

TVA Expected To Close Deal For Simulator

TVA's directors are expected to OK a \$6-million to \$7million contract this year for a reactor simulator of the Yellow Creek Nuclear Plant near here.

The simulator will be used at TVA's power production training center near Chattanooga, an equipmentpacked building where reactor operators from TVA and other utilities throughout the world are trained.

A reactor simulator is a duplicate of the control board in a nuclear plant. The simulator is linked to a computer and operators can be given "on-the-job" training with actually being given the controls of a nuclear plant.

Presently, the training center has nuclear simulators for Browns Ferry, TVA's Sequoyah and Watts Bar

nuclear plants. TVA last year approved a major expansion of the training center, committing \$12 million to buy simulators

for the Hartsville and Bellefonte nuclear plants. Joe official TVA Preskievicz told the Engineers Club Monday that

about half of the nation's utilities train operators at the power center Because of the availability

of all the reactor simulators in one place, the Nuclear Regulatory Commission is moving its training headquarters for inspectors to Chattanooga.

Convenience Stores **Outnumber Supermarkets**

They're a far cry from the old corner grocery, but they serve a similar purpose. The number of convenience food stores nationally tops 34,000, and sales for 1978 exceeded \$10.7 billion. Two decades ago, about 500 were in operation and sales were just \$75 million. They now stock 300 items, compared with 10,000 to 12,000 in a super-The average customer purchase is \$1.72, against \$10.63 in a large

> **Homemade Fast Foods Cheaper**

Costs of some fast food items were compared recently with expenses of fixing the same food at home. A meal consisting of a hamburger, French fries and soft drink cost \$1.61 at a leading fast food chain, but only 83 cents at home.

The greater cost at the drive-in included expenses for labor, energy, overhead and providing a restaurant atmosphere. The savings to the at-home budget came primarily as a return on the time and effort spent fixing the meal

Inflation has taken a toll at both places. In 1976, a family of four could eat hamburgers, French fries and soft drinks for \$4.60 at a fast-food place. Today, it costs \$6.80. Comparable at-home costs were \$2.20 then and \$3.32 now.

Either ammonium or nitrate sources of nitrogen can be used as a sidedressing. If anhydrous ammonia is used. apply at once at 10 inches from the drill.

Get Good Coverage

Obtaining good herbicide coverage while weeds are small is a key to good weed control. Coverage on some weeds may be determined by the time of day the herbicide is applied.

On sicklepod, for example, coverage is better and the treatment more effective when the herbicide is applied in the middle of the day when leaves are fully extended. leaves fold together and droop in late evening and early morning, meaning that less of the leaf is exposed to the herbicide.

Drought, rain or cloudy weather also may cause leaves to droop on some weeds. This may result in reduced herbicide coverage and effectiveness.

Forages

If grasses such as dallis, bahia, common bermuda and hybrid bermudas have not been fertilized, 60 to 70 pounds of nitrogen, phosphate and potash per acre may be needed for good growth.

For information on the improved bermudagrasses like the new Tifton 44 hybrid, contact the County Extension Office for detailed information on production practices for these forages.





Life As A Story

Psalm 90:9 "... we spend our years as a tale that is told." Life is likened to a tale that is told, not read. Years ago reading material was not as common or plentiful as it is today. Consequently there were quite a number of men who were professionatstorytellers. There are however, some still around that can tell some pretty fall yarns. Let us examine how our lives can be likened to atale that is told.

There are long tales and short tales. There are long lives and there are very short ones. Of course, we cannot always measure life by years, as we can measure a story by pages or inches. It is what we put into life that counts. We must look upon life as a measure to be filled and not as a goblet to be drained. It is what we put into our days and into our years that will decide the value of the life lived.

There are dull tales, and there are very interesting ones. There are lives that are very hum-drum, very sober and unattractive; whereas there are lives full of change and very exciting. Of course tastes differ, and what seems drab and interesting to some

is considered as quite op-

posite by others. There are bad tales and there are good tales. There are lives that are really bad, exerting a distasteful influence, whereas there are lives that are blessings to all. Only one life to live, and how most of us long to be as useful and helpful as possible Ask yourself this question

How can my life be as a good and beneficial tale? There are three conditions. (1) You must have the right author. It takes a genius to produce a really great tale, one that will live on and on for generations. Only the Lord Jesus Christ can produce a life that is a good, useful, and helpful tale. We must be His workmanship. We cannot do this ourselves. We must resign ourselves to His gracious and marvelous creative skill. (2) You must have the right hero. The quality of the book can be decided, and indeed hangs upon the quality of its hero. If Christ is the pivot and center of our lives, then all is well. (3) You must have the right object. A book without an object is likely to be a weak and wafery one, a very flat and dull'one. What is the object of your life? Are you doing everything for the glory of God? What kind of tale is your life telling?

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

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

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

Iuka EMT'S Attend Symposium

luka EMTs Rebecca Kay Barnett and John D. Murphy took part in the 1980 Symposium on Emergency Medical Services at the Biloxi

The emergency medical service (EMS) division of the State Board of Health sponsored the symposium. Cosponsors were the state chapter, American College of Surgeons: Mississippi Nurses Association; Mississippi affiliate, Emergency Department Nurses Association:

and the state chapter of the American College Emergency Physicians.

More than 350 people from Corinth to the Coast, Hernando to McComb took part in this year's symposium. Emergency medical (EMTs), technicians physicians, nurses, and other health care emergency professionals attended lecworkshops, demonstrations on caring for the sick or injured in a crisis. Nearly three dozen experts in their field served on the faculty

Workshops covered administration of the EMS system -- what's happening in Mississippi and neighbor states, registration of EMTs, legal trends in EMS, and effective ambulance service management; medical aspects of EMS -- how health professionals work as a team to treat various illnesses and injuries; and program/financial planning for the development of the EMS system.

The three-day symposium concluded with a U.S. Coast Guard air/sea rescue demonstration. Coast Guard personnel simulated the rescue of a boating accident victim from the Gulf of Mexico via helicopter; beach spectators rescue munications on loudspeakers as Guardsmen landed on the beach and EMTs from AM-SERV in Biloxi responded to assess and transport the patient to the hospital. Symposium sponsors said the rescue demonstration is thought to have been the first of its kind especially for EM-Ts and other emergency health care professionals.

Apartment owners in the TVA area are eligible for weatherization loans of up to \$2,000 per unit, TVA Manager of Power Hugh G. Parris said "We want to be sure that

owners apartment throughout the Valley realize

Home Insulation Program," Parris said. "In many cases, the loans can be substantial. For example, the owner of a 20-unit apartment complex could be eligible for up to \$40,000 in loans for weatherization."

Parris said TVA had been successful in reaching private homeowners. The agency has surveyed over 200,000 homes and more than 88,000 homes have been insulated. saving these homeowners 327 million kilowatthours annually.

"We want to achieve the same success for the 296,000 residential consumers who live in multifamily housing," Parris said. "We've determined that about 70 percent multifamily these dwellings could weatherization. If all the dwellings were weatherized to TVA standards, the savings would be 693 million kilowatthours annually, reducing energy costs by \$21 million each year."

For the approximately 60,000 public housing units which come under the Department of Housing and urban Development (HUD), TVA is working with HUD and the Department of Energy (DOE) to develop a program which would provide funding for weatherization.

"We hope to have the details confirmed within the month to pursue these programs," Parris said. "It appears that some units could qualify for DOE grant funds, while others might be funded through TVA loans which would be repaid by HUD.

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

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



Dishwasher **Problems**

If your dishwasher is cleaning dishes poorly, it may not be the machine's fault.

"Don't blame the dishwasher until you've checked other factors," says Frances Fortenberry, assistant to leader, Mississippi state Cooperative Extension Sereconomics home programs and Extension housing specialist.

Almost every problem can have several causes relating to the dishwasher, dishes, water and detergent.

"Make sure dishes are Check dishwasher-safe. labels and instruction books. If you can't find information, try only one piece first," she says. "Make sure you load correctly. Water must be able to get to and away from each

"The water temperature should be at least 140 degrees F in the machine. Low pressure or clogged pipes may prevent sufficient water from entering the dishwasher," she says.

Hard water can cause spotting. A rinse agent can help prevent spotting. If you have hard water, choose a detergent high in phosphate. Make sure you use the correct amount.

Don't buy a lot of one detergent to start with. Experiment with one box at a time to find one you like. Keep detergent in a dry place. If it's caked, don't use it. Don't buy too much at once, she adds, because it will age.

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
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
