### **Get Funds**

The J.P. Coleman State Park and Tishomingo State Park are two of the five state parks in Northeast Mississippi to receive work this year out of the \$7.5 million available to the Parks Department from bonds issued late last month.

Last month's issue represents the last of \$25 million in bonds of state park improvements authorized by the 1972 legislature.

Plans are to use \$47,000 for repair and renovation of the motel and cabins at J.P. Coleman State Park as well as to build an additional parking lot for the marina according to Fred Robinson, Chief of Planning and Design for the Parks Department and

Tishomingo State Park is slated to get \$122,000 worth of new cabins.

### With Chemicals

If you have a home garden or just a few plants, take care with any chemicals you use. Poisons act fast and so do children. Children younger than six most often get in trouble To safeguard your child, select the chemical that's right for the job -- not one twice as toxic as it needs to be. Always keep it in its original labeled container. and always read and follow directions. Store chemicals where they cannot be reached by curious, inexperienced hands.

Just in case, keep a bottle of syrup of Ipecac handy. Know the number of your poison control center or local emergency room.

#### Safety On Equipment

Enlist your family in the "no riders" club. By adopting and holding fast to this rule, your child will be protected from a tragic accident involving moving farm vehicles. Most rural youngsters and

young farm visitors enjoy tagging along with grownups in the daily running of a farm. The prospect of riding on a tractor or atop a wagonload of hay is exciting. This may make it difficult to say "no" to a child eager to join you. But what begins as fun could, in a second, turn to tragedy. Hundreds of children fall from farm tractors and other machinery eacy year, often to be run over

Be kind to your child and show him you love him. Say "no" to extra riders.

#### Adjust Your **Consumer Credit**

Credit card users must watch and read carefully all mail about each credit account. Each may affect you significantly. Watch for these changes. Every card holder must be notified before credit charges are increased, changes in methods of computing are made and increases in required payments are made.

#### Don't Waste Wages

Start this month. Organize your bills, sales slips, receipts and checks. There are two general kinds of family expenses. One is fixed expenses or promised payments housing, insurance, stallment payments and savings accounts. The other - lawns and gardens. Many category is day-by-day or changing expenses - food. utilities, clothing, personal allowances, travel and gifts.

Look at the total income for this month, and record your fixed payments. Record your day-by-day expenses. Add your fixed expenses and your day-by-day expenses. Subtract your total expenses from your monthly income. If the expenses are greater than the income, the wasters won this month and you lost.

Also, be careful when storing gasoline. Don't store gas in the trunk of your car or in your house. The fumes are highly flammable and a spark could set them on fire. If you store gasoline, don't use glass bottles, plastic jugs or other unsuitable containers. Reed says a safety can with a pressure release valve and a flame arrester is suitable for storing gas

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during the growing season, says Dr. Milo Burnham, Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service horticulturist

Gardens in sandy soils require as much as two inches of water each week in mid-summer. adds. Adequate moisture is important for seed germination, uniform growth and productivity. The most critical periods are seed germination, early growth and fruit and flower development.

You can choose from several kinds of sprinklers -from a simple hose with a spray pozzle to semiautomatic equipment. Many portable lawn sprinklers are adequate, too. Dr. Burnham advises gar-

deners to adjust the rate of water application so that it is not faster than it can enter the soil. Water applied too fast makes puddles, causing soil compaction and crusting or run off.

Place the sprinkler so plants don't interfere with the application pattern. This may mean mounting the sprinkler above the tops of plants. Place small cans throughout

the garden to measure water applied; they'll show the overlap necessary to approach even application.

Water early so foliage can dry before nightfall, says Dr. Burnham. This helps prevent

leaf diseases. Each watering should set the top three to five inches of soil. Frequent, light waterings result in shallow rooting, susceptibility to damage by drought and plants easily blown over. Soaker or perforated plastic hoses are excellent

for watering gardens, Dr. Burnham says. Place the hose with holes down along one side of the crop row or underneath a plastic mulch. Water can then soak into the soil. This method requires less water because water is placed next to the plant -where it does the most good. Other systems of trickle irrigation can be bought at retail outlets or ordered through catalogs.





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

His friends who from a safe distance had seen him executed were certainly not expecting ever to see him alive again. Indeed thay were most skeptical when the first report of his alive came in. 'Hysterical female nonsense!" they considered it. But when they saw him, not in the halfdark where they might have been mistaken for a moment, but in broad daylight, all they could say then was, "It must be a ghost!" And to put it bluntley, they yelled with sheer fright.

We can't exactly blame them. It's one thing to see a white shape in a church yard at night (which might after all

A few weeks ago it was my privilege to visit the nations's Capitol, the most obvious thing that struck me when I arrived in Washington after having departed North Mississippi was that there were no signs of recession in Washington, In fact, it appears that government prospers during hard times. You see, in times of

economic hardship the government must appoint more commissions and must establish more beaucratic agencies to deal with problems of unemployment. The result is more government, and who pays for more government? Well, the additional expenditures must either be financed through increased taxes, the hidden tax or inflation, or deficit spending. There are problems with all three.

What is the result of deficit spending? Inflation. Where do we get off the maddening cycle. There is one obvious stop - a sound fiscal policy. But then, a sound fiscal policy is unheard of in Washington. After all, if the government employed a sound fiscal policy, it might mean there would be no need for all of these additional government employees. In fact, you might say that a sound fiscal policy would bring a recession to Washington.

As my afternoon flight departed over the city of Washington, I could see the afternoon sunlight as it reflected off the capitol, and I could not help but remember the words of Thomas Jefferson, "The best government is that which governs least". Somehow, that saying just doesn't seem to fit the Washington of 1980.

David Smith, Chairman of the Citizens Committee. asked if a "special" Board Meeting would be held or would the Board wait until the regular Board of Alderman meeting next month to act on this issue. The Mayor replied "at the next Board Meeting." Alderman Corkey Smith made a motion that no action be taken on this issue until the next regular Board of Alderman meeting, if the ruling from the Attorney General had been received by that time; that it was not to be acted on in a "special" meeting. The motion was seconded and carried.

Linda Bailey informed the Board of Alderman that a formal protest would be presented by the time the Board held its next monthly

meeting. David Smith, also, asked the Board of Aldermen what a ction or steps would be taken regarding the shooting incident in Mr. Carl Huffman's behalf, who was present. The Mayor asked Mr. Huffman to explain what had happened. Mr. Huffman stated that he was returning home from a singing when he heard sirens. Mayor Cutshall requested a motion be made to offer an option on the property and request an architect to design plans to renovate the building. Alerman Leroy Dean made the motion and Alderman Mamie Culver seconded it. Alderman Corkey Smith objected to the motion without an estimated cost.
