## Indian Creek Youth Conservation Corps Sponsored By TVA

Indian Creek YCC Camp is one of ten camps sponsored by TVA, located throughout the Tennessee Valley. Indian Creek YCC is nestled comfortably in J.P. Coleman State Park under the management of Don Harwood. YCC director Bill Hudson, heads a staff of volunteers dedicated to the goals and objectives of the YCC program and reports that the summer is moving along at a steady pace in spite of the hot Mississippi heat. "We have had some pretty tough days and some tough conditions, but our young people (enrollees) are hard workers."

Creek work coordinator, has been getting "great support from the Iuka community both in work projects and purchasing the needed supplies from local merchants." The work projects carried out by the enrollees are designed to benefit a variety of groups including state and local recreation areas, public schools, historical sites and occasionally the camp itself. "One area that I emphasize," Tambornini said, "is that of work ethics. Our enrollees take a great deal of pride in their work and all of the work projects so far have been impressive."

The United States Youth Conservation Corps is a nationwide program funded by the Department of the Interior. Every summer thousands of young people between the ages of 15-18 are given the luxury of home and "take to the woods" to learn, laugh, and work in out-of-doors. Hudson says that "the rules are strict and the work is hard, but the summer's experience is a memory for a lifetime."

The work done on the grounds at the old Tishomingo County Courthouse is an obvious example. A good deal of the credit belongs to the four crew leaders that work and supervise the enrollees at the work site. Robert Crane, Barbara Burns, Kevin Luthenauer, and Geri Beck have done an outstanding job of teaching and developing the skills needed to complete the wide range of work projects that include everything from scraping off old paint to the construction

of a solar heating system.

The five-day residential camp could not be a success without Teresa Brown, the group living specialist. Her responsibilities begin where the crew leaders leave off. She works closely with the enrollees in planning recreational events and nurtures the process of group growth in the Indian Creek YCC community. Almost every minute is structured and/or planned by Teresa during the non-working hours. Suggestions and ideas from the enrollees become a reality through Teresa and the camp council.

The YCC program also contains a component of environmental awareness that is woven into just about everything. Brad Hague, the environmental awareness coordinator says, "that his goals are to 'create an understanding and appreciation for the natural world. Our collective goal is ecological literacy; to provide the enrollees with just enough information so that they can

make their own intelligent decisions concerning the future they want for their children."

Indian Creek YCC is fed from its own kitchen supervised by Ellen Wimbish. Each day two enrollees are on "kitchen duty" in the morning preparing breakfast and enduring the 100-degree heat in the kitchen fixing the evening meal. Fortunately, the lunches are taken to the different work sites which gives the kitchen crew time to do the shopping or take a much needed break at mid-day. The Indian Creek YCC kitchen must pass restaurant standards and is subject to inspection by TVA health officials without notice.

"Generally speaking, we have a great group of people in camp this summer," quotes the director. "The staff is sincerely committed to the development of young people and the support from the surrounding community is helping to make this camp a tremendous asset to both the community we serve and the people that work and live in the camp."

## Registration For Iuka Students

August 11, 12, and 13 from 5:00 - 8:00 p.m. has been set aside as the time for students in grades 7-12 to pick up their class schedules, pay fees, and complete the remainder of forms necessary to complete registration as a student at Iuka Middle or Iuka High School.

At this time (August 11, 12, 13), students in grades 1-6 will also pay fees and complete their registration forms.

Should any student feel there is a problem about their schedule, they may contact the school and confer with

one of the counselors. The Guidance Department is available to discuss career goals and educational requirements in obtaining these goals with students and parents. Parents and students may call the school at 423-3206, 423-6086, or 423-3316 to discuss any problem or to set up an appointment.

## State Parks To Get Funds

The J.P. Coleman State Park and Tishomingo State Park are two of the five state parks in Northeast Mississippi to receive work this year out of the \$7.5 million available to the Parks Department from bonds issued late last month. Last month's issue represents the last of \$25 million in bonds of state park improvements authorized by the 1972 legislature.

Plans are to use \$47,000 for repair and renovation of the motel and cabins at J.P. Coleman State Park as well as to build an additional parking lot for the marina according to Fred Robinson, Chief of Planning and Design for the Parks Department and Tishomingo State Park is slated to get \$122,000 worth of new cabins.

According to a printed report the five Northeast Mississippi parks will receive some \$555,000 worth of work this year.

## Cochran's Mobile Unit To Arrive

U. S. Senator Thad Cochran (R-Miss.) is dispatching his mobile office staff to Iuka on Wednesday, July 16. Cochran initiated this mobile office program last year in an effort to provide constituent services to Mississippians in all 82 counties.

Cochran's staff will be at the Tishomingo County Courthouse from 11:00 until noon.

"Anyone who has a problem with the federal government, or who has a special concern about a matter before the Senate is invited to stop by and talk to my staff," said Cochran.

Constituents coming to the courthouse to meet with the Senator's staff are advised to check with the Chancery Clerk's office for the appropriate room.

## Conservation Tour Planned

The Tishomingo County Soil and Water Conservation District Commissioners are sponsoring a conservation tour Thursday, July 17. The tour will begin at 9:00 a.m. at the Tishomingo county Vo-Tech Center.

The group plans to tour several no-till soybean fields and discuss the methods used in planting. The tour will then return to the Vo-Tech Center for a short program. The program will include Dr. Bob Williams, Extension Economist, who will discuss the price outlook for the major crops grown in the county. Also on the program will be Mr. Jim Parkman, Soil Conservation Service Agronomist, who will discuss no-tillage farming in relation to production and conservation.

The Commissioners feel that the tour and program will be informative and hope you will be with them.

## Attorney General's Office Says No Election Needed To Settle Iuka Zoning Issue

According to S.E. Birdson, Jr., Special Assistant Attorney General for the State of Mississippi, Iuka Aldermen can adopt a new zoning ordinance for the City of Iuka without a public vote.

Because of the growing concern over a proposed zoning ordinance for the city of Iuka, by Mayor Cutshall and the Board of Aldermen, City Attorney, Richard Clark contacted the Office of the Attorney General for an answer to the local problem. Attorney Clark stated in a letter to the Attorney General that a local Planning Commission had been established in Iuka

and a Zoning Plan for the City had been developed and asked whether or not the City of Iuka would be required to call an election before the zoning ordinance could be effective. Attorney Clark also requested an answer to the other questions: "If an election could be held and the Zoning proposition was defeated by the voters, how soon afterwards could an election on the same issue be held? If there is no specific authority for this proposition, if an election were held, would it be invalid? If no election can be legally held, what would be the recourse of the

citizens in the community opposing the Zoning Ordinance?"

In answering the questions of Attorney Clark, Special Assistant Attorney General Birdsong stated: "There is no statutory authority for a municipality to call an election before a zoning ordinance could be effective. Such an election would have no legal effect on the validity of such an ordinance. Persons aggrieved by the zoning ordinance enacted by municipal governing authorities may appeal to the Circuit Court of the county within which the municipality is located."

## TVA To Conduct Public Meeting In Iuka Monday

On July 14 at 6:00 p.m. TVA will hold a public meeting at the Iuka High School Auditorium.

TVA is asking the public to help the agency prepare a broad new management plan for the TVA-owned lands around Pickwick Reservoir.

Citizens can give their views on local and regional land use needs and voice concerns about future development. They also will be asked to help identify any particular growth pressures or trends that would influence the way TVA manages its property.

"Pickwick is the first of several TVA reservoirs in which we propose to implement a completely new land management planning process for future development," said Richard Morgan, Director of TVA's Division of Land and Forest Resources. "We want the active participation of Federal, state and local government agencies, private organizations, and the public."

A new planning process is needed because of increasing development pressures around TVA reservoirs, Morgan said.

"Our old system of reservoir land management is no longer adequate to effectively respond to these pressures or to meet the growth objectives of adjacent communities," he said.

Anyone planning to attend the meeting may call the toll-free TVA Citizen Action Lines and request a packet of materials explaining the proposed planning process and the purpose of the public meeting. The agency reviews plans for health programs in the state, such as services for crippled children and alcohol and drug abuse programs, and approves the State Health Plan, which identifies health priorities in the state.

"This council is most important in a state such as Mississippi where many technical problems are involved in planning for future health needs. Lambert has served as administrator of the Tishomingo County Hospital for the past 20 years.

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## Chatting With Your Home Economist

### Be Careful With Chemicals

If you have a home garden or just a few plants, take care with any chemicals you use. Poisons act fast and so do children. Children younger than six most often get in trouble. To safeguard your child, select the chemical that's right for the job -- not one twice as toxic as it needs to be. Always keep it in its original labeled container, and always read and follow label directions. Store chemicals where they cannot be reached by curious, inexperienced hands.

Just in case, keep a bottle of syrup of Ipecac handy. Know the number of your poison control center or local emergency room.

### Safety On Equipment

Enlist your family in the "no riders" club. By adopting and holding fast to this rule, your child will be protected from a tragic accident involving moving farm vehicles. Most rural youngsters and

young farm visitors enjoy tagging along with grownups in the daily running of a farm. The prospect of riding on a tractor or atop a wagonload of hay is exciting. This may make it difficult to say "no" to a child eager to join you. But what begins as fun could, in a second, turn to tragedy. Hundreds of children fall from farm tractors and other machinery each year, often to be run over.

Be kind to your child and show him you love him. Say "no" to extra riders.

### Adjust Your Consumer Credit

Credit controls, rules and regulations are undergoing shock treatment. Adjust your credit use to avoid future shocks to your economic system.

Virtually every leading institution must deposit a portion of its reserves with the Federal Reserve System. The Federal System has also "requested" that member banks limit loan growth to 6-9

percent (down from about 13 percent). This will translate into fewer consumer loans and, eventually, less buying.

Credit card users must watch and read carefully all mail about each credit account. Each may affect you significantly. Watch for these changes. Every card holder must be notified before credit charges are increased, changes in methods of computing are made and increases in required payments are made.

Adjust your spending plan and record-keeping system to meet your needs.

### Don't Waste Wages

Start this month. Organize your bills, sales slips, receipts and checks. There are two general kinds of family expenses. One is fixed expenses or promised payments -- housing, insurance, installment payments and savings accounts. The other category is day-by-day or changing expenses -- food, utilities, clothing, personal allowances, travel and gifts.

Look at the total income for this month, and record your fixed payments. Record your day-by-day expenses. Add your fixed expenses and your day-by-day expenses. Subtract your total expenses from your monthly income. If the expenses are greater than the income, the wasters won this month and you lost.

Decide what waste you can omit:

- Money wasted on unwise use of utilities. Cut off water, light, radio and TV when not in use.
- Money spent to replace improperly cared for clothing, home furnishings, and home appliances.
- Money spent for interest on credit obligations because of carelessness.
- Money spent for junk foods and fast clothes.
- Money spent when you could have used other resources such as energy, time skills and talents.

Money management could be a family affair. Beat the losers and be a winner. Look over your budget and answer these questions:

- What changes can be made in money habits?
  - What items can be changed?
  - What items need to be added or removed?
  - How much money can be spent next month?
  - Does the budget balance?
- Ask your Extension Home Economist for Publication 724 (\$ Plan) or Information Sheet 440 (Make Your Money Pay Your Way) and Form 235 (Spending Plan).

### Hearty Chicken Noodle Salad

6 cups water  
1 tablespoon instant chicken flavor bouillon  
1 teaspoon salt  
3 cups medium noodles  
3 cups chopped cooked chicken or turkey  
1 cup thinly sliced celery  
1/2 cup sliced radishes  
1/4 cup sliced green onion  
1 cup dairy sour cream  
1 teaspoon seasoned salt  
1/4 teaspoon poultry seasoning.

Bring water, instant bouillon and salt to boiling in a large saucepan. Add noodles and cook according to package directions; rinse with cold water and drain. Combine chicken, celery, radishes, onion and noodles in a large bowl. Gently combine sour cream, seasoned salt and poultry seasoning; fold into chicken mixture. Chill 2 to 3 hours to allow flavors to blend.

## County Agents Notes

If you are tempted to siphon gasoline into your lawn mower, think again. Extension Farm Safety Specialist Dannie Reed says a few drops of gasoline can get into your lungs and kill you. Also, be careful when storing gasoline. Don't store gas in the trunk of your car or in your house. The fumes are highly flammable and a spark could set them on fire. If you store gasoline, don't use glass bottles, plastic jugs or other unsuitable containers. Reed says a safety can with a pressure release valve and a flame arrester is suitable for storing gas.

The 1980 cotton crop is in good shape so far. Extension Cotton Specialist Dr. George Mullendore says the hot, dry weather in June got the cotton off to a good start. Dr. Mullendore says there is a great amount of fruit on the

cotton up to this point. He says another rain would be welcome about the 4th of July. Dr. Mullendore says this year's crop might be the best that Mississippi farmers have had in recent years.

A report by U.S.D.A. shows fewer cattle in the nation's feedlots. Extension Marketing Specialist John Wilson says the declining number of cattle on feed indicates a continued shorter supply and higher price for beef in months to come. Wilson says the feedlots are not as current in selling fed cattle. Wilson predicts steady to stronger prices for calves, yearlings and fed cattle through mid-July.

Pesticides are useful, but they can be dangerous if they are used improperly. Extension Weed Scientist Dr. Wayne Houston says homeowners use herbicides to control weeds in their lawns and gardens. Many people use M-S-M-A to control weeds in bermuda and zoysia grasses. Dr. Houston says M-S-M-A is an organic arsenical herbicide. Be careful after spraying M-S-M-A on bermuda and zoysia. Don't let children or pets on the sprayed area until the herbicide dries. Another problem occurs when a herbicide gets on desirable plants or grass. Be careful to spray only on weeds you want to kill. Dr. Houston says read labels and follow instructions when using herbicides on your lawn or garden.

## ASCS Farm News

**CERTIFICATION OF CROPS AND LAND USE** — Tishomingo County farmers are reminded to report their acreage of cotton, corn, grain sorghum, soybeans and peanuts to the County ASCS Office. If no crops are planted you will need to advise the county office by July 15. For 1980 to be eligible for program benefits accurate and timely report is required for the crop. **Remember!** the deadline to report is July 15th.

**REPORTING 1980 ACP PRACTICES** — To remind all farmers who have approved 1980 ACP Practices to report these practices to the ASCS Office just as soon as they are completed. Check the expiration date on the approval and be sure to make your report by this date.

## Gardens Need Water In Growing Season

Vegetables require about an inch of water each week in the form of rain or irrigation

during the growing season, says Dr. Milo Burnham, Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service horticulturist. Gardens in sandy soils require as much as two inches of water each week in mid-summer, he adds. Adequate moisture is important for seed germination, uniform growth and productivity. The most critical periods are seed germination, early growth and fruit and flower development.

You can choose from several kinds of sprinklers -- from a simple hose with a spray nozzle to semi-automatic equipment. Many portable lawn sprinklers are adequate, too.

Dr. Burnham advises gardeners to adjust the rate of water application so that it is not faster than it can enter the soil. Water applied too fast makes puddles, causing soil compaction and crusting or run off.

Place the sprinkler so plants don't interfere with the application pattern. This may mean mounting the sprinkler above the tops of plants. Place small cans throughout the garden to measure water applied; they'll show the overlap necessary to approach even application.

Water early so foliage can dry before nightfall, says Dr. Burnham. This helps prevent

the development and spread of leaf diseases. Each watering should set the top three to five inches of soil. Frequent, light waterings result in shallow rooting, susceptibility to damage by drought and plants easily blown over.

Soaker or perforated plastic hoses are excellent for watering gardens, Dr. Burnham says. Place the hose with holes down along one side of the crop row or underneath a plastic mulch. Water can then soak into the soil. This method requires less water because water is placed next to the plant -- where it does the most good. Other systems of trickle irrigation can be bought at retail outlets or ordered through catalogs.

The first cotton boll, fully grown, of a new cotton that was not yet named, was brought to the Vidette Office by Dalton Frederick.

### Message For Meditation

By Terry L. Booker, Pastor  
New Lebanon Church  
"CRITICISM"

Matthew 7:1-6 "Judge not, that ye be not judged. For with what judgement ye judge, ye shall be judged: and with what measure ye mete, it shall be measured to you again. And why beholdest thou the mote that is in thy brother's eye, but considerest not the beam that is in thine own eye? Or how wilt thou say to thy brother, Let me pull out the mote out of thine eye; and behold, a beam is in thine own eye? Thou hypocrite, first cast out the beam out of thine own eye; and then shalt thou see clearly to cast out the mote out of thy brother's eye. Give not that which is holy unto the dogs, neither cast ye your pearls before swine, lest they trample them under their feet, and turn again and rend you."

There is a right and wrong kind of criticism. We find three kinds of criticism in this passage.

DESTRUCTIVE CRITICISM. Verse 1: "Judge Not". The cynical critic is always trying to find something wrong. He is always tearing down. He can never find anything positive.

DELUSIVE CRITICISM. Verse 4: "Or how wilt thou say to thy brother, Let me pull out the mote out of thine eye; and behold, a beam is in thine own eye?" A person with deluded vision cannot see his own faults, problems, or shortcomings.

DISCRIMINATING CRITICISM. Verse 6: "Give not that which is holy unto the dogs, neither cast ye your pearls before swine, lest they trample them under their feet, and turn again and rend you."

Verse 1 does not say we are not to make any kind of judgement because verse 6 requires 4 judgements: What is "holy"? Who is a "dog"? What is a "pearl"? and What is "swine"? There are many that hide behind verse 1 to try to keep from accepting the truth about their spiritual condition. Furthermore, this verse 6 admonishes us to take the right kind of stand for the fundamentals of the faith. Here are a few of the fundamentals that Christians should stand for: The virgin birth of Christ, The deity of Christ, The physical resurrection of Christ, The substitutionary death of Christ, the verbal inspiration of the Holy Bible, and the Second Coming of Christ. seeing a ghost on a blazing summer afternoon; the spirits seem to prefer the shadows of the night. Perhaps that's because people can't be quite sure what they do see then, and fatigue has made them rather more susceptible to suggestion. Besides, most of us give our imaginations a little play in the evenings and keep our matter-of-factness for working hours.

Maybe that explains why we never hear of a seance being held in the bright sunshine in the open air. Mediums say they must have the right "Atmosphere", and that usually means a darkened room, a ring of clasped hands, and not too much skepticism present; otherwise the spirits can't get through.

All this makes it all the more remarkable that when a man did come back from the dead, it was all so free from "spookiness", and most of the action took place in daylight in the open air. But perhaps he did it deliberately, just to show that this was the real thing.

There was no doubt that he really died, for it was all horrible visible - a public execution on a trumped-up charge. Yet within a few days he showed himself to be really and truly alive not once but several times. His friends who from a safe distance had seen him executed were certainly not expecting ever to see him alive again. Indeed they were most skeptical when the first report of his being alive came in. "Hysterical female nonsense!" they considered it. But when they saw him, not in the halfdark where they might have been mistaken for a moment, but in broad daylight, all they could say then was, "It must be a ghost!" And to put it bluntly, they yelled with sheer fright.

We can't exactly blame them. It's one thing to see a white shape in a church yard at night (which might after all

be merely a cat), but it's quite a different matter when a friend whom you saw die on Friday comes up and speaks to you on the following Sunday morning! Yet this is what happened to the followers of Jesus Christ. He understood their fear, of course. He made them touch him and handle him to prove that he was really there, and then, when they still seemed a little slow in the uptake, he ate some food, for who ever heard of a ghost making a hearty meal? He had said he would conquer death, and here he was alive and well to prove it.

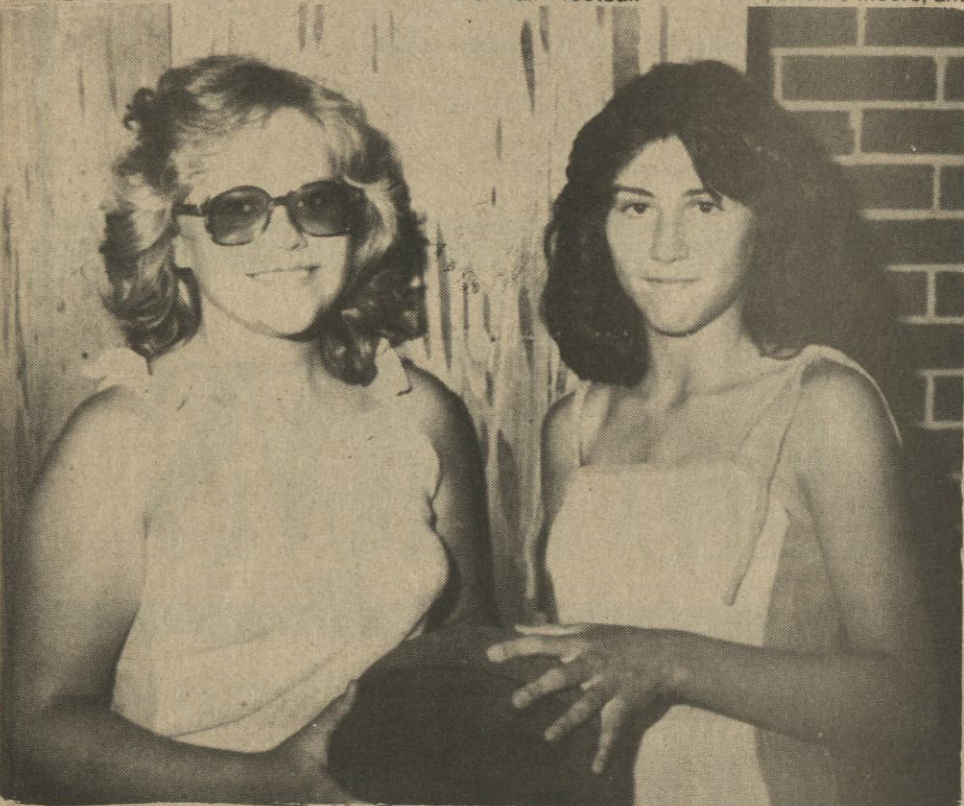

RESOLUTION DECLARING THE INTENTION OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF TISHOMINGO COUNTY, MISSISSIPPI, TO ISSUE A PROMISSORY NOTE ON BEHALF OF THE TISHOMINGO COUNTY SCHOOL DISTRICT, TO RAISE MONEY FOR THE PURPOSE OF MAKING REPAIRS, ALTERATIONS AND ADDITIONS TO SCHOOL BUILDINGS OF SAID SCHOOL DISTRICT AND DIRECTING PUBLICATION OF NOTICE OF SUCH INTENTION.

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the Tishomingo County School District, by resolution, has requested this Board of Supervisors to issue a Promissory Note in the principal sum of \$175,000, for and on behalf of said School District, to raise money for the purpose of making repairs, alterations and additions to school buildings of said School District, at an estimated cost of \$175,000; and

WHEREAS, the amount above specified is not now available in the treasury of said School District to provide for the aforesaid expenditures; and

WHEREAS, this Board of Supervisors is authorized, by the provisions of S37-59-101 through S37-59-115, Mississippi Code, 1972, Annotated, to issue a Promissory Note for the aforesaid purpose; and

WHEREAS, this Board does further find and determine that it is necessary and in the public interest that said Promissory Note, on behalf of

said School District, be issued as hereinafter set forth.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF TISHOMINGO COUNTY, MISSISSIPPI, as follows:

SECTION 1. That the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, hereby declares its intention to issue a Promissory Note on behalf of the Tishomingo County School District, in the amount of \$175,000 to raise money for the purpose of making repairs, alterations and additions to school buildings of said School District.

SECTION 2. That the said Promissory Note, in the amount and for the purpose aforesaid, will be issued at a meeting of said Board of Supervisors to be held at 10 o'clock A.M. on Friday, the 25th day of July, 1980. If twenty per centum (20%) of the qualified electors of the Tishomingo County School District shall file a written protest against the issuance of said Note for the aforesaid purpose; on or before the aforesaid date and hour, then an election on the question of the issuance of said Note shall be called and held, as provided by law. If no such protest be filed, then said Note shall be issued without an election on the question of the issuance thereof.

SECTION 3. That this resolution shall be published once each week for two consecutive weeks in the "Tishomingo County News," a newspaper published and of general circulation in Tishomingo County, which is a qualified newspaper under the provisions of S13-3-31, Mississippi Code, 1972, Annotated. The first publication of this resolution shall be made not less than fifteen (15) days prior to the aforesaid date.

SECTION 4. That the Clerk of this Board shall be and is hereby directed to procure, from the publishers of the aforesaid newspaper, the customary proof of publication of this resolution, and to have the same before this Board on the date specified in Section 2 of this resolution.

### TO THE EDITOR:

At the Board of Alderman meeting held at City Hall, July 1, 1980, 7:00 PM., Mayor George Cutshall stated that the ruling from the Attorney General's office had not been received on the proposed Zoning Ordinance. Therefore, no action would be taken until the next board meeting, or until the Attorney General's ruling was received.

At this time Linda Bailey, Northeast Mississippi Rural Legal Aide, introduced herself to the Board. She stated that she was representing the Citizens Committee and the concerned citizens of Iuka on this issue. She asked Mayor George Cutshall to clarify the statement that the zoning issue would not be acted on at this meeting. He stated again that it would not.

David Smith, Chairman of the Citizens Committee, asked if a "special" Board Meeting would be held or would the Board wait until the regular Board of Alderman meeting next month to act on this issue. The Mayor replied "at the next Board Meeting." Alderman Corkey Smith made a motion that no action be taken on this issue until the next regular Board of Alderman meeting, if the ruling from the Attorney General had been received by that time; that it was not to be acted on in a "special" meeting.

The motion was seconded and carried.

Linda Bailey informed the Board of Alderman that a formal protest would be presented by the time the Board held its next monthly meeting.

David Smith, also, asked the Board of Aldermen what a cition or steps would be taken regarding the shooting incident in Mr. Carl Huffman's behalf, who was present. The Mayor asked Mr. Huffman to explain what had happened. Mr. Huffman stated that he was returning home from a singing when he heard sirens.

He pulled off the side of the road, thinking an ambulance was needing to pass. He heard the siren a second time and a bullet was fired into his car. He said he did not realize it was the police until a shot

was fired. The Mayor requested that Mr. Huffman meet with the Board at a special time to discuss the incident with the acting officer present.

The Board of Aldermen appointed Frank Jimmar as Barry Finch's replacement on the School Board. Mr. Jimmar, who is over 65 years of age, is the first black to be appointed to this position. Other nominees were Stanley Dexter, Hilton (Popcorn) Moore, L.T. Robinson, and Terry Booker. The motion was made by Alderman Leroy Dean and seconded by Alderman Mamie Culver. The motion was carried.

The Board of Aldermen received a contract to be signed to provide funds for a fire station. The city's obligation would be to construct a building to house four fire trucks which would be cooperated and coordinated with Tishomingo County. The city is to receive a grant from TVA in the amount of \$24,750 to initiate this plan. The fire fund has a balance of \$33,000. Mayor Cutshall reiterated that he would like to use this \$24,000 to help purchase a new City Hall. He further noted that the Edmondson Grocery Building was for sale for \$75,000. The Mayor noted that his reason for wanting a new City Hall is the fact that there no vault in which city records would be protected from fire. He therefore would like to use the grant from TVA to purchase the building for a City Hall. Richard Clark, City Attorney, stated that these funds are to improve the Fire Department. Mayor Cutshall requested a motion be made to offer an option on the property and request an architect to design plans to renovate the building. Alderman Leroy Dean made the motion and Alderman Mamie Culver seconded it. Alderman Corkey Smith objected to the motion without an estimated cost.

The Board of Aldermen received a letter from TVA extending an agreement with the City to assist in the cost of law enforcement services. TVA is to reimburse the City for the salaries and fringe benefits of two law enforcement officers and for the operating expenses of a patrol car in the amount of \$38,500. The

motion to extend the contract was made by Alderman

Leroy Dean and seconded by Alderman Mamie Culver. The motion was carried.

James Grisham was appointed to the Iuka Housing Authority Board. Alderman Corkey Smith made the motion, Alderman Leroy Dean seconded it. The motion was carried.

The motion was made by Alderman Leroy Dean and seconded by Alderman Mamie Culver to resell the property by the new 25 Bypass. The first buyer was unable to obtain financing.

The TVRHA has requested that the Board of Aldermen recognize Westwood Circle as a city street. The motion to do so was made by Alderman Leroy Dean and seconded by Alderman Mamie Culver. The motion was carried.

Police Chief Jack Rye asked the Board of Alderman to move the Corporation Limits to include the Iuka Elementary School. Attorney Richard Clark noted that he thought that a petition would have to be filed through the courts to do so. He was asked to check into this matter and have an answer by the next Board Meeting.

## Report To the People

### Senator Bill May

The overriding purpose of the bill is to standardize the existing hodgepodge of statutes relating to the purchasing practices of state agencies, counties, municipalities, school districts, public hospitals and other local governing boards. The bill clarifies the basic principles of the Purchase Division of the Commission of Budget and Accounting relative to the regulation of

purchasing by state agencies and local governing bodies and specifies that purchasing under competitive bid prices shall be at prices approved by the commission.

The bill creates a new section of the code which provides for purchases of commodities at the state contract price from an approved source established by the Budget Commission. State agencies are required to purchase commodities at the state contract price unless a lower price is secured by the agency through the statutory bidding procedures. Local governing

authorities are authorized to purchase commodities from any lawful source without advertising for bids as long as the commodity is identical in brand and the price is the same or less than the state contract price. The Purchase Division of the Commission of Budget and Accounting is charged with ensuring that state contract prices are the lowest and the best prices available from any source offering that commodity at the same level of quality.

The act provides competitive bid procedures for state agencies and local governing authorities as

follows:

1. Purchases less than \$500.00: (a). Advertising and competitive bidding not required. (b). Competitive bidding may be instituted at the option of the agency.
2. Purchases less than \$1,500: publishing or posting advertisement for bids not required provided at least two (2) competitive written bids have been obtained.
3. Purchases greater than \$1,500.00: (a). Advertising for competitive bids once each week for two (2) consecutive weeks in a regular newspaper of general circulation is required. (b). The date as published for bid opening shall not be less than five (5) working days after the last published notice. (c). Known vendors of items sought shall be mailed solicitations for bids. (d). Specifications shall be written so as not to exclude any equipment of domestic manufacture.
4. A waiver of the competitive bidding requirements in certain emergency situations is allowed, provided that state agency heads or local governing authorities follow certain documented procedures.
5. Excepted from competitive bid requirements are: (a) Purchasing agreements, contracts and maximum price regulations approved by the commission; (b). properly documented equipment

repairs; (c). Raw unprocessed deposits of gravel or fill dirt, if the price is the same as to the general public; (d). Motor vehicles or equipment purchased from a state agency at public auction; (e). Perishables used in connection with certain public programs; and (f). Noncompetitive items available from one source only.

The act allows governing authorities to accept the lowest bid received from a dealer domiciled within the county for motor vehicles having a gross weight less than 26,000 pounds at the cost not to exceed 3% greater than dealer's cost. In the event the county does not have an authorized dealer, bids may be received from dealers in adjoining counties. Motor vehicle purchases may be made from authorized state contract dealers without having to advertise and receive bids, but governing authorities shall not purchase motor vehicles in excess of the approved state contract price if there is an authorized state contract dealer situated in the county of the governing authority.

The bill increases the criminal penalty for any public official failing to comply with the public purchasing law to a fine of not less than \$100.00 and not more than \$500.00 for each offense, and/or a jail sentence of not more than six months. The bill also amends the existing law providing for individual civil liability for unlawful expenditure of public funds. Present law requires the proof of actual loss to the public in order to receive compensatory damages. The section as amended would allow damages equal to the full amount of the unlawful purchase, regardless of actual loss. This section also allows an individual board member to avoid personal liability by having his proper vote duly recorded.

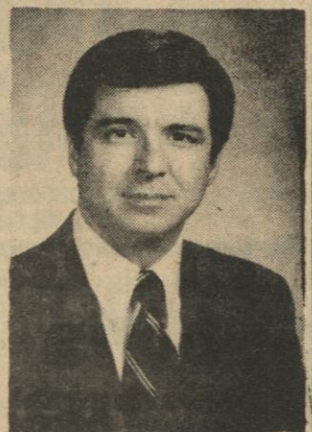

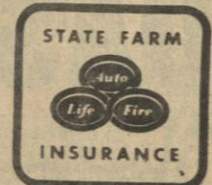

Available for inspection on the test days will be the NU-EAR Gem, the All-In-The-Ear hearing aid which is custom built to individual need.

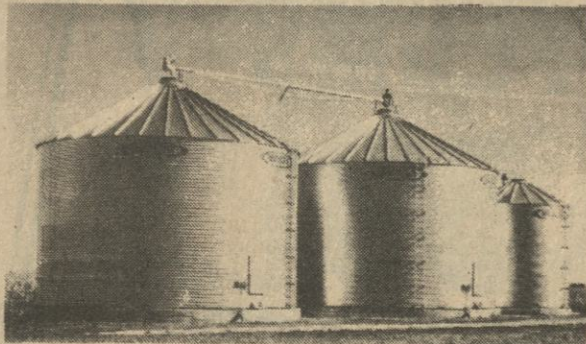
