planting. To be certain of full compliance, farmers must plant within the stakes that are placed when the land is measured," South said. This is a premeasurement service which is available prior to planting. Producers who take advantage of premeasurement are then guaranteed that the fields are a certain size. This is important in helping them plan which fields to plant to certain crops, South said. Early measurement service is available for the measurement of crops which have already been planted. Since staking and referencing

is not required for this type service, the cost to producers is considerably less. Costs of the premeasurement service and the early measurement service are based on the estimated cost of performing these services. These charges will be furnished by the county ASCS Office to interested producers upon request. After planting, program participants must certify or report their 1980 crops and other program acres to the county ASCS Office in order to be eligible for program benefits.

**AERIAL OBSERVATION** — For 1980 compliance in Tishomingo County will be done by an airplane. This method of doing compliance has proven itself to be less expensive than the conventional ground measurement. If you have land that you have recently cleared and want to know the acreage, contact the county office concerning cropland measurement service. The State Committee of ASCS has set the following rates on cropland measurement: 15 cents per acre, per farm, with a minimum charge of \$7.50 per farm; a minimum of 350 acres, where practical, before measuring by aerial observation.

**CCC INTEREST RATE INCREASED** — On April 15, 1980, Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland announced the interest rate on all 1980 crop loans and Farm Storage Facility Loans made by the Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) will be 13 percent. The effective date was April 16, 1980. Farmers who already have CCC Commodity or Farm Storage Facility Loans will not be affected by the new interest rate.

## Sen. Bill May Reports To The People

During the week of April 14th the Senate passed 36 resolutions, 38 appropriations bills, 67 general bills and confirmed 5 appointments of the Governor to the Board of Economic Development.

H.B. No. 838 which provides for the procedure for the determination of parental rights is a matter which

generated a lot of concern in my district. This bill which I supported passed Thursday, April 17, but was held on a motion to reconsider. Even though I was supportive of this bill, I supported a move to reconsider so that an amendment could be made. The way the bill presently is a parent in any county could have their rights terminated in any other county of the state. I thought that this should be amended to restrict this in order to offer more protection to the family.

There apparently has been some confusion as to my position on this. This matter is one of grave importance and should require extensive study. In an effort to be competent and responsible as your Senator, I refuse to enter into decisions lightly; therefore, I wanted to give this bill its due consideration before committing myself. I voted for the final passage of this bill in committee, allowing it to be referred to the Senate. Apparently, some of you have been misled by another person outside of the district who would better serve his constituency if he attended his own business.

There were many bills of great importance requiring lengthy floor debates. If any of you have any questions concerning any legislation that we have passed or have not passed, I hope that you will feel free to write.

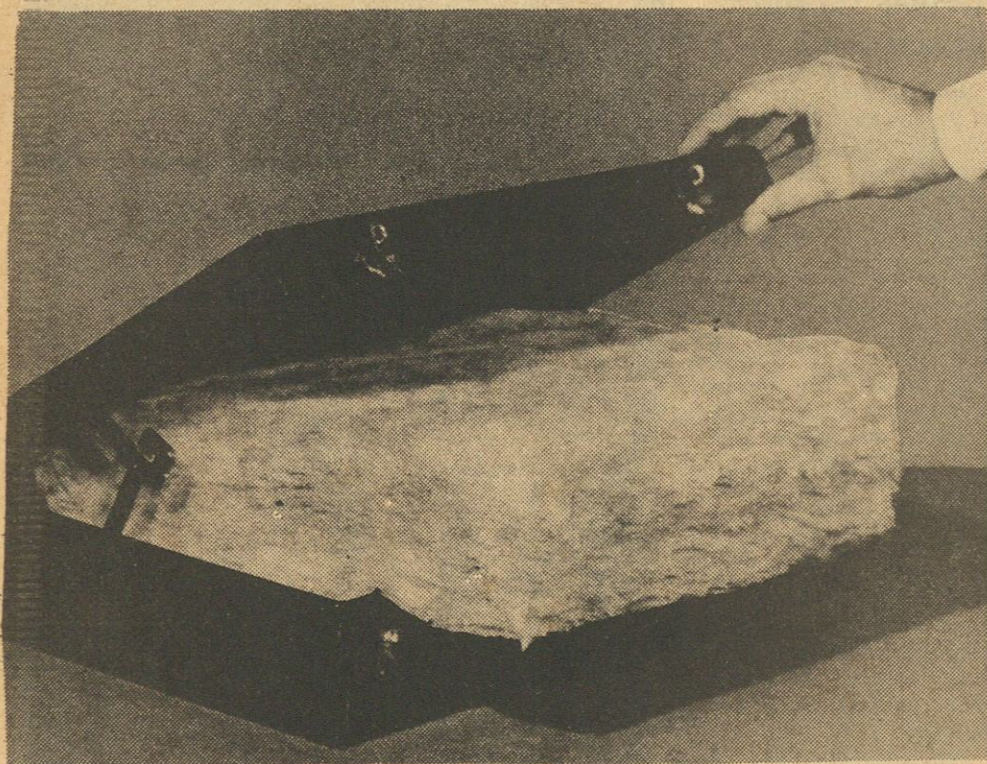

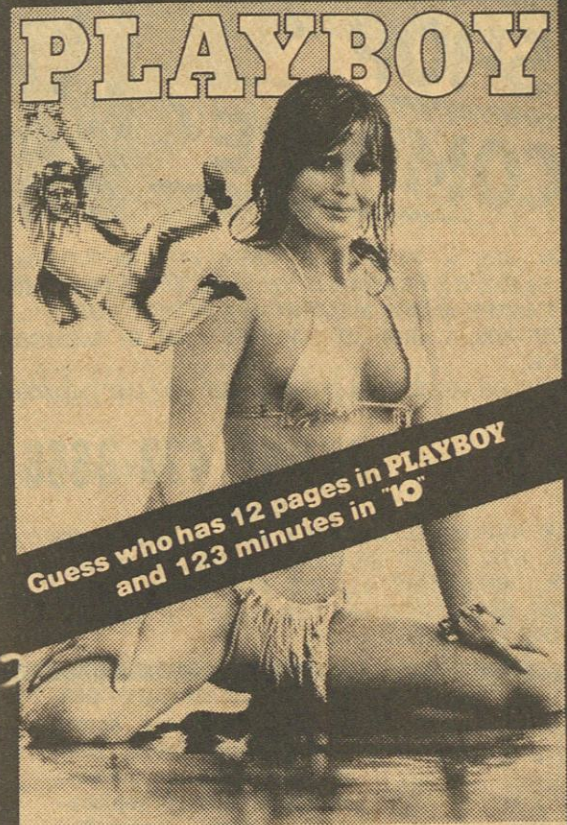
## Lucy Rowe Club Met

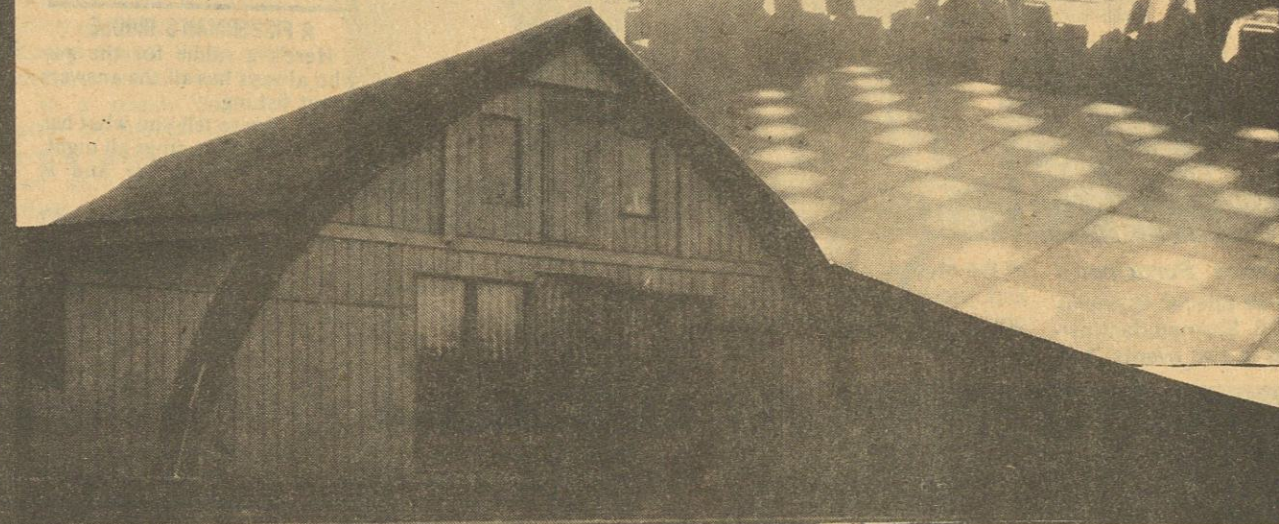

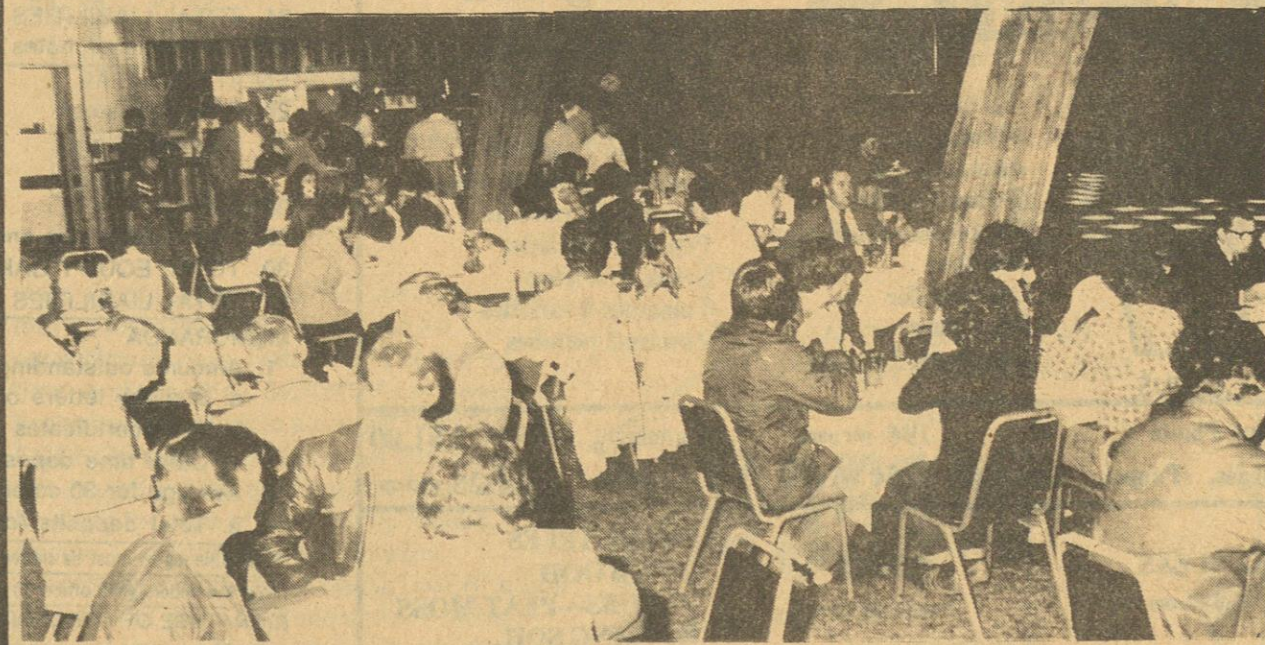

**A FISHERMAN'S RIDDLE**  
Here's a riddle for the guy who always has all the answers about fishing.

Ask him to tell you what has ears in its knees, sings all night, tells the temperature and is prized as fish bait.

When he tells you there isn't any such creature, you can quickly prove him wrong.

A brief study of the American field cricket will produce all these interesting facts, plus much more.

The cricket is really an exceptional insect. Only the male sings.

His potential mate hears the sound by means of special

organs located in the front legs just below the knees.

Crickets can tell you the temperature. For some reason, they increase their rate of chirping on warm days as the temperature increases.

You can determine the approximate temperature by adding the number 37 to the number of chirps you hear from one cricket in 15 seconds. The result will be the air temperature at that moment, plus or minus a degree or two.

The value of crickets as fish bait is well known to experienced anglers.

An easy way to have a ready supply of crickets is to use a simple trap recommended by Mercury outboards' fishing department.

They suggest you lay a few old boards on the ground in some tall grass, and wait a day or two.

All you need do is turn over the boards and grab a handful of bait.

Put the boards back in position and there'll be another supply of fresh bait the next day.

### Mustard Greens Good In Salads

What are your basic tossed salad ingredients? Lettuce, radishes, tomatoes, green onions, occasionally spinach or endive in season and a pinch of fresh dill or other herbs, right?

Few gardeners know how good mustard greens taste in salads, says Dr. Milo Burnham, Mississippi

Cooperative Extension Service horticulturist. Tender young mustard leaves have a peppery nip and a mild, distinctive taste. Substitute

chopped mustard greens for half the lettuce in salads.

The name "mustard greens" is unfortunate, said Dr. Burnham. The greens don't have a mustard flavor. Condiment mustard is made from mustard seeds from a different species. The only similarity between the taste of greens and prepared mustard is the mild peppery tang.

Mustard greens will mature in about 45 days from planting. Your first harvest, surplus seedlings thinned out of the row, will be ready in only 30 days. Young mustard plants are classed as semi-hardy and can be planted three to four weeks before the average date of the last killing frost in the spring. Late summer is a good time for seeding a fall crop.

Three kinds of mustard greens are usually available -- smooth leaf, curly leaf and a variety with broad stems preferred for Oriental cooking. Smooth-leaved varieties are best where soils are sandy because the leaves are easier to wash. The curly-leaved types are superior for salads; they fluff up tossed salads much like curly endive.

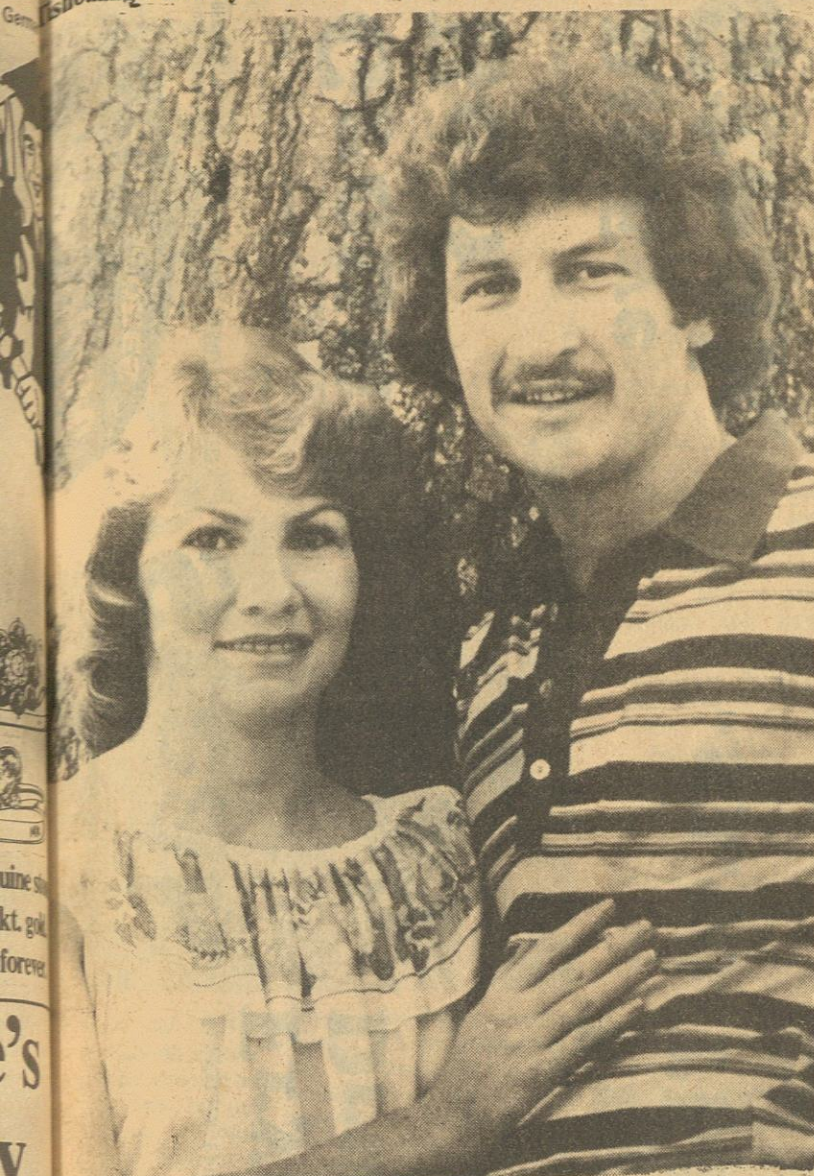

said Nevie McArthur, State Chairperson for the 1980 Cancer Crusade. "The secret is -- to have the disease detected and treated in time.

"I can't urge the people of Mississippi and Tishomingo County too strongly to help guard your lives against this disease," she said. "Go for regular health checkups. Know the seven warning signals of cancer. Ask the American Cancer Society about other ways you can help protect yourselves."

And the most important contribution, she added, the people can make is "the financial contribution you make to help support the research battle against cancer -- a battle that year after year gives doctors the knowledge and tools to help save more lives."

McArthur said she knew "only too well" that cancer can strike anytime. "I have seen it strike in my own family. I also am well aware how much more needs to be done in research. My life, your life, the lives of your friends here in Tishomingo County depend on it."

McArthur urged all citizens of Tishomingo County to make a "generous contribution" to the American Cancer Society when a "volunteer knocks on your door, during the 1980 educational fund drive in residential areas throughout Mississippi."

The Postal Service offers free Change-of-Address Kits to make it easier to notify everyone. Available in post offices and from letter carriers, the kits include convenient postcards to alert the postmaster and for mailing to department stores, friends and relatives, utility companies, banks, newspapers and magazine publishers and others who do business with the family planning to move. "Too often people who are

#### You Win By Losing

Matthew 16:25 - "For whosoever will save his life shall lose it: and whosoever will lose his life for my sake shall find it." Everyone loves to be a winner. There are many ways of becoming a winner. In the text, God's principle for winning is given. It may sound a little paradox, but examine the following to see its worth.

**Find Faith - Lose Doubts.** Matthew 21:21 - "If ye have faith, and doubt not, . . . it shall be done." Some people are doubters. They doubt God's Word. His creation, His salvation and even God himself. Doubters never win. We should not be naive, nor should we mistrust everyone. Suspicion and doubt are self-destructive. We must have faith because faith banishes doubt. Faith pleases God and enables us to win others. We win by losing our doubt. Faith brings victory (I John 5:5).

**Find Hope - Lose Despair.** Psalms 42:5 - "Hope thou in God: for I shall yet praise him." Many people are in despair. They have lost hope. Uncertain riches and sinful pleasures fail to satisfy. We must hope in God. Helping the needy, comforting the discouraged, and sharing Christ with others helps us lose despair. We win by losing despair. Hope in God brings the joy of salvation and the assurance of everlasting life (Psalms 51:12).
