Iuka Woman Charged In Shooting

An Iuka man was reportedly shot Saturday night by his estranged wife, a Corinth police official reported.

James Lee Lambert is listed in satisfactory condition at the North Mississippi Medical Center in Tupelo, according to a family spokesman. The police report confirmed that the man's former wife, Kathryn D. Lambert, of Route 1, Iuka, has been charged with aggravated assault and possession of a concealed weapon in connection with the shooting. Mrs. Lambert is free on \$10,000 bond, which was set by Fourth District Court Judge, Bobby Mitchell, the report said.

According to the family spokesman, the shooting occurred in the Red Carpet Lounge parking lot in Corinth around midnight on Saturday night. Lambert is believed to have been shot twice, the spokesman said, once in the throat and once in the shoulder area by a .32 caliber revolver.

He was taken to Magnolia Hospital in Corinth and then transferred to North Mississippi Medical Center in Tupelo, according to hospital reports.

TVA To Discontinue Interest Free Loans

TVA General Manager Bill Willis said today that TVA will not make interest-free loans for insulation available to new homes receiving initial electric service after June 1, 1981.

"We have discovered what may be a loophole in our Home Insulation Program where builders may be tempted to construct new homes without insulation, knowing that the homeowner can obtain the insulation later with an interest-free loan," Willis said. "This is not the intent of our program."

Willis said he was making the announcement today so that home builders, real estate agents, and home buyers would be immediately aware of this change in the program. He said that homes connected prior to June 1, 1981, would not be affected by this change.

TVA's Home Insulation Program, begun in August 1977, offers a free energy survey and loan to homeowners to retrofit their homes with attic insulation, storm windows, floor insulation, and other measures. As of October 31, 280,000 homes had been surveyed and 122,500 customers had received loans under the program.

Annual Report Released By Tishomingo County Soil And Water Conservation District

Annual Report FY 1980

The Tishomingo County Soil and Water Conservation District Commissioners would like to present their Annual Report to the people of Tishomingo County.

The District Commissioners sponsored many activities during the fiscal year 1980. Among the most significant accomplishments were:

1. Developed and carried out a work plan for the fiscal year 1980.

2. Developed a Long Range Program of Objectives for the district over the next ten years. This program of objectives was prepared in booklet form and should be available to the public by January 1 of the new year.

3. Sponsored "Tree Plan-

ting Week" on February 4-8 in which 1600 Tishomingo County School Children received trees to plant and more than 10,000 seedlings were planted that week.

4. Conducted annual drive for membership in the Mississippi Association of Conservation Districts.

5. Paid state and national association dues.

6. Sponsored a Beaver Control Seminar and trapping demonstration.

7. Co-sponsored, with Chevron Chemical Company and Extension Service a conservation tour looking primarily at different conservation tillage systems, on July 17.

8. Sponsored and participated in Soil Stewardship Week in May.

9. Cooperated with the Soil

Conservation Service to provide technical assistance to 657 cooperators, assisted 151 cooperators apply one or more conservation practices, and developed soil and water conservation plans for 4,950 acres.

10. Worked with the ASCS County Committee to develop county agricultural cost-share program. The SCS cooperated in the program by providing technical assistance to landowners who signed up for conservation practices such as ponds, terraces, and diversions. In 1980 SCS serviced referrals for 59 practices.

11. The district was represented at the Area and State Associations of Conservation Districts.

12. The District Commissioners provided half

scholarships for three local teachers to attend the "Teachers Environmental Education Workshop" at the Tupelo Branch of the University of Mississippi. The following response was from one of the teachers who attended the workshop:

"I wish to express my gratitude for the scholarship your agency provided me.

I realize the importance of conservation and preservation of our natural resources and have always taught this in my classroom. After this course I will be able to do a much better job of helping students to understand their environment and their role in it.

I think it would be very beneficial to our county if the scholarship program could be extended so more teachers could take advantage of it and in turn help to educate a generation that would be more knowledgeable about the problems and solutions of their environment."

13. The district commissioners met on a bi-monthly basis for business meetings.

The Tishomingo County Soil and Water Conservation District Commissioners would like to thank the USDA Soil Conservation Service for providing technical assistance to carry out many of the conservation practices over the past year; to the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service for providing cost-share assistance to install conservation practices; the Cooperative Extension Service for conducting an information and education program that keeps our farmers up to date on new agricultural trends and activities; the Farmers Home Administration for providing soil and water conservation loans to cooperators; the Mississippi Forestry Commission for providing valuable assistance to our woodland landowners in the form of fire protection, tree planting, forest management, and disease control; the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors who provided financial support for our programs; and finally we would like to thank the people of Tishomingo County who have worked and cooperated with us to promote the conservation and wise use of our natural resources.

Iuka Teenager Victim Of Gunshot Accident

Iuka young people as well as parents have been saddened at the onset of this Thanksgiving Season by the death of a 16-year old member of the Iuka High School tenth grade.

Mark Anthony Turbeville, 16-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Don Turbeville, of Route 2, Iuka, died Saturday evening as the result of an accidental gunshot he received at the home of a friend.

According to reliable sources, Mark arrived at the home of Mr. & Mrs. Roy (Bill) Bolton, Snowdown Road, around 6 p.m. on Saturday to meet Mark Bolton, a friend. While

waiting in the living room, some of the members of the Bolton family returned from deer hunting. While inspecting a .22 caliber revolver pistol, that a member of the hunting party had, the gun discharged hitting Mark Turbeville. Sources said the fatal wound was sustained in the left upper chest.

Mark was transported to the Tishomingo County Hospital by car where he died shortly after arriving at about 7:00 p.m.

Services for Mark were at 1:00 p.m. on Monday, November 24, at Cutshall Funeral Home Chapel with Reverend Joe Moyers officiating. Burial

was in the Douthitt Cemetery in Alabama.

Survivors other than his parents include two sisters, Cindy Turbeville, of the home, Terri Turbeville, of Phoenix, Ariz.; his paternal grandmother, Mrs. Mary Alice Turbeville, of Iuka.

Palbearers were: Robert Locke, Jerry Locke, Ricky Welch, Billy Joe Moore, Thomas Walker, Jeff Hazelwood, and Mark Bolton.

The staff of The Tishomingo County News extends their sympathy to the Turbeville family and feel a personal loss. Mark was a former summer employee of The News Office.

Chatting With Your Home Economist

Solving Lint Problems

Do you have trouble with lint on freshly laundered clothes? This is a common complaint, particularly on dark items.

There are five reasons why lint clings to clothes: improper sorting, overloading the washer and dryer, using insufficient amounts of water, over-drying and, in some instances, using too little detergent.

Probably the most common cause is improper sorting. Who has not, accidentally or otherwise, included lint "givers" in the same wash with lint "attractors"? Lint "givers" are the overloaded facial tissue in a pocket, towels, flannel items and bathmats. Lint attractors are the dark items, corduroy, linens and man-made fabrics.

Separate the "givers" and "attractors" when you wash. Wash heavy linters like chenille bedspreads separately. Dark items should not be tossed in with a load of

lighter colors. By washing separately, there is less chance of lint being transferred from one item to the other.

Too many clothes in the washer prevent the free movement of the clothes and the flushing away of the lint. Man-made fabrics that are dried too long draw lint because of the static build up, so be careful not to over-dry.

Detergents hold the lint and dirt in suspension. Some of this ability is lost in detergents with a lower percentage of phosphate. If you are using a detergent with a low phosphate level, check the package label for amounts to use. Water in Mississippi is fairly soft, so this may not be a problem.

Certain man-made fibers tend to pile, and lint collects on the piled surface. It is difficult to remove.

store commercially canned products? Canned products have an indefinite shelf life if the can remains unopened and is not bulged or leaking. If you plan to keep canned items for a long time, store them in a dry area at moderately cool temperatures. Storage in a moist area causes cans to rust and decompose, which results in leakage. Never use canned foods that show signs of spoilage, such as seeping liquid, an off-odor or mold. Don't even taste foods with these signs.

Baked Mustard Chicken

(Easy Dish with a Real Tang)
2 broiler-fryer chickens, quartered
2 teaspoons salt
1/2 cup prepared mustard
2 tablespoons water
2 tablespoons salad oil
1 teaspoon dried leaf thyme
1/4 teaspoon ginger

Sprinkle chicken on both sides with salt. Place skin side up in foil-lined shallow baking pan. Mix together mustard, vinegar, water, salad oil, thyme and ginger. Spoon over chicken. Bake in 375° F. oven 50 to 60 minutes. Makes 8 servings.

County Agents Notes

Soybean Seed

While we can expect an overall shortage of soybean seed next spring, this may not hold true for all varieties. Of our most widely planted varieties, Forrest and Bedford are in the most trouble. A shortage of seed beans in other southern states complicates matters. Some of our widely popular varieties like Bragg may be shipped out of state.

The quality of most early varieties -- Hill, Forrest, Bedford, etc. -- does not look good. You can expect a lot of "substandard for germination" seed tags issued this winter. Fungicidal treatments can help improve germination, and we may need to consider this approach more than in a normal year. But keep in mind that fungicides can't change "bad" seed into "good" seed.

I've heard a lot of questions this year about farmers saving their soybean seed. Soybeans are self pollinated. There is little cross

pollination, even when two varieties are planted side by side. So, it is perfectly acceptable to save seed year after year as long as they are not mixed mechanically with another variety.

If you save your seed, you may want to come by the County Extension Office for copies of printed materials on soybean seed. Ask for Information Sheets 868, 1064 and 1062.

Crop Survey

The Mississippi Crop and Livestock Reporting Service is gathering information on acreage and production of crops grown in 1980. More than 20,000 state farmers will receive questionnaires the last week in November.

Crop production accounted for 57 percent of the state's cash farm income in 1979. Because of this importance, the results of this survey needs to be as accurate as possible. If you receive a questionnaire, please fill it out completely and return it promptly.

State statisticians will use the findings of the survey, together with other surveys, to determine county, state and national crop estimates for 1980. All information on

individual farms is kept confidential.
A report will be published on January 14, 1981.

Clean Up Your Garden

Clean up your garden site and get it ready for next year as soon as you finish producing vegetables this fall. Extension Horticulturist, Dr. Milo Burnham, says remove dead plants or turn them under to add organic matter to the soil. Remove diseased plants, such as tomatoes that have early blight. Don't add diseased plants to your compost pile because they can create problems. Take a soil sample this fall so it can be tested at the Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service. Results will tell you what nutrients your soil needs for a healthy garden next year.

Weather Prediction

Near normal temperatures and above normal rainfall are predicted for mid-November through mid-December, according to the Mississippi Weather Outlook distributed by the Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service.

Daily high temperatures during this period are expected to range from the mid-60s to the mid-50s in northern Mississippi and from near 70 degrees to near 60 degrees in the south, say agrometeorologists who prepare the forecasts at the Mid-South Farm Weather Service in Stoneville. Northern lows drop from the low 40s to the low 30s and southern lows from the mid to upper 40s to near 40 degrees.

Mr. and Mrs. Mark McKee (Nettie), a well-known and respected couple, of Rutledge Salem Community, are happy to share a part of their memories at this Thanksgiving Season.

Mrs. Nettie (Cox) McKee is the oldest child of the late and Datha (Rast) Cox's seven children. Her brothers are: Mrs. Clara Greenwood, Frank Cox, Mrs. Jess Page, Felix Cox, and Mrs. Susie Rast. Mrs. Bessie McKee, Mrs. Nathan Cox and Mrs. Lorine Blackard. All are still living.

Mr. McKee was born July 1896, in Lawrence County, Tennessee. In 1900 she and family moved to Rutledge Salem Community in Tishomingo County where they still live. As a child she and her parents in the area and became a very

good cook at an early age. She began cooking meals for the entire family when she was ten years old.

Mrs. Nettie attended the one room Salem Community School, and Mr. Doc Oaks, from the Spring Hill Community, was the teacher. She is a member of the Rutledge Salem Methodist Church, where she was very active until age and health forced her to give up many of her activities. She still attends when her health permits.

Mr. McKee, the son of the late Robert (Bob) and Georgia Ann (Moody) McKee, was born on August 3, 1904, and is a life-long resident of Tishomingo County. He had eight brothers and sisters. Only one sister is living, Mrs. Sadie Cox. Mr. Mark told us that his father bought 150 acres for \$150.00. That seems like a little now, he

said, "but at that time one hundred fifty dollars was a great deal of money." As a boy he worked hard in the fields and has always enjoyed hunting and fishing. He attended the Salem Community School when Mrs. Bonnie Bickerstaff was the teacher. He paused for a moment, then laughed, and said, "We might not have learned a lot about reading and writing, but we did learn respect, obedience and a lot about caring for other people."

Mark and Nettie were married on March 15, 1925. They had an outside ceremony on the Cripple Deer Bridge in the Salem Community by Justice of the Peace John Page. They have been happily married for 55 years, and have four daughters, Mavis Pruitt, Mavis Shook, Ollie Nell McKee and Rubine Clark. Ten

grandchildren, thirteen great-grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

In 1949, Mr. and Mrs. McKee moved back to the farm her family had bought when they first settled in Tishomingo County and back into the house she, as a child, had helped her father build.

As their children were growing up, fishing and picnics on the creek bank were the main recreation, but occasionally someone would have a pound supper. Mrs. McKee explained that a pound supper was where all the neighbors gathered at one house and carried a pound of something to eat and everyone enjoyed supper together. Square dancing was also enjoyed.

Their children looked forward to making molasses each year. When sorghum was ready, Mr. John McDougal brought his sorghum mill to Mr. Tolbert Rutledge's farm where everyone in the community gathered to make their fall molasses.

The community grocery store was operated by Mr. Burnard Millford, and eggs sold for a penny each. Then in later years, Mr. Bostick filled his wagon, hooked up the mule, and called himself a peddler. Once a week Mrs. McKee traded eggs and chickens to the peddler for food they could not grow.

The family took the mules and wagon and went into Iuka each spring and each fall to buy needed clothing. Dr. Noonan Waldrup was the doctor who took care of the Rutledge Salem Community, so there was rarely any reason to go to town.

As we discussed the weather, Mr. McKee said he could remember snows that would stay on the ground for weeks at a time.

The McKees have lived full, busy lives. They have given a great deal of themselves to helping others and their community. They've never really wanted for anything, because, according to them, "If you have your health and

the Lord on your side the rest is up to you." They are now just enjoying life and its many blessings as they come, day by day.

For the McKee couple, Thanksgiving is not limited to the 4th Thursday in November, but is a daily part of living. Many great lessons are learned about living just by watching the lives of such people as the McKees.

Mrs. McKee shared some of the recipes she has used for many years:

Old Fashion Vinegar Cobbler Pie

1/2 cup vinegar
1 1/2 cups water
1 cup sugar
1/2 cup margarine

Mix ingredients. Make up dough like dumplings and place on top of liquid ingredients, push down adding more dumplings and cook on top of stove until dumplings are done. A top crust may be added and cobbler baked in oven to brown top crust.

Sweet Potato Pie

2 cups creamed sweet potatoes

1 1/2 cups sugar
1/2 stick margarine
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 cup sweet milk
3 eggs

Mix all ingredients and pour into unbaked pie shell. Bake at 375° for 30 minutes.

Egg Custard

3 eggs slightly beaten
2 cups sweet milk
1/2 cup sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla
Dash of nutmeg
Dash of salt

Combine ingredients, pour into pie crust, bake at 400° for 50 to 60 minutes.

'Fowl Language'

Television has had a tremendous impact on the English language. The computer age and even Watergate brought a whole new list of words and phrases into everyday use.

But, of all the outside influences on our language, the poultry and egg industry probably has made the most enduring contribution.

Joe Shipp, president of the Mississippi Poultry Association, lists 18 phrases he says are mainstays of modern American usage.

For instance, what does the supervisor do who successfully manages to keep his workers at their tasks?

According to Shipp's dictionary of "fowl" language, he "rules the roost."

The man who never totals his business profits before the final tallies are in, "never counts his chickens before they hatch."

When one farmer has a crop that outyields his neighbor, he "has something to crow about."

A husband who is nagged by his wife, is "henpecked."

How do your children feel when it has been raining for three days and they can't get outside? "Cooped up."

How many people have worked for an inadequate salary and called it "chicken feed"?

When people save for the future, they usually "store up a nest egg."

The company president yells at the vice president who yells at the secretary and

soon you learn the "pecking order" around the office.

When crooks meet late at night and plan robberies, they usually "hatch a plot."

When your prize joke fails to bring a laugh, you have "laid an egg."

A big mistake made in life usually "comes home to roost."

The tour leader who keeps his group close by is called a "mother hen."

The man who thinks deeply and darkly about his bad circumstances is "brooding."

In these inflationary times, people who are having a tough time with their budgets are "scratching out a living."

The buy in the office with the rough personality and tough hide is often "hard-boiled."

When you are faced with introducing an untactful friend to other friends, you often are found to be "walking on eggs."

How do you tell your stock broker that you don't want him investing your money in

one enterprise? "Don't put all my eggs in one basket."

Finally, Shipp's fowl language dictionary lists at least one biblical admonition. "Which came first, the chicken or the egg?" To clarify the philosophy, Shipp suggests reading Genesis 1:19-24.

"People who can get all the poultry-related phrases correct have 'something to crow about,'" Shipp said. "Those who get two-thirds correct are up with everyone else, but those who get less than one-third correct, 'better start getting up with the chickens.'"

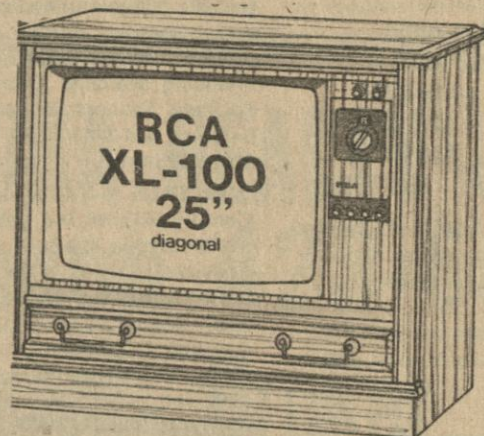

Southern Flank Games Set Record

More than 200,000 NATO
troops have been taking part
in an annual series of major

Cranberries At Peak

There's no real reason to buy cranberries now for use during the next few weeks, except that money-saving specials usually are offered just before Thanksgiving and Christmas.

Early season freshness of cranberries is a point in favor of making quantity purchases of cranberries in November and December, says Ann Rushing, Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service marketing specialist. When cranberries first reach retail markets, they are firm, bright and bouncy.

High quality fresh cranberries vary in size, color and shape, depending on variety. They may be oval or round and light orangy-red to deep crimson. The quality signs that should not vary are plumpness, firmness, dryness and smoothness of the shiny berries. Those that are soft, shriveled and dull have passed their peak.

"If you use cranberries all

year, it's good to buy and freeze the year's supply by mid-January, since fresh cranberries are not available all year," she says. "If they're truly fresh when purchased, it is not necessary to freeze them immediately. Their natural acidity acts against spoilage, and they keep well for two to three weeks in tightly closed containers in the refrigerator. At zero degrees, properly packaged frozen cranberries keep top quality for a year or more."

Cranberries require no special treatment for freezing other than proper wrapping. Instructions on some packages suggest freezing as purchased, but sorting and washing them before freezing increases their convenience for later use. For some purposes, even cranberries to be used immediately are improved by freezing.

"Unfrozen cranberries drip a great deal of juice when chopped in a food grinder or blender. Hard frozen ones do not drip if ground quickly," she says.

To make or buy whole cranberry sauce is more a

matter of preference than economy of time or money. To make cranberry sauce by directions on the package takes little time or skill, and saves only pennies per cup.

Compare prices on canned sauce and ingredients needed to prepare it from the fresh cranberries, she suggests.
