Air Ambulance To Assist Tishomingo Co.

An Emergency Air Ambulance Helicopter, scheduled to begin service to

Northeast Mississippians next month, was demonstrated last week in Iuka.

The endeavor, which has been pursued by the Yellow Creek Watershed Authority

will enable Tishomingo County residents, as well as other Northeast Mississippi communities within a 150 mile radius of Birmingham, Ala., to have the services of a Category I Trauma Center with a faster and smoother transport than by ground ambulance.

According to Louis Bohorfoush, Emergency Response Planner for the Yellow Creek Watershed Authority, the base for this operation is the Carraway Methodist Medical Center in Birmingham. It is possible for the Air Ambulance, staffed with a doctor and at least one registered nurse, to land in Iuka within about 40 minutes, depending on flight conditions. (A round-trip taking less than two hours by air.)

Mr. Bohorfoush said a Heliport for the Air Ambulance landing would be constructed at the Sheriff's Office and the helicopters are capable of being airborne within five minutes after they receive a call.

The Air Ambulance Life Saver will deliver a high level of care to meet any medical emergency regardless of its severity, 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Life Saver's purpose is to provide the highest level of care possible to the critically ill or injured patient while on the ground as well as in flight.

Law Enforcement Agencies, such as Highway Patrol, Sheriff's Department, Police, and Secret Service, Fire Department, Paramedics, Ambulance Service, Industrial Safety Representatives and hospital and physicians may request a Life Saver Flight.

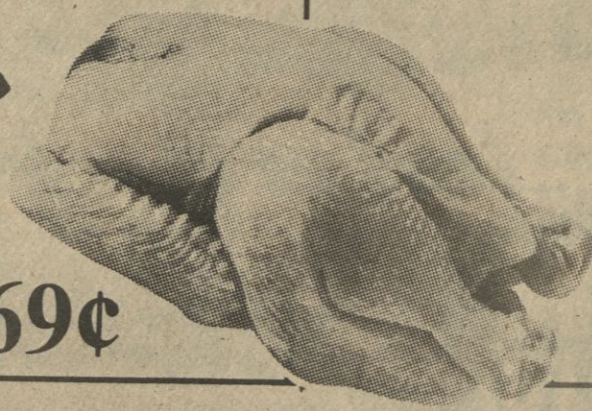

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Chatting With Your Home Economist

Food Hints

- Protect your budget by using leftovers. Failing to use leftovers is like going around with a hole in your pocket. In both cases, you are losing money. Wise homemakers look over their leftovers - not overlook them.
- Plan big meals so you can prepare most of the food ahead and have more time to spend with friends and family.
- Freeze hearty soups for quick suppers or for menfolks to heat up when you're away.
- Make up extra recipes of foods that freeze well to use for quick meals later.
- Make a recipe of chocolate candy or cookies while you prepare dinner. Store in coffee cans with plastic lids or airtight containers. This is easier than taking a day just for that.
- Keep rolls or cookie dough on hand to bake at last minute.
- Have a memo pad handy and as the last bit of an item

is used, list it for replacement on your next shopping trip.

- Store crackers in a warm dry place. A cabinet near the stove is a "self-crisping" device.
- Heavy cream doubles and often triples in volume when whipped.
- One cup of raw rice becomes 3 when cooked.
- Fresh tomatoes keep longer when placed stem end down.

Fruit

When peeling citrus fruits or pineapple, do so over a bowl so as to catch the juice.

To ripen avocado or pineapple, place in a brown paper bag; seal and let stand in a warm, not hot, spot.

To store a ripe pineapple in a refrigerator, wrap well to prevent other foods from absorbing odor.

To prevent discoloration of fresh fruit, the juice of citrus fruits has been designated. There is, as well, a product with an ascorbic acid base

available for this purpose.

Nuts

Be certain nut meats are fresh before using, as they will spoil the flavor of baked products if at all rancid. Taste before using.

A broken nut is about a 1/2-inch piece; coarsely cut, 1/4 inch; finely chopped is self-explanatory.

To blanch almonds, drop into boiling water, allow to stand 5 minutes until skins slip off.

To brown almonds, spread on pan in moderate oven and watch carefully. For salted nuts, add 1 teaspoon salad oil to each cupful in pan, stir often, drain and salt.

Holiday Snacks

Need some ideas for nutritious snacks for children while they are home for the holidays? Try these economical, nutritious snacks.

Cheesy Popcorn

3 T. oil
1/2 cup unpopped corn
Salt
1/2 cup grated cheddar cheese
Heat oil in a heavy saucepan. Add popcorn and cover tightly. Shake over medium heat until all kernels have popped. Immediately sprinkle on cheese and salt and shake. Makes 2 quarts.

Fruit Kabobs

Cheddar cheese cubes
Fruit pieces - apple, pear, orange, banana, grapes, pineapple

Place cheese and fruit pieces alternately on a toothpick.

Conservation Notes

With the field mapping recently completed, and the text now written, the soil survey of Tishomingo County has gone to the Government Printing Office for publication.

We really don't expect a best seller, but the soil survey could prove to be a popular and useful book when the printing is complete in about two years.

The main purpose of a soil survey is to provide a management tool to get the best use of each acre within the acre's capabilities. The survey will be useful to farmers and ranchers in determining range sites, the land's potential for irrigation or even production potential of grasses or crops on the land. Other people, like engineers and home builders can use the survey to determine the best building sites, real estate and tax people can use a survey to appraise the land, and government planning agencies can use a soil survey for land use decisions.

The survey provides an acre-by-acre analysis of the county's soil. Soil scientists have examined the soil and recorded the characteristics that affect its use for agriculture, recreation or urban development. These characteristics include the texture of the topsoil, the depth and nature of the various soil layers, natural drainage, and soil slope.

The purpose of the cooperative survey program is to get a complete inventory of the Nation and to learn as much as possible about the soil. A formal announcement will be made when the final published soil survey is available. Until that time, however, we can use the soil maps from the survey and provide any soil information people might need.

Anyone interested in obtaining the soils information for a home site, farm or ranch use, or for any other reason, should contact the Soil Conservation Service Office in Iuka. This survey is part of the technical help furnished by the SCS to the Tishomingo County Conservation District.

Stop Wild Mustard

Don't wait until wild mustard or wild turnips start to flower before trying to control them. In ryegrass or small grains planted for grazing, allow the crops to tiller and cover the ground and then apply the herbicide treatment. Use 1 to 1 1/2 pints per acre of low volatile ester of 2,4-D.

Where henbit and chickweed are problems, you may want to use Weedmaster (2,4-

Garlic Control

Garlic in home lawns is a tough weed problem that requires several herbicide applications to control. For best results, make two to three well-spaced applications from December to mid-March. Usually, 1/2 to 1 pound of low volatile ester, 2,4-D per acre is needed for each application. You may want to add a wetting agent like dishwashing detergent to help wet the garlic plants.

This year the forestry industry in Mississippi faced problems ranging from the economy to insects. A decline in housing starts resulted in lower prices for pine sawlogs, plywood and hardwood sawtimber. The southern pine beetle left its mark on pine forests throughout the state, reaching epidemic proportions in many counties. The value of 1980 forestry production was 530-million dollars, which was 20-million below that of 1979.

Mississippi homeowners who want to plant spring flowering bulbs must do it this month. Extension Horticulturist Jim Perry says December is the last month for planting these bulbs. Among the most popular bulbs are daffodils, tulips, hyacinths, and dutch iris. Perry says bulbs are an inexpensive addition to your landscape since they require little maintenance and bloom

Burnsville Homemakers

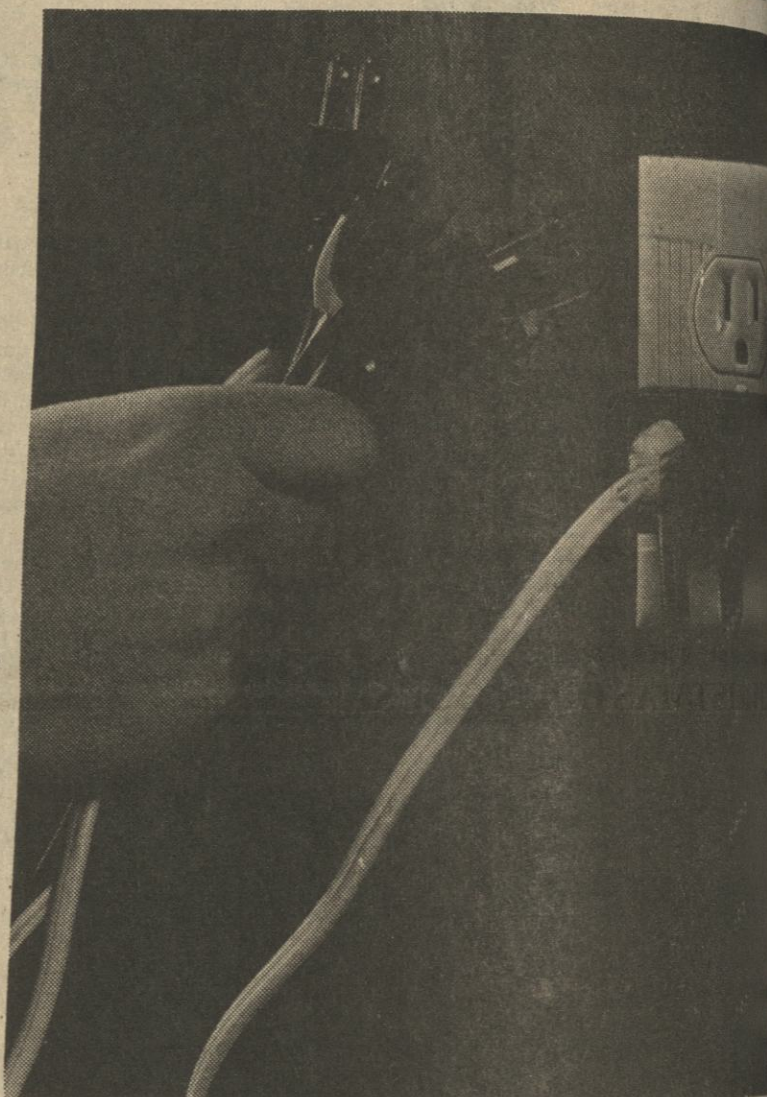

The president read a poem about Christmas.

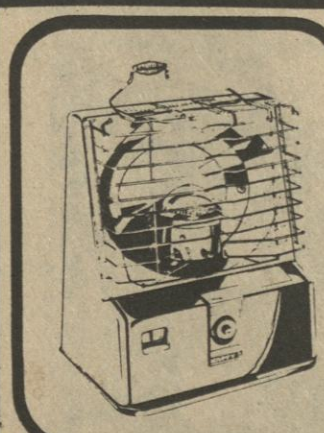

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trend reports, initiating safety orientation programs, and assisting Public Safety in implementing the project fire prevention and protection program. Feezell holds a bachelor's degree in engineering and a master's degree in safety engineering from UT-Chattanooga and North Carolina State, respectively. Leach graduated from East Tennessee State University with a mechanical technology degree.

Since the creation of the Occupational Safety and Health Act in 1970, renewed emphasis has been placed on safety practices at all construction sites and in private industry. The provisions of the act made employers responsible for the standards and subject to fines if the standards weren't met. TVA restructured its own Health and Safety branch to better enforce and comply with safety standards on TVA jobs in 1979.

"The safety field is an active job," says Leach, a six-year TVA veteran. "Every day you're pursuing a new activity that requires something different along safety lines."

According to Leach, negligence is the largest cause of accidents on construction jobs. "People make accidents happen," he remarked. "Most injuries are from falls, hoses lying on the ground, and exposed reinforcing steel. The injuries are primarily to backs, knees, and ankles."

Because some employees are working high above the ground on structural steel erection, safety nets are being used in the unit 1 turbine building area. The nets cost approximately \$20,000, with one crew of ironworkers constantly working to hang the nets. If one life is saved, the time and trouble will be more than justified, say the safety engineers.

"Safety meetings are required each week by the Division of Construction," adds Feezell. "We try to make workers aware of accident potential before it occurs."

When conducting visual inspection of an area, Feezell says he looks for violations in the use of hardhats and safety belts, observation of entrances and exits into a work area, and inspection of potential hazards like electrical cords and air and water hoses. He adds that you can generally find something everywhere you go.

"Our other primary role is to investigate accidents," said Leach. "We check out an accident area following the mishap to determine if a definite hazard existed, the cause of an accident, and possible preventive action."

And finally, like a true detective, Leach admits, "We check out accident claims to decide if they are fraudulent or legitimate, and submit our evidence for worker's compensation acceptance or rejection."

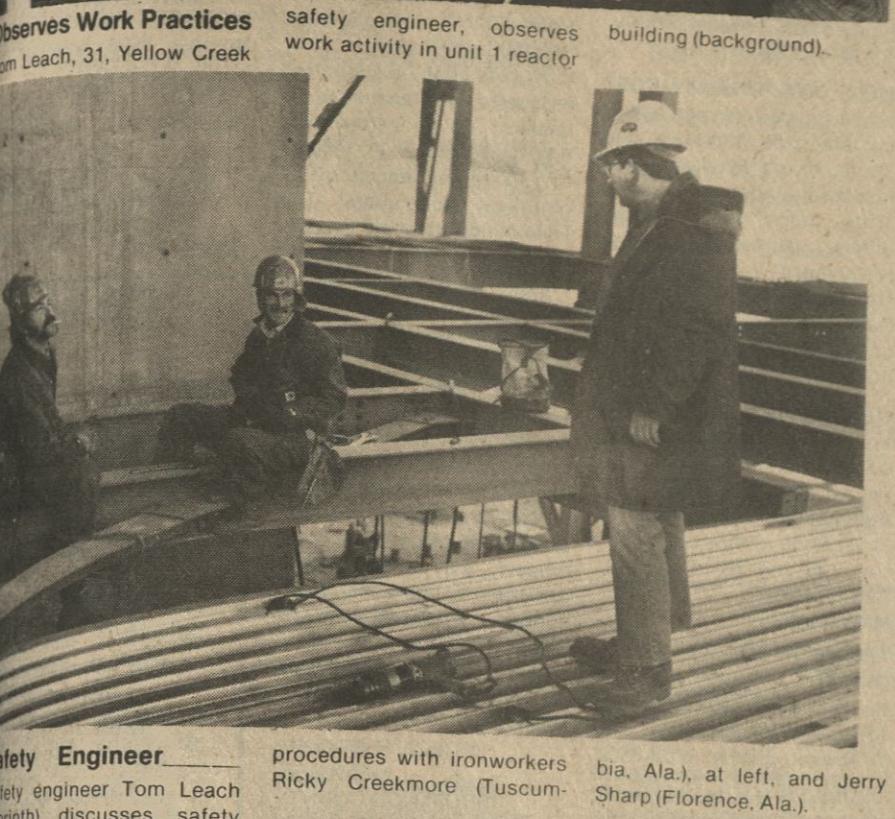

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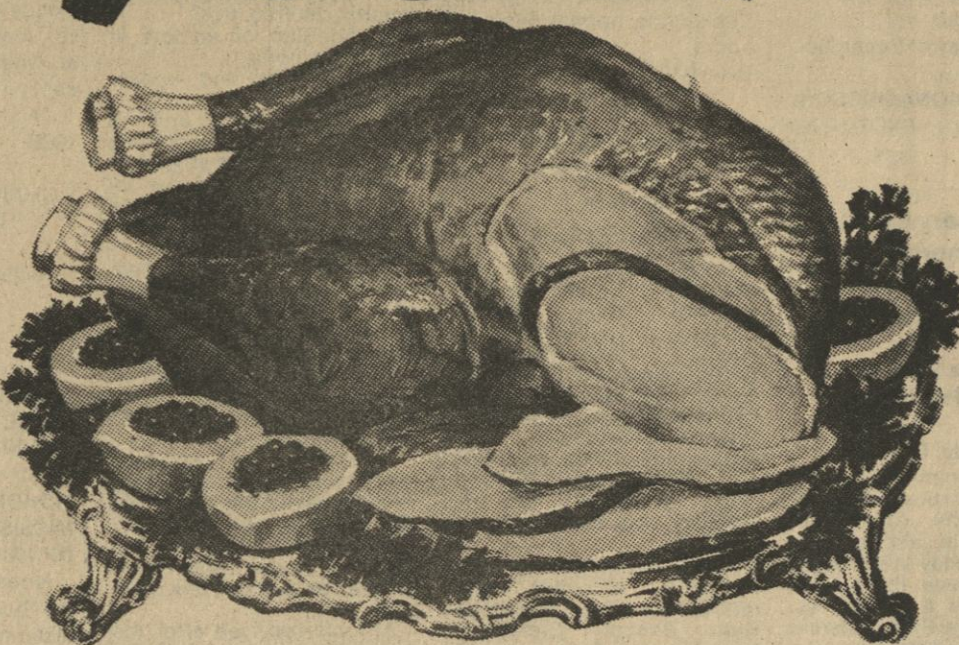

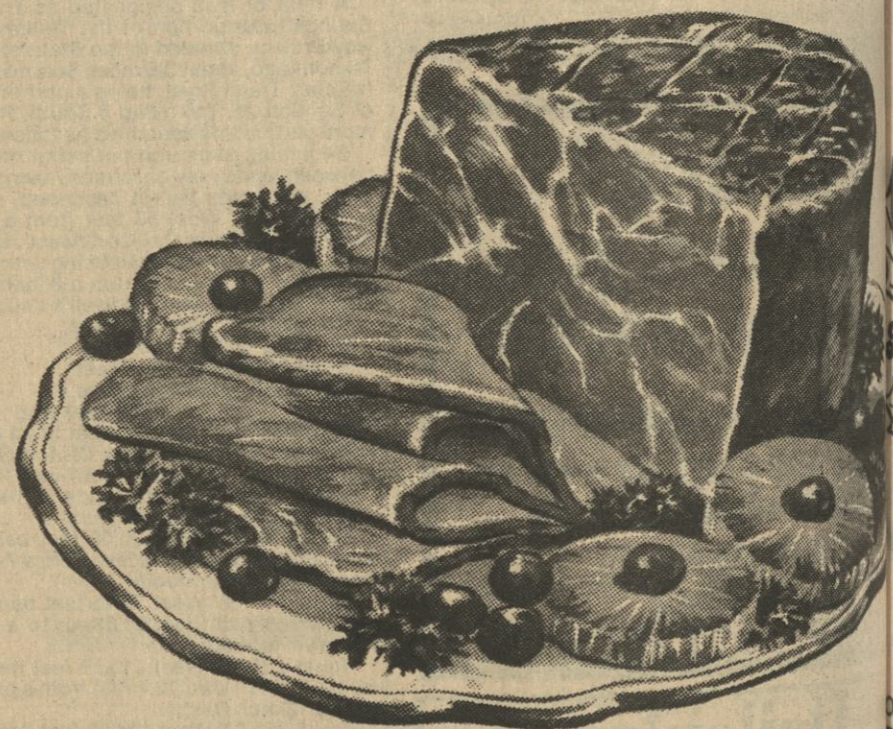

Mrs. Thelma Gray

Mrs. Thelma Ross Gray, born October 16, 1905, only child of Frank Ross and the late Mrs. Hattie Whit-Ross. The birth took place in a little three-room house near Miss Hattie's, the late Mr. and Mrs. Donald Whitfield. The family was located five miles from Burnsville just off Highway 365. A year later Mr. Ross and his wife moved to a house and farm near Burnsville riding a mule. He met a dog that was slobbering at the mouth. The dog went on a very short distance then turned and came back toward him. The dog with rabies (most people called it a "Mad" dog) lunged and bit the mule in the side. Then the dog turned back and went on his way. Mr. Ross followed the dog (but not at close range) as it bit almost every dog in the community. The mule was kept in a stable for a long time but never took rabies. The mule was sold to some horse traders at one-half price because the horse

traders were told the mule had been bitten.

Thelma got her grammar school education at Rowland Mills School. It was only a one teacher school until she was in the fourth grade and then a two-teacher school. Some of her teachers were Mr. Vinson Smith; Mr. Tandy Stepp and his wife, Mrs. May Stepp; Miss Lyda Wren, who is now Mrs. Dave Holder; and Mr. Luther White. Mr. White and "Miss Lyda" are still living. Thelma's high school education was at Red Bay, Ala., and Tishomingo Agricultural High School. She graduated at Tishomingo in 1925. There were 19 in that class. The ones that are still living are as follows: Zeke Clark, Miss Nannie Lee Moore, Mrs. Mae Bell Tigner, Wade Hester, Mrs. Helen Timbes Alden, Jimmy Whitfield, Mrs. Elizabeth Flurry Monroe, Candler White and Mrs. Thelma Ross Gray. The deceased are: Joe Jourdan, Miss Susie Mae Ramsey, Lawrence Bullard, Olen Tigner, Mrs. Beatrice Holder Wheeler, Alvis Grissom, Mrs. Annie Lou Smith Wigley, Hubert Smith, Mrs. Edna Deaton Dean, and Noonan Stephens. Mr. W.R. Nettles was superintendent of the Tishomingo High School at that time. He died October 5, 1962, at the age of 78. Thelma and husband, Eddie Gray, attended his funeral at Tishomingo.

Miss Thelma taught her first school at Holcut (1925-1926). The next year she taught at home - Rowland Mills. On May 1, 1927, she was married to Eddie Gray, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Simon Peter Gray, of Burnsville. Eddie was a barber in Iuka, working for Charlie Daugherty, who is still living. The Grays bought a home in Burnsville, and she taught there for four years before they moved to Red Bay, Ala., where he worked as a barber.

Mrs. Gray got her college education at Northeast Mississippi Junior College, Blue Mountain College and Mississippi State. She got her degree at Mississippi State in 1957 at the age of 52.

The Grays moved from Red Bay to Holts Spur in 1951 to take care of her parents. Her father was bed fast and her mother was in bad health. She again taught in Burnsville in later years which made a total of 11 years. She says that she really enjoyed teaching school. The last job that she had was "Council on

Aging", which lasted three years. She was hired for 13 months but it lasted 37 months. She carried people age 60 or over who had no transportation available in the Burnsville area to the doctor, drug store, grocery store, bank and any where that was necessary. She carried some people to church. That job was terminated on June 30, 1980.

Some people might like to know when the Illinois Central Railroad was built from Corinth to Haleyville, Ala. It was July 17, 1907, that the first train arrived on the new tracks. The tracks met at Red Bay, Ala. Holts Spur is on that railroad. Frank Ross, 98, says this is how the community got its name. A man by the name of Holt owned a saw mill here. A spur track was built in order that box cars could be left and lumber loaded into them. Lumber was usually shipped to Burkeiser in Corinth. There was a passenger train called the "Dood" which people could ride to Corinth in the morning and do their shopping and come back in the afternoon.

A man by the name of Rowland owned and operated a sawmill here, and the school was named Rowland Mills School. When the church was built in 1930, it was named Rowland Mills Baptist Church.

At one time there were three stores at Holts Spur, but there is only one now called Mary's Shopping Center on Highway 365.

Miss Thelma, who was valedictorian of her class, was the first girl from this community to finish high school, and Willie Brackeens was the first boy. There were only three high schools in the county in 1925 - Iuka, Tishomingo and Belmont. There were no school buses any where in the county then. Thelma is proud that she can drive a car. She says that there are lots of women left widows that cannot drive. She has been driving for 59 years.

She boasts that there were five generations of her people living. They were Ann Jeanetta (Walker) Barrett who died at the age of 95, Tishia (Barrett) Stricklen who died at the age of 75, Daisy Bell (Stricklen) Whitfield who died at the age of 93, Hattie Lee Whitfield Ross who died at the age of 80, and Thelma Ross Gray still living. She was almost 10 years old when her great - great - grandmother Barrett died.

The Grays had a son born to them while living in Red Bay. He is Edwin Ross Gray, who is now guidance counselor at the Manpower School in Corinth. His wife, Carolyn Collier Gray, works in Corinth also.

Thelma told us about her Grandpa Ross, Granville Henry Harrison Ross, called "Dock". He fought in the Civil War which lasted from 1861-1865. He enlisted September 19, 1861, at Iuka, Miss. He was captured at Fort Donelson, February 16, 1862. He was paroled at Greensboro, North Carolina, April 28, 1865. He then walked home to this community.

Thelma has a badge that belonged to him which is inscribed Camp W.A. Johnson No. 898 U.C.V. Tuscumbia, Ala. The date on it is 1861-1865. He died at the home of his son, Frank Ross, at the age of 69. He was a member of the Methodist Church. The late Reverend C.C. Perry held the funeral at Jacinto where he was buried beside his wife, Beatrice Jones, on April 26, 1910. It snowed that day, and though Thelma was only 4 1/2 years old, she can remember him.

Mrs. Gray can also remember a great-grandfather who went to the Civil War. His name was Andrew Jackson Stricklen. He got an ankle broken in time of it when he was in Georgia. They let him come home on a horse but he went back when his ankle got well. He died at the age of 70. He fell dead in his yard at his home and that of his wife, Tishia Stricklen.

Thelma has three named for her - Thelma Whitfield, Thelma Lambert, and Thelma Gallaheer.

Mrs. Gray's hobbies are reading, making a garden, writing letters, and helping people in different ways. She doesn't watch TV very much, but she does watch Buddy and Kay Bain at WELO every morning (Monday through Friday) from 6 to 7 o'clock. She also watches the news. She listens to the birthday and wedding anniversary show on the radio at Iuka and calls those on the phone that she knows. She visits her father at the nursing home often and visits some of the patients at the Tishomingo County Hospital. She is a member of the Rowland Mills Church, having served as church clerk and Sunday School teacher for a number of years; a member of Burnsville Homemakers Club, and a member of the Burnsville Chapter of the Eastern Star.

Thelma has been sending news to The Vidette ever since she was a teenager, except for the 22 years she lived at Red Bay. She reported the Red Bay news to the paper while living there. She wishes everyone a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.

QUESTION - Which of the following is not a common possible symptom of narcotics use?

- d) Pinpoint pupils

ANSWER - The use of narcotics may result in a short-lived state of euphoria. They also tend to induce drowsiness, apathy, lethargy, constipation, pinpoint pupils, and reduced vision. Except in cases of acute toxication, however, there is no loss of motor coordination or slurred speech as in the case of depressants.

ANSWER - A recent study by the National Institute on Drug Abuse shows that Darvon continues to be reported more often in drug-related deaths than any other prescription drug. This analysis is based on deaths involving Darvon used alone or in combination with other drugs and alcohol.

Darvon is labeled for the relief of mild to moderate pain. An estimated 30 million prescriptions for the drug are filled annually.

QUESTION - What percentage of heroin addicts also are alcoholics?

- a) None
- b) 10%
- c) 30%
- d) 50%

ANSWER - Nearly half of all heroin addicts are alcoholics or have drinking patterns which point to alcoholism, says a study released by the National Institute on Drug Abuse.

According to the study, "Unstable adult lifestyles were evidenced by the fact that 47% of the alcohol-involved addicts reported illegal income sources and 86% had spent time in jail." The study also reports that 36% of the alcohol-involved heroin addicts had contemplated suicide and that 20% actually attempted to take their own lives.

Dr. Sanchez Appointed

Dr. J.R. Sanchez has been appointed to a committee to conduct in-depth clinical study on personal injury (whiplash) in Iuka.

As a result of the advanced work in personal injury, Dr. Sanchez has successfully completed, he was one of a select group chosen while attending a three-day symposium in Atlanta, Ga.

The symposium was conducted by practice consultants. Included in the study was intensive technical training on personal injury (whiplash) and resulting trauma.

Dr. Sanchez states that this additional training will enable him to render a superior service to patients involved in personal injury (whiplash).

Your Social Security

Many important changes in the social security disability insurance and supplemental security income (SSI) disability programs take effect this month (December), Jerry Myatt, social security manager in Corinth, said recently.

Many of the changes are intended to encourage people who receive social security or SSI disability payments to return to work. These changes are: If a person who is still disabled becomes unable to work within a year after his or her benefits were stopped because of work, payments can be automatically reinstated. A new application is not necessary, but the person must notify social security.

If a worker starts receiving social security disability benefits within 5 years after they stopped and he or she had Medicare before, Medicare can begin immediately. The person will not have to serve another 24 month waiting period. This provision also applies to disabled widows and widowers and adults disabled before age 22 whose benefits start again within 7 years.

A person who did not complete the 24-month waiting period during the first period of disability can count the months he or she did get benefits toward the waiting period in the second period of

disability.

Impairment related work expenses can be deducted from a person's earnings in deciding whether he or she is able to do substantial gainful work even if these expenses also apply to daily living needs. Expenses for such things as medical devices and equipment, attendant care, required drugs, and services are included. These deductions also apply in figuring the amount of the SSI payment. Disabled widows and widowers are now eligible for a trial work period which permits them to test their ability to work and still get benefits. Social Security will pay a reasonable charge for any medical reports it needs and requests.

Another change applying to those getting SSI payments because of disability will become effective in January 1981. Under the old law, SSI payments stopped if a person was found to have earnings high enough to represent substantial gainful work. As a result, he or she was often ineligible for Medicaid and social services.

Under a 3-year experiment, all of these benefits may continue even though a person's earnings are high enough to represent substantial gainful work. As the person's earnings increase, however, the amount of the SSI payment will decrease.

But, eligibility for Medicaid and social services may continue if a disabled or blind person could not work without this help and does

not earn enough to pay for similar help.

More information about these changes in the social security disability insurance and SSI disability programs is available by contacting the Corinth social security office between the hours of 8:30 - 4:30. The phone number in Corinth is 287-5241. Most residents of Tippah and Tishomingo counties can call

the office in Corinth at no charge by dialing 837-3018, or 423-6042 respectively.
