The accident occurred while traveling in opposite directions on Highway 25 North. Bumgart sustained injuries in the mishap and was taken to Tishomingo County Hospital in Iuka and later transferred to Coffee Memorial Hospital in Florence, Ala. South Central Bell announced today that it will not appeal an order issued recently by the Mississippi Public Service Commission which granted the company a \$38.6 million rate increase instead of the \$58 million which had been requested.

to become effective September 30. Since the full rate increase has been in effect under bond since April 4, 1980, most of the revised rates that will go into effect will be lower as a result of the Commission order. Refunds due customers will be issued before the end of the year.

In deciding not to appeal the order, South Central Bell Vice President Frank Edmonds said that "this appears to be in the best interest of both our customers and the Company. Appeals are costly and often lengthy," Edmonds said. "Accepting this reduced amount means we won't be able to do all the things we need to do to expand and improve service to our customers, but we will be able to move ahead without delay on some service improvement programs."

In addition to putting into effect new local and long distance rates, the Company will implement the new Directory Assistance Repricing plan

on November 1. Under this plan, which was approved by the Commission, all customers will receive a 50 cent a month reduction in their local service rates. At the same time, the Company will begin charging for Directory Assistance calls in excess of the ten call-a-month allowance.

"We are pleased that we

can pass on to our customers the savings that we will realize by putting into effect this Directory Assistance Repricing plan," Edmonds said. "We think it only fair that those customers who use the service must pay more of the cost of providing it, thus relieving the entire customer body of that burden."

Grant Approved For Tishomingo

A \$54,000 Federal Grant has been approved to help the Town of Tishomingo relocate a portion of its natural gas line and allow the completion of construction of the Iuka By-Pass to Highway 72, Congressman Jamie Whitten said Monday.

The Appalachian Regional Commission funds will be used to make the Tishomingo

Natural Gas Systems lines, which are in the path of highway work in widening U.S. Highway 72.

The system serves 200 homes, 50 commercial users, and three industries employing some 220 people in the Towns of Tishomingo, Paden and Iuka.

Tishomingo will contribute \$15,000 to a total \$60,000 project cost.

County Unemployment Rate Drops In August

Tishomingo County's unemployment rate dipped slightly to 6.1 percent in August, a decrease of three-tenths of a percent compared to July's 6.4 percent jobless rate, according to Charles Smith, Manager of the Mississippi State Employment Service. Last year's August unemployment rate was 3.7 percent.

Figures prepared by the Employment Service revealed 10,390 employed and 670 unemployed out of a civilian labor force of 11,060.

Manufacturing em-

ployment in the county totaled 2,920 at mid-August compared to 2,980 last month and 2,900 in August 1979. Nonmanufacturing employment climbed to 6,180, some 80 above the previous estimate and 320 over one year ago.

A sharp drop in the labor force for the four-county area of Alcorn, Prentiss, Tippah and Tishomingo occurred from July 1980, but a substantial gain from August 1979 was experienced. The civilian labor force, a combination of those employed

and unemployed, totaled 46,090 at mid-August. There were 42,200 workers employed in August with an estimated 3,890 unemployed. The rate of unemployment in the four-county area was 8.4 percent, compared to 8.5 percent last month and 4.5 percent one year ago.

Area manufacturing employment, estimated to be 14,760, experienced decreases from both comparison periods. Non-manufacturing employment totaling 19,400 experienced increases over both comparison periods.

son, said that the money raised will go toward the support of the museum programs. The museum will be headquartered in the Old Tishomingo County Courthouse currently being renovated in Iuka.

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Chatting With Your Home Economist

By: Nellie R. Horton Choose Pork This Fall

The pig is one of the most primitive forms of domestic mammals, dating back nearly 40 million years. Between 700 and 3000 B.C. man began to adapt to the wild hog to fit his needs. The pig has been serving man -- or man has been serving pork -- ever since.

Roast pork, flavorful and juicy... crisp bacon, filling the air with tempting aroma... and tantalizing baked ham are only a few of the good pork "eatings." Pork is plentiful and a good choice for fall menus.

When you're shopping for pork, appearance is an important guide to quality. Choose meat, either fresh or cured, that has a high proportion of

lean to fat and bone. The flesh should be firm and fine-textured.

The color of the lean in fresh pork may range from grayish pink to red. Lean cured pork has a typical deep pink color.

Cook pork long enough to allow heat to penetrate into the center of the meat. Pork heated to 137 degrees F. is safe to eat. It's more tender and flavorful when cooked to higher temperatures.

A good test for doneness is to make small cuts next to the bone and into the thicker part of the meat. If the juice is still pink, the meat is not done. For thick cuts, a meat thermometer is well worth the investment.

Fresh pork should be

heated to an internal temperature of 170 degrees to 185 degrees F. depending on the kind of cut. Cured hams labeled "cook before eating" should be heated to an internal temperature of 160 degrees and cured picnic shoulders to 170 degrees.

Fully cooked cured pork can be eaten without further heating, but reheating to an internal temperature of 130 degrees enhances the flavor.

Take advantage of pork in your grocery stores this week. Enjoy it with fall vegetables for a real treat.

One-Pot Spaghetti

1 lb. ground beef
1 medium onion, chopped
1 tbsp. oregano leaves, crushed
1 can (11 oz.) condensed tomato bisque soup
1 can (12 fl. oz.) tomato juice
1 soup can water
1/4 lb. uncooked thin spaghetti, broken in pieces

In skillet, brown beef and cook onion with oregano until tender (use shortening if necessary). Stir to separate meat; remove excess fat. Stir in remaining ingredients. Bring to boil; reduce heat. Cover; simmer 20 minutes or until done. Stir often. Serve with grated Parmesan or Romano cheese if desired. Makes about 5 cups.

County Agents Notes

Ferment Silage

Silage should ferment for three weeks before being opened for feeding. If the silo is opened before fermentation is complete, silage losses may be considerable.

Also, milk production loss because of lower consumption of mild silage will be much greater if the silage is fed immediately. To make good quality silage, fill the silo fast, seal it tight and allow three weeks for fermentation.

Mulch Shrubs

Fall is a perfect time to accumulate leaves, pine straw and organic material for mulch around the base of shrubs. Mulching is one of the best ways to prevent drought damage, and it also protects shrubs from winter injury. Keep a three-to-four-inch mulch layer around shrubs, adding additional mulch to replace decayed material.

Gardeners need to water shrubs and landscape trees during the dry autumn months to prevent further damage from dry weather.

Fall Fertilization

Many farmers should consider fall applications of fertilizer on their fields. Extension Agronomy Leader, Dr. Kelton Anderson says applying mix fertilizer or phosphate materials in the fall is a good practice, especially on soils prepared in the fall. Dr. Anderson says there are certain places where farmers should not make fall fertilizer applications. These are steep slopes where erosion is a problem and sandy soils where severe leaching of potash may occur.

Dr. Anderson says potash and phosphate give good results when applied in the fall, especially on crops such as wheat that will be followed by soybeans. Dr. Anderson adds nitrogen should not be applied in the fall for spring crops.

Mississippi farmers can expect above normal temperatures and above median rainfall through mid-October. The weather outlook distributed by the Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service says average rainfall during this period is usually three inches for most of the state. The above normal rainfall predicted may cause

problems during harvest. Extension Soybean Specialist, Dr. Wayne Jordan, says the added rain could help late maturing soybeans until the end of September.

Front-end loaders are versatile and can be a valuable tool for farm work, but they can also be dangerous if operated improperly. Extension Farm Safety Specialist, Dannie Reed, says a few precautions can reduce the chances of an accident with a loader. First, allow directions in the operator's manual for your tractor and loader. Next, be sure the loader is installed correctly and does not exceed your tractor's handling capacity. Keep the bucket low while carrying loads and when operating on hills. A hole or sudden bump can upset a tractor easily if the bucket is carried high. Drive forward when going uphill with loads. Back downhill with loads.

4-H News

More than 153,000 Mississippi 4-H'ers will be celebrating National 4-H Week October 5-11. They are among 5 million youngsters involved in 4-H activities.

Here in Tishomingo County, 745 youngsters belong to 44 4-H Clubs.

A common trait of all 4-H programs is a learn-by-doing approach. Active involvement of youth is designed to help them learn and apply knowledge and thereby develop life skills.

"THESE SKILLS VARY FROM LEARNING TO CLEAN A CAMERA TO FITTING AN ANIMAL FOR A SHOW AND FROM PLANNING AND PREPARING A MEAL TO PLATFORM SPEAKING," Purvis said. "A skill most former 4-H'ers attribute to 4-H is the ability to interrelate with people."

Another strength of 4-H is that it belongs to the people. National, state and local governments finance the Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service that, in turn, provides program personnel and curriculum. Local volunteers then deliver the program to youth.

More than 5,000 volunteers were involved in the Mississippi 4-H Program last year. Tishomingo County has 62 volunteer leaders. Youth also provide volunteer leadership as older teens guide and share their skills with younger 4-H'ers as teen leaders. Sixteen teen leaders help with Tishomingo County programs, Purvis said.

More than 40 projects are available for youth to participate in. Many 4-H'ers choose more than one project; others concentrate on the main interest. Projects are designed for urban and rural youth. A farm youth enrolled in the dairy project may devote his time to milk production. A city 4-H'er

enrolled in the project may study dairy marketing and processing.

Participating in various 4-H projects helps youth develop values, economics and careers. Project work provides an insight into the real world of work, Purvis added.

Awards and incentives encourage 4-H participation and recognize outstanding achievement. Local, state and national businesses, agencies and individuals provide the funds for these incentives. Most awards are given through various competitive events designed to help 4-H'ers exhibit skills learned in project work. 4-H'ers are encouraged to maintain a record of their learning and achievement. These records contribute to one's feeling of self worth and provide a method for recognizing accomplishments.

4-H began in Mississippi in 1907. The program has changed to meet the needs of youth based on their individual interests. Changes are made continuously by 4-H participants to keep the program abreast with today's youth.

"If you are looking for an opportunity to participate in a youth organization as a member or volunteer, 4-H is here for you," said Purvis. "4-H belongs to you."

ASCS Farm News

By: Henry L. Knox, County Executive Director ASCS Has List of Eligible Voters For Election

A list of the names of all persons eligible to vote in the upcoming annual ASC committee election is available for inspection in the Tishomingo County ASCS Office, reported Elmer (Booster) South, Chairperson of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee in Tishomingo County.

ASCS, an agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, is responsible for farm program administration, and on the local level, ASCS operates under a farmer-elected committee system, South said. Anyone who meets the following requirements is eligible to vote in ASC committee elections: Any individual of legal voting age with an interest in a farm as owner, operator, tenant, or sharecropper and who is eligible to participate in any ASCS program. Persons not of legal voting age who supervise and conduct farming operations on an entire farm are also eligible to vote because of race, sex, color, religion, or national origin. A person may cast a ballot in the community in which he/she is an eligible ASC voter, but he or she cannot vote in more than one com-

munity in the county. Chairperson South said anyone having questions about ASC committee member elections should contact the Tishomingo County ASCS Office.

Conservation Notes

Tall Fescue, a cool season perennial, is widely grown throughout most areas of Mississippi.

However, because of high temperatures and less water-holding capacity in the sandy soils of south Mississippi, good performance as a forage crop occurs only in the central and northern parts of the state. Mississippi beef producers have had good results from fescue, but it is not a good choice for grazing milk cows. Adding a clover does improve the quality of a fescue pasture.

Fescue begins new growth in late August or early September and continues growing through the succeeding months, maturing a seed crop in late May or June.

Sow twenty to thirty pounds per acre of a high germinating seed between September 1 and November 1. Some producers have tried to establish fescue by seeding in the spring, but it is not highly successful. Increasing the seeding rate over thirty pounds in an effort to by-pass good seedbed preparation is a mistake. Fescue seeded for a grazing crop needs a legume overseeded or interseeded.

The best combination with fescue for North Mississippi is either Regal white clover (3 lbs. per acre) or a combination of these two. In ad-

dition to supplying nitrogen for the grass, the clover adds quality to the forage. After seeding the clover, use a culti-packer or similar tool to cover the seed lightly and firm the soil.

The first growth of both fescue and clover provides good quality forage. You should crossfence your fescue so you can practice rotational grazing. Three pastures are needed for adequate rotational grazing.

The ideal stage to graze a fescue-clover mixture is turn on at a six-inch height and take off when grazed down to three inches high. This is, of

course, not always true, but having three pastures will greatly improve the grazing program. There is usually a growth in the spring.

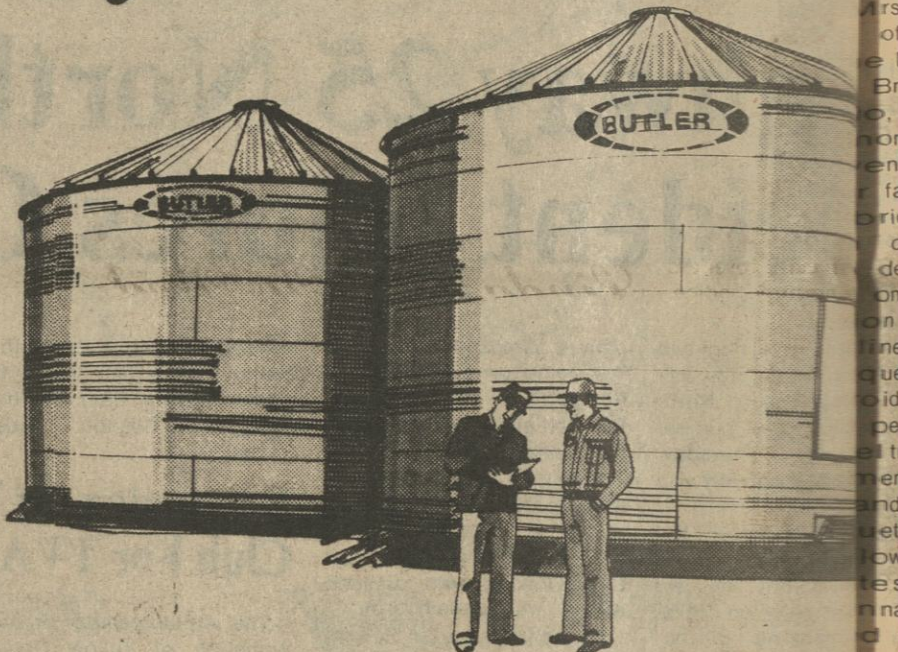

painting.

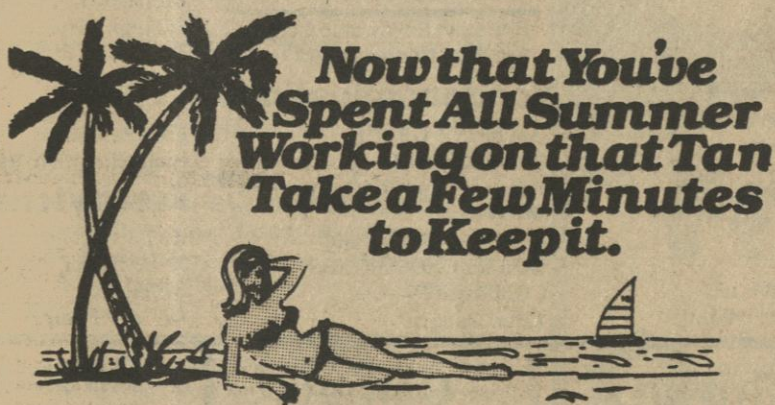

Hunting Seasons

The weekend of Oct. 4 will be a big one for most Mississippi sportsmen as the hunting season picks up. Squirrels, deer and rabbits will be on the minds of most.

Squirrels, the state's most popular small game animal, will be the target of much attention Saturday, Oct. 4, when the season opens in Zone 1. Open counties are those north of and including: Warren, north of I-20, Yazoo, Madison, Attala, Montgomery, Grenada, Calhoun, Pontotoc, Union, Prentiss and Tishomingo.

Each year over 167,000 squirrel hunters spend some 1.5 million days afield, according to one Department of Wildlife Conservation survey. They average harvesting approximately 3.3 million squirrels, or just slightly over two per day.

Shooters are permitted a daily bag limit of eight squirrels and a possession limit of 16. A possession limit is not allowed on opening day.

The season will extend through December 28. Beginning this year state law allows hunters to shoot squirrel with an unplugged shotgun.

The state's first deer season will make its debut October 4. Only hunters using longbows will be allowed to take the daily limit of one adult buck (no season limit), or one antlerless deer. Hunters are limited to two antlerless deer per season.

A legal adult buck is one with visible antlers of hardened, boney material having broken naturally through the skin, according to a Department law enforcement spokesman.

Agency biologists say that archery hunters should have another good season, due to the state's expanding deer herd. Last year archers harvested some 4,641 deer statewide. Experts say this year should be better.

Wildlife officials say that dogs, crossbows, sidearms and all firearms are prohibited while hunting deer during this archery season that will extend through October 30.

Rabbits, easily the state's most numerous small game animal, also will be hunted beginning October 4. This season, which lasts through February 28, permits shooters a daily limit of eight and a possession limit of 16.

"One of the big changes this year for hunters," explained law enforcement chief Philip Strong, "is the fact that shooters can hunt all

legal game animals one-half hour before sunrise until one-half hour after sunset, except migratory birds. This was a change made by the last session of the Legislature and will give hunters an extra half hour of hunting."

According to Strong, hunters must have a valid hunting license before hunting any game species. If sportsmen hunt on legally posted land, they must have written permission from the landowner on their person while hunting, he said.

Strong cautioned hunters not to hunt, or shoot in, on or across any public highway.
