Billy Shelton Announces Candidacy For Judge

In announcing his candidacy for Circuit Judge of the First Judicial District, Billy Shelton says, "I have been a lifetime resident of Lee County and grew up in Mooreville and East Tupelo. I attended Mooreville Grammar School and graduated from Tupelo High School, Hattawamba Junior College, University of Mississippi Law School and the University of Miami Law School.

After graduating from Tupelo High School, I attended Hattawamba Junior College on a football scholarship and was called into service with the Mississippi National Guard during the Korean Conflict. During the Korean Conflict, I served as an Airborne Ranger and have served since then continuously in the Mississippi National Guard and Army Reserve and am now a Lieutenant Colonel in the United States Army Reserve. I have attended many military schools, including the Command and General Staff College, the Industrial War College and am now attending the Air War College. For the past 21 years, I have been an attorney in active practice in Tupelo.

I am married to the former Ruth Berryhill, daughter of the late Rev. J.I. Berryhill. We have two children, Sherrie, married to Alan Howell, of Amory, and Barry, who is a senior at Tupelo High School. I am a member of the Baptist Church, having served as a deacon and Sunday School teacher, a 32nd Degree Mason, Shriner, American Legion, Lee, Mississippi and American Bar Associations, the Trial Lawyer's Association and several other worthwhile organizations.

The fine people of Lee County permitted me to serve four years in the Mississippi Legislature and four years as Lee County Prosecuting Attorney. I am now asking for the opportunity to serve as your Circuit Judge and feel that I am qualified by education, experience, judgment and temperament to serve in this office.

The judgeship which I am seeking is the unexpired term of Judge Tommy Senter, of Aberdeen, who was appointed Federal Judge. The judgeship is held by Judge Ralph Pogue, who is not seeking election.

I would like to stress the importance of exercising your right to vote on June 3, in the Democratic Primary, because every vote is important. The election of a Circuit Judge is extremely important because it affects your own personal welfare. The Circuit Court is closer to the people, as a whole, than any other court. The manner in which it is conducted, the respect in which it is held by the people and the efficiency and fairness with which it is operated

determines to a large extent the respect the people have for law and duly constituted authority.

I pledge to you, the voters of this district, that if you elect me to this office, I will conduct my court in a dignified, fair and business-like manner.

I humbly ask for your vote and support on June 3, for the office of Circuit Judge.

TVA Directors Postpone Proposed Rate Hike At Iuka Public Meeting

The Iuka High School Gymnasium was the scene of a TVA Board meeting last Thursday night, and at the time the recommendation was made that rates remain the same at least on a temporary basis. Approximately 200 area residents, including several representing anti-nuclear power groups, were at the meeting.

TVA staffers recommendation was that the agency's Board of Directors not impose another rate increase this year on its 2.7 million power customers. The final decision will be made upon completion of the Board's quarterly rate review at a later board meeting.

According to Hugh Parris, Director of TVA's Office of Power, the rainfall in the area

during the fiscal year is 42 percent above normal, boosting hydro-generated power, and another hike is not needed at the present time.

The Board had expected to set another hike for the fiscal year ending in September, and a 10.8 percent rate increase was put into effect last April. He said that the estimated operating expense for the utility has been reduced by \$145 million since August, 1979. However, Parris said, "the estimated interest for TVA debts has jumped by \$73 million for the fiscal year."

The bulk of the meeting was consumed by nuclear debate. Opinions of the supporters and opponents were still being voiced three hours after the meeting began.

The Concerned Citizens Alliance of Alcorn County, from Corinth, gave the Directors a 1,000-name petition asking TVA to convert the Yellow Creek Nuclear Plant to a coal-fired plant.

According to the agency it would lose \$400 million if it stopped construction of the plant, slated to serve Northeast Mississippi and parts of Tennessee.

Nine nuclear protesters, from the Mississippi Catfish Alliance and the Concerned Citizens for Safe Energy of Wayne County, Tenn., stood quietly in the back of the gymnasium during the

meeting holding anti-nuclear posters.

Cecil Thornton, Iuka construction worker said, "These people (non-supporters of nuclear energy) don't want a working man to make a decent living. I'm for nuclear power plants -- all you can build."

Elbert C. Wright, of Corinth, said TVA had not properly informed Tishomingo County residents, who would be served by the yellow Creek Plant, about the dangers of low level radiation and possible nuclear accidents.

Several Tishomingo County residents commended TVA for building the Yellow Creek Plant and said the facility would create needed jobs. According to Board Chairman David Freeman, there was no trade-off between jobs and risks and safety was the biggest factor in building the plant. TVA is not exposing people in the county to risks just to create jobs, Freeman said.

Nearly all of Tennessee and portions of Mississippi, Alabama, Georgia, Kentucky, Virginia and North Carolina are provided electricity by the utility.

The Board agreed to contract with the Institute of nuclear Power Operations, an agency created in late 1979 after the Three Mile Island accident, to monitor safety at nuclear plants, at an annual cost of \$690,000.

Yellow Creek Training Center Building Dedicated

Tennessee Valley Authority and Northeast Mississippi Junior College officials dedicated the Yellow Creek Training Center Building, located at the Nuclear Plant site on Thursday afternoon, May 15.

The Training Center has been set up to train skilled workers for the construction trades such as carpenters and equipment mechanics. This is a joint program between TVA and Northeast Mississippi Junior College at Booneville. According to Harold White, NEMJC President, less than 25 percent of the people hired for the nuclear project have been from Mississippi because the state lacks qualified workmen. "This is a beginning point to train people in the area to handle construction work and related jobs," he said.

The Center houses five classrooms, administrative offices and a shop area and has been built by TVA and the State Vocational Education Department.

About 50 students are now enrolled in classes in operating engineer mechanics and carpentry, and future courses offered will be based on need.

Students who enroll in the classes are not obligated to work for TVA nor is TVA obligated to hire the students, a school official said. John Slater, from TVA in Knoxville, Tenn., said the TVA and Union would work together in an effort to place graduates in jobs.

We are proud to be in this partnership with the school system and Mississippi people in facilities built by local labor, David Freeman, Chairman of the TVA Board of Directors, said before the ribbon cutting ceremonies on Thursday.

"The most treasured wealth of this Valley is human resources. I don't know how we can offer our young people any more than an opportunity," George H. Kimmons, of TVA, said.

Tishomingo Countians are urged to exercise their right to vote by going to their respective precinct on June 3, and casting their ballot. The general election will be held in November.

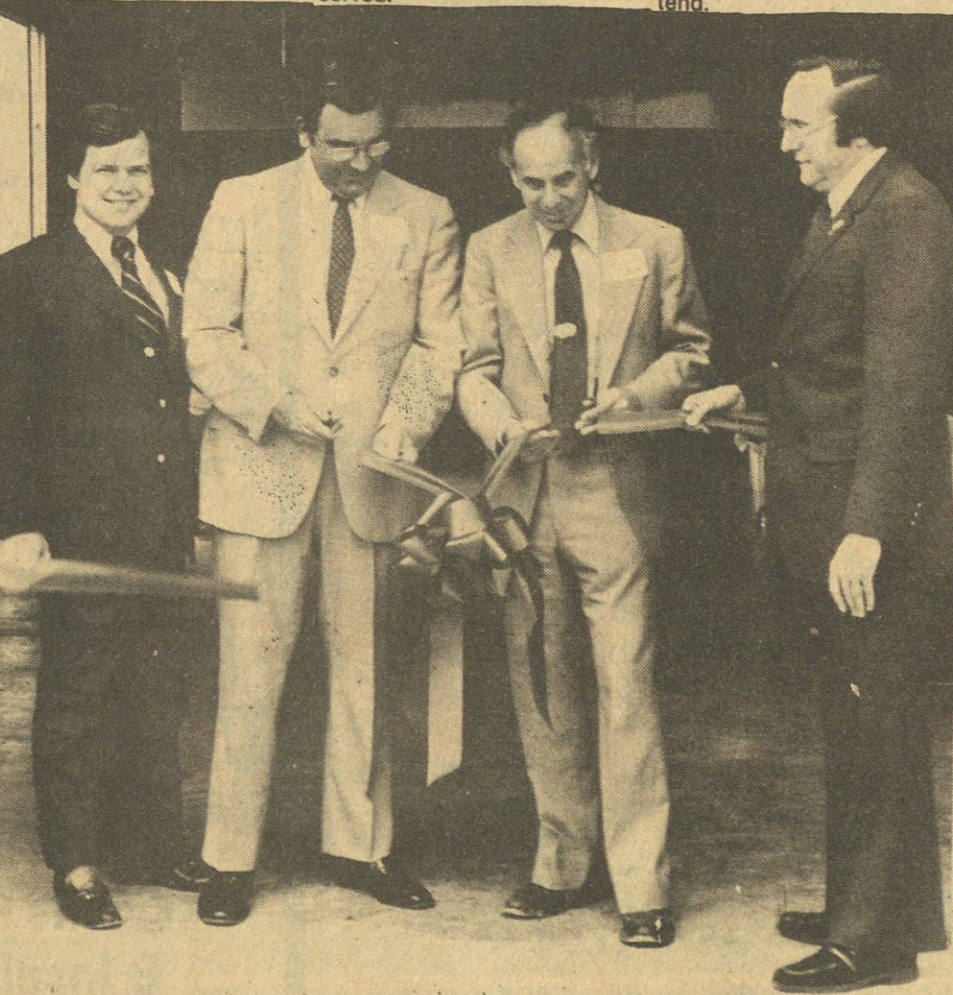

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Chatting With Your Home Economist

Meal Planning

Every homemaker knows that meals must be planned to get the most out of the food dollar and to provide the family with a well-balanced diet. The freezer, more than any other household appliance, can help secure these results. The more you learn how to use it in relation to your own family, the greater the returns.

Freezing is a quick, convenient and easy way to preserve foods in the home. Plan ahead to manage your time and energy for preserving food directly from harvest. Freeze limited amounts at one time so the work is spread over several days of picking, rather than squeezed

into one long tiring period of time. Be practical about what you attempt.

Your own observation has taught you that some foods "spoil" more quickly than others, so the rate of speed at which they must be frozen varies with their individual temperaments. A good rule for home freezing is: two hours from garden to orchard to container, and the faster the better!

Most food that is highly perishable at normal temperatures can be quick frozen. Even delicate fruits and vegetables can be frozen, with only a few exceptions such as tomatoes (stewed tomatoes can be frozen) and those vegetables that lose

crispness such as radishes, celery, cucumbers and salad greens.

Decide what you will freeze on the basis of availability of foods, family needs and taste, freezer space, cost of freezer storage and availability of alternate methods of storage.

It is essential to start with high quality raw material. As garden foods mature, process without delay. Quality of the frozen food will be only as good as the quality of the food before freezing. Freeze foods at their peak of eating quality to preserve flavor, texture, and appearance as near those of the fresh product as possible.

Do not ignore details of the recommended procedures for preparing foods for freezing. Seemingly unimportant steps can make the difference between a low quality and superior frozen product.

Before you begin freezing foods at home it's important to know exactly which process to use and what the process is doing to the food.

Micro-organisms grow on food, causing it to spoil. The common growths are simple yeasts, molds, and bacteria. Because these micro-organisms are everywhere -- in the air, water, soil and on all surfaces they contact -- they naturally occur on all foods. Storing and preserving foods properly controls or inhibits the growth of micro-organisms, thus maintaining both quality and safety of the food.

Cleanliness and sanitary methods are as important in handling foods for freezing as in preparing them for immediate use.

All foods contain chemical substances called enzymes. They are essential to life, and continue their chemical activity after the fruits and vegetables mature or are harvested.

If allowed to work after the food reaches its peak of maturity, enzymes destroy the food's physical properties thus changing its color, flavor and texture.

When perishable food is not preserved by one of the recommended ways, enzymes within the cells of the food continue to live and cause spoilage.

Much of the success you have with your home freezer will depend on how you prepare, package, wrap and seal foods. Protecting frozen food is as important as freezing food of high quality.

Quick Chili Dogs

1/2 lb. ground beef
1 large onion, chopped
1 can (8 oz.) tomato sauce
1 tsp. chili powder
1 teaspoon garlic powder
1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
1 lb. hot dogs
1 package hot dog buns, toasted
Brown beef and onion, stirring. Stir in tomato sauce,

chili and garlic powder, salt and Worcester shire. Simmer 10 minutes. Pour into vacuum bottle to keep hot. When ready to serve, grill hot dogs over coals, turning frequently until browned and heated through. Place hot dogs on buns and top with sauce. Makes 10 servings.

County Agent's Notes

Wheat Harvesting

With time to harvest wheat just around the corner, you need to check combines, clean storage areas and have everything in proper working order before harvest.

It's especially important to clean dirty storage bins. They may contain insects which can damage stored grain. Either Sweep or vacuum or spray the interior with an insecticide such as malathion or methoxychlor. Check labels for rates.

If you have drying facilities or are willing to take a high moisture discount at the grain elevator, you can begin harvest when grain is 16 to 18 percent moisture. This will allow harvest to begin about 10 days earlier, which can be important if you plan to follow wheat with soybeans or sorghum.

Wheat harvested at this moisture content can be dried to 12 to 13 percent for safe storage. Once in storage, inspect and aerate wheat regularly to maintain grain quality.

Plant Sorghum for Corn

If you missed out on planting corn this spring because of wet weather, there is still time to plant sorghum as a substitute.

For silage, the high starch, low sugar varieties like DeKalb FS-LA, FS-IB and Funks G-6505 are much better quality than high-sugar sorghums. Tonnage may be lower on these varieties, but I think you'll find this is more than offset by high quality.

Plant sorghum for grain as early as possible. Plantings after about June 10 will not yield as high as earlier plantings. July plantings of grain sorghum are seldom profitable in Mississippi.

Plastic Black

Use a mulch material around the base of your tomato plants. Extension Horticulturist, Dr. Milo Burnham says pinestraw, sawdust, newspaper and black plastic make good mulches. These conserve moisture in the soil, help control weeds and keep dirt from washing onto the plant during heavy rains or irrigation. Dr. Burnham says black plastic used as a mulch in early spring helps warm the soil, which promotes active root growth. Black plastic used during the summer months may absorb too much heat. Spray the black plastic with white latex paint before putting it under plants. This keeps excessive heat from hurting the plant roots.

If you think you are eligible for food stamps, contact the Tishomingo County Food Stamps Office at 423-9241 and arrange an appointment. The office will explain what items you should bring to help fill out an application.

ASCS Farm News

Aerial Observation Method For Compliance

Farmers are required to certify all crops planted in 1980. Failure to file proper certification could result in loss of program payments and benefits. It is a requirement that the county office make a random check of a certain percent of the farms to verify the accuracy of the reports.

The aerial observation method of compliance is new to the Tishomingo County ASCS Office, but not to the State of Mississippi. According to Carolyn S. Hamm, program assistant, "I am both excited and enthusiastic about the new method." Henry L. Knox, CED, states that basically, an airplane is substituted for an automobile and a camera for a measuring tape. A picture slide is taken with a camera and then projected onto the aerial photograph. The crop is then plotted and acreage determined by planimetry.

Our farms will be flown by office personnel from the Lee County ASCS Office. Kay Ghiglieri will be the observer and Janis Curtis will be taking the slides.

Prevented Planting Credit For Cotton and Other Crops:

Elmer South, Chairperson, Tishomingo County ASC Committee, stated that cotton farmers may qualify for cotton prevented planting payments under disaster provisions of the current cotton program under certain conditions. Following are guides for determining eligibility:

1. The producer intended to plant the area to that particular crop.
2. The crop could not be planted by the end planting date. The crops and dates are listed below.

Crop	May 25	May 31
Corn & Rice		
Grain Sorghum		
and Soybeans	June 30	
Wheat	November 30	
3. In all cases when a crop is prevented from being planted and a later nonconserving crop could have been planted, but wasn't, it will eliminate the prevented planting eligibility for the intended crop. For example, cotton was intended to be planted but the water did not recede until June 10. The land was planted, or could have been planted, to grain sorghum or soybeans. In such case there is no disaster prevented planting payment credit allowed for cotton.
4. In cases where farms have no 1979 cotton acreage credit, there can be no prevented planting disaster

due to the loss of because of beyond his control

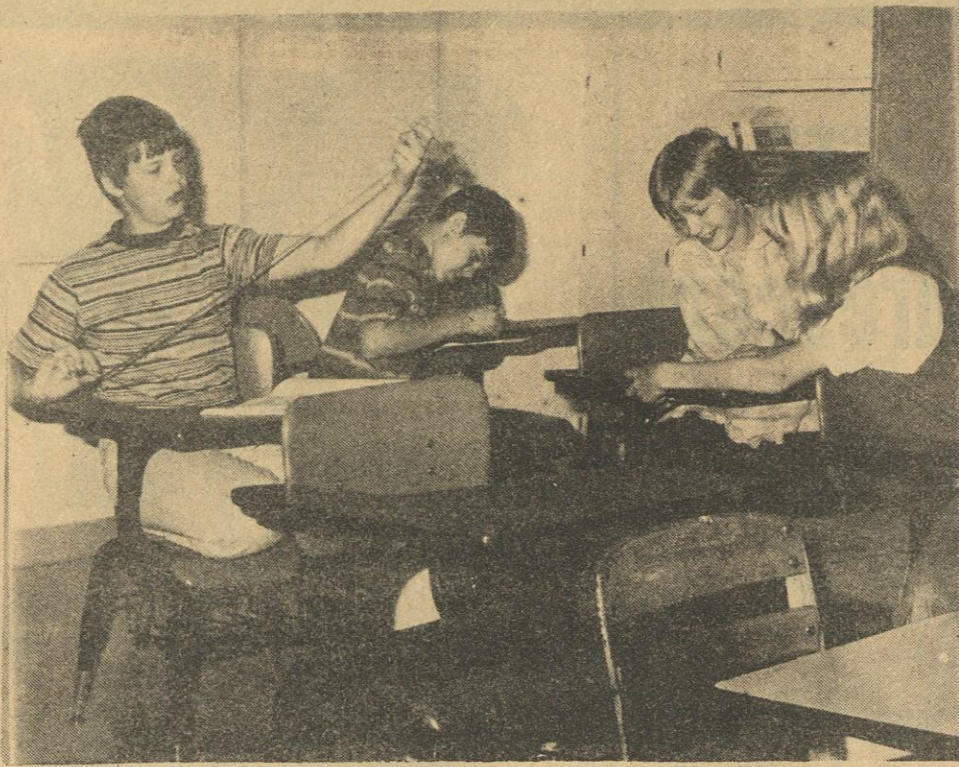

aged minister arose and began to recite. His voice was not remarkable - his intonation was not faultless. When he finished, no sound of applause broke the silence, but there was not a dry eye in the room, and many heads and hearts were bowed in reverential awe.

The great actor arose to his feet again, his voice shook with uncontrolled emotions as he laid his hand on the shoulder of the aged minister and said to the audience, "I have reached your ears my friends, but this man has reached your heart. The difference is this: I know the Psalm, but he knows the Shepherd."

Message For Meditation

New Lebanon Church
"The Grazed Altar"
Exodus 27:1-8

Let us consider a spiritual pattern shown forth in the Old Testament but pointing to the fulfillment of the new Testament. The word altar means high place or that which lifts up. The altar is representative of Christ on the cross. Through the altar, Israel was lifted up into fellowship with God. The cross is a ladder into heaven lifting us up into communion with God.

Notice the significance of the altar. Standing at the gate of entrance, it represented the claims of God that must be satisfied. The altar was to be filled before a man could

approach God. The altar was filled with demands met when Christ cried, "It is finished." Its great purpose served to burn sacrifices. The sin-offering was slain. Christ was our sin-offering to pay with his life our redemption price. The burnt-offering was consumed except for the skin which was saved and given to the priest for a covering to remind of the sacrifice. Christ was so consumed with the debt of our sin that God had to turn his face. However, we now have His blood as a covering to remind us of the price of redemption.

Notice the position of the altar. It stood in front of the gate. Atonement is the first requirement in our approach to the holiness of God. In the outer court, all had free access to it. Salvation is free to all.

Notice the Materials of the

altar. The shittum wood represents the human side of Christ character. The wood by itself would be consumed by the fire. The brass reveals the strong enduring deity of the divine Son of God. Never is it called the wooden altar but the golden altar because it represents that one who is strong and mighty and able to overcome.

Notice the size of the altar. The most prominent object in the temple to draw the people's attention to God. The cross is the most prominent object for the way of the cross leads home. The four square of the altar represented the outreach to the four corners of the world of the gospel of salvation.

Notice the horns of the altar. The sacrifice was bound by cords to the horn. It was not nails that kept Christ on

the cross, it was the cords of love.

Notice the blood of the altar for atonement, Lev. 17:11 - "The life is in the blood." The Hebrew word for atonement means to cleanse, to cover, and to appease. The atoning death of Christ appeased God, cleanses and covers the believer.

There was not any other altar for Israel. So it is today, Acts 4:12 - "There is none other name under Heaven given among men whereby we must be saved."

perience in its tax receipts after the passage of this act, with respect to both "mandatory" millage, and "discretionary" millage, is limited to 10 percent above that received for the previous year. Any revenue collected in excess of that 10 percent limitation must be used to reduce the next year's budget.

Two mills in new taxes are authorized to be expended in executing reappraisal plans approved by the Tax Commission.

After January 1, 1982, the state's four mill ad valorem tax levy is repealed and three mills of the levy may be made by the counties, first to pay pledges already outstanding under the state tax levy. The fourth mill is mandated to be levied and deposited in an interest-bearing account where it will remain unexpended until a county has Tax Commission-approved reappraisal, maintenance records, mapping system and certified appraisers.

Until December 31, 1983, all counties are authorized to levy up to four mills, the revenue from which may be expended for any lawful county purposes.

If the taxes of utilities are lower following reappraisal, a formula is included in the bill which is intended to spread any reduction of such taxes over a five-year period.

A Resolution declaring the intention of the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Iuka, Mississippi, to issue street improvement revenue bonds of said municipality in the maximum principal amount of One Hundred, Fifty Thousand and 00/100 (\$150,000.00) Dollars to raise money for the purpose of resurfacing and improving the streets of the said municipality.

Whereas, the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Iuka, Mississippi, hereinafter referred to as the "Governing Body," acting for and on behalf of the said City of Iuka, hereinafter referred to as the "Municipality," does hereby find, determine, adjudicate and declare as follows:

That it has become necessary to expand, enlarge and improve the public

streets of the Municipality; and

II That the Governing Body of the Municipality has determined the nature and extent of the necessary resurfacing and improvements to the present streets and roadways and has made an estimate of the cost thereof, which estimate is the aggregate amount of One Hundred, Fifty Thousand and 00/100 (\$150,000.00) Dollars; and

III That said expansion, enlargements and improvements are necessary, and are economically feasible, and that it would be to the public interest and benefit to the Municipality that the same be made, and the Governing Body does hereby adopt the estimate of the cost of the said improvements and resurfacing; and

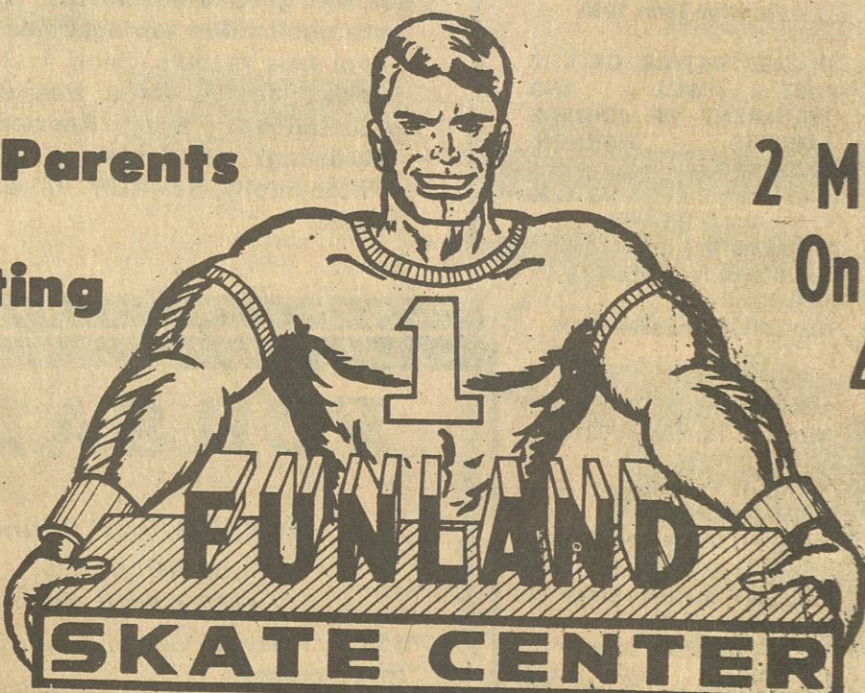

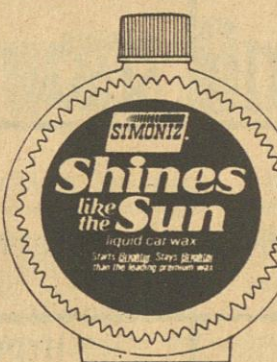

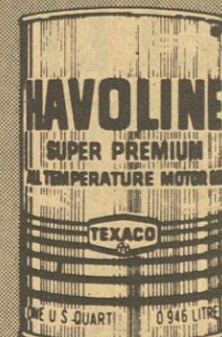
