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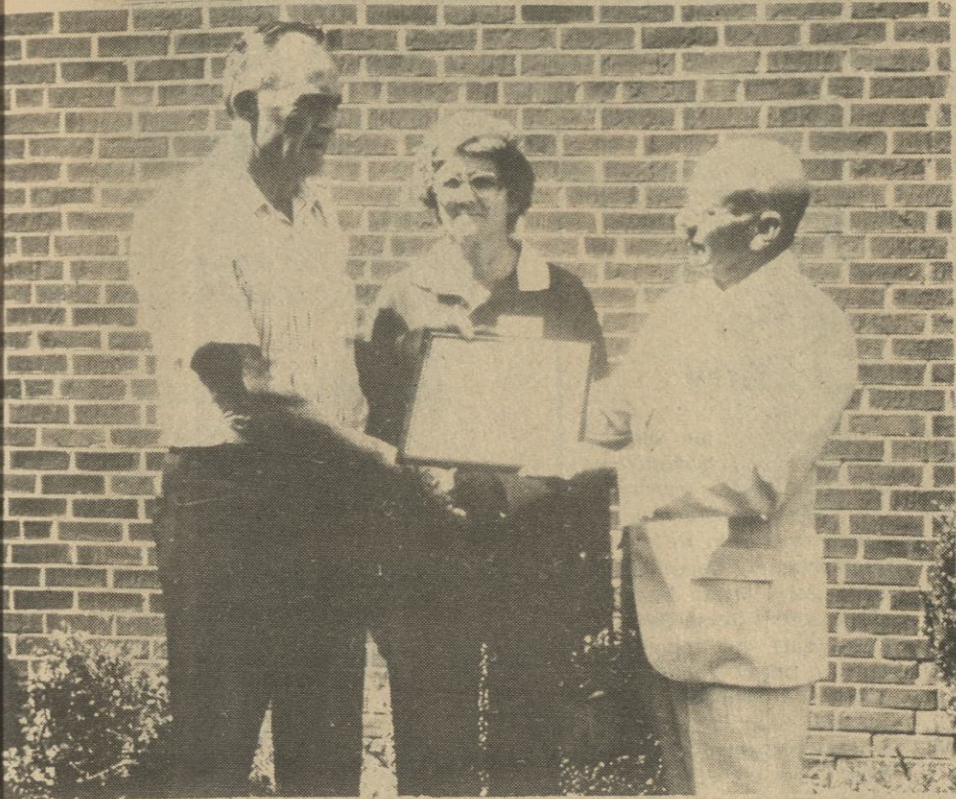

An accident on Saturday morning, September 13, at approximately 4:00 a.m., one mile south of Cairo on Hwy. 365, claimed the life of a Kentucky man, according to a report received by The Tishomingo County News.

The report stated that Donnie Harding, 36, of Farmington, Ky., driver of a tractor-trailer rig, apparently lost control of the vehicle, leaving the road, going into a ditch and overturning. The rig belonged to the Bells Trucking Company of Tupelo and was hauling corn.

A spokesman for the Tishomingo County Hospital said that Harding was pronounced dead on arrival at Tishomingo County Hospital.

Auto Accident Claims One Life - Injures Six

A one car accident, occurring Monday afternoon, September 15, south of Tishomingo, claimed the life of a four-year-old Joliet, Ill. girl and injured six other passengers, who were riding in the car, according to Mike Kemp, of the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department.

Deputy Sheriff Kemp reported that the driver of the 1972 Monte Carlo, Thomas Altiery, approximately 20 years of age, of Dennis, Miss., Route 1, apparently lost control of

the car while traveling west on the Jackson Camp Road, about four miles south of Tishomingo. The car skidded about 60 feet, Kemp said, and overturned, at least once, into a ravine being about six feet in depth, throwing four-year-old Chrissie Brandt out of the vehicle. She was pronounced dead on arrival at the Tishomingo County Hospital.

According to a spokesman for the Tishomingo County Hospital, the passengers have been identified as Bon-

nie Altiery, of Dennis, Route 1, wife of the driver of the car; Thomas Altiery, Jr., four-month-old son of Thomas and Bonnie Altiery; Sue Altiery, of Dennis, Route 1, believed to be a sister-in-law to the Thomas Altierys; Shannon Altiery, 13 month old daughter of Sue Altiery; Coleen Magana, of Joliet, Ill., a relative of the Altiery family and mother of Chrissie Brandt.

The hospital spokesman said that Bonnie Altiery, Sue

Altiery, and Thomas Altiery, Jr., were transferred to Coffee Memorial Hospital in Florence, Ala.

Shannon Altiery, Coleen Magana and Thomas Altiery were admitted to Tishomingo County Hospital where they are listed in satisfactory condition at press-time.

Sources said it is believed that Colleen Magana and her daughter, Chrissie Brandt, were in Tishomingo County visiting the Altiery family.

Helmets Are Required

Failure of motorcyclists to wear protective helmets triples their risk of death in an accident. It also costs the public many millions of dollars in added medical care, rehabilitation and public assistance expenses.

Unhelmeted riders suffer two to four times as many head injuries as those wearing helmets. Many of the injuries are severe, requiring extensive care and higher medical costs.

Helmet use does not increase accidents by impairing a rider's vision or hearing, or by causing fatigue or over confidence. There is no scientific evidence that helmets cause or increase the severity of neck injuries in motorcycle accidents.

Mississippi has a law requiring the use of helmets by drivers and riders. But some still take risks by not using helmets. Encourage members of the family who drive or ride a motorcycle to wear a helmet always.

Carpet Care Tips

Carpet care is essential, but unless done properly, it is ineffective. Do-it-yourself cleaning is possible, but a professional has the equipment to handle ground-in dirt and stubborn stains.

When it's time to have your carpeting cleaned, consider an in-home maintenance program where the carpet cleaner comes to your home, cleans by extraction and applies "Scotchgard" Carpet Protector. The extraction

process leaves the least amount of detergent on the carpet. Important since detergent attracts soil. The 3M Company soil/stain resistant finish helps keep carpeting cleaner two or three times longer than untreated carpeting, because soil does not adhere as readily to carpet fibers. Stains and spills can be spot-cleaned more easily by conventional methods, too.

Carpet care also includes vacuuming sections with heavy traffic daily, others weekly, going over each area two or three times. An upright vacuum cleaner or rotating brush attachment should be used. It removes dirt, brushes up the pile and assures the continued bright appearance of the carpet.

After a cleaning, move the furniture's location an inch or two. This will help avoid prolonged and concentrated crushing of the pile. Periodically shift the furniture around as much as possible. This helps change the traffic pattern and allows the carpet to wear more evenly.

Barbecued Fillets

2 pounds thick fish fillets
1/3 cup lemon juice
1/2 cup chopped onion
2 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
1/4 tsp. liquid hot pepper sauce
1 cup catsup
1/4 cup cooking oil
1 tsp. sugar
1 clove minced garlic
1 tsp. liquid smoke, optional
1 bay leaf

Cut fish into serving-size portions. Place fish in single layer in shallow baking dish. Combine 1/2 cup catsup, lemon juice, oil, Worcestershire sauce and garlic. Pour sauce over fish. Cover and refrigerate about one hour, turning fish once. Remove fish, reserving sauce. To the sauce add remaining catsup, onion, 1/4 cup water, sugar, liquid hot pepper sauce, liquid smoke and bay leaf. Simmer about 20 minutes to thicken and blend flavors. Place fish in well-greased, hinged wire grills and baste with sauce. Turn and cook for seven to eight minutes longer or until fish flakes easily when tested with fork. Brush fish with sauce as needed during cooking. To serve, spoon additional sauce over fish. Makes six servings.

Cut Soybeans For Hay?

Soybeans make excellent hay. In fact, that's why we first began to grow them in Mississippi. But unless good judgment is used, some of these beans will make expensive hay crops.

One item to consider is when to abandon soybeans and cut them for hay. As long as soybeans have pods and plants have not started to "fire up" from the bottom, they will probably be more valuable if combined for seed.

A key question is how much soybean hay will be worth. I've seen various estimates of \$65 to \$80 a ton for next winter, but don't forget high costs of baling and storing, yields of most drought-stressed beans would be about one ton of dry matter per acre. So, 8 to 10 bushels of beans per acre would be a better deal than one ton of hay.

Even if you expect a poor bean crop this fall, with current bean prices you'll want to do some heavy figuring before making a decision to cut beans for hay.

Get Bins Ready

It's still hot in grain bins and warehouses, but they need to be made ready for seed storage. Check them

over carefully to make sure they're in good condition. Then, clean them out now to save valuable time this fall. You'll also want to check seed handling equipment for needed repairs.

Drought Affects Silage

The dry growing season means many dairymen will have reduced tonnage and lower nutritive value of corn silage this fall. As a rule, you can expect this drought-affected corn to have a feeding value of only about 80 percent of normal corn.

This means you'll need to test the material and adjust the concentrated portion of the ration to make sure milk production does not drop appreciably.

One solution to the lack of feed tonnage is to buy a replacement. But high quality hay is expected to be scarce and fairly expensive. You can balance the ration with a minimum amount of forage as long as the crude fiber of the dry matter is kept at 13 percent or more.

Livestock Feed

The livestock feed situation is serious because of hot, dry weather this summer.

Extension Dairy Specialist Gerald Taylor says many producers have planted winter grazing pastures, but the hot, dry weather has prohibited germination of these pastures. Taylor says some producers are feeding their dairy animals hay and silage because of lack of grazing. Taylor says it will cost producers more to feed hay and silage than to use grazing.

Wheat Target Price May Exceed \$3.81 Per Bushel

"The target price for 1981 crop wheat will be increased to at least \$3.81 per bushel, 18 cents over the 1980 level," Elmer South, Chairperson of the Tishomingo County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, said. The final amount will depend upon the size of increase in short-run production costs. He said the loan price will be at least \$3 a bushel. All farmers are eligible to participate in the 1981 Wheat Program. There are no set-aside requirements. Producers need only to be sure they plant within the normal crop acreage (NCA) to be eligible for the farmer-owned grain reserve, commodity loans, and target price protection. However, only those who plant or harvest no more wheat than was planted and considered planted in 1980 will have the full target price protection. South said the 1980 planted and considered planted acres in-

cludes actual acreage planned for harvest and approved prevented plantings. "Farmers should continue to use good farming practices and not enter fragile or marginal lands into wheat production. Acreage not traditionally used for crop production will not be added into a farmers NCA for subsequent years." The grain reserve release and call prices for 1981 will be increased from the current \$4.50 and \$5.25 to keep them consistent with the cost of producing wheat. South said the exact amount will be determined when more cost information becomes available. To encourage wheat producers to make more effective use of the program, a special reserve loan is being considered by Congress. "The measure under consideration would set the special reserve loan at not less than \$3.30 per bushel," the ASCS Official said. Farmers are expected to place a sufficient quantity of their 1980 crop wheat into the reserve to boost farm prices over the current release price to satisfy 1980/81 market requirements. According to South, a paid diversion program and/or a haying and grazing program will be offered to farmers if it becomes evident that wheat supplies are excessive in 1981. About 59 Tishomingo County farmers participated in the 1980 Wheat Program.

4-H News

Parent Interest, Cooperation Vital To Growing 4-H Clubs

Strong, growing 4-H Clubs must have parent interest and active parent cooperation. To help members get the most from their 4-H experience, parents must take part actively in club work.

Parent cooperation does not mean parent "take over" of the club or parent domination of the local 4-H leader; that would be no better than lack of parent cooperation. It does mean that every 4-H parent and every potential 4-H parent should be fully informed of the aims, policies, project activities and all events of the 4-H club program. It means that parents should be asked to take part. Most people will not volunteer their services, and yet most of them are willing to help when asked.

A recent study of 458 parents and 152 leaders in Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire and Ohio showed that more than three-fourths of the parents were willing to attend special 4-H events and meetings, provide transportation, and have meetings in their homes, but only one-eighth to one-half actually did. From one-half to two-thirds of the parents were willing to discuss 4-H with other parents, help teach

project work, and take part in 4-H meeting programs, but hardly any of them did. About one-third were willing to serve as leaders or on 4-H councils or committees, but only one out of 100 actually did.

Most parents were willing to help members select projects, help get material for projects, help with projects and records, and encourage members to take part in 4-H activities, but only one-half to two-thirds were actually doing so. Eighty-five percent of the parents were willing to read 4-H news articles and 4-H material sent to them and listen to 4-H radio programs, but only one-half of them did.

4-H leaders gain parents' cooperation by:

1. Calling on the parents of all club members;
2. Talking with parents about 4-H work when ever they see them;
3. Holding club meetings in the homes when possible;
4. Including parents in activities and events;
5. Asking parents to help them;
6. Praising them and giving thanks freely.

File For SSI Early

People who are already receiving social security, or other retirement payments, may be able to receive additional income in the form of Supplemental Security Income. Jerry Myatt, Manager of the Corinth Social Security Office said that individuals who began receiving retirement payments before age 65 often overlook additional income available to them under the SSI program when they become 65. He suggests that those persons

who began receiving retirement payments before age 65 get in touch with the Social Security Office again about one month before they reach their 65th birthday. Unlike claims for regular social security benefits, which are earned through working in work covered by Social Security, SSI claims are not good for any months earlier than the month in which the claim is filed. "It is a good idea, then, to apply on time, or up to one month ahead of time, Myatt explained. Supplemental payments can be made to people who are at least age 65, and to some disabled

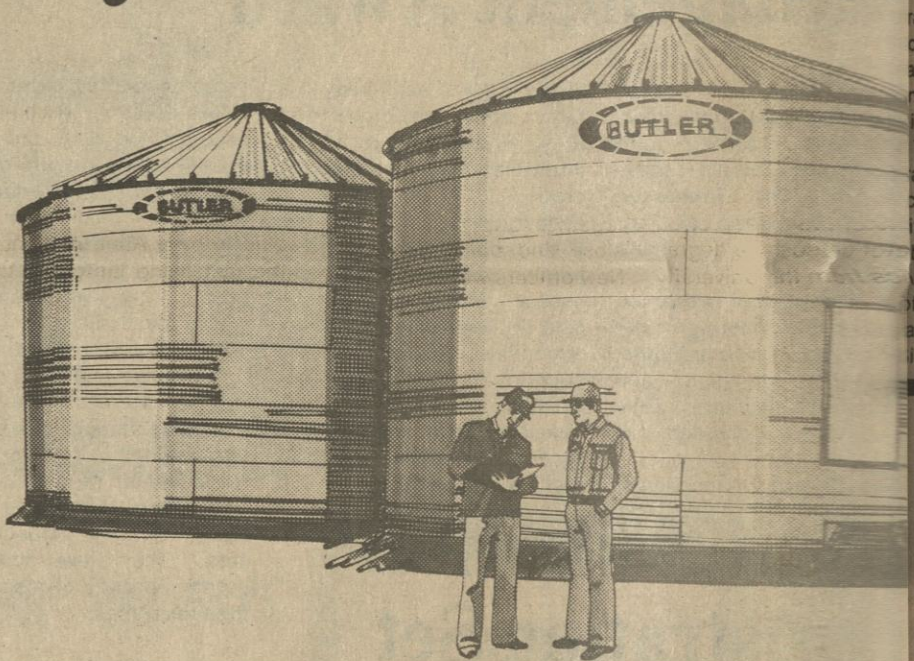

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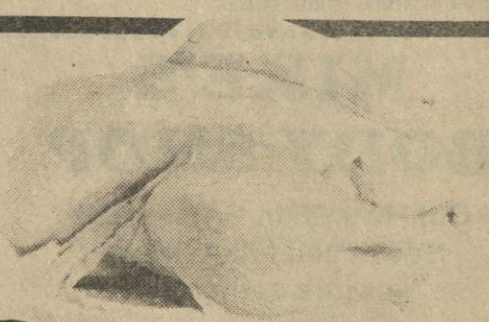

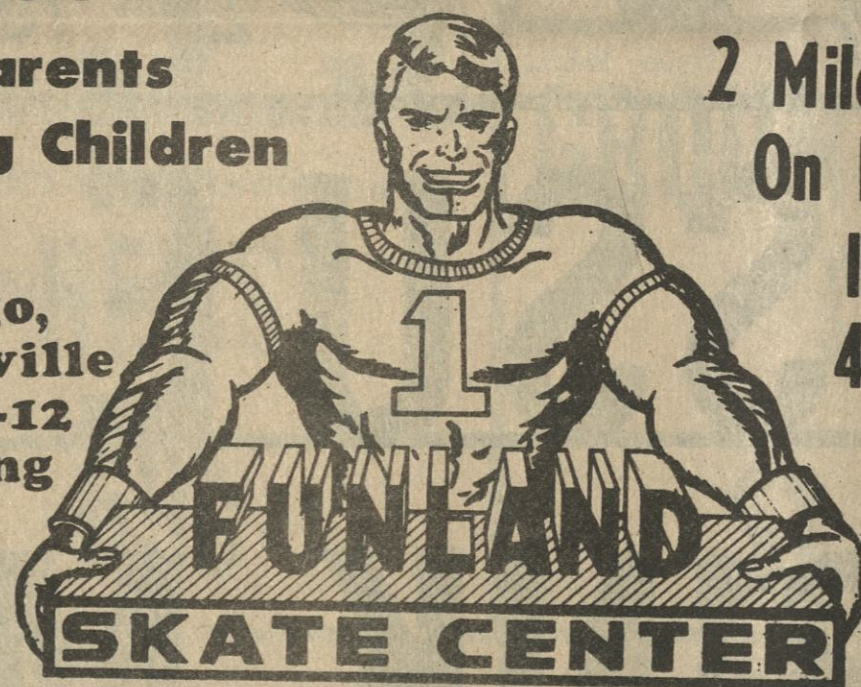
We had our first home game last Friday night against Okolona. Despite great effort and determination, we were defeated with a score of

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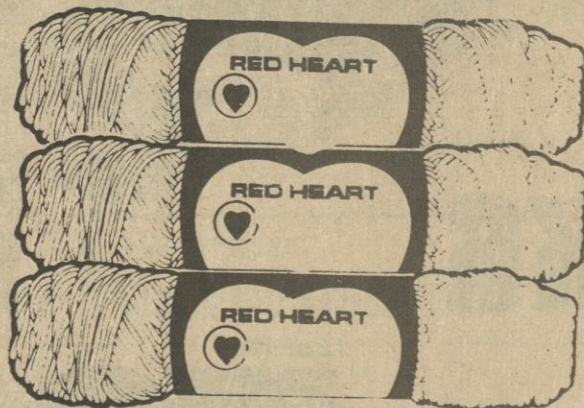
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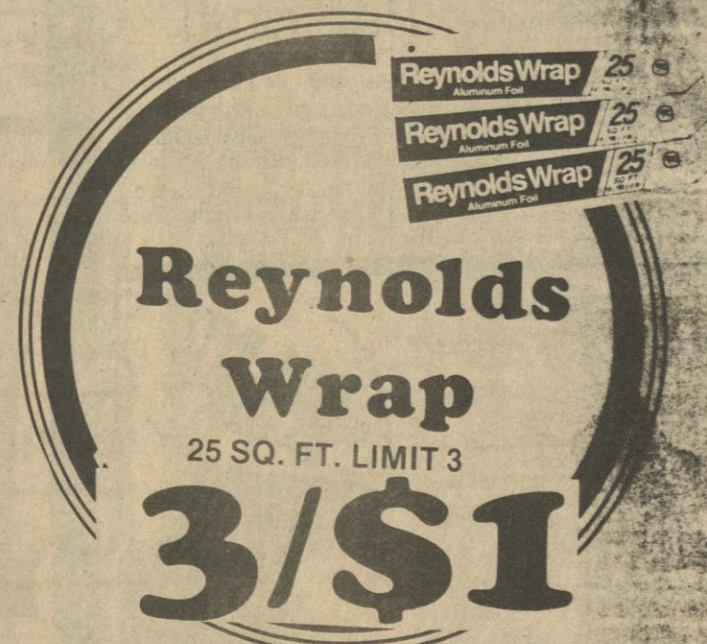
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Dr. John Hora

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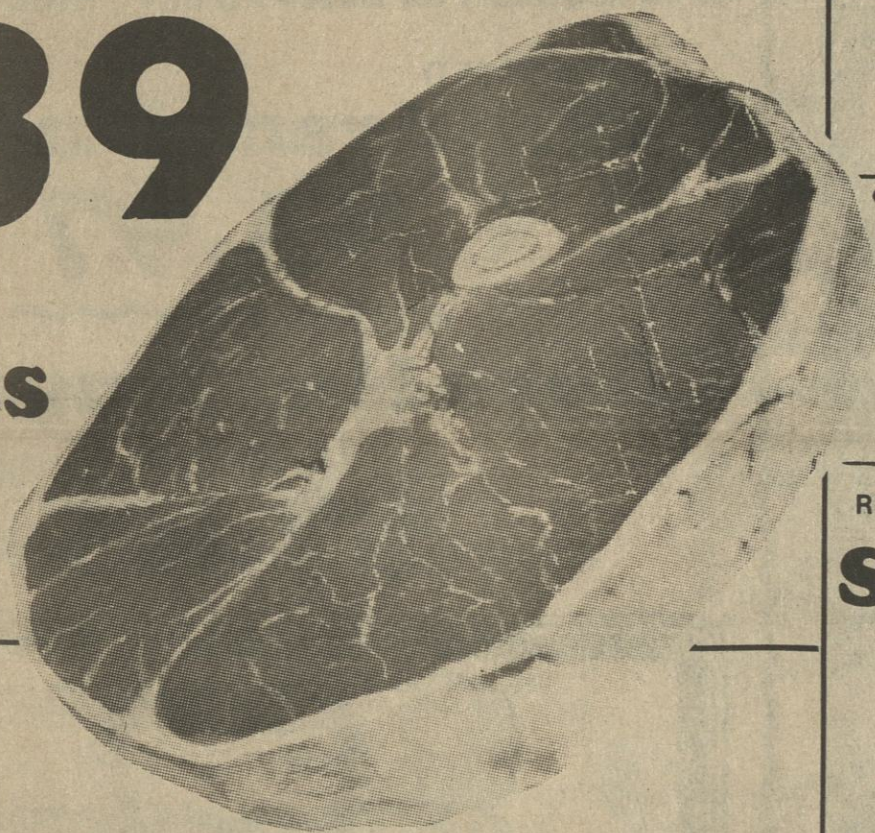

The Tishomingo Bulldogs remained on victory row Friday night as they defeated Middleton Tigers 30-21 at Middleton.

Half-time found Middleton atop with a 21-14 lead, which caused the Bulldogs to try catch-up ball.

The Bulldogs got on the board when Hookie Allen

teamed up with Rodney Frazier for a touchdown pass that covered 60 yards. Then Hookie Allen ramblled 15 yards for another Tishomingo touchdown. Frazier added the two point conversion.

What To Do When "The Walls Cave In On You"

Ever had the feeling that your world was about to come to an end because of something that had happened to you? Maybe you lost your job, failed a class at school, or your husband divorced you. What do you do at times like these? Let me make four suggestions:

1. DO NOT PANIC. Everything is not lost. It may seem that way, but the last chapter has not been written. Many hasty decisions are made at this time and later you regret them. Solomon said, "It is not good to have

zeal without knowledge, nor to be hasty and miss the way" (Prov. 19:2). Do not rush into things. This is not the time for major decisions.

2. ACCEPT WHAT YOU CANNOT CHANGE. Time spent in fighting a battle that you cannot change only deepens your problem. If your husband has died, then he cannot be brought back. David had this experience when he lost his son. The servants were surprised that he took off his clothes of mourning and resumed his normal life. They asked why? "While the child was alive, I fasted and wept, I thought, Who knows? The Lord may be gracious to me and let the child live. But now that he is dead, why should I fast? Can I bring him back again?" (II Sam. 12:22-23) He accepted what could not be changed.

3. DO NOT WALLOW IN SELF PITY. Self pity is like acid that will destroy you. When Job lost his wealth, family, health and support of his wife the Bible says, "In all this, Job did not sin in what he said." (Job 2:10) When you begin to feel sorry for yourself, complain about it, blame God or others you are just heading for more trouble. Refuse to feel sorry for yourself.

4. REMEMBER, BECAUSE OF JESUS, NO SITUATION IS HOPELESS. Even on days when the clouds cover the sun, the sun is still shining. In Christ there is always hope. Robert Schuler wrote the following poem that is true because of Jesus.

After the night comes a new day,
After winter, a new spring,
After the storm, a sun,
After sin comes forgiveness,
After defeat, another chance.

"The Ideal Life"

II Corinthians 4:10
"Always bearing about in the body and dying of the Lord Jesus, that the life also of Jesus might be made manifest in our body."

We always hear people say that the word Christian means being Christ-like. However, here in this passage is a phrase that should challenge us: ... that the life also of Jesus might be made

manifest in our mortal flesh. We are to be LIFE—LIKE of Christ. The life of Christ was the ideal example of the life we should live. Notice what made his life so different:

IT WAS A LIFE FROM GOD. He was born from above as we find in Luke 1:35. He was God manifest in the flesh. I Timothy 3:16 - "And without controversy great is the mystery of godliness God was manifest in the flesh." If then, the life of Jesus is to be manifest in our mortal flesh, we must be born of God, born from above. John 3:5 - "Jesus answered, Verily, verily, I say unto thee, Except a man be born of water and of the Spirit, he cannot enter into the kingdom of God. That which is born of the flesh is flesh; and that which is born of the Spirit is spirit. Marvel not that I said unto thee, Ye must be born again." Galatians 2:20 - "I am crucified with Christ; nevertheless I live; yet not I but Christ liveth in me."

IT WAS A LIFE ENTIRELY YIELDED TO GOD. John 5:19 - "Jesus said, the Son can do nothing of himself, but what he seeth the Father do." John 6:38 - "For I came down from heaven, not to do mine own will, but the will of him that sent me." Romans 6:13 - "... yield yourselves unto God, as those that are alive from the dead."

IT WAS A LIFE EMPOWERED BY THE SPIRIT OF GOD. Acts 1:3 - "God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Ghost and with power." Our lives also need to be empowered by the anointing of the Holy Ghost if we are to live the ideal life. Luke 24:49 - "... tarry ye in the city of Jerusalem until ye be endued with power from on high."

IT WAS A LIFE OF UNWAVERING FAITH IN GOD. Even though he had no honor in his own country and was hated, it did not change his attitude toward his destiny of the cross. John 15:18 - "If the

Remember the word that I said unto you, the servant is not greater than his lord. If they have persecuted me, they will also persecute you; if they have kept my saying, they will keep yours also." James 1:6 - "For he that wavereth is like a wave of the sea driven with the wind and tossed."

IT WAS A LIFE OF CONCENTRATED ACTIVITY. Luke 2:49 - "I must be about my Father's business." John 9:4 - "And as Jesus passed by, he saw a man which was blind from his birth. And his disciples asked him, saying, Master, who did sin, this man or his parents, that he was born blind? Jesus answered, Neither hath this man sinned, nor his parents; but that the works of God should be made manifest in him, I must work the works of him that sent me while it is day; the night cometh, when no man can work."

IT WAS A LIFE CROWNED WITH VICTORY. II Corinthians 2:14 - "Now thanks be unto God, which always causeth us to triumph in Christ, and maketh manifest the savour of his knowledge by us in every place." I Corinthians 15:57 - "But thanks be to God, which giveth us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ."

The Angel of Death has spirited away from the roster of the General W.F. Tucker Chapter of United Daughters of the Confederacy, one of the oldest, purest, and best beloved daughters, Martha Shackelford Tucker.

She passed over the river to rest under the shade Thursday, January 8, 1920, and crossed to the other shore, with no fear in her heart for she was truly a soldier of the cross.

She was born in 1821 on her father's plantation near Columbus, Mississippi, and if

her life had been spared until the 20th, she would have been 89 years of age.

She was one of the nine children of Henry Lee Shackelford. He was an extensive ante-bellum planter, owning hundreds of slaves and most of the land in and around Okolona.

Her brother, Jim Shackelford, sold the site where Okolona now stands for a gold watch. Martha Shackelford was married in 1851 to General W.F. Tucker. Six children were born to them and at her death she had 24 grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

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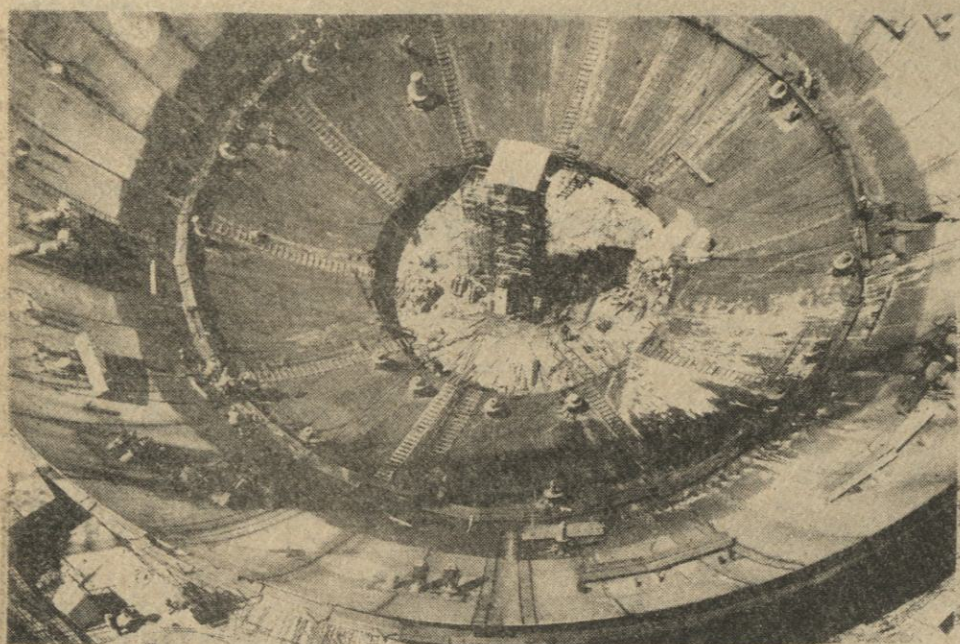
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Containment Erection At Yellow Creek

Overall construction at the Tennessee Valley Authority's Yellow Creek Nuclear Plant

has advanced to approximately 16 percent completion. Major emphasis has recently centered on erection of the steel containment vessel for unit 1 reactor building shown from 150 feet directly overhead. Chicago Bridge and Iron Company, primary steel containment contractor for the reactor

buildings, recently installed the bottom liner section (not shown) of the containment structure. When complete, the containment vessel will be a sphere approximately 200 feet in diameter made up of plates up to 1-3/4 inches thick. Welding and fitup is nearing completion for the first two courses or rings of the containment.
