Master Builders of Corinth Awarded Contract By Iuka Aldermen For Renovation Work

Master Builders of Corinth, Inc., of Corinth, Miss., has been awarded a \$112,000 contract by Iuka Aldermen for renovation work on the Iuka City Hall.

The building, located between the First American Bank and the Southern Railway tracks, was purchased by the city in November, and when completed it

will be a modern, colonial style city hall, city officials said. The plans call for the structure of 6,336 square feet to house the city government offices, the Iuka Police and Fire Department, and will contain an 81-seat auditorium, having a raised stage area to be used for board and town meetings.

Recreational Site For Burnsville

According to a letter received by Burnsville's Mayor, A.T. Marlar, from Charles B. Hooper, Chief, Real Estate Division, Department of the Army, the proposed lease to the Town of Burnsville of 142.64 acres of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway Project for recreational purposes has been approved and executed on behalf of the Government. Two archaeological sites have been discovered in the lease area. According to the letter, the Nashville District has nominated these sites to be included in the National Register of Historic Places, but whether the State of Mississippi will agree and place them on the Register is not known. If the sites should be eligible for the National Register, the lease may need to be amended to protect these areas further, and the Town of Burnsville would be responsible for their mitigation.

Arson Fires Destroy Barns, Hay and Vacant Houses

Tishomingo County Sheriff Amos Bates said a rash of arson fires were set north of Iuka on Sunday evening, December 7, burning barns, vacant houses and hay in one

open field in the communities of Harmony, New Salem, Rocky Springs, Patrick and on the Cagle Road, all within a 10 mile radius. The first act of destruction was reported

to the Sheriff's Department at approximately 8:00 p.m., and within a short period of time the other fires were started.

Sheriff Bates reported that his department received a call at approximately 8:00 p.m.

reporting large bales of hay burning on the Robert Akers farm in the Harmony Community. Sheriff Bates said about 20 bales of hay was in the field and tractors were used to quickly move the bales from the fire. Three large bales were destroyed.

During the attempts to extinguish the blaze at the Akers farm, fire was set to the Dr. Bostick vacant farm house in the New Salem Community.

The next arson fire occurred, the sheriff believes, only minutes later at the Edgar Hannon barn on Cagle Road. The barn contained lumber and hay, which was destroyed in the blaze.

The Eston McCollough barn was the next site of destruction of the arson chain. The McCollough barn, located in the Rocky Springs Community, contained 200 bales of hay and crushed feed.

The vacant house of the late Mr. Finch Grisham, located in the Patrick Community, was the last to be burned. The house contained some furniture and household items.

Sheriff Bates said the fires were set so quickly that fire fighters could not get to a fire in time to save the building nor its contents. "We have several good leads," Sheriff Bates said, "and investigation of the destructive fires will continue."

There were no injuries reported from the fires and several people assisted in controlling the blazes: The Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department, First District Fire Department, County Foresters, Game Warden and Tennessee River Pulp and Paper.

According to reliable sources, a rash of fires of this nature occurred last fall affecting some of the same people as the recent destruction.

Cherokee Man Kills Ex-Wife, Shoots Self

Route 3, Cherokee, man recently shot and killed his wife and then turned the gun on himself Sunday afternoon, according to Colbert County Sheriff Buddy Aldridge.

John E. Hicks, Jr., 30, apparently shot his ex-wife, Mrs. Nora Cornelius Hicks, Route 1, Cherokee, Sunday afternoon while she sat in a parked vehicle at High Overlook on Rose Trail in Cherokee, then shot himself, Aldridge said.

Hicks was found dead at the scene of the incident. Hicks was taken to Eliza Coffee Memorial Hospital where he died two hours later. Colbert County Coroner Jessie York ruled the incident a homicide and a self-inflicted wound.

Aldridge said an investigation is continuing with Lt. Ronnie May in charge.

Mrs. Hicks was a graduate of Cherokee High School, The University of North Alabama, and was a second grade teacher at Cherokee.

Funeral services for Martha Cornelius Hicks were at 2 p.m. Tuesday at Margerum United Methodist Church.

She is survived by two children, Alison Hicks, age 3, and Gregory Hicks, age 5; her parents, Mr. and Mrs. W.D. Cornelius; one sister, Kim Cornelius; one brother, Sonny Cornelius; and her grandfather, Fred Malone, all of Margerum.

Boxcar - Automobile Collide, Injures One

Burning Boxcar At Scene Of Accident

An Iuka woman is listed in stable condition at Tishomingo County Hospital following a freak car-train accident in Iuka on Tuesday night, December 9.

According to Mr. Floyd Whitaker, Iuka Fire Chief, his department received a call at approximately 7:30 p.m. alerting the department that a boxcar on a Southern Railway train was burning. According to Chief Whitaker, the fire had been spotted in Cherokee, Ala., as the train was traveling in a westerly direction. The Cherokee Fire Department followed the train to the Oldham Crossing where the train was stopped and the Iuka and Cherokee Departments attempted to extinguish the fire. Due to a shortage of water, the departments were unable to get the fire under control. The front section of the 195 car train was disconnected at the burning boxcar and proceeded to Iuka where both departments fought the blaze for approximately three hours before the fire was extinguished. After the burning boxcar was sidetracked in

Iuka, the engine and front section attempted to backtrack to Oldham to pick up the remainder of the cars. As the train started across the Fulton Street Crossing (in front of the Old J.C. Jourdan Hardware), Mrs. Fay Poindexter, of 208 W. Quitman St., Iuka, was traveling south on Fulton Street, and according to Chief Whitaker, she apparently failed to see the flagman and approaching train. As she came upon the crossing, Mrs. Poindexter realized the train was about to hit her. She jumped from her car and was running east down the track. At this point the train struck her car and drug the car over Mrs. Poindexter. The Tishomingo County Hospital Ambulance Service was called and Mrs. Poindexter was carried immediately to the hospital. According to a hospital spokesman, Mrs. Poindexter at no time lost consciousness and is being held at the hospital for observation.

Mrs. Poindexter is an employee at Sunflower in Iuka and is the mother of three children.

After a hike to the playground and an hour of play, the group returned home - a tired but happy group.

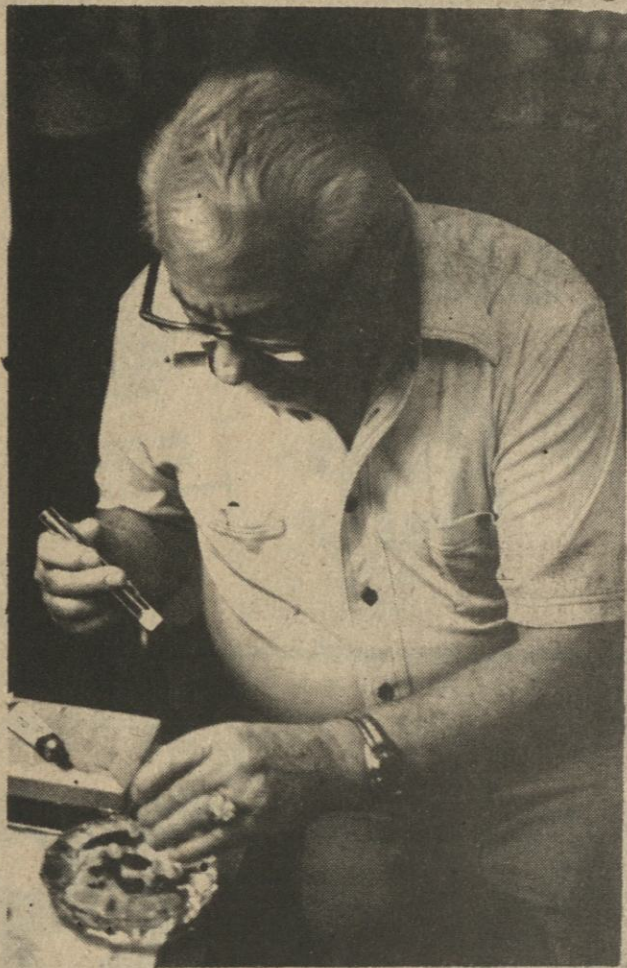

Examining Gems

During their working years in the United States and abroad, the Horace Richardsons have collected many precious

gems. Richardson examines his collection often for stones with interesting characteristics to point out to Rainbow 4-H Club members.

Gem Collectors Seek Stones And Children

Deep in the hills of northeast Mississippi, prospectors have been looking for gems as work on the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway continues.

The 4-H staff of the Tishomingo County Cooperative Extension Service found such a precious gem near Burnsville - a retired couple called the Richardsons.

As it is, the couple also seek precious gems, actually stones, that is, and human gems - those that come in the small size between the ages of 9 and 19.

When Eleanor and Horace Richardson moved to Burnsville from Flint, Michigan, three years ago, they expected to retire quietly after

working for many years in the United States and abroad. No matter what country they had lived in, Mrs. Richardson had always worked with children and soon began to miss interaction. She fell by accident into the 4-H program.

"Before moving here, I had no exposure to the 4-H program. I was lonesome for children though, and when a neighbor asked me to help with her 4-H club, I gladly agreed. Then, when her husband, who was working with the waterway, was transferred, I took the club. We now call ourselves the Rainbow 4-H Club, because we are all starting a new beginning," Mrs. Richardson said.

"I guess I'm the side kick," added Mr. Richardson. "Since

we married, she's started all sorts of projects. Since I'm a craftsman, I just go along for the ride and help with the work."

This couple's enthusiasm is catching, and now the 4-H club meets two days. Interest in the woodworking project, directed by Richardson, has increased and now demands its own day (Wednesday) for crafts. The club also meets on Thursday for a regular meeting.

Members of the Rainbow 4-H Club haunt the Richardson home every day, however, sometimes once at a time, and more often, in groups. The living room coffee table stays loaded with magazines shuffled by the young hands that eagerly search for new material. The young often come just for conversation or to look at the Richardsons' gem, antique glass or thimble collections.

"These children are a pleasure to us," the couple agreed. "And, we offer them opportunities that they might not have at home. Many young families have been forced by the economic situation to reduce magazine subscriptions and travel."

"Our home is a menagerie of articles collected throughout the United States and from countries abroad. These items offer the children a cultural education," they said. "And, we strive to make them comfortable; you accomplish more that way."

The Richardsons are willing to tackle any project. They don't believe in the word "can't"; to them, that word represents a cop-out. For this reason, they are involved not only in the 4-H program, but also serve as Sunday School teachers, training union instructors and work with the County Women's Missionary Union.

"People laugh when I tell them that Horace also attends the female functions. But, after all, we're in these projects together. Why, for the missionary prayer retreat, we squeezed 144 lemons and hauled spring water in washtubs for lemonade. I couldn't have done it without him," Mrs. Richardson said.

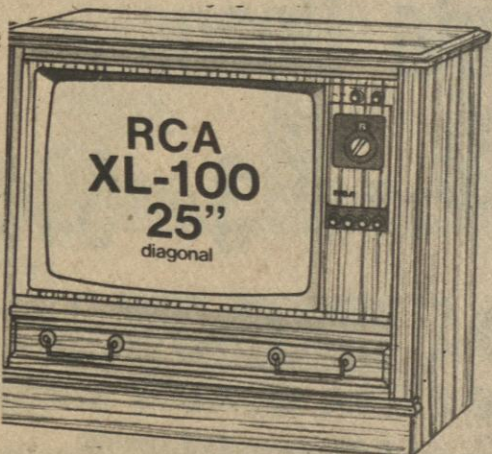

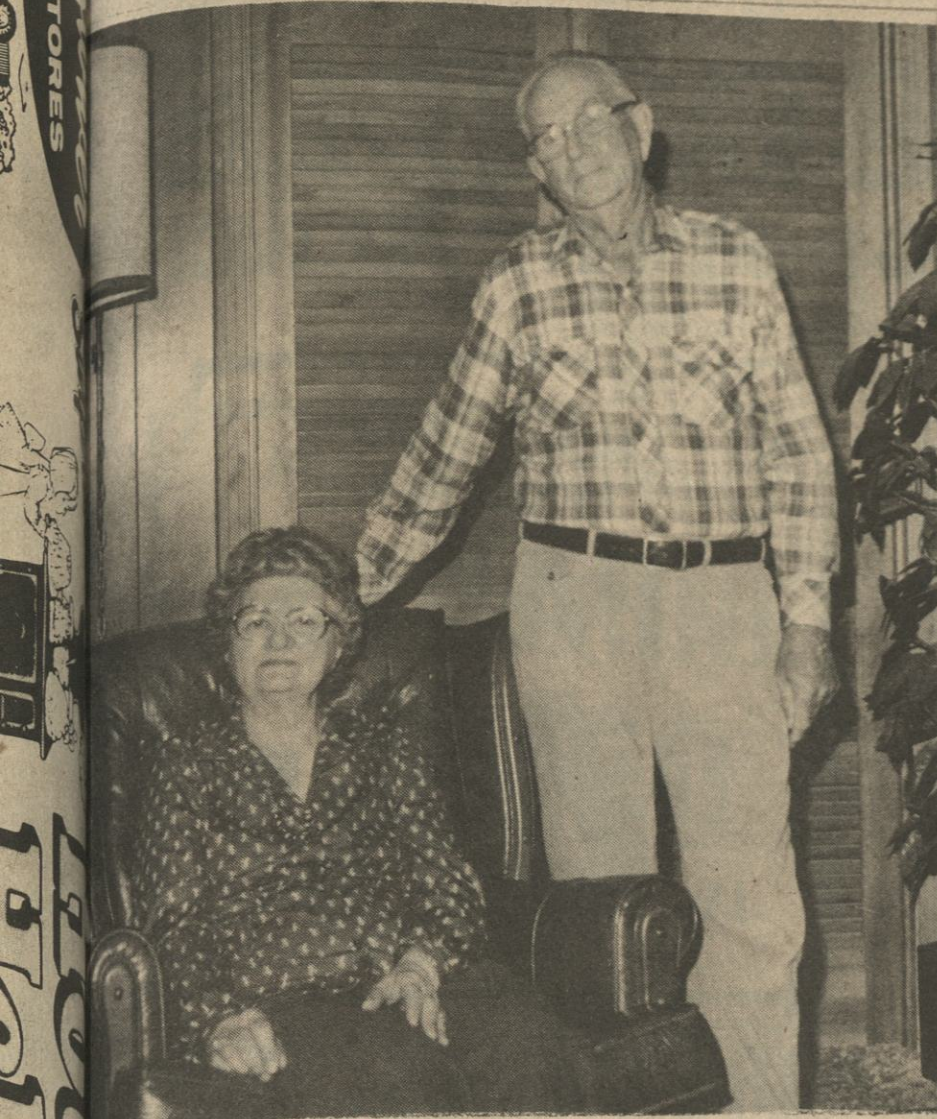

father. There was a log house on the land and this became their first home. Their first child, a son, was born while they lived in the log house. The Deans then built a new home on the Bullard Cutoff Road and moved themselves and their infant son from the little log house to their new home. To support his young family, Mr. Pleas continued to farm. The family lived in their new home for about five years, and they increased in number from three to four as another son was born.

Time rolled on and changes began to come to the area. TVA bought their land with the little log house, Mr. Dean said. The couple decided to sell the home they were living in and to build again. This they did, building on what is now Highway 25 North and moving in 1937. Their family continued to grow, as five more children were born. (Three sons and twin daughters.)

Mr. Dean continued to farm, raising cotton, corn, sorghum, hogs and cattle. Along with farming, he drove a school bus for the Central School. His driving record is very impressive - 18 years with no accidents. In addition to this, he again drove a Head Start school bus for 8 years in the 1960s.

The family worked together, Mr. Dean said. One year they picked a bale of cotton a day, picking a total of 32 bales that year. During the years that Mr. Dean farmed and drove a school bus to support the family, Mrs. Dean kept busy caring for their home and seven young children. In earlier years, her chores included such necessities as making soap.

The Dean children were educated at the Central School, with the younger ones finishing high school at Iuka.

The couple said all their children were active in sports during their school years, and the parents found time to support them in their ac-

tivities. ("Now," said Mr. Dean, "the grandchildren are active in sports and we've started the second round.") The children worked to help their parents, and in addition to teaching responsibility, the Dean parents exposed their family to the culture of music.

Sunday was a very special day to them - Sunday was reserved for worship and that they did by attending the Rocky Springs Methodist Church.

"All our children have excelled in their own talents," Mrs. Dean said, "and we are extremely proud of all of them." Two of the sons are well known. Tommy Dean signed a baseball contract with the Los Angeles Dodgers in 1964, making Tishomingo County very proud of him. He continued professional baseball for eight years, ending his career with the San Diego Padres. The Deans cheered their son on and traveled to see as many games as they could. Their travels included Houston, Texas, Oklahoma City, Okla.; Los Angeles, Calif.; St. Louis, Mo.; Florida and Atlanta, Ga. One of the highlights of their California trip was Disney World.

Bobby, another of the Dean sons, is an accomplished musician, excelling in piano. Bobby was trained at the James D. Waldrep School of Music in Birmingham, Ala., and now serves in his church, Whitehaven Methodist Church, Memphis, as Sunday School pianist.

In 1968, the Deans built their present home, next-door to where they were living. Mr. Dean, semi-retired, but continued to work as hard and be as active as ever. For the past ten years he has been engaged in truck farming. Mr. Pleas is especially known for the cantaloupes he raises. He supplies stores in Iuka as well as Corinth with produce.

"Working is an enjoyment to me," Mr. Dean said, "and it's one of my hobbies." Other hobbies include attending ball games, bird hunting and singing. Mr. Dean has served the Rocky Springs Methodist Church as Music Director for about fifty years. He is now accompanied at the piano by one of his daughters. He is also serving as president of the Tishomingo County Singing Convention, an office which he occupied in past years. The Deans attend the National Quartet Convention last September in Nashville, Tennessee, and have traveled almost as much to singing conventions as they did to baseball games.

Mrs. Gola has always worked beside her husband by keeping the home and caring for the children. "She kept the home fires burning and was always here and we knew it," one daughter remarked. "She is a very good cook," the other added. From observing the attitude of these children, one can only surmise that Miss Gola is a tremendous success as a wife and mother. She cans, freezes, raises pot flowers, bakes and cooks. She excels in making pickles, especially mixed pickles. One daughter-in-law complemented Miss Gola on her taste in clothing and her youthful appearance. She likes to shop, read and enjoys television.

The Deans include Mr. Pleas, Miss Gola and their children: Billy Dean, of Iuka; Bobby Dean, of Memphis; Scotty Dean, Rev. Jackie Dean, Tommy Dean, Jean Dean Hester, and Joan Dean Holly, all of Iuka. Four daughters-in-law, two sons-in-law, fourteen grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

Along with their children, which they love deeply, the Deans expressed appreciation for the daughters-in-law and the sons-in-law. "When they became part of the family, we felt we had been richly blessed." Of course, the first places in the hearts of the Deans go to the grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

In return, the children, spouses, and grandchildren sum up their feelings for their parents like this: "They felt the simple things provided for their family far outweighed the material things. Their children had the security of a home, knowing Mom was there to render whatever service was needed; fellowship and fun of being together; parents that took them to church to worship and parents that gave of themselves to their family."

With Christmas coming, the Deans will spend time enjoying each other. Mr. Dean constructs a special tree in the yard, which all the neigh-

bors have learned to look forward to. Mrs. Dean adds to the season with her excellent cooking; gifts are opened and the family traditionally spends time singing Christmas carols with Bobby at the piano.

The Deans said they had had sickness, trouble, heartbreaks, like everyone, but they quickly added, "Our blessings have far outweighed the bad times."

The Deans will celebrate their 50th wedding anniversary this month, and the children and grandchildren will host an anniversary celebration on December 14, at Rocky Springs Methodist Church in honor of the couple.

Mrs. Dean shared two of her favorite recipes with us:

Dressing (Will serve about 30)

2 large skillet or pans of cornbread made with 10 eggs*

1 quart finely chopped onions
1 quart finely chopped celery
Approx. 3 Tbsp. sage
Salt and pepper to taste

While cornbread is baking, put in a large container (like dishpan) 2 quarts broth with 8 - 10 large crackers and 5 pieces loaf bread. When cornbread is browned, crumble finely with broth mixture, adding onions, celery, sage, salt and pepper. Add more broth if needed. Place in large baking dishes and bake at 400 until browned.

*Mrs. Dean adds no eggs to her dressing but puts them in the cornbread.

Chocolate Pie

¾ cup sugar
½ cup plain flour
3 Tablespoons Cocoa
3 egg yolks (use whites for meringue)
2 cups milk
1 Tablespoon margarine
1 Tablespoon vanilla

In double boiler combine sugar, flour and cocoa. Add a little of the milk to mix and

make a paste. Add beaten egg yolks, add rest of milk. Cook over medium heat and stir constantly. After thickened, take off heat, add butter and vanilla. Pour into a baked pie shell. Bake at 350° to brown meringue.

Pie Crust

1 to 1½ cups plain flour
Scant ½ tsp. salt
½ cup Crisco
4 Tablespoons hot water

Put flour in bowl adding salt. Place shortening in center of flour and pour hot water over shortening. Cut into flour. This makes a soft dough. Turn out on floured surface and knead; adding enough flour to make a stiff dough. Roll out and place in pie plate.
