Funds To Upgrade Substandard Housing

In response to Governor's strong appeal last during a tour of substandard housing in Mississippi, the Federal Housing Administration (FmHA) announced that \$56.2 million dollars in federal housing funds have been targeted to upgrade substandard housing in the state and provide an economic shot-in-the-arm to the state's housing construction industry.

An additional \$5 million was awarded by FmHA exclusively for housing needs in the Tennessee-Tombigbee Corridor.

Alex Mercure, Assistant Secretary of Agriculture for Rural Development, and Tom Marshall, a native Mississippian and Area Coordinator of FmHA, joined Governor Winter in announcing an accelerated first quarter allocation of \$50 million dollars for the construction of single family dwellings throughout the State.

They also announced the allocation of \$11.2 million in discretionary money for single family housing construction. Some \$5 million of this sum is targeted to alleviate the especially severe housing conditions in the 14-county Tennessee-Tombigbee Corridor. Approximately \$1.2 million of the discretionary money will fund the construction of 48 units of multi-family housing in the Hickory, Lake and Mettieton communities.

Some \$11.2 million of the funding announced was allocated to the State as a direct result of FmHA Director Cavanaugh's survey of dire housing conditions in the State last week at Governor Winter's prompting.

Winter, whose efforts to upgrade housing prospects in the State have included a low interest home financing program which was enacted by the 1980 Legislature, emphasized the importance of these FmHA grants to the task of upgrading substandard housing in the State.

Winter has identified the alleviation of Mississippi's critical housing needs as one of the primary goals of his administration. The Governor has noted that housing construction has a healthy rippling effect throughout the State's economy.

Repair Work Begins On Haynes Lake Leak

Work has officially begun on the repair of the lake bottom at Tishomingo State Park. For several years park officials have known that there was a leak in the lake bottom but were unable to do anything about it until the relief valve in the dam was located this past summer. Over a period of years the valve became buried under several feet of silt.

The draining of the lake began after the Labor Day holiday.

Aubrey Rozzell, Director of the Bureau of Recreation and Parks, Department of Natural Resources, said the nature of the soil and rock on the bottom of the lake allowed the water to run out.

"We're going to put cement grout in the rocks on the bottom, and this should stop the majority of the leaks," Rozzell explained.

For the past several years the water level has fluctuated widely with the spring and fall rains. Now the water level should be more consistent.

The work was the culmination of several weeks of planning by local, county, state and federal agencies and the private sector.

From Iuka, J.R. Long (1st American National Bank), Ted Day (1st Citizens National Bank), and Gene Jourdan (Iuka Guaranty Bank) were instrumental in working with all the groups in getting the project organized.

Supervisors Leon Cook and Max Whitehead, of Tishomingo County, were helpful in the planning, as were Representative Mack Wadkins and Senator Bill May.

Government agencies involved in the project are TVA, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, the Mississippi Department of Natural Resources, Bureau of Geology and the Tishomingo State Park staff.

Private contractors contributing labor and material to the work are Peter Kewitt, Al Johnson Contractors, Mississippi Stone and The Heil Company.

Rozzell said the

cooperation of all the parties concerned will result in a savings of several thousand dollars for the state. "Without this cooperative venture, it is likely that the repair would have resulted in having an empty lake during next summer's heavy use season," Rozzell said.

"Our plans now are to start re-filling the lake during the latter part of November, and then begin stocking the lake with fish, mainly bream and bass. We anticipate sufficient water to insure all types of recreational activities next summer," Rozzell added.

Tishomingo State Park is located three miles north of Dennis, off Mississippi Highway 25.

Nine Iuka Students Hurt In Northeast Bus Crash

Nine Northeast Mississippi Junior College students, from Iuka, suffered minor injuries Tuesday after a school bus in which they were riding hit a road grader and flipped over in a ditch on Mississippi 30 west of Tishomingo.

Highway Patrolman Bill Bingham, of Iuka, said the accident occurred at about 7:15 a.m. Monday as the bus was enroute to the junior college in Booneville.

The students, who were shaken up in the accident, were taken to Tishomingo County Hospital and released following treatment for minor cuts and bruises, he said.

Bingham said the bus driver and a teacher, who was riding in the bus, reported that the brakes failed as the bus came over a hill and attempted to pass the road grader.

The bus struck the road grader and went into the ditch after traffic, coming from the west, forced the bus driver back into the west-bound lane, said Bingham.

Damage to the bus, which was carrying about 20

passengers, included a broken window on the driver's side, a dented right front fender and damage to the left side of the vehicle.

Bingham said the accident is under investigation to determine what caused the brakes to malfunction.

Helpful Hints For Meat Cookery

With about 33 percent of the food dollar spent on meat, consumers need to be aware of the best procedures for cooking meats. One of the most fundamental points in meat cookery is to know the nature of the cut and the proper procedure to use in cooking.

The meat from young animals (baby beef or veal) and from the least exercised muscles of more mature animals (cuts from the rib, short loin and sirloin) contains only a small amount of connective tissue and is ten-

der. Dry heat methods of cooking such as pan frying, broiling and oven roasting are used. Less tender meats from more heavily exercised muscles (cuts from the chuck, fore Shank, round and tip) contain larger quantities of connective tissue and require moist cooking to make them tender. Moist methods of cooking are pot roasting, braising and stewing.

Another hint for successful meat cookery is to salt meats toward the end of cooking. Salt retards browning and draws out natural juices if added to raw meats. When

cooking, avoid piercing the meat with a fork. Use tongs to prevent loss of juices.

When roasting meats, place them on the roasting rack fat side up so the meat is basted in its own juice. This also will keep the roast from drying out during cooking. Remember: Meat is more tender, juicy, flavorful and more uniformly cooked when cooked at low to moderate temperatures. When the roast is done, allow it to stand 15 to 20 minutes before carving, and carve across the grain.

The most accurate guide for determining the degree of doneness of a cut of meat, particularly a roast, is by using a meat thermometer. The meat thermometer eliminates the guesswork. Cooking time is often used, but at best it is only an estimate. Cooking time may be used for broiled meats or for braised cuts and stews and other meats cooked in liquid. Tenderness commonly is measured in the latter by inserting a fork into the meat.

Clean The Bathroom

A clean bathroom is appreciated by the entire family, but to keep it orderly and reasonably clean is a constant task and requires the cooperation of every family member. Since all members use it, each occupant should be expected to help keep it clean for the next person who uses it.

Daily cleaning can keep the bathroom acceptably clean, but extra cleaning is needed weekly.

Once a week take time to: clean the toilet bowl. Use a disinfectant or bleach. Clean outside of toilet and water closet.

wash tub enclosure and tub. Disinfectant may be used.

clean lavatory, faucets, counter tops.

clean mirrors, windows and other glass surfaces.

The medicine cabinet needs an occasional cleaning, too. Discard out-of-date, unused or unknown medicines.

Clean woodwork, then floors. Replace bathmats and towels with clean ones.

Apple Salad

2 cups diced, unpeeled red apples
1/2 cup bottled French dressing
4 ripe bananas
1 can (11 oz.) mandarin oranges
1/2 cup white seeded grapes
1/2 cup black seed grapes
1 cup mayonnaise
1/2 cup dairy sour cream

Drop diced apples into French dressing. Slice bananas into French dressing. Drain oranges; add with grapes. Toss to be sure fruits are well coated with dressing. Chill; drain. Combine mayonnaise with sour cream, add fruits and toss lightly. Serves 4.

County Agents Notes

Lime Time Now

Is your farm among the 2.6 million acres of Mississippi cropland that needs lime? The only way to be sure is to run a soil test.

Last year, Mississippi farmers used about 900,000 tons of lime. More than twice that amount is needed annually for top production potential, however. Lime is the one

blue-chip investment that gives the greatest return for each dollar spent.

Fall is the best time to apply lime for row cropland. This will give the liming material plenty of time to react with the soil and benefit next spring's crops.

Soil testing is a free service of the Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service. For details, contact the County Extension Office.

Evaluate Fields

During harvest, make a note of fields with obvious problem areas. These may include special weed problems, drainage problems and other situations that may require follow-up soil testing, fertilization or tillage treatments. From your notes, you can develop maps for field-by-field evaluations of production problems, causes and solutions. You'll have all winter to plan and correct the problems.

Cover Crops

October and November are excellent times to establish wild winter peas, vetch or cereals for winter cover and a green manure crop to turn under next spring. Peas or vetch will add organic matter plus 40 to 60 pounds of nitrogen per acre. Cereal crops like wheat and rye provide organic matter only.

These green manure crops build organic matter only temporarily, but they may be of great value in improving herbicide performance and soil tilth in the following growing season.

Cattle Rustling

Cattle rustling is generally associated with the Old West, but it still continues today. Extension Livestock Specialist, Dr. Bill Swoope, says fall and winter are the seasons when most cattle get lost or are stolen. He says many cattlemen run their cattle on stalk fields, and the cattle can stray off easily. Lost or stolen cattle are hard to identify unless they are marked with a tattoo or brand. Dr. Swoope says you should keep accurate records of your livestock and register your brand with the livestock theft bureau of the Mississippi Highway Patrol.

Farmers in Tishomingo County are advised that the County ASCS Office is now receiving nominations for candidates for ASC Community Committee. Dear Mr. Editor:

I would like to bring out some of the issues in the upcoming election on November 4, 1980. Not the men personally, not who look the best or who can make the best speeches, but what the people of this country will have to live with for the next four years.

How many times has something happened that you couldn't explain the purpose, so you say God must have some good reason. Have you ever thought it might be For Christ's Sake.

For Christ's Sake, we are to forgive. Ephesians 4:32 - "... Forgiving one another, even as God For Christ's Sake hath forgiven you." How many times Peter asked in Matthew 18:21-22. Not seven times but seventy times seven.

For Christ's Sake, we are to serve one another. Paul states in II Corinthians 4:5 - "Ourselfes your servants for Christ's sake." I Corinthians 9:19 - "For though I be free from all men, yet have I made myself servant unto all, that I might gain the more. To the weak because I am weak: I am made all things to all men, that I might by all means save some. And this I do for the gospel's sake, that I might be partaker thereof with you."

For Christ's Sake, we are to take pleasure in afflictions. II Corinthians 12:7 - "And lest I

should be exalted above measure through the abundance of the revelations, there was given to me a thorn in the flesh, the messenger of Satan to buffet me, lest I should be exalted above measure. 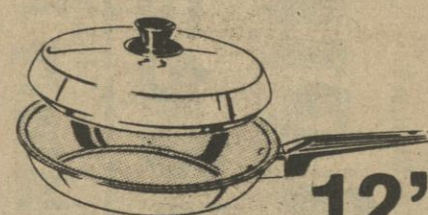

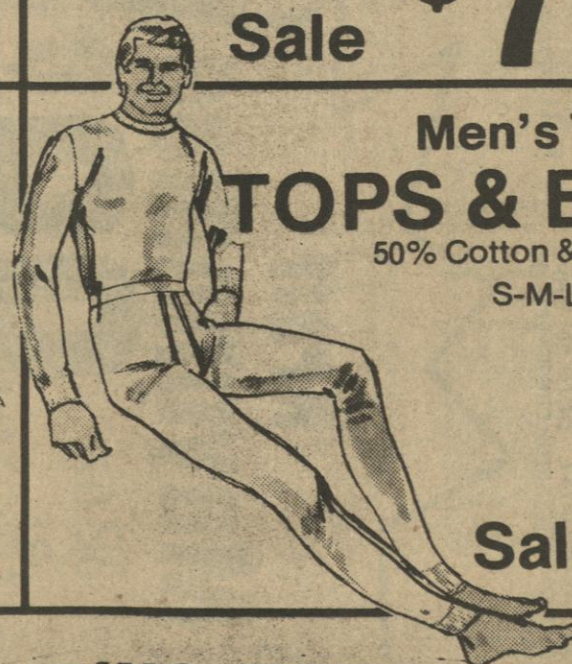
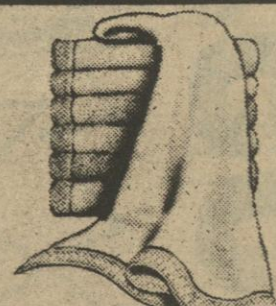

Mr. & Mrs. Ed Thorne

The large, gray farm house Mr. and Mrs. Ed Thorne sits in a picturesque setting with a spacious, well cared yard and colorful trees in the near-by woods. The Snowdown Road home also has hints of yesteryears with a well and well house, smoke house, barn and some old preserved pieces of antique furniture inside the house.

The home, occupied by the lovely Thorne couple, both of whom are Tishomingo County residents, is fortunate, if a house can be fortunate. The Thorne's built the house and they are the only family to live in it. Mrs. Thorne said at one time Mr. Thorne was working in the Dennis area and they considered moving. In fact they went so far as to begin packing furniture. Some of the pieces of furniture wouldn't fit into the moving vehicle, so they just unpacked and she and the family stayed at home while Mr. Thorne completed his job.

Mrs. Ed Thorne (known to everyone as Dodie) is one of ten children of the late Ed and Rebecca Dexter Tigner. Miss Dodie grew up near the Tennessee River in the area that is now J.P. Coleman Park. She has one brother still living at this time, Jake Tigner, of Memphis, Tenn.

Relating memories of her childhood seemed to thrill Miss Dodie. She went to school at Short Creek, which is a one teacher school, but later became a two teacher school. Mr. Rob Grisham was the last teacher she had, during her years as a child,

square dance where they met was at the home of Mr. Will Long near Rocky Springs. According to them the dances were held in homes and the beds were taken down and furniture moved out of the way, the fiddler and banjo player furnished the music and folks had a good time. The dances occasionally lasted all night. Mr. Leash Kirk and Mr. Ellis Walker are remembered by the Thorne's as being excellent musicians. Mrs. Thorne added that she and Mr. Thorne also attended her church during these days.

In 1921 the couple were married and began to make their home at the same place they now live. (Their first home burned but they rebuilt using the same chimney.) Mr. Thorne supported his family by farming and working at a sawmill. The sawmill job, as were many jobs in that day, was from daylight until dark, for \$1.00 a day. During their beginning years they became the parents of two sons, R.K. (Dieder) and Jack Thorne. Other jobs for Mr. Thorne have been building roads (he was foreman working for Elmer Gravette in 1930 when the overhead bridge on Old Hwy. 25, a dirt road at the time, was built). He drove a school bus for 25 years, driving for both Snowdown and luka, retiring in 1961. He also drove one of the TVA

buses to furnish transportation for all the shift working on Pickwick Dam (at this time the boys were old enough to drive the school bus to help their Dad out). Mr. Thorne mentioned Mr. Filmore Curtis as a passenger on the TVA bus and recalling school students that rode his bus he mentioned Celeste (Shackelford) Lomenick, Army Haines, Melvin, Polly, Christine and Helen Clark and L.D. Daugherty.

Mr. Thorne managed the Snowdown Baseball Team for about two years. Mrs. Thorne made suits for the team and was score keeper. They went as far as Red Bay, Ala. to play and the team rode in a dump truck and carried a tarpaulin in case of rain. Team members were: D.S. Daugherty, Roy Maxwell, Jack Thorne, Woodrow Cornelison, Bob Brown, Clinton Dexter, Pinky Pruitt, Shorty Deaton and William Ernest Helton.

The Thorne's have realized the values of a couple sharing their interests and they have been involved in all of each other's interests -- that is -- almost. Mrs. Thorne loves to fish. Mr. Thorne does not, but he still participates in his wife's hobby by helping to eat the catch. Other hobbies of the two are sports, especially baseball, and their favorite team is the Cincinnati Reds. Mr. Thorne is busy with the

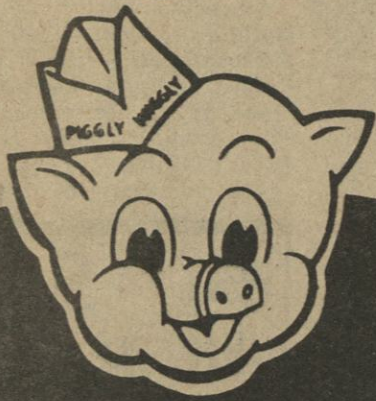

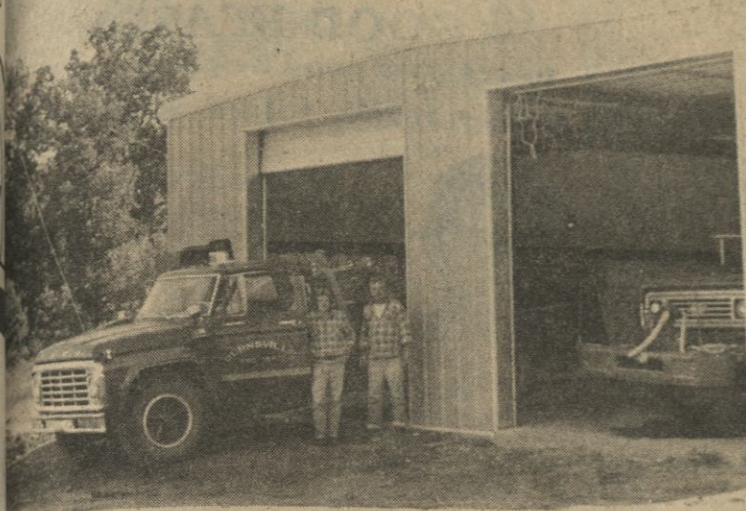

Have you bought some sugar recently? Some of us remember doing with sugar in the days of the Depression, but it was scarce and not high.

Sugar is a habit to which we are all accustomed. Other sweetening agents are honey, molasses, corn syrup and maple syrup. We only have to adjust our habits and revise our recipes. Total calories in 1 teaspoon of sweetening varies as follows: cane sugar, 100 calories; honey, 70; molasses, 65; corn syrup, 70; maple syrup, 65. Honey does 2 1/2 times the work of sugar and provides greatest nourishment.

Dredge raisins and nuts in 1 T. flour and add. Then fold in beaten egg whites. Bake in loaf pan in slow oven 250° for 2 hours or until straw comes out clean.
