Health Nurse Issues Statement

Yvonne Stephens, Health Information Coordinator for the municipal county school systems, conducted a visual health check of the schools and like to encourage students to notice if they have any abrasions or open wounds. If any of the following signs should be noticed: 1. Observe all cuts and open wounds. 2. Cleanse these wounds with soap and water. 3. Keep all open wounds covered. 4. If you are taking medication for an infection, please take your medication as directed by your physician. Stephens also states that if a child is observed with a problem should have a child checked by the physician.

the first business to fall victim to the thievery on Thursday night, October 9. Chief Rye said entrance was gained to the establishment by knocking a hole in the rear door. An RCA stereo and some cigarettes were reported missing.

Jason's Pizza, located on the corner of Ash and Wilmoth, was also broken into on the same evening. Mr. Rye said entrance was gained to Jason's by removing a pane from the front door in order to unlock it. About \$20.00 in change was reported missing from the cash register.

The W.S. Brown Co., on Fulton Street, was the third business to be vandalized. The Police Chief said entrance was gained by going up the steps in the rear of the store and removing screws from iron bars over the windows. The bars were apparently pulled out enough to knock out an inside window and enter the building. The filing cabinets, drawers and a safe, which was open, were ransacked. The store reported a theft of \$140 to \$150 in money. Nothing else has been reported as missing at press-time, Mr. Rye said.

The robberies are still under investigation and there is one suspect to date, but the suspect has not been apprehended, Chief Rye said.

New Gun Regulations At Shiloh

Due to the increase in poacher incidents at Shiloh National Military Park, Superintendent Zeb V. McKinney announced today that all gun regulations in the park will be strictly enforced. In effect, McKinney said, "This means that any gun in the park must be cased, broken down, or put away in such a manner that it is not usable. Simply racked in the back window of the pickup will not do."

Superintendent McKinney went on to state that since September 1, the park has issued four citations for poaching on the park and has had at least three deer shot. This is more citations than have been issued in the previous three years.

If you regularly travel the park roads with a gun in your vehicle, make sure that it is not useable. If you have any questions about the regulations you should contact Shiloh National Military Park at Shiloh, or call 689-5275.

Classics Are "In" This Fall

The classics head for school via the crisp preppy look for boys and girls in sizes 4 to 14. Fashion relies heavily on plaids and argyles, lacy collars, string ties and rich colors with emphasis on gray, burgundy, navy and traditional fall shades.

Pants are straight or pegged with single or double pleats or no pleating. Many have suspenders. Baggies are back, but modified. Corduroy, denim, cotton canvas, acrylic and wool flannel, gaberdine and twill are the fabric choices in solids or new patterns.

Sweaters are the favorite tops: crewnecks, cardigans and vests. Patterns and textures include cable stitches, jacquard novelties and argyles. They are knit or machine washable acrylic, orlon and man-made fabric blends. Wool and wool blends abound. Check labels for care instructions when buying a sweater and again before

laundry.

Vests and pullovers go over shirtwaist dresses and skirt or pants and shirt combination. Cardigans are teamed with matching pullovers.

Shirts in polyester/cotton, oxford cloth and heavier polyester/wool flannel feature man-tailoring with button-down collars or the softening of lace collars. Plaids show up here, too, often with a shirt plaid repeated in trim on jumpers in corduroy or denim.

Skirts are crystal pleated, A-line, half circle or killed. They are made of polyester flannel, wool blend flannel, corduroy and velour. Plaids are popular. Solid flannels take on patterned tops, including preggy argyles.

Blazers join the mix and match ensembling in corduroy, polyester flannel and velveteen. A four-part outfit may feature a gray polyester flannel blazer, matching skirt, deep wine polyester/cotton print shirt and

gray/white/wine foulard-type jacquard acrylic sweater.

Shirtwaist dresses with short roll-up sleeves often have the look of a skirt and blouse. Details include the little collar, grosgrain and string ties, cuff interest, pleats and tucking. Plaid is popular; so are rugby stripes and sweatshirt styling with rib knit trim.

In active sports wear, sweatshirt dressing and fleece-backed fabrics surface with novel detailing and colors. For example, a yellow and gray acrylic fleece turns up in quilted vest and matching pants with a plaid polyester and cotton shirt.

Boys wear divides into classic preppy and rugged outdoor looks. Signs of the classics include button-down collars, V-neck sweaters, sport coats with natural shoulders and easy shaping, trimmed down trousers. Mixes of fabrics and patterns are important. Tweeds go with corduroys, suede vests with tweeds and corduroys, heathers with plaids and tweeds.

Active wear appeals via training pants, updated and piping or quilting. Gray is the athlete's favorite shade.

Numerous shirts and sweatshirts are basic. Choices include zip-front jacket styles, T-shirt bodies with shawl collars or zip plackets. Screen prints, stripes and pieced color treatments are seen.

From the classroom to the football field, preppy styling sets the pace for fall with classic coordinates and sturdy, easy-care fabrics.

Ten Minute Sardine and Noodle Platter

County Agents Notes

Stop Brucellosis

Although the new brucellosis eradication program won't go into effect until January 1982, our cattlemen need to act now to bring herds in compliance with the new regulations and assure the best marketing opportunities for their cattle. Nationwide, brucellosis costs cattlemen about \$56 million annually in losses. We're particularly concerned about the disease in

Mississippi, because the state ranks third nationally in incidence of infected herds.

To sell breeding cattle in Mississippi livestock markets or by private sale, a cattleman will have two choices to meet the regulations. First, he can have his entire herd certified free of brucellosis by completing two negative complete herd tests 10 to 14 months apart. The entire herd must be retested yearly to maintain certified free herd status.

The second choice is to have two negative tests on breeding animals the cattleman intends to sell at an interval of not less than 60 days. The tests must be performed before sale of the animals.

No tests are required for calf-hood vaccinated heifers less than 24 months old from herds of unknown status, unless they are near calving or have calved. All animals not meeting one of these requirements must be sold to slaughter or to a quarantine feedlot.

For more specifics on the brucellosis program, contact the county Extension office or your veterinarian.

Emergency Loans

If you have a 20 percent production loss in a crop because of the drought, you may qualify for an emergency loan from the Farmers Home Administration, FmHA has declared every county in the state eligible for the loans, which will be available for seven to 20 years at 5 percent interest. You have until June 29, 1981, to apply. For more information, see your FmHA LOAN OFFICER.

Chain Saw Accidents

Chain saws cause accidents when safety steps are ignored. Extension Farm Safety Specialist Dannie Reed says chain saw kickback can seriously injure the upper part of the body. The head and face are vulnerable

because the saw slips back toward the operator. Reed says avoid kickback by keeping the tip of the blade out of the cut. Also avoid small limbs and brush which can grab the blade. Reed says the best rule is to watch the saw blade tip at all times.

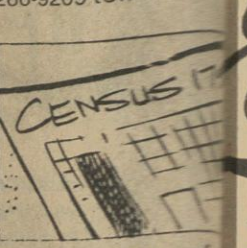
Letter To The Editor

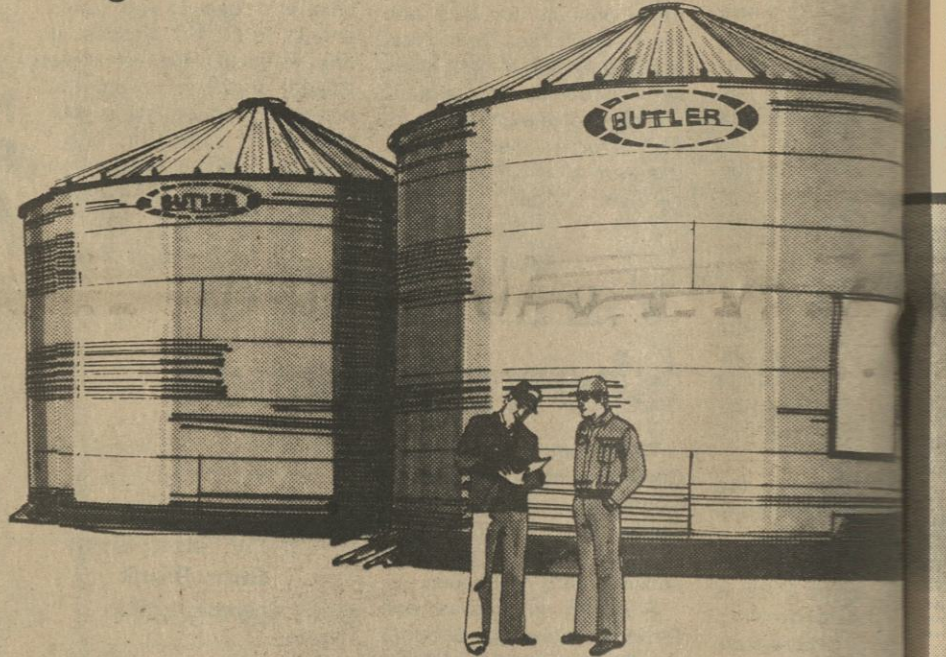

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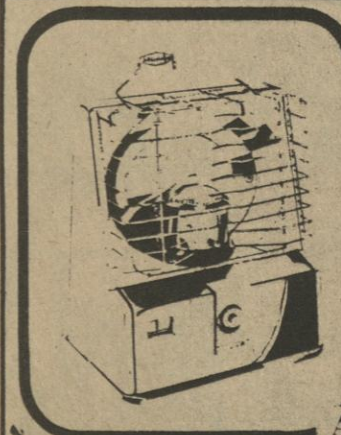


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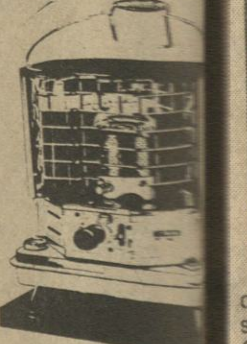

to school at Holcut, where he
was taught in the old two-
teacher school or several
grades in one room, are
among his many memories.

Mrs. Grimes (Mammie) was
one of five children of the late
Sherman and Lemmie
Walden. She lived as a very
small child in Prentiss Coun-
ty, moving to Tishomingo
County with her mother,
brothers and sister in 1917,
when her father died. Mrs.
Grimes grew up helping her
mother as did the other
children by hoeing crops for
25 a day (.35 for the grown-ups)
and sawing wood with a cross

cut saw. She attended a two
teacher school and fondly
remembers one of her
teachers, Mrs. Lela Clark.
Walking to school, carrying a
lunch bucket with molasses,
butter and cornbread, riding
in a buggy and the very scary
experience of seeing her first
car are among the memories
related by Mrs. Grimes.

The couple teamed up to
tell how they met. It seems
that it was at a singing at
Forked Oak. According to Mr.
Grimes, he and some of his
friends planned to visit a
watermelon patch after dark,
but to fill up time they

decided to attend a prayer
meeting in the early evening.
In the course of the evening
he had the privilege of taking
Miss Mammie Walden home.

This developed into a cour-
tship, and on March 7, 1926,
they were married. (Mr.
Grimes stated that he and his
friends did indeed visit the
watermelon patch after the
prayer meeting... and surely
a sweet juicy time followed.)

The Grimes lived in the
Holcut area where they both
devoted themselves to
working hard and raising their
family. Mrs. Grimes said they
rented one house for \$3.00 a
month and the rent had raised
to \$10.00 a month when they
moved eighteen years later.
During these years Mr.
Grimes worked as a farmer
and in timber - loading
cross-ties into a box car for a
penny each. He worked for
Tishomingo County for
eighteen years and also in
service stations. Because of
his love for sports and in-
terest in young people, Mr.
Grimes drove a school bus for
special activities such as ball
games and class trips.

After many, many years of
hard work, the Grimes built a
house in the mid-1970's, on the
old homestead of Mr. Grimes,
the land where he had moved
to with his parents in 1918.
They lived in their home for
about 16 years and found it
necessary to relocate the
house, as well as themselves,
because the Tombigbee
Waterway now occupies the
land. Mr. Grimes stated that
he had heard of the Tom-
bigbee all of his life and sud-
denly it became a reality to
him. The couple moved the
house to its present site and
added a spacious kitchen. In
one sense the move was a
sad experience for the
couple, as they left the spot
that held many memories for

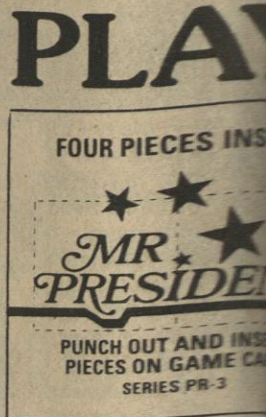

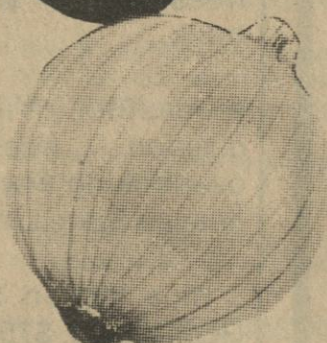

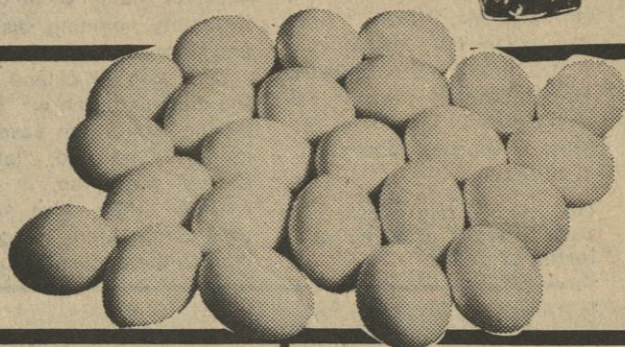

Ever since Mr. Bell's time, the Bell System has wanted to make it possible for everyone to communicate with telephone service.

South Central Bell has equipment to make using the telephone possible for hearing impaired, blind, speech impaired or paralyzed people.

Someone who's unable to hold a conventional receiver can use a Speakerphone set or a headset. For the hearing impaired, there are special bells, chimes, horns and lights to indicate the phone is ringing. Phones with adjustable volume controls aid people with speech or hearing problems.

The "Portable Communications Terminal" is a new device for the deaf or speech impaired. The terminal allows users to conduct written "conversations" with other telephone customers who have compatible instruments. The South Central Bell device is compatible with most teletypewriters (TTYs) and with other telecommunications devices for the deaf (TDDs).

An artificial larynx, developed by Western Electric Company, lets those who have lost the use of their larynx speak. It substitutes electronic vibrations for natural voice vibrations.

The list of special services for the handicapped is long and varied. If you are disabled or if you know someone who has a physical problem in using the telephone, special equipment may be the solution.

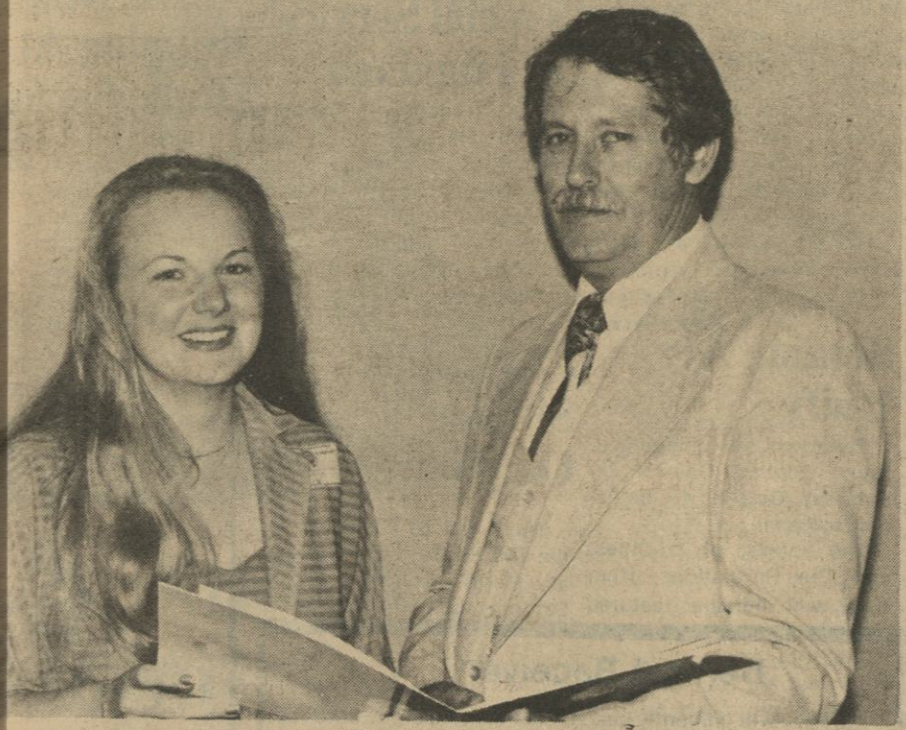

ture, as it has been some time since the children (and adults) of Iuka have had the opportunity of attending a circus on their own county fairgrounds.

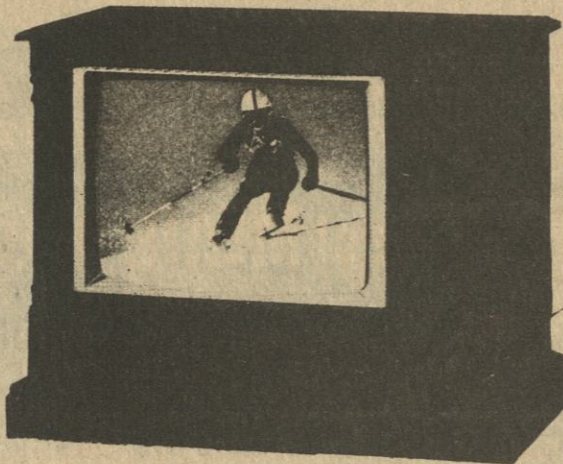

Scalp Problems

The fall months are approaching and it is the time for ticks and lice to appear in the communities and the home. This type problem may occur in any social, economic class.

Pediculi (lice) do not carry disease but they do cause itching and scratching of the scalp which may become infected. Lice may spread rapidly from person to person.

I suggest strongly that you check your children's heads at regular intervals for any signs of ticks, lice or infected sores.

There is an effective treatment for lice which consists of a shampoo.

Prevention of lice or recurrence of the problem can be obtained by boiling clothing, bedding, combs, and brushes for ten minutes. Vacuum all furniture and rugs thoroughly. Wash all clothes in hot water. Non-washable items should be treated with a disinfectant, such as R&C Spray, Black Flag, or Raid. Teach your children not to use combs, brushes, or clothing of other children. Coats and wraps should be hung where they do not touch those of other people. When one member of a family is found infested, all family members should be examined.

Lice are quite small and are a neutral color, which makes them hard to detect. The eggs (or nits) are easier to see as small specks on individual hair shafts, or along seams in clothing. When it is determined that a person is infested with lice, treatment should begin as soon as possible.

Careful Shopping Can Mean Better Meals

Stretching food dollars in these times of rising food costs is a challenge.

Careful shopping can mean a better fed family and substantial savings, says Ann O. Rushing, Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service marketing specialist. There are usually more expensive and less expensive

ways to buy almost any food. For example, we may buy chicken or ground turkey instead of beef roast or steak. Use a non-fat dry milk instead of fresh milk offers considerable savings. Carrots usually cost less than broccoli. Bread is much less expensive than fancy rolls.

"There is no department in the store where know-how counts more than in the meat department," she says. "About one-third of the food budget is spent on meat, including poultry and seafood. If you spend more than that, you may be slighting one of the other basic food groups or concentrating too much on

the more expensive cuts of meat."

Figure cost per serving. It is not the price per pound, but the price per serving that counts. If flank steak is \$2 a pound, it is still a better buy than short ribs at 69 cents a pound. You will get four servings at 50 cents each from the flank steak, but only about one serving from the short ribs at 69 cents.

Here is an easy rule of thumb for figuring servings per pound. Boneless meat yields four servings per pound. Ground meat, flank steak, stew meat, liver, boneless ham and fish fillets

are all in this category.

Bone-in meat, such as roasts, steaks and poultry, give two to three servings per pound.

Meat with substantial fat and bone provide only one to two servings per pound. It includes spare ribs, short ribs, breast of lamb, porterhouse and T-bone steaks, chicken wings or rib chops of lamb or pork.

Often meat servings are larger than necessary for good nutrition. Three ounces of cooked lean meat is the most common definition of a meat serving. The size of the serving really depends upon you and your family. Two ounces is probably a satisfactory amount for small children and many elderly persons. Teenagers may eat considerably more than three ounces.

Buy the specials. Except in time of extreme scarcities, meat is usually on special regularly and the savings are considerable. If you have a freezer and enough grocery money, you can buy enough for later use.

Use the less tender and less demanded cuts. Only about one-fourth of the carcass ends up as tender cuts, and these tender steaks and roasts get the highest prices. The remaining three-fourths of the carcass is less tender, usually lower priced, just as nutritious, but requires more time and ingenuity from the cook.

"Long slow cooking in a covered container can make any cut of meat tender," she says. "Seasonings such as onion, celery, carrots and various herbs add extra flavor. A little wine can add a nice touch."

Remember meat alternates. Eggs, cheese, cottage cheese, dry beans, peas, lentils, nuts, soybeans and peanut butter all have high protein content. When you use the vegetable proteins or nuts as meat alternates, be sure to serve them with milk, cheese or perhaps add small amounts of meat to the recipes. Vegetable protein is incomplete and needs to be supplemented with some animal protein.

Don't overlook variety meats. Beef liver is a bargain both from the nutritional and cost standpoint, heart and tongue are also nutritious and add variety to menus.

RC&D Completes Flood Prevention

The Northeast Mississippi Resource Conservation and Development Council recently announced the completion of a Flood Prevention Measure on Upper Yockanookany River in Choctaw County at Ackerman, Miss.

This flood prevention measure was adapted by the Northeast Mississippi RC&D Council in 1968 as a means of providing 100-year flood protection for the business and residential sections of Ackerman, Miss. The measure was installed in three phases over a period of

several years as funds and other resources became available and involved construction of four floodwater retarding structures and 2.2 miles of channel improvement in downtown Ackerman.

The sponsors of the measure were the city officials of Ackerman, The Choctaw County Board of Supervisors and the Choctaw County Soil and Water Conservation District Commissioners.

The sponsors provided all the land rights including relocation of the utilities, bridges, etc. The RC&D program provided \$855,325 in financial assistance plus needed technical assistance. The operation and maintenance of the flood prevention channels, floodwater retarding structures and flood plain zoning will be the responsibility of the city of Ackerman and Choctaw County.

Even though the last of the four floodwater retarding structures was not completed at the time of the great Eastern floods of 1979, the system worked as

designed and prevented major flooding of downtown Ackerman saving thousands of dollars of flood damage to homes and businesses in Ackerman and also provided some flood protection for property in towns and cities downstream.

In addition to this measure the Northeast Mississippi RC&D Council reports that during fiscal year 1980 which ended September 30, 1980 eighteen other measures were completed, eleven new measures were adopted for

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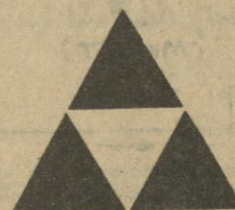

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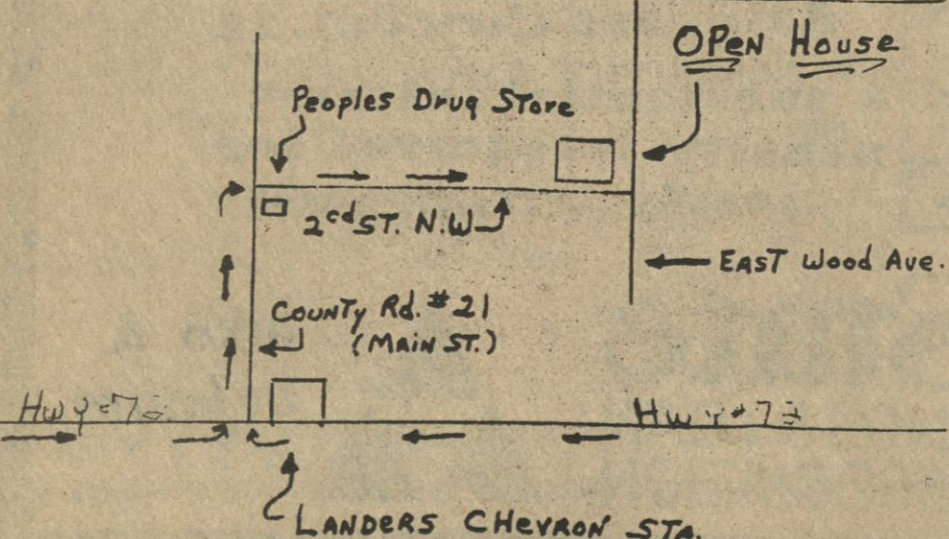
