

#### Read Food Labels

"Caution: Your diet may be hazardous to your health.'

Although you'll never find this warning on a label, many scientists believe certain health problems -- heart and vessel diseases, blood obesity and tooth decay -- can be traced to diet. There is also some evidence linking nutrition to some other diseases, including certain forms of cancer.

According to USDA's Food Safety and Quality Service, diet is not the only factor contributing to human health, but it's a major one. Better nutrition at any age can be a positive step toward disease prevention.

Given the enormous variety of foods available in American supermarkets, what should you eat to stay healthy? And, how can you find these foods when you shop?

Although there is no 'ideal' diet for everyone, USDA and the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfre

(HEW) recently announced seven guidelines to help healthy people stay healthy. These dietary guidelines recommend eating a variety of foods in moderation -- less fat, cholesterol, sodium (including salt, baking soda, baking powder and MSG) and alcoholic beverages. Also, USDA and HEW scientists suggest people eat more foods high in starch and fiber, such as fruits, vegetables and whole grain products, along with maintaining their

But how many calories does a particular food have? How much sugar, sodium or

Some of these questions are answered on the product label. While only certain foods are required to carry nutrition information, many it voluntarily. Nutrition labels supply such information as the number of calories per serving and the grams of protein, fat and carbohydrates per serving.

the amount of polyunsaturated and saturated fat and the amount of cholesterol is also included. as well as the content of certain vitamins and minerals.

A label's list of ingredients provides other valuable information. Through careful reading, you can get a good idea of how much sugar, salt or other ingredients are present. By law, ingredients must be listed in decreasing order according to their weight in the product recipe. The first ingredient listed is the most abundant; the last ingredient is the least abun-Although some manufacturers explain the order of ingredients on the product label; most do not.

A plan recently announced by the federal government would provide even more important and useful information on produce labels. The three federal agencies responsible for food labeling -

FSQS, HEW's Food and Drug Administration and the Federal Trade Commission's Bureau of Consumer Protection - developed this plan in response to the thousands of consumers . and industry representatives who expressed their views on labeling to the agencies at a series of public meetings recently held throughout the country.

The foods you eat can be an asset to your health. Product labels now provide much of the information you need to make positive dietary changes. If the government's food labeling plan is implemented, even more product information will be available.

Roundup in Ropewicks

#### Sen. Bill Iviay Reports To The People

S.B. No. 2118: This bill redefines the eligibility standards for those individuals who are recipients of Medicaid assistance by their receipt of Supplemental Security Income (S.S.I.) benefits under the Federal Social Security Act. The Medicaid eligibility deterwill be replaced with a computerized eligibility determination procedure from the Social Security Administration. The Medicaid Commission is charged with the responsibility to propose any necessary legislation to implement the transition to S.S.I. eligibility deter-

mination, and to minimize the transitional impact upon those individuals currently in nursing homes who are not The bill also speaks to the

amount and type of drugs which are reimbursable under the Medicaid program by deleting the provision that limits drug reimbursement to 7 prescriptions per month, which was done in anticipation of the commission's re-establishment of the 50¢ co-payment required. The bill also conforms Medicald drug reimbursement to the state's generic drug substitution law, which gives the patient and/or the physician the right to refuse generic

However, the commission is given the discretion to reimburse only for a generic equivalent or only for a trademarked name, when the concensus of medical advice dictates otherwise. The bill also clarified that reimbursement to druggists would be at the prevailing price in the package size that is bought

Dear Editor:

After having read previous letters to your paper, listened to several discussions and expressions of feelings by groups and individuals on the proposed Zoning Ordinance for the City of luka, I feel compelled to voice my opinion on the important issue. In the past thirty years, I've lived in several areas that have gone through "growing nains" similar to those we are experiencing here Tishomingo County. It has

been my observation that those towns and cities with zoning ordinances have atdesirable businesses and industries than those without. Zoned communities almost always are in a position to provide better education for their children and better public services for everyone in the

Criticism has been made because the Mississippi Research and Development Center aided in drawing up the ordinance. Since this is an agency of our own state, and staffed by Mississippians, paid by our state tax dollars, why not use the R & D Center? The goal of the R & D Center is to help improve our state and the communities within it - let's take advantage of their knowledge and experience! The length of the proposed ordinance has been questioned but thirty-three pages isn't really all that cumbersome, in fact, it's rather short to many others I've seen, which run well over one hundred pages.

luka is the only city of its' size in Northeast Mississippi that does not have some type of zoning ordinance. Isn't it about time we took the first step needed to put our city on a competitive basis with others in the area?

I commend the Ma Board of Aldermen for having the courage and foresight to initiate this action on a coning ordinance. In reading the proposal, I find nothing that would create any particular hardship on anyone and a great deal that would contribute to making luka a better, safer and more prosperous place in which to

One other important point should be brought out. If a labor intensive industry, which needed little capital investment to set up, wanted to move in several hundred "displaced refugees" and take advantage of them by cramming them into a flimsy dormitory to work for minimum wages, there is no way at all to stop them under existing law. A zoning ordinance would prevent this from happening to our city. If it should happen, however, it rould then be too late to pass zoning against such an occurrence because the ACLU and leftist liberals would start suing about violation of civil liberties. You all know howthe federal courts rule in hose kind of cases.

Let's lend our support and cooperation to the Mayor and Alderman and our Alderlady n this step to upgrade luka.

#### Make Summer Safe For Your Child

More than 17 million children are injured in ac-

cidents each year. Most accidents involving children younger than five are homerelated and occur in July and August.

Overstreet. Susie Mississippi Cooperative Ex-Service education specialist, said many accidents can be avoided if parents plan and educate children to be careful.

Many accidents occur on equipment. playground Supervise children while they are using this equipment, she suggested. Make sure nuts. bolts and screws are tightened. Replace rusted connectors such as nuts, bolts and chains.

Hard surfaces under play equipment also cause many injuries. Avoid gravel and concrete. Sand isn't recommended because it attracts animals and harbors germs.

"Wood chips make a good surface, but caution children against putting the chips in their mouths or throwing them "she said

Glass doors can be dangerous. Miss Overstreet suggested putting decals of different shapes and sizes on glass doors, even those that are shatter-proof

Other safety measures include: Remove discarded boxes and boards with nails: lock doors of refrigerators and trunks left outside; store paint, aerosol cans and poisionous sprays out of reach of children; teach children not to eat wild mushrooms. berries and other plant parts.

If your children play out-

side after dark, make sure the play area is well lighted. A fence may be a good investment. It keeps children out of the street, away from stray animals and makes safety easier to teach.



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
